Lantigua discute una decisión difícil

El reciente anuncio del Alcalde William Lantigua que está pidiendo al Estado ayuda con las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence ha provocado reacciones de los simpatizantes, así como los críticos. Lantigua on tough decisions

An interview with Lawrence's Mayor

The recent announcement from Mayor William Lantigua that he is asking the State for help with the Lawrence Public School has caused reactions from sympathizers as well as critics. While a recent outcry was to bring the State to take over the entire city, now those same individuals are saying that he should have never given the schools to the State because this is the beginning and later they will take over the entire city.

"I will never be able to please 100% of the people," said Mayor Lantigua. "I am the one getting constantly beaten so if I'm going to get beat for this, let it be. It's my decision to make and the problems with the school system have gone on for too long."

soy quien tiene que tomar esta decisión y los problemas con el sistema escolar se han prolongado durante demasiado tiempo".

Lantigua compareció en algunos programas de radio expandiendo el comunicado de prensa que envió esta semana anunciando la petición.

"Los problemas con las escuelas son crónicos; no han ocurrido en los últimos años y no voy a aceptar las excusas de que estos niños provienen de hogares donde falta uno de los padres, vienen de un idioma extranjero, de barrios pobres, que hay muchas tiendas de licores a su alrededor, que viven de asistencia pública...", dijo Lantigua citando una parte del comunicado de prensa. "Los mismos niños de esos barrios y las mismas familias prosperan en Bellesini, Esperanza, y Notre Dame."

El alcalde afirma que está siendo criticado por no consultar con los miembros del comité escolar, pero lo hizo. "Llamé a Jim Vittorioso, Mark Gray, Greg Morris, Pavel Payano, e incluso a la Dra. Mary Lou Bergeron, para pedir su opinión." Admitió que no intentó ponerse en contacto Sammy Reyes o Martina Cruz.

Aunque la decisión no tendrá lugar inmediatamente porque hay varias etapas que pasar, incluyendo una reunión el lunes, 28 de noviembre 5:00 a 7:00 en Malden, cuando escucharán los comentarios del público.

Cuando se le preguntó por qué no consultar a los miembros entrantes del comité escolar, su respuesta fue que: "Ellos no han sido juramentados hasta el momento."

Los rumores abundan en la radio y en las calles. Algunos comentarios escuchados son que los buenos profesores serán los primeros en ser cesanteados cuando el Estado se haga cargo en favor de la política; también la existencia de una lista de 25 administradores que Lantigua personalmente despedirá.

"Los administradores están cubiertos por un sindicato. No puedo despedir a nadie y eso es una mentira descarada de que tengo una lista."

En cuanto al papel que el comité escolar desempeñará en el futuro, el Alcalde Lantigua dijo que aún es incierto. Esa junta tiene tres grandes áreas de responsabilidad que son contratar y evaluar al superintendente, la formulación de políticas y la supervisión del presupuesto. Como el Departamento de Educación Primaria y Secundaria tendrá la opción de nombrar a un superintendente, "No sé cómo

la función del comité escolar va a cambiar", dijo Lantigua.

Las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence había sido objeto de publicidad negativa por muchos años y cuando la Escuela Primaria Arlington y la South Lawrence Middle School fueron nombradas como escuelas de Nivel 4 por el Departamento de Educación Primaria y Secundaria, "Fue devastador para nuestra ciudad y la moral de los empleados del departamento escolar", dijo el Alcalde Lantigua. "Cuando nos enteramos de que otras tres escuelas se habían añadido a la lista, tenía que hacer algo".

Las nuevas escuelas son la James F. Leonard, la International High School y la Business Management and Finance High School.

Otros superintendentes y administradores de escuelas de la zona que no quisieron ser identificados, dijeron que es muy triste tener que llegar a eso, pero que se veía venir desde 1998. El declive de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence ha sido constante, dejando al Alcalde Lantigua en una situación en que la decisión tenía que ser hecha.

Todos ellos se refieren a la Ley de Reforma Educativa de 1993, cuando el poder le fue quitado a los comités escolares locales. Ahora, ellos no tienen voz en la contratación de maestros, problemas de educación y currículo.

Ralph Carrero el superintendente de la Lawrence Family Development Charter School (LFDCS) espera que esto traiga un cambio en el gobierno. Por favor, lea sus comentarios en la página 7.

Patricia Karl, fundadora de LFDCS dice, "En cuanto a la petición y discusión de un posible control de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence: Mi primera preocupación siempre será los niños de Lawrence y tengo la esperanza de que esta decisión abordará la necesidad de los cambios que sean necesarios para proporcionar una fuerte y consistente educación de alta calidad para todos los estudiantes en la ciudad. Espero que la política y la culpabilidad no sean parte de la discusión, más bien un énfasis en lo que los recursos de liderazgo y capacitación pueden ser llevados a las escuelas y las aulas para apoyar el trabajo de los educadores y las preocupaciones de los padres."

Frank Bonet, director de personal para la Ciudad de Lawrence dijo simplemente, "Lantigua ha dado a los niños de esta ciudad, una voz".

La reunión con el Departamento de Educación Elemental y Secundaria tendrá lugar en Malden el lunes, 28 de noviembre de 5 a 7 PM.


That is why this Thanksgiving Week is the right time to call on everyone to push aside favoritisms and recognize what we always were: common people who came to this country in search of a better life.

RESPONSABILIDAD: El seguro conocido como "liability" lo protege si alguien se lastima en su propiedad o en su negocio. Si usted alquila, el propietario querrá que usted tenga seguro de responsabilidad civil y el nombre como asegurado adicional. Si usted vende comida, un producto o servicio, el seguro de responsabilidad civil es muy importante. Si usted es propietario y alquila, el seguro de "liability" es necesario para protegerlo de demandas de inquilinos y se requiere para la Sección VIII de los inquilinos. Los contratistas lo necesitan para proteger a sus clientes. Muchas ciudades y pueblos requieren Certificados de Seguros de los contratistas cuando solicitan permisos.

INCENDIO/PELIGROS Si usted pide prestado dinero para iniciar su negocio o comprar un inmueble, el banco requerirá que usted tenga seguro contra incendios (igual que cuando usted pide prestado para comprar una casa).

ROBO: La cobertura de robo por lo general se puede adquirir junto con el seguro contra incendios. A menudo es necesario contar con una alarma antirrobo para comprar cobertura de robo.

TRABAJADORES DE COMPENSACIÓN: Si usted decide contratar a alguien o tiene familia que ayuda, es necesario adquirir un seguro de indemnización laboral. Esto protege al trabajador si se lesionan en el trabajo. No sólo son los gastos médicos pagados, sino los salarios también se pagan al empleado lesionado en caso de tener que faltar al trabajo. El costo se basa en el tipo de negocio y la nómina real. Las empresas deben adquirir esta cobertura. Empresas LLC y los propietarios no tienen que protegerse a sí mismos, pero deben comprar una póliza para los trabajadores que contratan.

PÉRDIDA DE ALQUILERES/ENTRADAS: Si su ingreso de alquiler o producto de ventas paga las facturas entonces usted necesita para asegurarse de que su póliza incluye esta cobertura. ¡Esto no se incluye automáticamente!

Parte de prensa del Alcalde de Lawrence William Lantigua anunciando que le pidió ayuda al estado para las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence.

“No podemos esperar más”

El Alcalde William Lantigua se reunió con el Comisionado de educación Mitchell Chester este mes para discutir el futuro de las escuelas públicas de Lawrence. En el transcurso de los últimos meses, el Alcalde Lantigua ha participado personalmente en conversaciones con el Comisionado Chester con relación al futuro de las escuelas públicas de Lawrence y la necesidad de avanzar como distrito escolar. "Estoy convencido, después de analizar muchos escenarios, que necesitamos ciertas herramientas para el progreso de nuestras escuelas públicas. Las herramientas son muy específicas y sólo están disponibles para nosotros con estricta supervisión del Departamento de Educación y el estado de Massachusetts", declaró el Alcalde Lantigua.

El Comité Escolar de Lawrence inició la búsqueda de un nuevo superintendente en la primavera, sin embargo, aunque diecisiete personas solicitaron, la búsqueda no produjo un candidato que se pudiera nombrar superintendente escolar.

"Nosotros no podemos esperar más como distrito escolar para ver la transformación necesaria para que las escuelas públicas de Lawrence puedan alcanzar los niveles de logro que se merecen los estudiantes de nuestra comunidad. Por mucho tiempo he escuchado las teorías y excusas de que los niños vienen de casas de un solo padre, y que viven en barrios turbulentos", declaró el apasionado alcalde William Lantigua. "Los mismos niños, de los mismos padres están sobresaliendo en los salones de la Academia Bellesini, la Academia Esperanza, y las escuelas tipo charter Community Day y la Lawrence Family Development como también la

Academia de Notre Dame todas localizadas en la Gran Ciudad de Lawrence," agregó el Alcalde Lantigua.

"A partir de hoy, le he pedido al Comisionado Chester que tome las herramientas necesarias para que el próximo superintendente de las escuelas públicas de Lawrence pueda reformar nuestro sistema escolar. Con esta solicitud, estoy buscando la supervisión inmediata del Estado, incluyendo el nombramiento de un Receptor, con autoridad nombrado por el Comisionado para asistir a las escuelas públicas de Lawrence," indicó el Alcalde William Lantigua.

El Alcalde Lantigua espera que un nuevo superintendente traiga reformas al sistema escolar y con la supervisión del Estado, esta persona pueda hacer los cambios mayores que los anteriores administradores han ignorado por muchos años. Varias escuelas en Lawrence durante mucho tiempo han sido clasificadas como "Nivel 4", y hoy tres nuevas escuelas se añadieron a esta lista. Sin embargo con la solicitud del alcalde Lantigua para que el Estado vigile el distrito entero sería declarado crónicamente de bajo rendimiento, de acuerdo a la ley de Massachusetts M.G.L. capítulo 69, y nombramiento de un receptor.

Las escuelas públicas de Lawrence tienen una larga historia con el departamento de educación. En el 1998, la ex Alcaldesa Patricia Dowling firmó un acuerdo para formar una asociación con el Estado y las escuelas públicas de Lawrence.

La solicitud de hoy por el Alcalde Lantigua es mucho más compleja que la supervisión anterior del Departamento de Educación.

La reunión con el Departamento de Educación Elemental y Secundaria tendrá lugar en Malden el lunes, 28 de noviembre de 5 a 7 PM.

Press release sent by Lawrence Mayor William Lantigua announcing that he asked for the State's help with Lawrence Public Schools.

“We can't wait any longer”

Mayor William Lantigua met with Education Commissioner Mitchell Chester earlier this month to discuss the future of the Lawrence Public Schools. Over the course of the past several months, Mayor Lantigua has been personally engaged in ongoing conversations with Commissioner Chester about the future of the Lawrence Public Schools and what is needed to advance as a school district. "I'm convinced, after analyzing many scenarios, that certain tools are needed in order for our public schools to progress. Some of the tools are very specific and are only available to us with strict oversight by the Department of Education and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts", stated Mayor Lantigua.

The Lawrence School Committee launched a search for a new Superintendent this past spring, however, though seventeen people applied, the search did not yield any one candidate to be named as permanent Superintendent.

"We cannot wait any longer as a school district to see the transformative changes that is needed in order for the Lawrence Public Schools to reach the levels of achievement that the children of our community deserve. I have long listened to the single parent theories and the so called troubled neighborhood excuses", stated a passionate Mayor William Lantigua. "The same children of the same single parents are excelling in the halls of Bellesini and Esperanza Academy, Community Day and Family Development Charter Schools, along with Notre Dame Academy all in our

Great City of Lawrence," Mayor Lantigua added.

"As of today, I have asked Commissioner Chester to take the extraordinary steps necessary to give the next Lawrence Public Schools Superintendent tools to reform our school system. In this request, I am seeking immediate state oversight, including the appointment of a Receiver, pursuant to all applicable laws within the Commissioner's authority to assist Lawrence Public Schools," further stated Mayor William Lantigua.

Mayor Lantigua hopes that a new Superintendent will bring ongoing reform to the school system and with state oversight; this person will be able to make the wholesale changes that have been ignored for years by previous administrators. Several schools in Lawrence have long been labeled as "level 4" and today three additional schools were added to that list. However with Mayor Lantigua's call for state oversight, the district as a whole would be declared chronically underperforming, pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 69, and a Receiver appointed.

The Lawrence Public Schools has a long history with the Department of Education. In 1998, former Mayor Patricia Dowling signed a memorandum of agreement forming a partnership with the State and the Lawrence Public Schools.

Today's request by Mayor Lantigua is much more comprehensive than previous oversight by the Department of Education.

Términos claves: manejo personal, enfermedades crónicas, vejez



Pregunta:
Recientemente, vi un anuncio en la YMCA local promoviendo un programa para personas que atraviesan dificultades para manejar sus enfermedades crónicas.

Las sesiones son conducidas por líderes que no son doctores. Esto me tiene un poco confundido. Yo pensaba que los doctores son los responsables de nuestro sistema de salud. ¿Me podría dar más información acerca de los beneficios de participar en estas sesiones?

Respuesta:

Cualquier persona, joven o mayor, que tenga una condición médica, debe de buscar consejos apropiados de profesionales con licencia y experiencia. Los doctores, enfermeras, y terapeutas pueden sugerir un plan de cuidado médico, recetar medicamentos, y monitorear el impacto que tiene la enfermedad en el paciente. En la última década, se ha visto un cambio en la filosofía para incluir el manejo personal en el sistema de manejar la salud. Numerosos estudios han resaltado los resultados positivos asociados con la responsabilidad que toma el paciente en el manejo diario de su enfermedad crónica. La autoeficacia,

un concepto utilizado en la rama de la psicología, también puede ser utilizada en el proceso de manejar las enfermedades crónicas. La persona que es auto-eficaz tiene la habilidad y confianza en sí mismo de impactar su propia salud y obtener resultados positivos. Los programas de manejo personal no reemplazan la medicina tradicional, el efecto deseado es mejorar. Muchos de los programas de manejo personal son conducidos por personas que no son profesionales de la salud pero que se han preparado para ser líderes. En muchos casos, ellos mismos tienen una enfermedad crónica. Estas personas siguen un currículo que ha sido evaluado y que ha mostrado resultados positivos en las personas que han participado en el programa. Un ejemplo de esto son los programas desarrollados por en la Facultad de Medicina de la Universidad Stanford (Stanford University Medical School) que incluye el Programa de Manejo Personal de Enfermedades Crónicas y el Programa de Manejo Personal de la Diabetes. La parte importante de estos programas es el proceso de aprendizaje y la información proveída. El objetivo de estas sesiones no es que usted escuche la información sino que participe activamente. En estas sesiones, los participantes se familiarizan con las emociones que sienten cuando padecen de una enfermedad crónica, aprenden a comunicarse mejor con los profesionales de la salud, obtienen consejos de cómo manejar sus medicamentos, aprenden los pasos a seguir antes de asistir a

una cita médica, y aprenden la importancia de convertirse en su propio defensor en un sistema de salud complejo.

Se ha demostrado que los pacientes que completan uno de estos programas tienen menos hospitalizaciones, cuando son hospitalizados pasan menos días en el hospital, y generalmente requieren menos visitas al doctor. Todo esto resulta en una reducción del costo de cuidado médico y un mejor estado de salud del individuo. Muchas organizaciones se han envuelto en esta filosofía de manejo personal incluyendo a la Administración de Asuntos sobre la Vejez (Administration on Aging), el Concejo Nacional de Asuntos sobre la Vejez (the National Council on Aging), agencias locales, proveedores de seguros médicos, y centros de salud. Ralph Carrero comenta sobre la situación de Las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence

Como educador, es triste que una vez más nos encontremos con la ciudad de Lawrence en esta situación en relación con la educación pública. Sin embargo, en última instancia, independientemente de quién y por cuánto tiempo, existe un compromiso externo por el buen funcionamiento de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence, que si beneficia a los estudiantes, valdrá la pena todos los riesgos y cambios que la supervisión externa traiga a LPS.

Cambios y la rendición de cuentas han sido norma constante desde el inicio de la reforma de la ley de Educación de 1993. Todos sabemos que Lawrence ha sido uno de los mayores benefactores de esta ley especial a nivel financiero. También voy a añadir, y con razón, dadas las condiciones de la Ciudad de Lawrence, esta debió haberse beneficiado de la nivelación financiera de la educación pública.

Desde el principio, cuando LPS era el destinatario de los millones de dólares de ayuda estatal que ha recibido para la educación, ha sido consciente de que el desempeño y la rendición de cuentas tendría un papel importante una vez que las pruebas del MCAS entraran en funcionamiento. Nuestros estudiantes merecen nada menos que lo mejor. Y dado el nivel de pobreza que nos ocupamos, en su mayor parte es la única oportunidad de romper ese ciclo de

pobreza bajo el que viven. Por lo tanto, tenemos la enorme responsabilidad de asegurar que reciban una educación de calidad.

Supervisión del Estado, si éste es el curso a tomar por las escuelas, será un reto enorme para el personal docente por el alto nivel de rendición de cuentas nuevas que se requerirán. Como resultado de la designación de un nivel cinco, también anularán contratos existentes con todas las uniones dentro de LPS.

Para los padres y estudiantes esto puede servirles como un alivio, ya que comenzarán a ver la puesta en práctica y la corrección de sus preocupaciones en cada escuela dentro del distrito. También se abrirá una voz más grande para ellos y oportunidades para participar en las escuelas.

El mayor reto, sin embargo, va a ser sentido por la junta de gobierno, porque su autoridad, en su mayor parte, será neutralizada por el supervisor designado y la instalación temporal de un órgano de gobierno que estará integrado por personas designadas, determinado por la oficina del Comisionado y de la oficina ejecutiva local. Un plan de rendición de cuentas tendrá que ser aprobado e implementado que explique las metas académicas centradas en el rendimiento estudiantil, a corto y largo plazo.

Incumplimiento por parte del distrito escolar en el logro de estas metas anuales requerirán cambios más profundos que pueden y van a afectar a los maestros y el personal administrativo. Teniendo en cuenta el hecho de que el Departamento de Educación está listo para implementar nuevas normas y reglamentos para la evaluación del personal docente, no hay duda de que una amplia aplicación de estos nuevos requisitos de evaluación tendrá lugar aquí en LPS.

Cuando termine la supervisión, los estudiantes y sus familias se habrán beneficiado debido a que los cambios mejorarán el rendimiento de los estudiantes, las nuevas estructuras que se pondrán en marcha deben servir como un catalizador para seguir mejorando la calidad de la educación pública.

Habrà una oportunidad real para la calificación de los maestros eficaces, y esperemos que se establezcan nuevas normas que se traduzcan en mejores sueldos para los maestros, y que obligue a la comunidad a examinar la estructura de gobierno actual y determinar si se debe reemplazar y/o reformar.



And given the level of poverty that we deal with, for the most part it is their only chance at breaking the cycle of poverty they live under. Therefore we bare an enormous responsibility to ensure that they receive a quality education.

State oversight, if this is the direction of the schools will present a huge challenge for the teaching staff because of the level of new accountability that it will require. As a result of a level five designation it will also void current existing contracts with all the unions within LPS.

For parents and students it can serve as a level of "fresh air" because they should start to see the implementation and correction of their concerns at each school within the district. It will also open a bigger voice for them and opportunities to get involved in the schools.

The biggest challenge however will be felt by the governance board because their authority for the most part will be neutralized by the appointed oversight person and the temporary instillation of a Governance body that will consist of appointed individuals determined by the Commissioner's office as well from the local Executive office. An approved accountability plan will have to be approved and implemented that is designed to spell out short term and long term academic goals centered on student

performance.

Failure on the part of the school district in achieving these annuals goals will require deeper changes that can and will affect teacher and administrative employment. Given the fact that the Department of Education is ready to implement new standards and regulations for the evaluation of educational personnel, there is no doubt that broad implementation of these new evaluation requirements will occur here in LPS.

At the end of the oversight era, students and their families will have benefitted because the changes should bring better student performance, the new structures that will be put in place should serve as a catalyst to continue to improve the quality of public education. There will be real opportunity for the measurement of effective teachers, and hopefully new set of standards that can translate into better teacher salaries, and it will force the community to examine the current governance structure and determine whether it should be replaced and/or reformed.

DIAZ: Interview

Lantigua appeared on some radio shows expanding on the press release he sent out this week announcing the petition.

"The problems with the schools are chronic; they didn't happen in the last few years and I will not accept the excuses that these children come from single-parent homes, foreign language background, poor neighborhoods, too many liquor stores around them, welfare..." Lantigua said quoting to a portion of the press release. "The same children from those neighborhoods and the same families thrive in Bellesini, Esperanza, and Notre Dame."

The mayor claims that he is being criticized for not consulting with the members of the school committee but he did. "I called Jim Vittorioso, Mark Gray, Greg Morris, Pavel Payano and even Dr. Mary Lou Bergeron, asking for their opinion." He admitted that he did not try contacting Sammy Reyes or Martina Cruz.

Although the decision will not take place immediately because there are several steps to go through, including a meeting on Monday, November 28 from 5:00 to 7:00 in Malden when they will be listening to comments from the public.

When asked why he did not consult with the incoming members of the school committee, his response was that, "They have not been sworn-in yet."

The rumors abound on the radio and on the streets. Some comments heard are assuming that good teachers will be let go when the State takes over in favor of politics; also the existence of a list of 25 administrators that Lantigua personally will fire.

"Those administrators are covered by a union. I can't fire anyone and that's a blatant lie that I have a list."

Regarding the role the school committee will play in the future, Mayor Lantigua said that is still uncertain. That board has three major areas of responsibility which are hiring and evaluating the superintendent, policy making, and oversight of the budget. Since the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education will have the option of appointing a superintendent, "I don't know how the function of the school committee will change," said Lantigua.

Lawrence Public Schools had been targeted for negative publicity for many years and when the Arlington Elementary School and the South Lawrence Middle School were named as Level 4 schools by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, "It was devastating for our city and the morale of school department employees," said Mayor Lantigua. "When we found out that three more schools had been added to that list, I had to do something."

The new failing schools are the James F. Leonard School, the International High School and the Business Management and Finance High School.

Other superintendents and schools administrators in the area who did not want to be identified said that it is very sad having to come to that but they could see it coming since 1998. The decline of the Lawrence Public Schools has been steady, leaving Mayor Lantigua in a situation that a decision had to be made.

They all referred to Education Reform Act of 1993 when power was taken away from local school committees. Now, they have no say on teacher hiring, educational issues or curriculum.

Ralph Carrero, the superintendent of the Lawrence Family Development Charter School (LFDCS) hopes this will bring a change in governance. Please read his comments on page 7.

Patricia Karl, founder of LFDCS said, "Regarding the request and discussion of a possible state takeover of the Lawrence Public Schools: My first concern would always be for the children of Lawrence and the hope that the decision will address the need for whatever changes are necessary to provide a strong, consistent, high quality education for every student in the City. I hope that politics and blame will not be part of the discussion, rather an emphasis on what resources of leadership and trainings can be brought to the schools and classrooms to support the work of educators and the concerns of parents."

Frank Bonet, personnel director for the City of Lawrence simply said. "Lantigua has given the children of this city a voice."

Lawrence General Hospital Recognized as Part of Massachusetts Hospital Association's Tobacco-Free Hospitals Honor Roll

Diane Knight of the Northeast Tobacco Free Community Partnership joined colleagues from around the Commonwealth to participate in the 2011 Great American Smokeout on November 17th at the Massachusetts State House. The event, organized by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Massachusetts Tobacco Cessation and Prevention Program, is part of a nationwide effort to raise awareness of the dangers of tobacco use and motivate smokers to make a quit attempt.

At this year's event the Massachusetts Department of Public Health presented the Massachusetts Hospital Association (MHA) with its annual Make Smoking History award. The award, presented each year, honors an organization in Massachusetts committed to making the Commonwealth tobacco-free. MHA has been working with and recognizing hospital campuses across the state that are committed to being tobacco-free. Lawrence General Hospital

is one of the 48 hospitals listed on MHA's Tobacco-Free Hospitals Honor Roll.

The Northeast Tobacco Free Community Partnership also toured the State House and visited with legislators and their staff members to educate them on cessation benefits, such as the patch and stop-smoking medicines, which when used together more than double a smoker's chance to quit for good.

It's important for everyone to know that smoking still remains the number one cause of preventable death and disability in Massachusetts," said Diane Knight, director. "However, the good news is seventy-seven percent of adult smokers in Massachusetts want to quit smoking and if we can provide them with the support necessary to quit for good, we will have made a difference."

Funded by the Massachusetts Tobacco Cessation and Prevention Program, the Community Partnership, a program of Greater Lawrence Family Health Center serves as a resource for local coalitions, health and human service agencies, municipalities and workplaces on tobacco intervention efforts in 49 communities throughout Essex and Middlesex Counties

Arts and Writing Contest

The Martin Luther King Coalition announced that its Arts and Writing Contest for the Lionel Washington Johnson Youth Awards will be expanded for 2012 to include fifth grade students from all New Hampshire public, parochial, private schools and home-schooled students.

The state-wide contest asks students to submit original written or graphic art responses to words from Dr. King, selected each year by the Coalition from Dr. King's writings and speeches. Student submissions are judged by a special committee. First place winners receive \$100 and a plaque; second place winners receive \$50 and a certificate; third place winners and honorable mention receive a certificate. All winners are asked to attend the Annual Martin Luther King Day Celebration in Manchester on the holiday for personal presentation of the Lionel Washington Johnson Youth Award.

Traci Belanger, Chair of the Arts and Writing Committee, explained the expansion of the award, "Many schools now include fifth grade students in middle schools and our Coalition wants to include as many children as possible in the contest. We welcome entries from public students, home-schooled students, students from charter schools, private schools, and religious based schools – all the fifth through eighth graders in the state of New Hampshire."

For 2012, the Coalition has chosen words taken from a 19th century abolitionist and often spoken by Dr. King: "The arc of the moral universe is long but it bends towards justice." Fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth graders are asked to interpret the quotation to reflect how they understand and relate to the theme and the words in their lives as well as life in general today. Students may submit any form of art, including drawings,

paintings, posters, videos, and PowerPoint presentations. For writing, students may submit any form of writing, such as essays, short stories, of 400 to 800 words or full-page poems.

Corporations must purchase this coverage. Proprietors and LLC businesses do not have to protect themselves but they must purchase a policy for workers they hire.

LOSS OF RENTS/EARNINGS: If your rental income or your sales money pays the bills then you need to be sure your policy includes this coverage. It is not automatically included!

MVCC's Women's Conference

Merrimack Valley Chamber of Commerce members benefited from attending the Women in Business Conference held at DiBurro's in Haverhill.

Keynote Speaker Congresswoman Niki Tsongas, welcome the opportunity to get together and talk about the women's struggles such as work, childcare, domestic violence, the recession, unemployment, credit, etc., while women are still earning 80 cents for each dollar a man earns.

Anita Rajan Worden, Chairwoman Solectria Renewables knows the meaning of managing several roles at once. She struggles between hiring reliable employees and handling her children as part of her day.

As a member of Congress, Mrs. Tsongas can give a voice to women in the armed forces and she is working towards a health care bill for them. "Sexual assault in the military is a very serious problem since one in 3 women will be assaulted," Congresswoman Tsongas explained and promised to work towards a solution of that threat.

According to Jeanne A. Hulit, New England Regional Administrator for U.S. Small Business Administration, "Women's are the fastest growing businesses in the economy amounting to \$1.9 trillion. Last year, the SBA provided \$3B in loans to women business owners which was a record!"

"There was a time when our industry was dominated by men," explained Mrs. Worden. "But now there are more women

coming into this field (electronics) mainly because of education advances."

Government Panelists:



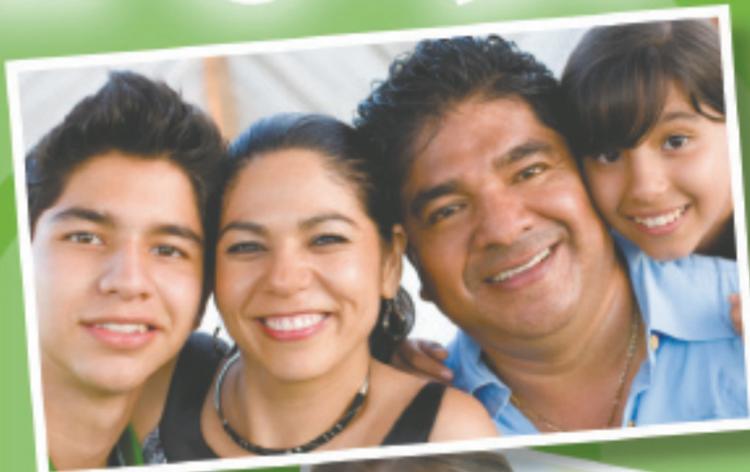
