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

“El día que vivirá en la infamia”

- Presidente Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Seisenta y siete años atrás, durante las primeras horas del amanecer del domingo, 7 de diciembre, 1941, fuerzas del Imperio Japonés lanzaron un sorpresivo y devastador ataque aéreo contra la base naval de Pearl Harbor, Hawai, hogar de la flota del Pacífico. Cuando el ataque terminó, las bajas del lado de los Estados Unidos eran 2,403 muertos y 1,178 heridos en acción, además de una larga lista de buques perdidos totalmente y/o dañados, así como una gran cantidad de aviones.

Aunque no fue un ataque a Norte América, ya que Hawai era territorio de los Estados Unidos y no un estado miembro de la unión en esa época, provocó a los Estados Unidos a declarar la guerra a Japón, luego de un apasionado discurso ante el Senado por el entonces Presidente Franklin D. Roosevelt.

En Septiembre 11, 2001, otro día que vivirá en la ignominia, esta vez el territorio continental de los Estados Unidos fue atacado en una serie de ataques suicidas contra las Torres Gemelas en New York y el Pentágono en Washington por miembros de al-Qaeda con el resultado de la pérdida de casi 3,000 civiles. Los Estados Unidos respondieron con una guerra abierta contra el terrorismo.

La diferencia entre los dos ataques es que el primero vino de un país fácil de identificar y destruir, aunque a un alto costo. Los terroristas están en todas partes. Han atacado en Yemen, África, y España y recientemente en Mumbai, India, el 26 de noviembre y tal vez considerando otro ataque aquí.

Nuestro saludo y respeto va a aquellos que sesenta años atrás lo dieron todo defendiendo nuestros principios e ideología y también para aquellos que entraron a las torres en llamas, cuando todos estaban tratando de salir de ellas.

¡No los olvidemos por su sacrificio y por lo que han hecho por la humanidad!

Sixty-seven years ago, on the predawn hours of Sunday, December 7, 1941, Japanese Imperial forces launched a surprising and devastating aerial attack against the United States' naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, home of the Pacific Fleet. When the attack was over, the U. S. casualties were 2,403 killed and 1,178 wounded in action, besides a long list of lost and damaged air and naval crafts.

Although not an attack on North America, since Hawaii was a United States territory and not a state of the Union at that time, it prompted the United States to declare war on Japan, after a passionate speech by President Franklin D. Roosevelt before the Senate.

On September 11, 2001, another date which will live in infamy, this time the United States continental soil was attacked in a series of coordinated suicide attacks upon the Twin Towers in New York and the Pentagon in Washington by members of al-Qaeda with a result of the loss of close to 3,000 civilians. The United States responded with an all-out war against terrorism.

The difference between both attacks is that the first one came from a country, easy to identify and destroy even at a high cost. The terrorists are everywhere. They had attacked Yemen, Africa, and Spain and recently in Mumbai, India, on November 26, 2008 and perhaps considering another attack here.

Our salute and respect goes out to those who gave it all sixty years ago, defending our principles and ideology and also to those who walked in when everybody was trying to escape from the burning towers.

Let's not forget them for their sacrifice and what they have done for humanity!

El Alcalde Sullivan inmediatamente asumió que la llamada anónima recibida por la Comisión de Ética había sido hecha por mí. Para mí está claro ahora que la ciudad ha progresado a pesar de que su inteligencia está en tela de juicio. El vino ayuda al corazón tanto como una dieta

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Según el nuevo estudio, los investigadores pusieron en el alimento de ratones de edad media pequeñas dosis de resveratrol, sustancia que se halla en las uvas y en las granadas, el vino ayuda al corazón tanto como una dieta. Así, constataron que esa sustancia influía en la regulación genética del envejecimiento y proporcionaba una especial protección al corazón.

Y es que pequeñas cantidades de un elemento natural del vino tinto, el resveratrol, tienen efectos benéficos en el corazón semejantes a los de una dieta, según un estudio internacional publicado por la revista científica PLoS.

Sin embargo, el consumo de vino diario no debería sobrepasar los tres vasos por día, en el caso de los hombres, que para las mujeres se reducen a dos, según la Organización Mundial de la Salud (OMS). Además, el consumo excesivo de vino está relacionado con el aumento del riesgo de padecer ciertos tipos de tumor.

Así, para los autores del estudio publicado en PLoS, un vaso de vino o suplementos alimenticios con las mismas dosis bajas de resveratrol, pueden jugar "un importante papel en frenar el envejecimiento cardíaco".

Esto podría explicar por qué se dan menos enfermedades cardiovasculares en poblaciones consumidoras de vino como los franceses o los habitantes de países del sur de Europa, como España, habituales consumidores de este agradable producto.

Carta al editor

Es con gran orgullo que escribo esta carta. Por 7 años completos he servido a la gran ciudad de Lawrence. He conocido a tantas personas maravillosas que han venido a este país y esta ciudad en busca de una mejor forma de vida. He dicho muchas veces que es la actitud positiva y el orgullo de Lawrence que es primordialmente responsable de todo lo bueno que ha pasado en los últimos 7 años.

En esos 7 años pasados hemos sido testigos de una inversión pública de más de \$250 millones en esta ciudad. Esto trajo por consiguiente otros \$250 millones en inversiones privadas que han entrado a la ciudad. Nuestros talleres han sido renovados y eso ha creado miles de nuevos empleos y nuevas viviendas.

La ciudad está disfrutando del nivel de crimen más bajo en 38 años. Hemos renovado nuestro ayuntamiento, invertimos en nuestros parques y espacios al aire libre por toda la ciudad y por vez primera en casi 100 años hemos construido la mejor escuela secundaria para nuestros jóvenes. La conversión del tráfico a dos vías y las inversiones en nuestro centro comercial están comenzando a traer vida de nuevo a la calle Essex. La gente está regresando a vivir en el centro de Lawrence y el futuro se vislumbra brillante y excitante.

Yo me sentí extremadamente orgulloso este pasado verano cuando la ciudad de Lawrence fue escogida para los Prestigiosos Premios de Latin Pride que tuvieron lugar el 25 de septiembre. ¿Qué mejor lugar para auspiciar este evento que el nuevo Teatro de las Artes de Lawrence High School? Se imagina a la ciudad de Lawrence siendo anfitriona al gran Sammy Sosa, la ex Miss USA Susie Castillo y muchas otras grandes figuras que han tenido éxito en sus respectivas carreras y han contribuido a sus comunidades?

Yo me sentí más que orgulloso cuando la organización me pidió que diera la bienvenida en el teatro lleno a nombre de la orgullosa ciudad de Lawrence. Yo me sentí honrado en ese evento. El orgullo de Lawrence fue contagioso esa noche y todos la pasamos de lo más bien.

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The Gift of Good Health

The holiday season is here again. But amidst the hustle and bustle of gift-giving and family get-togethers, seniors enrolled in Medicare Part D should carve out time to consider whether they want to stay with their current prescription drug plan.

From now through the end of the year, Medicare is holding its annual "open enrollment" period for Part D. During this time, eligible seniors can sign-up or change plans. Seniors can compare their current coverage with others among the many competing Medicare drug plans. They can decide whether to stay with their current coverage or switch to another plan that may offer lower premiums or more coverage options.

Unlike traditional government programs, where there's just one plan for everyone, Medicare Part D is structured so that insurance companies must compete for customers. Knowing that beneficiaries have the option to switch means that insurers have to make their plans attractive or they will lose customers. The record shows that this results in more choices and lower costs.

In 2003, lawmakers estimated seniors would pay an average monthly premium for prescription drug coverage in 2009 of more than \$44. But according to government officials, their average monthly premium next year for the standard plan will be just \$28.

But some drug plans are raising their prices and changing the specific drugs available. So every senior who is enrolled—even those that are happy with their plans -- should be sure to seize this once-a-year opportunity to review their coverage.

Web savvy seniors can do this is through Medicare's website at www.Medicare.gov. There, using the "Medicare Plan Finder," seniors can compare plans based on price, drug coverage, and out-of-pocket expenses. Seniors can also use the Plan Finder to compare the cost of filling a prescription their local pharmacy versus a mail-order drug store.

Seniors without web access can always call 1-800-Medicare and speak with a customer service representative who will talk them through their choices. Seniors may also want to assess whether one of the Medicare Advantage plans also may be right for them. These plans offer a full range of health services and some of them include prescription drug coverage at no extra cost.

Medicare's open-enrollment period ends on December 31, so seniors should act fast to check their options and make sure they're enrolled in the most-affordable plan that best suits their needs. After all, the best gift is good health.

El plazo anual de "inscripción abierta" de Medicare para la Parte D comienza a partir de ahora y se extiende hasta fin de año. En el curso de dicho plazo, los ciudadanos de la tercera edad con derecho a ello pueden inscribirse en un plan o cambiar de plan. Los ciudadanos de la tercera edad tienen la oportunidad de comparar su cobertura actual con otras coberturas ofrecidas por los muchos planes competitivos de Medicare que se ofrecen para medicamentos por receta. Pueden decidir si desean mantener su cobertura actual u optar por otro plan que ofrezca primas menos elevadas o mayor cantidad de opciones de cobertura.

Sin embargo, según funcionarios del gobierno, el año próximo la prima mensual media correspondiente a un plan estándar será de tan solo \$28.

No obstante, algunos de los planes para medicamentos por receta aumentarán los precios y modificarán la disponibilidad de ciertos medicamentos específicos. Por lo tanto, conviene que todos los ciudadanos de la tercera edad que estén inscritos en un plan (inclusive aquellos que consideren satisfactorio su plan actual) aprovechen esta oportunidad, que se da una sola vez por año, para volver a examinar su cobertura.

Aquellos ciudadanos de la tercera edad que dominen la Internet podrán visitar el sitio Web de Medicare en www.Medicare.gov. Una vez que se encuentren allí, podrán

comparar planes a utilizando el "Medicare Plan Finder" (Buscador de planes de Medicare), basándose en el precio, los medicamentos que cubre cada plan y los gastos en efectivo. Los ciudadanos de la tercera edad podrán usar también el Buscador de planes para comparar el costo de los medicamentos por receta en su farmacia local frente al costo de los mismos a través de una farmacia que los abastece por correo.

Asimismo, los ciudadanos de la tercera edad que no cuenten con acceso a Internet pueden llamar por teléfono al 1-800-Medicare y hablar con un representante de atención al cliente, que les explicará sus opciones. Es posible que

los ciudadanos de la tercera edad también deseen evaluar los planes Advantage de Medicare, para determinar si les conviene optar por uno de ellos. Dichos planes ofrecen una gama completa de servicios para la salud, y algunos de ellos incluyen también, sin costo adicional, cobertura para medicamentos por receta.

El plazo de inscripción abierta de Medicare llega a su cierre el 31 de diciembre; por lo tanto, se recomienda que los ciudadanos de la tercera edad no pierdan tiempo, verifiquen sus opciones y se aseguren de estar inscritos en el plan más asequible y más adecuado para satisfacer sus necesidades. Después de todo, la buena salud es el mejor regalo.

He is also a member of the ESMV Board of Directors, President of the Haverhill Breakfast Exchange Club and Chairperson for the SeniorNet Program that teaches computer skills to elders, and also teaches many of its classes.

Mr. Nolet volunteered for many years at the Solace Program of the Haverhill Visiting Nurses' Association - providing comfort and companionship to critically ill elders and their families.


Most and Bill Harrington in 1960 in WHDH in Boston as sports announcer for both the Celtics and the Bruins.

For the award winning Fall 07-Spring 08 edition the decision was made to make it an annual publication so that more time, effort, and funding could be dedicated to the issue. In addition, an area author was solicited to publish a short story to further raise the magazine's profile. The changes worked and the 70-page, full-color, high gloss magazine received national recognition for the first time in its 42-year history.

While the mission of Parnassus, to showcase the students' best works, hasn't changed, the delivery has, says Lochelt.

"The attention to detail has changed. This is judged on design as well as content," he said. "This shows the best the school and its students have to offer."

With its sleek, new design, Lochelt expects an increase in Parnassus awareness among faculty, staff, and students. Already, most of the award-winning Parnassus edition, distributed on campus, is in circulation.

Master of deceit

Seems that Lawrence Mayor Michael Sullivan misses that I have not been writing about him for the past two months and wanted to provoke an altercation in order to see his name in Rumbo again. Well Mayor Mike, I aim to please.

On Thursday, December 4, he sent a letter to the editor to several newspapers being Rumbo number one on the list. When we heard about said letter, wondering why others received it but not us (and considering that I was the target of his long diatribe), my husband, Alberto Surfís, went to his office and requested a copy. We have faithfully translated the letter and published it in this edition for your benefit on page 21. You will find that he has mastered the art of twisting the truth.

Mayor Mike dedicated the first page to enumerate his achievements in the past seven years, the same rendition that we have all memorized because he repeats it wherever he goes. This is just a distraction from the real issues. I really think he did that to make me work harder with the translation.

He received a call from the State Ethics Commission regarding something that we published on October 1st of this year. I also asked for their opinion about giving the use of the Performing Arts Center, overtime pay for the school department's security guards, the use of the police and the technicians to run the event that night, to a for-profit group from outside the city. Mayor Sullivan immediately assumed that the anonymous call received by the Ethics Commission had come from me. It is clear to me now that the city has progressed in spite of his being intelligence challenged. POWERS AND DUTIES OF CITIES AND TOWNS, Chapter 40: Section 3. Towns; power to hold, lease and convey property of the Massachusetts General Laws clearly state that local school committees must approve renting out buildings.

Katherine Lamana, Director of Massachusetts State Scholars Initiative commended the group of students for their dedication and assured them that many more opportunities to honor their achievements


during the four years at GLTS.

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

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

Jim Rivard, a Woodard & Curran Senior Vice President, was so impressed with Jalcy that he asked her to return for a second year. Christine Brown, Office Support Administrator, praised Jalcy and the Hire4Ed Program, "Jalcy is efficient and fast and is doing a great job! The school's summer training program is thorough so the students can enter their internship with confidence, addressing details right down to dress code." Brown serves as Jalcy's mentor, overseeing her daily workload.

Jay Robie, Director of the Hire4Ed Program, says that the school has successfully placed over 200 students in entry-level positions at workplaces throughout the Greater Merrimack Valley and is still seeking Employment Partners

for this academic year and 2009-2010. Robie notes that the students' attendance rate is consistently high – 95% – and the interns are expected to make up any day they miss. "We provide transportation to and from work," he said, "so that critical element of reliability is guaranteed."

Notre Dame opened in 2004 and graduated its first class in June 2008. All 51 graduates went on to attend college. "More and more colleges are interested in visiting us," Robie said, adding, "they know our students are accountable, take initiative, and are highly responsible. That's the type of student colleges want and most of our students will leave Notre Dame with stronger resumes than most college students."

Notre Dame High School combines college prep courses and a work-study program to help its nearly 230 students pay for their tuition and teach them professional skills. The school is part of the Cristo Rey Network, a national association of 22 high schools dedicated to providing quality education to urban young people living in communities with limited educational options. ELDER SERVICES: 34th Annual Meeting

He has been a scout master for the Boy Scouts, a camp counselor for the YMCA, and founded a girl's Little League baseball program in Hampstead New Hampshire. He and his wife Lucinda, have frequently hosted foreign exchange students and been a host family for cast members in the "Up with People" tour.

Special Recognition was given to the Greater Boston Food Bank which has been collaborating with Elder Services in a free food distribution program for elders and adults with disabilities. In the first month of operation 3 years ago, the Brown Bag Program began with 225 recipients. Today, over 1,150 people throughout the Merrimack Valley are helped by these efforts. The award was accepted by Paul Colligan, Joyce MacDonald and Christina Perry from the GBFB.

Caregiver Awards – which recognize the compassion, dedication, energy and flexibility of people who dedicate their lives to helping elders in need – were given to Donald Basiliere (Haverhill) for caring for his wife; Delores Chin (Lowell) for caring for her aging mother; James Cutter (Salisbury) for caring for his wife; Paul Kisly (Lowell) for taking care of his wife; and Lana Schofield (North Andover) for creating an entire support network for an elder whose home burned down.

During Elder Services' fiscal year 2007, 301 individuals volunteered in 9 different programs at Elder Services, giving 8338 hours of total service to the agency.

Years ago former First lady Rosalynn Carter said, "there are only four kinds of people in the world: those who have been caregivers, those who are currently caregivers, those who will be caregivers and those who will need caregivers. 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


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
