Editorial

Ya tenemos candidatos

La fecha para someter las firmas llegó creando una gran preocupación en Lawrence. Algunas de las antiguas caras regresan porque no tienen oposición y esto no se presagia como algo bueno para la ciudad.

La carrera para la alcaldía promete ser acalorada con tres candidatos tratando de sacar al Alcalde Michael J. Sullivan. Es una lástima que la ciudad esté tan terriblemente dividida por razas y lenguajes.

El Concilio tendrá algunos cambios en noviembre con dos de ellos postulados para alcalde este año y los distritos verán caras nuevas también, pero la única tensión se verá entre los concejales At-Large. Hay seis candidatos y todos pasarán a las elecciones de noviembre donde solo tres serán seleccionados, pero las Elecciones Preliminares del 27 de setiembre será una buena indicación de cuáles serán los resultados finales.

Tenemos tres novatos en el Comité Escolar en los Distritos C, D y F, corriendo sin oposición y debemos rogar porque su integridad sea superior a la de algunos de los miembros actuales. El Distrito B tiene tres candidatos compitiendo por esa posición, todos nuevos en la política y Amy McGovern, la única miembro del Comité Escolar realizando su trabajo fielmente, tiene a dos en su contra. En el Distrito A, James Vittorioso está postulado para reelección sin oposición.

Hoy hay tiempo si alguien desea tomar parte en una campaña con *stickers* en cualquiera de esos distritos. Necesitamos nuevos candidatos para poder escoger a la mejor persona y no tener que aceptar a algunos de los mediocres que tenemos postulados.

The deadline for submission of signatures arrived creating great concern in Lawrence. Some of the old faces are coming back because they have no opposition and it does not bode well for the city.

The mayoral race promises to be heated with three candidates trying to unseat Mayor Michael J. Sullivan. It is a shame that the city is so terribly divided by racial and language lines.

The City Council will have some changes in November with two of them running for mayor this year and the districts will see new faces, too, but the real nail bitter is the Councilors At-Large race. There are six candidates and they all will make it to the November Elections where only three will be selected, but the September 27 Preliminary Election will be a great indication of how they will turn out.

We have three newcomers in the School Committee in Districts C, D and F, running unopposed and we must pray that their integrity will be superior to that of some of the current members. District B has three candidates competing for that position, all newcomers, and Amy McGovern, the only member doing her job faithfully, has two contenders. In District A, James Vittorioso is running for reelection, unopposed.

There is still time if anyone wants to run a sticker campaign in any of those districts. We need new candidates for office so that we can choose the best candidates not just get stuck with some of the mediocrity we have running.

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Mayor Responds to Devers on CrossOver

Lawrence Councilor At-Large and mayoral candidate Marcos Devers sent us a press release last week questioning different issues going on in this city so Richard Aybar and I decided to invite Mayor Michael J. Sullivan to "CrossOver" our radio show on WCCM-AM and among other questions, we also asked him about his contender's concerns. Next Sunday, August 14th, Councilor Devers will be our guest in the studios.



Laboy/McGovern issue

Councilor Devers is concerned about the on-going criminal process involving School Committeewoman Amy McGovern and Schools Superintendent Wilfredo Laboy as a result of their mid-June physical confrontation. We chose not wasting any time discussing something that the mayor has no control over since the court hearing is scheduled for August 26th. Besides, whatever decisions are to be taken, it will be the School Committee and they are not about to do anything, particularly fire Superintendent Laboy.

Planning and Development and HUD

"Contrary to what the mayor is telling us, his acting director of Planning and Development reported to the City Council that almost half of these funds are still unavailable to the city because the mayor has not implemented a HUD-approved infrastructure compliance program," said Councilor Devers.

Mayor Sullivan said that everything is still pending but he went as far as explaining that HUD had reservations about the Economic Development Director. While he earns over \$92,000 salary from three different sources, he spends most of his time working out of the mayor's office because he doesn't pay too much attention to job descriptions and "when I want something done I give it to anyone," said Sullivan.

HUD said that the Economic Development Department should be revamped and separated from the Office of Planning and Development (OPD), like the way it used to be when Morella Lombardi was director of Planning and Development before they became one big department. The new Economic Development Department may consist of three employees and the director may end up earning \$140,000. At this time, there are 13 positions available in the OPD and when all the job descriptions are redone, every employee has to apply for his or her own position. This includes the director of the Economic Development Department.

When Richard asked Mayor Sullivan if he has the requirements to apply for the job, the mayor answered that "his experience will be taken into consideration," sort of on-the-job-training.

Israel Reyes and the \$4,000 bribe

Councilor Devers also mentioned that "City Councilor Israel Reyes alleged that a member of the mayor's licensing board took a \$4,000 bribe to deliver approval of a liquor license to an applicant. It was not until I began demanding an accounting of this allegation from the mayor that he finally asked Chief Romero to begin a police investigation of the allegation."

Mayor Sullivan gave us a timeline of how the events happened. According to him, he requested Chief John Romero "to conduct an investigation the very next day and the following Saturday, Councilor Devers attended the Mt. Vernon Neighborhood Association meeting and did not say anything."

Devers also said in his note, "I, not the mayor,

also asked the Essex County District Attorney to look independently into this matter. After nearly three months, we still have yet to receive a report from the mayor as to the findings of this investigation of his appointees." According to Mayor Sullivan, it was two weeks later when Devers contacted the District Attorney's office.

"What the councilors should have done was ask Councilor Reyes to explain himself at that time," said Sullivan. The mayor believes that the councilors should have placed the issue on the agenda in order to pursue its veracity.

Since the investigation has been completed, Sullivan is prepared to present the results of the investigation to the Council this coming Thursday the 11th of August, he will place it on the next agenda to force them to discuss it.

The investigation took the police department to New Jersey in order to interview the woman in question. Richard Aybar suggested that Israel Reyes pays for the costs incurred in this investigation as punishment for throwing bombs without adequate documentation.

ValleyWorks' slush fund

Marcos wrote: "Several weeks ago it was revealed that ValleyWorks Career Center, the agency in charge of providing jobs training monies and programs for Lawrence, was sitting on a \$1.2 million slush fund to pay for Lawrence's salaries and fringe benefits and 'to protect Lawrence,' according to its director. In other words, the money was not being used for its intended purpose – jobs training in a city with double-digit unemployment."

According to Mayor Sullivan, the investigation revealed that there was no wrongdoing because it is normal for these funds to exist - perhaps not this high amount – but it has not been considered a 'slush fund' because it has been audited every year. From now on, the Budget and Finance Director, John Griffin will be in charge of that account.

Inspectional Services Inspectors

"During the City Council's recent budget deliberations we heard some details about a state investigation into the manner in which the city

administers its building inspections. For example, we do not have inspectors who are state certified; we do not have enough inspectors; and we have one inspector currently serving a paid suspension for unknown misconduct. We learned that the state board overseeing this department intends to have continual oversight of the situation until the mayor and his appointees can comply with state regulations," wrote Devers.

The alleged misconduct is something that cannot be discussed in public but the mayor pointed out that this employee who has been out on paid leave is the only one certified by the state and he is coming back on Wednesday of this week. We have two inspectors plus the returning employee and there is one position posted with 12 applicants. These are the four positions budgeted and the mayor is confident that with four inspectors the department will be able to function properly.

Mayor's budget

Councilor Devers is also concerned about the deficit. "The mayor's budget director admitted the city has a \$6.5 million structural deficit. Because the mayor is using faulty revenue numbers that the state

Department of Revenue already rejected once in last year's budget, we are likely looking at an almost \$10 million budget deficit for the fiscal year that began on July 1st."

Sullivan placed the responsibility back on the members of the council for failing to raise sufficient funds from the sale of lots, practically giving them away to non-profit groups.

Anonymous letters investigation

With regards to the investigation going on at City Hall on the anonymous letters that were sent to several people, Mayor Sullivan said that it has ended and they could not prove the origin of said letters.

Public Access Television

I took the mayor to task with Channel 8 because while we don't have a studio to tape our shows, he avails himself of the South Lawrence East School's television studio. According to the contract between the City and Lawrence Community Access Television, in case of delays, the City should make space available for Public Access programming. As it is, most of the shows he produces belong on Channel 22, the Government Channel, not Channel 8.

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

Dear Editor

I'd like to thank Senator Steven Baddour for showing his commitment to protecting public health by supporting a line item in the state budget that will provide funding for research on safer alternatives to 5 toxic chemicals: lead, formaldehyde, perchloroethylene, hexavalent chromium, and di-(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate (DEHP). Senator Baddour co-signed letters to the leadership of the Massachusetts legislature in support of overriding a Romney veto of the Toxics Use Reduction Institute Safer Alternatives Analysis. The legislature overrode this veto on Thursday July 14th.

Scientific evidence increasingly indicates that toxic chemicals are contributing to an epidemic of chronic diseases and disorders, including asthma,

cancer, learning and behavioral disabilities, and neurological diseases such as ALS & Parkinsons. This analysis is an important step towards creating a program to replace these toxic chemicals with safer alternatives wherever feasible and thus mitigating further exposure to humans and the environment.

Thank you to Senator Baddour for his leadership on this issue. I hope that he will continue his support by working for legislation to replace toxic chemicals with safer alternatives during this legislative session.


Phase II was done this year, from the

Lawrence kids get food with fun at local sites

When school is out, kids who rely on free or reduced-price meals need a safe place to go where they can get a healthy meal and have some summer fun. That's why Project Bread gave \$4,500 in Summer Food Service Program Incentive Grants to the City of Lawrence in an effort to improve and expand current programs.

The grant money is designated to strengthen existing programs and add new sites where needed in Lawrence. Grants can be used to acquire food storage and preparation equipment, sports or arts and crafts equipment, even books and air conditioning, whatever it takes to add a new site or enrich the programming and expand the number of children served. Project Bread's grants are part of its ongoing work to prevent hunger in children. Grantees include: Lawrence Math and Science Partnership Summer Camp; Lawrence Public Schools; and Lawrence Seventh Day Adventist Church.

"As part of our child hunger prevention work," said Ellen Parker, executive director of Project Bread, "we're committed to feeding kids where they live, learn, and play. Kids are scattered over the summer months, making it more difficult to feed them. For this reason, we've made an investment in bringing food and fun together at neighborhood programs that are attractive and meaningful to families."

The 53 programs that received grants included local Boys and Girls Clubs, community centers, school- and playground-based programs, church programs, and YMCAs.

These are located in the cities and towns identified by Project Bread as most needing assistance, including Boston, Brockton, Chelsea, Chicopee, Fall River, Fitchburg, Holyoke, Hyannis, Lawrence, Lowell, Lynn, New Bedford, Revere, Salem, Southbridge, Springfield, and Worcester.

Project Bread works to expand access to the USDA's Summer Food Service Program, administered by the Department of Education, which currently provides free lunch for children up to the age of 18 at locations throughout Lawrence while school is out during the summer months. Children who have access to nutritious meals throughout the summer return to school in the fall ready to learn.



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

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Art Installations on site in Lawrence

Open Day: Sat. Aug 13th, 12-8pm

Floating Studio is pleased to announce its first event to be held July 15- Aug 15th, with an opening reception Saturday August 13th, 12-8pm, free and open to the public. Floating Studio is an organization of artists in need of space to execute large-scale experimental projects. For their first project, 5 artists will work for 3 weeks in one communal 3,000 square foot space, donated for this time period by Andrea Management in Lawrence, Mass. Each artist will create a temporary installation that capitalizes on the experimental nature of the environment, and the temporary availability of large scale space. The installations will be available for viewing at the open day event, Saturday August 13th, 12-8pm. The space and artists' work in progress may be viewed at any other time by appointment.

The idea for this project was born out of a discussion between Sophia Ainslie and Cynthia Roberts, two participating artists seeking a temporary space for the execution and exploration of projects which would literally not fit in their studios. The work being shown is not presented in gallery-format, but rather as work in process and experimental in nature. The roots of this project draw on the model of Triangle Artists' Workshop, an international arts organization with intensive artists projects worldwide, in which Ainslie, Bjerkie and Roberts have participated. One of the hopes of the artists is to continue to build the vibrant arts community of Lawrence which is developing. The building where the temporary installations will be held, 250 Canal Street, is owned and operated by Andrea Management, which has generously donated the space for this time period. This historic mill building is undergoing a transformation which brings increased studio space and new loft space to Lawrence for artists and creative professionals.

Participating artists include Sophia Ainslie (South African, lives/works Boston area), John Bjerkie (American, lives/works in Brooklyn, NY), Gayle Caruso (Lawrence native, lives/works Andover), Cathy McLaurin (American, lives/works Boston area), Cynthia Roberts (lives/works Boston area). Lawrence, founded on the Merrimack River and incorporated in 1847, was the final and most ambitious of the New England planned textile-manufacturing cities developed by the Boston entrepreneurs who launched the American Industrial Revolution. Known for its textile mills it is now home to various businesses and retail outlets such as New Balance, as well as cultural institutions including the Essex Art Center and many independent artists' studios.

Also referred to as "Immigrant City", due to the large number of people who immigrated to work in the textile mills when they were still in operation, the name still applies, since Lawrence has a large Hispanic immigrant population, as well as a strong Asian immigrant population.

Mayor Michael J. Sullivan wastes no opportunity to market the city. On July 27, 2005, he hosted a group of members of *North of Boston Convention and Visitors Bureau* gathered at the Abe Bashara Boathouse, in the Riverfront State Park, in Lawrence.

From Boston’s doorstep to New Hampshire, from the Atlantic Ocean to peaceful fields, woods and streams along I-93, *North of Boston* promotes first-class museums, shops and galleries along with many of New England’s finest restaurants and accommodations.
