





Foro sobre Lawrence RC

El Congresista Marty Meehan fue el anfitrión en un foro para discutir la expansión de la Zona de Renovación de Comunidad de Lawrence. Representantes del Departamento de Viviendas y Desarrollo Urbano y del Servicio de Rentas Internas acompañaron al congresista, para responder a preguntas de cómo esta expansión impactará a la comunidad de negocios de Lawrence.

El Foro, que tuvo lugar en Sal's Conference Center and Function Facility, durante un almuerzo proveído por Sal Lupoli, propietario del establecimiento, el lunes, 5 de diciembre, 2005, atrajo a más de 200 hombres y mujeres de negocio. A pesar de que Chris Fingliss de New Balance explicó de cómo su compañía se ha beneficiado de los incentivos que el programa ofrece, no muchos, con la excepción de Malden Mills han tomado ventaja de ello.

De acuerdo con Fred T. Carberry, Director Interino de Planeamiento y Desarrollo, su oficina está para informar a la comunidad de negocio acerca de las ventajas de aplicar pero es la obligación de los dueños de negocios, a través de sus preparadores de impuestos o contadores, el aplicar. "Solo el Departamento de Rentas Internas puede decir cuántos negocios en Lawrence se están aprovechando de este plan", dijo Carberry.

Forum on Lawrence's RC

Congressman Marty Meehan hosted a forum to discuss the expansion of Lawrence's Renewal Community Zone. Along with the congressman, representatives from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and Internal Revenue Service were on hand to explain how this expansion will impact Lawrence's business community.

The forum, which took place at Sal's Conference Center and Function Facility during a lunch provided by Sal Lupoli, on Monday, December 5, 2005, attracted more than 200 area business people. While Chris Fingliss from New Balance, explained how his company had benefited from the tax breaks offered by the designation, not too many, with the exception of Malden Mills, had taken advantage of it.

According to Fred T. Carberry, Acting Director of Lawrence Planning and Development, his office is

there to inform the business community about the advantages of applying but is up to that business community, through their tax preparer or accountants to do the actual application. "Only the Internal Revenue can tell how many businesses in Lawrence are taking advantage of this plan", said Carberry.

In January 2002, Lawrence was one of 40 communities in the nation to have been designated a Renewal Community by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, in order to spur economic development and revitalization in the city. In 2004, Congressman Marty Meehan authored federal legislation to expand the LRC and in 2005 HUD acted to expand the zone to include the Wood

The Center, located at the corner of South Union and Merrimack Street (211 Merrimack St.) is not far away from the old Lawrence Train Station.

The Transportation Center is not just a new train station, but a Community Police Sub-Station, shops soon to open, a terminal for buses about to start traveling to Logan and Manchester Airports and back, and a huge parking building with close to 900 spaces.

Muchos residentes de Lawrence están seguros que el Alcalde Michael J. Sullivan va a pasar cuatro años de vacaciones y nada significativo tendrá lugar en la ciudad pero, la ceremonia de juramentación de su segundo término no se ha celebrado aún y él está retumbando como una tormenta.

El Departamento de Servicios de Inspección ha enviado un aviso a todos los candidatos para un puesto público en Lawrence dejándoles saber que ya es hora de remover sus letreros políticos.

Silverio espera que con la nueva administración y con la cooperación de algunos de los concejales antiguos, la ciudad vaya a encontrar la solución de este problema. “La ciudad necesita crear un sitio donde las personas puedan obtener la información que necesitan”, dijo Silverio y añadió, “Debemos ser capaces de trabajar con esos negocios, de ayudarlos, de mantenerlos en su negocio. No podemos olvidarnos de que el pequeño comerciante en Lawrence necesita asistencia, necesita ayuda y de que ahora tenemos la oportunidad de hacerlo y creo que debemos tomar los pasos necesarios para asistirlos ahora”, terminó Silverio.



- (v) No deben poner más de un letrero en un edificio a menos que su frente esté dando a más de una calle y en tal caso, podrán poner dos letreros, uno dando hacia cada calle.
- (vi) El letrero ante el cuartel de campaña de un candidato político no debe considerarse como un letrero político.

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DESAFÍOS Y OPORTUNIDADES: Programa de Crédito para Propietarios de Pequeños Negocios

Recientemente me informaron de que la Ciudad de Lawrence ofrece un programa de asistencia financiera para pequeños negocios sean nuevos o ya establecidos. Este programa llamado *Small Business Revolving Loan Fund* o fondo de préstamos para micro-empresas es financiado a través del *Community Development Block Grant* de la ciudad, que es administrado por el Departamento de Vivienda y Desarrollo Urbano conocido como HUD.

El objetivo es ayudar a revitalizar el sector comercial de la ciudad al facilitarles acceso a capital y financiamiento a pequeños negocios. Por este medio, el gobierno municipal busca fomentar el desarrollo económico a través de la creación de empleos, y la generación de inversión comercial y el mejoramiento de las condiciones económicas del vecindario. Estos esfuerzos combinados eventualmente ayudarían a mejorar la calidad de vida de los residentes de la ciudad.

En una ciudad con más de 300 micro empresas, los programas de financiamiento no convencional, tales como el *Revolving Loan Fund*, son críticos. Un estudio del 2003 realizado por el Dr. Jorge Santiago y el Dr. James Jennings señala que con frecuencia los propietarios de pequeños negocios Latinos financian sus firmas con fondos familiares debido principalmente a limitaciones de crédito y la carencia de fondos para el pago de préstamos comerciales.

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conlleva su diligenciamiento.

El tema de la financiación también es una preocupación para las personas involucradas en el otorgamiento de créditos. Andrés Sánchez, miembro del comité y oficial de préstamos en Banknorth espera que más residentes empiecen a utilizar el programa revolving loan en lugar de acudir a refinanciar sus hipotecas para financiar sus negocios. En contraste con la opinión de algunos microempresarios, Sánchez afirma que los requerimientos crediticios y el proceso de diligenciamiento son razonables y de gran valor al momento de aprobar un crédito.

A Osvaldo Maldonado propietario de una micro-empresa llamada *All Pro Floor Care* le fue aprobado un préstamo por valor de \$30,000 de la Ciudad de Lawrence. El utilizó tales recursos para satisfacer sus necesidades básicas de capital y adquisición de equipos. Aunque a Maldonado inicialmente le fue negado un préstamo comercial porque carecía de fondos para cumplir con los pagos regulares, el *Revolving Loan Fund* le proporcionó una alternativa de financiamiento, la cual fue aprobada luego de que presentara su plan de negocios.

Marisol Reyes, micro empresaria dueña de *La Frutería* también solicitó recursos del *Revolving Loan Fund*, pero su crédito no cumplía los requisitos de puntaje requeridos por el comité. Su única opción fue considerar un préstamo personal a una tasa de interés del 18%. Ella espera que muy pronto su crédito reúna las condiciones del programa para tener acceso al fondo de préstamos de la ciudad.

En contraste con Maldonado y Reyes, hay otros propietarios de negocios que buscaron otras opciones de financiación por razones diferentes. José Del Carmen, *Pueblo Supermarket* por ejemplo, utilizó algunos ahorros familiares como inversión inicial. El prefirió apoyarse en recursos

propios más bien que exponer su negocio a endeudamiento. Después de su inversión inicial, Del Carmen ha expandido su negocio sustancialmente y ahora tiene una línea de crédito de \$50,000 con un banco local, la cual espera incrementar en un futuro.

Como es evidente a través de las experiencias y comentarios de propietarios de negocios las necesidades y circunstancias personales de microempresarios pueden variar significativamente. No obstante, el programa de préstamos es una alternativa viable para microempresarios que cumplen los requisitos exigidos.

De acuerdo con el Sr. Orlando Salazar, gerente del fondo, la mayoría de empresarios necesitan asistencia para preparar un sólido plan de negocios. El opina que algunos de ellos "no están suficientemente preparados" cuando solicitan un préstamo comercial.

Asimismo, Andrés Sánchez también indicó que una de las mayores barreras para la concesión de un crédito es la carencia de garantías reales además del alto margen de deudas que la mayoría de propietarios de negocios tienen cuando buscan financiamiento. Es la carencia de capital inicial, limitado conocimiento del negocio, y crédito inestable lo que finalmente reduce la posibilidad de la adjudicación de un crédito de negocios.

Después de hablar con algunos propietarios de negocios y personal del programa de préstamos de la ciudad, hay dos consideraciones que deberían ser reexaminadas: el role y las necesidades de los propietarios de negocios, y las expectativas al igual que los requisitos exigidos para crédito con las instituciones financieras. Tal vez haya una forma de recrear un fuerte lazo entre ambas partes al establecer una sólida comunicación con microempresarios y proporcionar asistencia técnica a microempresarios de la ciudad.

Lawrence es un excelente lugar para iniciar un negocio, pero sin un sólido plan de negocios y algún capital inicial, sea en ahorros familiares o créditos bancarios, estos negocios tendrán limitadas oportunidades de éxito. La buena noticia es que hay servicios disponibles de la ciudad y también de la oficina de *US Small Business Administration* que pueden ayudar a propietarios de negocios a satisfacer sus necesidades de capital. Todo lo que se necesita es concentración, compromiso y perseverancia.



OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES: Loan Program for Small Business Owners

I recently discovered that the City of Lawrence has a program that offers financial assistance to new or established entrepreneurs. The Small Business Revolving Loan is funded by the City's Community Development Block Grant Program which is managed by the Office of Planning and Development. It is designed for micro entrepreneurs and small businesses from Lawrence who seek non-conventional financing. The goal is to help revitalize the commercial sector of the city by providing capital to small businesses, thereby promoting economic development through job creation and generation of commercial investment.

In a city with over 300 minority businesses, non-conventional financing programs, such as the Revolving Loan, are critical. A 2003 study by Dr. Jorge Santiago and Dr. James Jennings indicates that a notable number of Latino business owners finance their firms with their own money because of limited established credit and shortage of down-payment capital for commercial loans.

According to Santiago and Jennings, in 2003 89% of entrepreneurs used family savings as principal source of investment with only 28% of entrepreneurs choosing to access some form of conventional credit. We can infer from these figures that the majority of minority business owners still struggle finding adequate financing for their businesses. Conversations with various business owners confirmed that most of them do have a keen interest to access commercial loans but the applications and program requirements are often too overwhelming and time consuming.

The issue of financing is one of concern to business lenders. Andres Sanchez, a member of the Revolving Loan Review Committee and commercial lender at Banknorth is hoping that more people begin utilizing the revolving loan program instead of tapping home equities for business-related investments. In contrast to business owners, Sanchez believes that the requirements and application process for the Revolving Loan program are

reasonable and worth pursuing.

Osvaldo Maldonado a local business owner, *All Pro Floor Care*, applied for a city loan and was approved for \$30,000. He has utilized the funds for basic capital needs and equipment acquisition. Mr. Maldonado was initially rejected by a commercial bank because he lacked a sizable down payment for the loan. The Revolving Loan Program provided a financing alternative, but it wasn't until Mr. Maldonado prepared and presented a business plan and financial statements that he was able to earn an approval from the Loan Review Committee.

Marisol Reyes also tried accessing the Revolving Loan funds but quickly realized that her credit score was not strong enough to guarantee loan approval by the Committee. Her only option was to apply for a personal loan at 18% interest. Reyes clarified that she doesn't have any regrets of her initial loan, but she is hoping that in the future her credit score has improved enough to win strong consideration by the City's business loan program or another lower-interest financing product.

In contrast to the experiences of Osvaldo and Marisol, there are others who have elected to pursue other financial alternatives for other reasons. Jose Del Carmen, *Pueblo Market*, utilized his family savings as down-payment for his business because he preferred relying on his own resources instead of exposing his business to unnecessary debt. After his initial investment, Del Carmen has since been able to successfully expand his business. Today, he has a line of credit of \$50,000 with a local financial institution, which he expects to increase in the near future.

As evident through the insights and comments of business owners, the needs and personal circumstances of entrepreneurs can vary significantly. Nevertheless, the Revolving Loan Program can be a viable financial alternative for eligible entrepreneurs. Orlando Salazar, manager of the small business revolving loan fund, notes that most entrepreneurs need assistance building a solid business plan as "they are often unprepared" when

they attempt to access the city's loans. Andres Sanchez added that one of the major barriers to financing is the lack of collateral or investment from the borrowers as well as the high debt margin that most business owners have when they seek financing. It is, as they observed, the lack of initial capital, limited business knowledge, and unstable credit that ultimately reduce the creditworthiness of business borrowers.

The dialogue and interviews with business owners and city personnel, revealed two major considerations that should be examined: 1) the role and needs of local business owners and 2) the expectations and underwriting criteria of financial institutions. Perhaps there's a way of creating a stronger link between the two worlds by establishing strong communication ties with business owners and delivering additional technical assistance to those who need it. Through this interaction and commitment there can be mutual benefit for business owners as well as lenders.

Our next article will feature an interview and discussion with a representative from the US Small Business Administration to identify technical assistance available for micro entrepreneurs and small business owners.

WARNING TO POLITICIANS: Time to remove signs

The Inspectional Services Department has sent a memo to all the candidates for public office in Lawrence advising them that it is time to remove their campaign signs.

"I am writing to ask for your assistance," said Building Commissioner Luis Waldron in his letter. "Now that the elections are over, we are, once again, beginning to receive complaints regarding political signs which have not yet been removed."

The Lawrence Revised Zoning Ordinance requires all signs be removed within thirty days after the election. This sets a removal deadline of December 9, 2005 for the general election signs and an October 23 deadline for the primary.

Those who lost in the preliminary elections of September should have had their signs removed within thirty days but the city has been lenient enforcing this ordinance and the result has been that political signs of winners and losers of several years ago are still littering the city.

Violation notices will be issued in mid December upon observance of signs which are not in compliance.



A Town to Remember

"It had its good points, and bad. What potential! It has a proud history. Unfortunately, today, people will probably only remember it for crime, rundown streets, and formerly historical buildings which are turning to dust."

This place is really about so much more than that.

This is a story about one of the most famous areas in all of America. People, trade, a part of a town where the use of creating items by hand and machine began.

Towertown

In its infancy, where American Industry sprung up from, is forgotten and is suffering. But, from the ashes, history remembers the growth of giving ordinary men and women the chance to learn a trade, a craft, and grow as human beings. Woman led a major role in sparking a generation. They became influences and producers, and became role models, where, in the past, were only considered second class citizens.

Not in Towertown. Everyone had a chance here, and their growth process began here.

Stately brick factory buildings with glorious clock towers were common, but, their majesty was not. They had character. A long, winding river made sure they were protected and kept high and mighty. The two were like brother and sister, one never overshadowing the other.

So much to tell.

If you leave Towertown to move to another location, you do it with a sense of loss, and a feeling of what could have been, but proud of what it was. You always flashback to when you were a child, and then a young adult, and you are left with your own sweet and sometimes bitter stories, a lifetime mixed with both pleasure and pain.

Everything during the Industrial Revolution happened here. The "Olde Girl" as locals called it, may have its bruises, but they healed with pride.

This place has its own stories to tell.

Ellen Yound can tell you more than most. She embodies Towertown: a place where life is told "like it is." She remembers both now and then, that the experience left you with conviction for a bygone era, many of the morals of the place, hard and mean, but missing today in our much too hurried society.

She lives now in a city very different from the grit environs of Towertown. Peace here doesn't always feel good to her. She has a left piece of herself back in that land, and it's that spirit that haunts her, but strengthens her just the same.

"It had style and had persona, more than most," she said while sitting in a chair on a front porch in a harbor port town far away from the mecca she called home.

This is a tale of what Towertown has left in her collective consciousness that will never fade away.

She recalls in great detail the scenes of a multidimensional culture.

"I like it here, but I miss Towertown," she adds, a tear streaming down her cheek, that she doesn't bother to wipe off.

The forum, which took place at Sal's Conference Center and Function Facility during a lunch provided by Sal Lupoli, on Monday, December 5, 2005, attracted more than 200 area business people.

Mill, Riverwalk, Tower Hill and New Balance areas.

Julia Silverio, who was part of the panel, explained about the difficulties Latino businesses encounter. Silverio told the audience that even when most businesses in Lawrence belong to Latinos, they are the smallest of all and in a vast majority, operated by relatives. "And that is one of the stipulations," said Silverio. "If you employ relatives, your business doesn't qualify."

According to Silverio, there are several factors why these businesses haven't been able to benefit from the program and one of them is the lack of use of tax preparers who are experts in the area and the lack of use of CPAs for the tax preparation. "The lack of knowledge the community has in finding the resources to assist them, is probably due to their language barrier," said Silverio.

Silverio hopes that with the new administration taking shape and with the cooperation of some older councilors, the city will come up with a solution for these problems. "The city needs to put together a place where people can go and get the information they need," said Silverio and added, "We need to be able to work with those businesses, to help them out, to keep them in business. We can not afford to

forget that the smaller businesses in Lawrence need assistance, need help and we have an opportunity to assist them now and I believe we should take steps to assist them now," ended Silverio.

Hi, Rumbo readers! I hope everyone had a nice Thanksgiving and that the snow didn't create too many problems. I was lucky to spend the day with my family even though doing so did involve the most time-consuming trip to Vermont on record.

By the time you see this we should be finished with the first stage of our renovations. The auditorium will be finished and our piano retuned so that we can host a lot more events there once things return to normal. The auditorium is the easy part of the whole enterprise since the carpeting in there requires no major moving effort.

Healthy Holiday Eating

The season for savory dishes has arrived, but maintaining nutritious eating habits shouldn't be daunting. It is not too late to get a handle on the holiday eating. Take these ideas from Elisabetta Politi, R.D., nutrition manager at Duke University Diet and Fitness, and you might find the happy medium between being a diehard dieter and a guiltless gorger.

Say so long to strict rules. Politi says people who are ultra-strict about their diet during the holidays generally don't enjoy the celebration and tend to rebound later. "When January comes and everyone starts their New Year's resolutions, those people who have done really well through the holidays tend not to be highly motivated."

Prepare and set goals for gatherings. Eat a snack before you head to Aunt Betty's infamous afternoon feast. If you take the edge off of your appetite, you'll be less likely to overindulge on the mouthwatering dishes. When you get there, try to keep track of your calorie intake. One goal Politi recommends is limiting alcohol intake to one beverage and drinking sparkling or seltzer water during the event. Think in terms of calorie comparisons, too. A serving of eggnog packs 251 calories, while a serving of spiced cider has 128 calories. Choose the cider, and with just one beverage serving, you've cut 123 calories from your day's caloric total.

Remember portion control. At celebrations, especially those with buffets, Politi advises, "take a look at what's being offered before deciding what to put on your plate." When making your plate, Politi suggests this ratio: 1/2 vegetables, 1/4 protein, and 1/4 grains. "Most of the volume on your plate is taken by vegetables, which tend to be lower in calories. Of course, you want vegetables that are not cooked with a lot of fat," Politi says. If you'd rather not make a heaping plate of food once in the day, she also recommends the alternative

of eating small portions frequently to avoid being overly hungry at any point.

Learn from Volumetrics. This theory, established by Dr. Barbara Rolls, professor of nutrition at Pennsylvania State University, found that people tend to eat the same volume or weight of food every day. "If you want to cut down on calories and not be hungry, eat more food with low calorie density," Politi says. "Food that has low calorie density has a lot of water bound to it." So, vegetables, fruit, and puffy grains such as rice or couscous are perfect choices to help you feel full.

Choose wholesome and healthy over high-fat and processed. When the holiday season draws near, it will bring with it the temptation of delectable (read: high-fat and high-sugar) dishes, which could mean disaster for your health. Fear not, Politi says. "If you want to enjoy food that has high calorie density, just try to choose something wholesome." Nuts and dried fruits are flavorful and nutrient-packed alternatives to highly processed foods that offer no healthy benefits.

Put things into perspective. Politi says, "I think it's important to enjoy the spirit of the holidays and not focus on food so much; it is not the main point of the gathering. By doing that, you will make healthier choices."

HEALTHY HOLIDAY BAKING GOLDEN HEALTH COOKIES

INGREDIENTS:

2 ripe bananas
1 tsp vanilla extract
1/2 cup margarine, softened
1/4 cup shelled sunflower seeds
1-1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup honey
1 tsp baking powder
1 egg
2 cups raisin-granola cereal
1/3 cup plain, lowfat yogurt

INSTRUCTIONS:

Preheat oven to 375° F. Puree bananas in blender. Beat butter and honey until fluffy. Beat in egg, yogurt, vanilla, and bananas. Combine flour and baking powder; add to banana mixture. Stir in granola and sunflower seeds. Drop by heaping tablespoons onto non-stick cookie sheets (or spray sheets with non-stick vegetable spray). Bake for 12-15 minutes. Makes about 2 1/2 dozen.





Regulations on Political signs in Lawrence

- (i) Such sign is permitted inside of windows of residences and business establishments open to the public when such premises are occupied by the owner or tenant.
- (ii) No such sign is permitted in or upon vacant premises; vacant dwelling units; in or upon trees, utility poles and unregistered vehicles; and on the outside of buildings or other structures.
- (iii) All such signs shall be removed within thirty days following the election. A winning election candidate in a primary election may maintain his or her sign until thirty days following the general election.
- (iv) The size of any such sign shall not exceed six square feet.
- (v) Nor more than one sign shall be placed upon any premises unless such premises fronts upon more than one street, in which event, two signs may be erected, one on each frontage.
- (vi) Headquarters signs for a political candidate shall not be considered a political sign.
