

El Centro Satélite del Boys & Girls Club destruido por fuego

El viernes, 1ro de septiembre al mediodía, un fuego destruyó el Multi Service Center, localizado en la esquina de las calles Essex y Winter, en Lawrence. El edificio era propiedad de la Autoridad de Vivienda de Lawrence y era operado por el Boys and Girls Club, donde mantenían su Centro de Computadoras.

“Para la Autoridad de Vivienda, el edificio fue una pérdida total y nosotros perdimos 36 computadoras”, dijo Markus Fischer, director ejecutivo del Boys and Girls Club. “Nuestra mayor pérdida es que nuestros niños no pueden usarlo más”, dijo.

“El Centro tenía 18 computadoras viejas que iban a ser reemplazadas por 18 nuevas y ahora las perdimos todas, las viejas y las nuevas incluyendo los ratones

de las computadoras, teclados, impresoras, pantallas, etc, así como un nuevo estudio de grabación”, explicó Fischer

Al cierre de esta edición, jueves 7, la Estación Central de Incendios reportó que el fuego aún estaba bajo investigación.

Como resultado del reciente incendio y la subsiguiente pérdida del local de Servicios Múltiples de Lawrence en la esquina de las Calles Essex y Winter donde funcionaba el precinto 1 del Distrito C, este ha sido reubicado en la Escuela Guilmette, en el número 80 de la calle Bodwell para las Primarias Estatales de septiembre 19, 2006 y las Elecciones Estatales de Noviembre 7, 2006.

Boys and Girls Club Satellite Center destroyed by fire

On Friday, September 1st, 2006 in the afternoon, a fire destroyed the Multi Service Center, located at the corners of Essex and Winter Street, in Lawrence. The building was the property of the Lawrence Housing Authority and was operated by the Boys and Girls Club where they housed their Computer Center.

“For Housing, the building was a total loss and for us, we lost 36 computers”, said Markus Fischer, executive director of the Boys and Girls Club. “But our biggest loss is that our kids can't use the place any more”, he said.

“The Center had 18 old computers that were about to be replaced by 18 new ones, and we lost them all,

the old and the new ones, including mice, key boards, printers, monitors, etc. and also a brand new recording studio”, explained Fischer.

At the closing of this edition, Thursday the 7th, the Central Fire Department reported that the fire was still under investigation.

As a result of the fire and subsequent loss of the Multi-Service Center polling location at Essex and Winter Streets, all voters in the C-1 voting precinct will be able to vote at the Guilmette School located at 80 Bodwell Street in Lawrence, MA in the State Primary on September 19, 2006 and the State Election on November 7, 2006.

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PERMANEZCA SALUDABLE DURANTE LA TEMPORADA DE MOSQUITOS

NO SE DEJE PICAR: Los mosquitos y otros insectos penetrantes son una parte normal del verano en Nueva Inglaterra. Pero unos pasos simples pueden ayudar a su familia a permanecer saludables durante la temporada de insectos.

QUITE EL AGUA ACUMULADA: Los mosquitos ponen sus huevos en agua baja inmóvil. Mantenga su patio libre de artículos de chatarra tales como piscinas sin usar, neumáticos viejos, etc. El agua lluvia puede recoger estos artículos y proporcionar un lugar ideal para que los mosquitos se críen.

MANTENGA TODO LIMPIO: Quite todos los artículos de chatarra de su patio, corte su grama y mantenga su propiedad bien. Asegúrese que su contraventana y canaletas no estén bloqueadas de ninguna manera. A los mosquitos no les gusta una casa seca y un patio bien mantenido.

QUÉDESE ADENTRO CUANDO LOS INSECTOS ESTÉN FUERA: Mantenga a niños y ancianos adentro después del atardecer. Los mosquitos están afuera y mas activos después del anochecer y al amanecer también. Use una malla protectora sobre el coche de bebe cuando saque a su bebe fuera.

SI TIENE QUE ESTAR AFUERA: Póngase camisas sueltas de mangas largas y pantalones largos. Utilice protector de insectos en la piel y roséelo sobre la ropa y sombreros de verano y use un pañuelo alrededor de su cuello.

SIGA LAS DIRECCIONES: Lea las etiquetas y escoja su protector de insectos sabiamente. El protector de insectos con DEET se recomienda a menudo pero otros pueden trabajar bien, también. ¡Tenga cuidado al aplicar el protector de insectos en los niños! Evite contacto con los ojos y la boca, y asegúrese de utilizar un producto especialmente diseñado para los niños.

TENGA CUIDADO: Algunos mosquitos en Massachusetts ahora están llevando el Virus del Oeste del Nilo o la Encefalitis Equina del Este. Algunos de los síntomas de estas enfermedades son fiebre alta o dolor de cabeza. Llame a su doctor enseguida si se enferma de repente en la temporada de mosquitos.

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Marcos Devers acusa a Lantigua de apoyar un aumento injusto en los impuestos

En un recién recibido parte de prensa enviado por su equipo de campaña, Marcos A. Devers acusó a William Lantigua de secretamente apoyar el aumento a los impuestos a la propiedad por más de \$250, según ha propuesto el Alcalde Michael J. Sullivan.

“El incumbente está en secreto detrás de ese aumento de impuestos”, denunció Devers citando un artículo publicado la semana pasada en el Eagle-Tribune, el cual reportó que “el Alcalde Sullivan tendrá que romper su promesa (de no aumentar los impuestos) porque la delegación legislativa demanda que (el alcalde) aumente los impuestos al máximo”, dijo Devers en su parte de prensa.

La Ciudad de Lawrence se enfrenta a un déficit que ha sido estimado hasta de \$16 millones (dependiendo de quien está hablando) y el Alcalde Sullivan ha sido forzado por la Legislatura a aumentar los impuestos al máximo para el año fiscal del 2007.

La nota continúa culpando al Representante Estatal Lantigua porque siendo miembro de la Legislatura no alzó su voz en contra de tal aumento; entonces el representante dijo en una entrevista exclusiva que él no puede discutir con lógica en la Casa de Estado cuando traen el asunto de los impuestos en una discusión. “Los impuestos a la propiedad en Lawrence son bajos, por eso es que el valor a la propiedad sigue subiendo.”

El año pasado, el ex Secretario de Administración y Finanzas Eric Kriss vino a Lawrence para escuchar sobre los planes de expansión de Northern Essex y rechazó la idea porque fue su impresión que Lawrence no está haciendo lo que es justo con relación a los impuestos y deben subirlos al máximo límite.

El hecho es que Lawrence está a aproximadamente el 9% por debajo de ese límite, lo cual representa menos de \$3 millones. Apesar que el número es más alto que la mayoría de las municipalidades en el estado, es mucho más bajo que la Ciudad de Cambridge la cual está en un 20% por

debajo de su tarifa de impuestos que representa casi \$45 millones; Lowell está en 17% representando más de \$12 millones; Leominster es 13.4% que significa \$5.1 millones y Methuen está a 9% bajo el cual representa \$4.3 millones. Estas cifras están disponibles a través del Departamento de Rentas Internas, División de Servicios Locales.

Rumbo también hizo un llamado a otros legisladores hallando un sorprendente apoyo hacia la petición del Alcalde Michael J. Sullivan que permita que Lawrence empiece a pagar por sus propios gastos. Massachusetts tiene 160 representantes estatales y 40 senadores estatales y todos ellos apoyan esta medida del comité de finanzas que recomendó a Lawrence el aumento en sus impuestos.

“Yo he trabajado con el Rep. Lantigua por casi cuatro años y puedo decir con toda certeza que aumentar el impuesto a la propiedad en Lawrence no es su idea,” dijo el Rep. Kevin Murphy (D-Lowell).

“Eso no suena como algo que Willy (Rep. Lantigua) haya dicho,” dijo el Rep. Thomas Goleen (D-Lowell). “El siempre está buscando más dinero para sus constituyentes, no sacárselos del bolsillo.”

“Yo pienso que es una acusación casi

ridícula que alguien sugiera que el Representante Lantigua está abogando por un aumento de impuestos. El es un incansable luchador por Lawrence aquí en la Casa de Estado y se ha ganado el respeto y admiración de sus colegas de todo el estado,” dijo el Representante Estatal David Torrisi (D-North Andover) quien también representa una porción de Lawrence. “El ha asegurado millones de dólares en fondos para la ciudad. La ciudad simplemente no tiene la base necesaria para devengar los impuestos que requiere para sus propias necesidades y el Representante Lantigua ha sido vital en hacer posible que esas vicisitudes de los ancianos y niños sean cubiertas.”

Y el Rep. Torrisi agregó, “Mientras que simpatizo con Marcos, pienso que Willy está haciendo un buen trabajo. El siente pasión por lo que hace y hace presión cuando necesita hacerlo, sin embargo, tiene muy buen sentido del humor y es agradable estar en su compañía y trabajar con él. Lo considero un buen amigo.”

La Senadora Estatal Susan Tucker (D-Andover) también expresó la necesidad de



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La policía de Lawrence continúa siendo criticada

Recientemente, el canal 5 divulgó después de una investigación de dos meses en el departamento de policía de Lawrence, unas estadísticas realmente sorprende. Mientras que el informe fue dirigido hacia el uso de los autos oficiales siendo usados para cosas personales, las cifras descubiertas por esta investigación tomaron por sorpresa a los residentes de Lawrence en cuando al crimen y a la calidad de vida.

Hemos estado oyendo durante mucho tiempo que el crimen está reduciéndose y parece que hay un bloqueo general en toda la información referente a los crímenes cometidos en esta ciudad. No tenemos ninguna idea donde Janet Wu encontró estos datos pero puesto que se han recibido con silencio, debe ser verdad.

Según el informe, el jefe del policía dice que el crimen se ha reducido por un 55% desde que él ha tomado ese cargo con solamente 2 asesinatos en dos años y que el hurto residencial y el robo de automóviles han bajado este año.

Pero en los primeros siete meses del 2006, los robos subieron un 44%, los robos comerciales aumentaron un 50%, las raterías subieron 6% y los asaltos agravados un 4%.

El pasado martes, 5 de septiembre, el residente Mark Gray de Lawrence compareció ante el consejo de ciudad leyendo una copia de quejas contra el departamento de policía que él distribuyó más tarde a cada miembro del consejo y que publicamos aquí por separado.

Mientras tanto, el jueves por la mañana, hubo una reunión en la Escuela Leahy para informar a padres sobre el año escolar próximo. El parqueo en ese vecindario es muy limitado, por lo tanto ellos se estacionaron doble sabiendo que todos iban para el mismo sitio. Entonces, la reunión fue interrumpida y acabó precipitadamente porque una oficial de la policía estaba

poniendo multas a todos los que estaban bloqueando a otros autos afuera.

Usted dirá que estaba haciendo su trabajo, ¿verdad? ¿Por qué es que eligen hacer "su" deber cuando nadie los llama?

El alcalde, el concilio de ciudad y cada residente de esta ciudad no debe continuar enterrando la cabeza en la arena con este asunto o llamando a Eddie Costa "negativo" cuando él es el único que llama a la WCCM para reportar los crímenes que oye siendo cometidos a través del escáner de la policía.

Presentación de Mark Gray ante el consejo de Ciudad de Lawrence

5 de septiembre de 2006
Queja civil

Por los últimos 20 años en la Ciudad de Lawrence, me he visto o implicado con actividades que implican al departamento del policía. Al escribir este documento, varias ocasiones vienen hoy a mi mente.

1. Un asalto por dinero y por una chaqueta en Dunkin Donuts en la Ruta 114, en los cuales arranqué a los 3 asaltantes de la víctima. La policía en esta ocasión dispersó a la muchedumbre incluyéndome a mí sin proteger la escena de crimen o recoger ninguna información. Me forzaron a dejar mi nombre y número con el personal en Dunkin Donuts quienes actuaron más responsablemente que la policía. Nunca se pusieron en contacto conmigo a pesar de mis intentos de llamar al oficial que estaba al cargo de la investigación.

2. Observé un accidente de motocicleta en la Ruta 114 y esperé por la policía, di un breve recuento de lo que sucedió antes de que el oficial me despidiera sin tomar ninguna información.

3. Reporté que habían muchachos lanzando piedras desde el puente del ferrocarril en la calle Andover y esperé en medio de la calle a ver si la policía iba a aparecer ya que el oficial con quien hablé me dio una impresión muy clara de que no sería así. Por supuesto, no lo fue.

4. Un ladrón intentó robar de mi casa; hice que mi esposa llamara a la policía mientras que salí a ver si él todavía estaba en el área y así fue. Vi un carro patrullero cerca así que lo perseguí encendiendo y apagando mis luces y tocando la bocina de mi auto para llamar la atención del oficial. Desde Andover St. hasta Broasway y pasado Salem St., el oficial apresuró su velocidad y puso en función las luces rojas para conseguir alejarse de mí y así no tener que responder. No logramos conseguir a nadie en la comisaría de policía. Le dí la vuelta al vecindario para vigilar al ladrón y para evitar que robara de cualquier otra persona.

5. Había un rothwiler en el barrio que andaba suelto y los niños del vecindario no podían salir a jugar. Llamé y esperé a la policía que nunca llegó. Llamé a la policía y al oficial de control de animales en varias ocasiones. Finalmente tuve que poner el perro en un área cercada detrás de mi casa donde cavó encima de todas mis fresas y rasgó todo el patio. Eventualmente, el perro se escapó una segunda vez e insistí en hablar con los dueños. Encontré que el perro pertenecía a un oficial de policía que residía en Dana St.

6. Yendo a trabajar una tarde por la Ruta 114, me arrimé a la derecha porque 3 carros patrulleros venían corriendo por la Ruta 114. Los observé entrando en Dunkin Donuts, y mientras que yo compraba mi café a través de la ventanilla de "drive through" ví que los oficiales de los 3 carros patrullas iban en camino con bandejas de café.

7. Desde el 29 de agosto, he estado tratando con oficiales que se niegan a hacer un reporte policiaco o darme una copia de mis llamadas a la comisaría de policías con respecto a una orden judicial que estaba siendo ignorada y lo sigue siendo. También he sido provocado y retado por un oficial en la ventanilla de la estación de policía sin haber dicho tan siquiera una palabra a él, mientras que pacientemente esperaba para hablarle. Lo peor del caso es que delante de él tenía un hombre viejo que me siguió en la estación empujándome a plena vista del oficial. El departamento también rechaza tomar una queja sobre este asunto. Hasta la fecha todavía no puedo conseguir la prueba de que yo he estado llamando a la policía.

El concilio de la ciudad es la autoridad que supervisa el departamento de la policía, por lo menos eso es lo que la policía estatal dice. Así pues, ya que la policía se niega a hacer algo, aquí estoy.

Lo que estoy preguntando es, ¿qué quieren que la gente haga sobre esto? Obviamente, la policía se niega a responder y obrar recíprocamente con los ciudadanos de Lawrence. ¿Quieren que la gente tome ley en sus propias manos? ¿Qué más nos queda por hacer?

Los titulares de los periódicos nos dicen del infante de marina que tiene que irse a Methuen para continuar con su negocio porque la policía rechaza responder al público. Oí decir que puede que hayan \$20 millones cortados del presupuesto de la policía, pero pensé que debían ser \$50 millones, después de todo si recibimos cero servicio en \$100 millones será igual que cero servicio en \$50 millones. Después de ser provocado por este departamento de policía y su denegación para documentar acontecimientos por casi 20 años de observación, creo firmemente que esta ciudad está pagando pródigamente a un manojito de gamberros para no hacer caso de sus ciudadanos. ¿Qué van a hacer ustedes sobre esto? Ésta es claramente su responsabilidad; ¿qué quieren ustedes de nosotros que estamos siendo maltratados por estos inciviles a quienes la ciudad paga?

Una de las preguntas que puedo ver que la gente escurridizamente hace sobre este tema es, ¿por qué no hay más gente haciendo la misma queja? ¿Quién además de gente como yo que no le teme a estos rufianes va a tener el valor de pararse aquí, hablar y hacer algo?

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LA JUEZ MARIA LOPEZ

Programa Judicial de media hora

Inmigrante, profesional, pionera y madre. Estas son algunas de las palabras que describen a la dinámica y franca anfitriona del nuevo programa de media hora por sindicación de la Juez María López. María López ha batallado toda su vida por alcanzar sus metas. Y es por eso que le es decoroso representar a los menospreciados. Siendo ella misma una minoría (por ambas partes: cubana inmigrante y mujer) María se identifica con los sentimientos de ser un extraño, el de no pertenecer.

A través de su carrera en el campo judicial, la Juez López ha luchado siempre por los derechos de los menos privilegiados, tomando posiciones y decisiones estrictas, pero llenas de compasión y creatividad. Ella personifica el sueño Americano- una pionera inmigrante que sobrepasó grandes barreras y dificultades para llegar a la cima del sistema legal.

Nacida en La Habana, y con apenas 8 años de edad, su familia escapó la violenta revolución Castrista para comenzar una nueva vida en los Estados Unidos. Batallando contra la pobreza y los contratiempos, María logró aprender inglés en sólo 3 meses. A la larga ha dedicado su vida a luchar por defender a quienes han sido privados de sus derechos civiles. Atacó de frente toda clase de estereotipo, insistiendo en que la base para lograrlo era la educación. Algo que no se consideraba de gran prioridad para las mujeres en una sociedad cubana. La tenacidad lo gana todo y María era más tenaz que la mayoría.

Smith College fue el centro académico perfecto donde María encontraría su voz entre la gente. Allí, donde había poca discriminación y un ambiente que daba campo a las mujeres para sobresalir, María tenía la seguridad de una estudiante activista. En gran parte fue influenciada por el movimiento de los derechos humanos y la guerra contra la pobreza. El programa del presidente Johnson "Great Society Program" le hizo ver a María que ella podía ser un vehículo para lograr cambios sociales. Observó cómo la ley funcionaba viendo a su padre manejar y aceptar las leyes del sistema legal americano. El tomó los exámenes de reválida una y otra vez más para poder ejercer legalmente como médico en los Estados Unidos. En 1966 la Juez López y su familia se hicieron ciudadanos estadounidenses.

Cuando López le dijo a su madre que quería ser abogada, su madre le contestó: ¿Qué, quieres abrir una biblioteca con tantos títulos? Aún así, su familia la vio partir a la escuela de Leyes de Boston University sin entender muy bien las ambiciones de la joven. Pero pronto verían como se desenvolvería todo. Al graduarse, su carrera tomó pasos agigantados. Inspirada por sus raíces de activismo y como inmigrante conocedora de la sensación de aislamiento en carne propia, López comenzó su carrera como abogada representando a los pobres los menospreciados y los marginados por la sociedad en casos civiles.

De 1980 a 1987, López ejerció como Fiscal Auxiliar en la División de los Derechos Civiles en la Fiscalía de Massachusetts. Ella era responsable de hacer cumplir con las leyes de los derechos civiles estatales.

Continuando con su pasión por llevar justicia a los oprimidos, la Juez López ejerce como abogado en la Oficina para Refugiados e Inmigrantes. Esta fue una nueva agencia creada para asistir a los refugiados e inmigrantes a obtener servicios sociales y convertirse en ciudadanos de los Estados Unidos.

En 1988 la Juez López hizo historia. Fue la primera latina designada al tribunal en Massachusetts cuando fue postulada por el gobernador Michael Dukakis al Tribunal del Distrito como juez. La Juez López continuó haciendo historia: fue la primera latina nombrada al Tribunal Superior de Massachusetts en el año 1993.

Una doctora en leyes de seriedad y respeto, la Juez López ha sido conocida por ir al punto, por decir las cosas como son y a la misma vez por sentenciar con compasión, creatividad y sí, con sentencias controversiales también. Una vez hizo que un hombre que había matado a un amigo en un accidente de bote le construyera un monumento a la víctima.

La juez López adjudicó en uno de los casos civiles más grandes y significativos en Massachusetts: una disputa familiar que involucraba a un imperio de supermercados. Su decisión, la cuál se sostuvo en apelación, le costó unos cuantos enemigos en el campo de la política, incluyendo algunos abogados prominentes que representaban a los perdedores de este caso. En otra ocasión, la juez López fue criticada por su no popular, pero sí legal sentencia de un acusado transexual convicto de un atentado de asalto sexual. Como resultado de su mano fuerte con el fiscal en este caso, fue acusada de mala conducta judicial y le ordenaron a que pidiera disculpas. Antes de comprometer su integridad y sus principios, la Juez López renunció a su puesto.

López ha dejado mellas en el mundo más allá de su tribunal. También está muy comprometida con su comunidad. Como profesora residente del Centro de Investigaciones y Estudios Femeninos en Brandeis University/Waltham, MA, López ha trabajado en múltiples proyectos de temáticas acerca de la mujer. Recientemente llevó a un grupo de profesores de Brandeis a Cuba en un proyecto investigativo para estudiar a la mujer cubana expresada en el arte contemporáneo. López es una gran fuente de apoyo para los artistas cubanos-colecciona tanto artistas ya establecidos como artistas salientes. En ellos se incluyen Julio Girona, Manuel Mendive, Belkis Ayon, Sandra Ramos, Alicia Leal y Cerenica Moreira. López trabaja con niñas de escuelas secundarias que están matriculadas en el programa de la escuela de belleza Blaine y quienes están aprendiendo a ser peluqueras. Muy recientemente las niñas hicieron un proyecto de fotografía acerca de sus vidas y su comunidad, el cual se exhibió en Brandeis.

López ha recibido galardones por parte del YWCA (el premio de La Academia de Mujeres de Hazaña), Girls, Inc. y Big Sisters. También apoya ARTS-Boston, el Centro de Bellas Artes (donde forma parte de la junta directiva), el Teatro Provincetown, el Programa de Investigación de Cancer del Hospital General de Massachusetts, el

López reside en Boston con su esposo. Es madre de dos hijos y "abuela adoptiva".



Nuevo Kindergarten en la Charter School

Rojo, azul, amarillo y verde-los colores de la infancia-dieron la bienvenida con globos a 60 niños de 4 años de edad, pisos de mosaico y recién pintadas paredes en las nuevas aulas de Lawrence.

Un nuevo programa de Kindergarten de todo el día para niños de 4 años dio comienzo el 5 de septiembre en la Family Development Charter School. 60 estudiantes con sus padres se reunieron con los maestros y tuvieron orientación la semana pasada en la Charter School de la calle West mientras esperaban que las nuevas aulas del antiguo convento de Santa Anne, situado en la esquina de las calles Haverhill y West, fueran terminadas.

El día de la inauguración fue recibido con mucho entusiasmo por parte del personal y de los padres, y una amplia sonrisa por parte de los niños.

El LFDSC, fundado en 1995, ha servido a 520 estudiantes desde kindergarten hasta 8vo grado. El nuevo grado, K1, proveerá conocimiento de lectura y lenguaje adecuado y un programa de desarrollo de destrezas. El plan está atado a la Estructura del Plan de Massachussets y permitirá a los maestros a extender el aprendizaje durante dos años reforzando el aprendizaje del idioma inglés y la habilidad de aprenderlo.

K1 para niños de 4 años y K2 para los tradicionales de 5 años, ofrece un consistente programa conectado de aprendizaje y preparación para el primer grado. Un Centro de de Educación familia, adyacente al programa de K1, será inaugurado el mes entrante.

Cuatro clases de 15 estudiantes cada una tienen maestros de Early Childhood Education y para profesionales bilingües. K1 es el primer programa que se ha establecido en el antiguo convento de St. Anne, adquirido el pasado diciembre, por la Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund de su propietario, el Arzobispado de Boston.

La renovación del convento y la escuela están a punto de ser concluidas y serán inaugurados en este año 2006. CHARTER SCHOOL'S NEW KINDERGARTEN

Red, blue, yellow and green-the colors of childhood-greeted sixty 4 year olds with welcoming balloons, floor tiles and accented walls in Lawrence's newest classrooms.

A new, full-day Early Kindergarten program for four-year-old students opened September 5th, at the Lawrence Family Development Charter School. Sixty students and their parents met with teachers and had orientation at the Charter School's West Street location last week waiting for the completion of their new classrooms in the restored and rebuilt former St. Anne's convent at the corner of West and Haverhill Streets in Lawrence. Today's official opening was greeted by applause and gratitude of parents and staff-and smiles by eager children!

LFDSC, founded in 1995, has served 520 students in K-8. The newest grade, K1, will provide reading and language readiness and a full program of skill development. The curriculum ties to the Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks and will allow teachers to stretch Kindergarten learning benchmarks across two years by strengthening English language acquisition and readiness to learn. K1 for four year olds and K2 for traditional five year olds offer a two-year connected and consistent program of learning and readiness for first grade. A family education center, adjacent to the K1 program, will open next month.

Four classrooms of fifteen students are each staffed by an Early Childhood Education teacher and bilingual paraprofessional. K1 is the first program to be located at the former St. Anne's property purchased by Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund from the Archdioceses of Boston last December. A full-scale, interior demolition and rebuilding of the former school and convent is nearing completion and will reopen throughout the fall of 2006. The Maria del Pilar Quintana Family Center, offering English as a Second Language and Citizenship Education for adults, will relocate to the main convent building in late September with the Upper School (grades 5-8) moving to the former St. Anne's School in November. A new gymnasium adjacent to the school will also open in November.

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STAY HEALTHY DURING MOSQUITO SEASON

DON'T GET BUGGED:

Mosquitoes and other biting insects are a normal part of summer in New England. But a few simple steps can help your family stay healthier during bug season.

REMOVE STANDING WATER

Mosquitoes lay their eggs in shallow, still water. Keep your yard free from junk items such as un-used swimming pools, old tires, un-used bird baths, etc. Rain water can collect in these items and provide an ideal place for mosquitoes to breed.

KEEP IT CLEAN:

Remove all junk items from your yard, keep your lawn mowed and your property well-drained. Make sure your shutters and gutters are not blocked in any way. Mosquitoes don't like a dry house or a well drained & maintained yard!

STAY IN WHEN BUGS ARE OUT:

Keep small children and the elderly inside after sunset. Mosquitoes are out and most active from dusk to dawn. Use a bug net around your baby's carriage any time you are out.

IF YOU HAVE TO BE OUT:

Wear loose, long-sleeved shirts and pants. Use bug repellent on exposed skin and lightly spray it on your clothes, too. You can even spray bug repellent on summer hats or a kerchief tied around your neck.

FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS:

Read labels and choose your bug spray wisely. Repellent with DEET is often recommended but others may work well, too. Use special care when applying bug spray on children! Avoid contact with eyes and mouth and be sure to use a product designed for kids.

PLAY IT SAFE:

Some mosquitoes in Massachusetts are now carrying either West Nile Virus or Eastern Equine Encephalitis. Some symptoms of these diseases are high fever or a bad head-ache. The chance of getting these diseases is extremely low. But play it safe, by using common sense prevention and call your doctor right away if you suddenly become ill during mosquito season.

Marcos Devers accuses Lantigua of supporting unjust tax increase

In a recently received statement issued by his campaign team, Marcos A. Devers, charged State Representative William Lantigua of secretly supporting the property tax increase of up to \$250 proposed by Mayor Michael J. Sullivan.

"The incumbent is secretly behind that tax increase," denounced Devers quoting an article published last week in The Eagle-Tribune which reported that "Mayor Sullivan will have to break his promise [of not increasing the taxes] because the legislative delegation demands [the mayor] to raise taxes to the maximum," said Devers in his press release.

The City of Lawrence faces a deficit that has been estimated up to \$16 million (depending of who is doing the talking) and Mayor Sullivan has been forced by the Legislature to increase taxes to the maximum for FY2007.

The note goes on to blame State Representative Lantigua for while being a member of the Legislature and not speaking out against the property tax increase so, the representative said in an exclusive interview that he cannot argue logically at the State House when they bring up the tax issue to the discussion. "Taxes are low in Lawrence, that's why the property value keeps going up."

Last year, former Secretary of Administration and Finance Eric Kriss came to Lawrence to hear about Northern Essex's expansion plans and was very dismissive of the idea because it was his belief that Lawrence wasn't doing its fair share in terms of taxing to the levy limit.

The fact is Lawrence is approximately 9% under the levy limit, which represents less than \$3 million. Though that number is higher than the majority of municipalities in the state, it is far below the City of Cambridge which is 20% under their tax levy which represents almost \$45 million; Lowell is 17% under which represents more than \$12 million; Leominster is 13.4% under which represents \$5.1 million; and Methuen is 9% under which represents \$4.3 million. These numbers are available on the Department of Revenue, Division of Local Services website.

Rumbo also checked with our other legislators before the State House finding an overwhelming support for Lawrence Mayor Sullivan's request to allow Lawrence residents to start paying their fair share of expenses. Massachusetts has 160 state representatives and 40 state senators and all of them supported the measure of the budget and finance committee to recommend a tax increase for Lawrence.

"I've worked with Rep. Lantigua for nearly four years now, and I can tell you in no uncertain terms that increasing property taxes for the people of Lawrence isn't his

idea," said Rep. Kevin Murphy (D-Lowell).

"That doesn't sound like Willy [Rep. Lantigua] to me," said Rep. Thomas Golden (D-Lowell). "He's looking to put more money in his constituents' pockets, not take it away from them."

"I think that it is a pretty ridiculous claim for anyone to suggest that Rep. Lantigua is advocating for a tax increase. He is a tireless advocate for Lawrence up here at the State House and has earned the respect and admiration of his colleagues from across the state," said State Representative David Torrisi (D-North Andover) who also covers a portion of Lawrence. "He has secured millions of dollars in funding for the city. The city simply does not have the property tax base to support its needs and Rep. Lantigua has been instrumental in making sure those needs are met for our seniors and our children."

And Rep. Torrisi added, "While I personally like Marcos, I believe Willy is doing a great job. He is passionate and forceful when he needs to be, yet also displays a great sense of humor and "easygoingness" that makes him fun to be around and to work with. He has also

become a good friend."

Lawrence Police continues being criticized

Recently, Channel 5 reported after a two-month investigation on the Lawrence Police Department, some surprising statistics. While the report was geared toward the use of official cars for personal use, Lawrence residents were taken back by the figures uncovered by this investigation when it comes to crime and the quality of life.

For a long time we have been hearing that crime is down and there seems to be a lock down on all information pertaining to crimes committed in this city. We have no idea where Janet Wu found this data but since it has been received with silence, it must be true.

According to the report, the police chief says that crime is down by 55% since he's taken office with only 2 murders in two years and that residential burglary and auto theft are down for the year.


But in the first seven month of 2006, robberies were up 44%, commercial burglaries were up 50%, larcenies were up 6% and aggravated assaults were up by 4%.

Last Tuesday, September 5th, Lawrence resident Mark Gray appeared before the City Council reading a copy of complaints against the police department that he later distributed to each member of the council and which we published here separately.

For a long time we have been hearing that crime is down and there seems to be a lock down on all information pertaining to crimes committed in this city. We have no idea where Janet Wu found this data but since it has been received with silence, it must be true.

Meanwhile, Thursday morning, a meeting was being held at the Leahy School to inform parents about the upcoming school year. Parking in that neighborhood is very limited so they double parked knowing that they were all going inside for the same purpose. Then, the meeting was abruptly interrupted and came to an end because a police officer was ticketing everyone outside.

Just doing her duty – you would say. Why is it that they choose to do “their duty” when they are not called.

Presentation by Mark Gray before the Lawrence City Council

September 5, 2006 Civil complaint

Going on 20 years in the City of Lawrence I have seen or been involved with activities involving the police department. In writing this document today several occasions come to mind.

1. A mugging for money and a jacket at the Dunkin Donuts on Rt. 114, in which I tore off the 3 muggers from the victim. The police in that matter dispersed the crowd including me without protecting the crime scene or collecting any information. I was forced to leave my name and number with the staff at Dunkin Donuts who acted more responsible than the police did. I was never contacted despite my attempts to contact the officer handling the investigation.

2. I observed a motor cycle accident on Rt. 114 waited for the police, gave a brief account of what happened before the officer dismissed me without taking any information.

3. I reported kids throwing rocks off the railroad bridge on Andover St. and waited half way down the street to see if the police would show up after getting the distinct impression from the officer taking the call that they wouldn't. Of course, they did not.

4. I had a thief trying to steal from my house; had my wife call the police as I went out to see if he was still in the area, and he was. I saw a cruiser go by so I pursued flashing my lights and honking my horn to get the officer's attention. From Andover St. and then down Broadway past Salem St. the officer sped and ran red lights to get away from me so he wouldn't have to respond. We were unable to get a hold of anyone at the police station. I circled the

neighborhood to keep an eye on the thief and to prevent him from stealing from anyone else.

5. I had a rothwiler in the neighborhood running loose and the neighborhood children couldn't go out to play. I called and waited for the police that never showed up. I called the police and animal control repeatedly. I finally had to put the dog in a fenced-in area behind my house where it dug up all my strawberries and tore up the yard. Eventually after the dog escaped a second time and I insisted on speaking to the owners. I found out the dog belonged to a police officer residing on Dana St.

6. Going to work one evening on Rt. 114, I pulled over for 3 cruisers drag racing down Rt. 114. I observed them pulling into Dunkin Donuts, as I got my coffee through the drive through I watched the officers of all 3 cruisers walk out with trays of coffee.

7. Since August 29th I've been dealing with officers that refuse to make out a police report or give me a hard copy of my calls to the police station regarding a court order that was being ignored and still is. I was also provoked and challenged by an officer at the window of the police station without ever saying a word to him, while patiently waiting to speak to him. The kicker to this officer's challenge to me was that in front of him I had an old man who followed me into the station pushing and shoving me, in plain view of the officer. The department also refuses to take a complaint on the matter. To date I still can't get proof that I called the police.

The city council is the authority overseeing the police department, at least that's what the state police states. So, since the police refuse to do anything, I'm here.

What I'm wondering is what you want the people to do about this. Obviously, the police refuse to respond and interact with the citizens of Lawrence. Do you want the people take the law into their own hands? What else is left to do?

Front line in the news, the marine who has to go to Methuen to run his business because the police refuse to respond to the public. I heard that there might be \$20 million cut from the police budget, when I heard that I thought it should be \$50 million, after all zero service at \$100 million is the same as zero service at \$50 million. After being provoked by this police department and their refusal to document events along with almost 20 years of observation, I firmly believe that this city is lavishly paying a bunch of thugs to ignore its citizens. What are you going to do about this? This is clearly your responsibility; what do you want from people like me who are getting jerked around by these thugs that the city pays for?

One of the questions I can see people asking to squirm away from dealing with this issue is why don't other people come make the same complaint. Who else besides people like me that stand up to bullies are going to stand up, speak up and do something?

Methuen, MA (September 1, 2006) – In May of this year, Little Sprouts Child Enrichment Centers submitted an Early Reading First grant application, and the staff has been waiting with fingers crossed to hear the results. On August 31, they received the good news.

“I’m ecstatic!” said Literacy Director and grant writer Meghan McGinley Crowe. “We will be able to do so much with this new literacy project!” Early Reading First is a national initiative, designed to respond to the President’s No Child Left Behind legislation. The Early Reading First Program supports preschools and early childhood education providers, especially those serving children from low-income families, so that they can become preschool centers of educational excellence, providing children with the foundational skills necessary to become successful readers. Little Sprouts received an Early Reading First award in 2003, but their \$1.5MM, 3-year grant expires this fall. In that time, Little Sprouts underwent a complete renovation of their classrooms and curriculum. “We created higher outcomes with our first Early Reading First project than we ever imagined,” said McGinley-Crowe. “But this project will enable us to impact our community on a whole new level.”

Little Sprouts has 6 early education facilities in the Greater Merrimack Valley: Haverhill, Lawrence, Lowell, Andover, Methuen, and the newest center opening September 11th in Westford. This Early Reading First Project, designated “Sprout-Out,” will serve 14 preschool classrooms, 48 teachers, and over 260 children per year enrolled at Little Sprouts.

Founder and CEO of Little Sprouts Susan Leger Ferraro, never doubted the organization would be able to continue and enhance its literacy project. “I’m grateful for the opportunity to create on-going advancement for children, families and educators, not only in literacy but to make a difference in our communities and our world.”

Only 32 projects nationwide were awarded the Early Reading First Grant, and Little Sprouts was the only grantee in Massachusetts. Senator Ted Kennedy called Little Sprouts on Friday, September 1st to congratulate the staff. “As study after study has shown, early childhood education has a tremendous positive impact on our children, and it is essential that we provide the best resources for these efforts,” said Senator Kennedy. “I’m thrilled that these funds will support the Little Sprouts Child Enrichment Centers’ extraordinary work in enhancing the reading skills of preschool-age children from low-income families in Massachusetts.”

Congressman Meehan, who has been a supporter of the great work of Little Sprouts, applauded the award, “Little Sprouts Child Enrichment Centers are a tremendous asset to the communities of the Merrimack Valley and the hundreds of at-risk children they serve. This funding is great news, and will allow Little Sprouts to continue preparing children to enter Kindergarten with the skills they need for a

lifetime of successful learning.”

“Little Sprouts is dedicated to children’s lives,” continues Ms. McGinley Crowe. “We know that too many children enter school already lacking the skills they need to be successful readers, and we are committed to giving all children the start to school they deserve. We are creating a New Era in Education, one family at a time.”




