

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

En 2004, Las Hermanas de Notre Dame de Namur abrieron la escuela superior Notre Dame en Lawrence, para servir a jóvenes económicamente desventajados del área del Valle de Merrimack. La escuela ofrece un programa único donde los alumnos pueden pagar 70% de su matrícula con su propio trabajo.

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El domingo, 21 de enero, más de 2,000 fieles, en su mayoría dominicanos, llenaron la Iglesia de Santa María de la Asunción, para honrar a la Virgen de la Altgracia, Protectora y Reina de los corazones de los dominicanos. Cuando los bancos se llenaron, Ramón Brito y Temístocles Devers no daban abasto colocando sillas plegables para acomodar a los que seguían entrando a la iglesia.

El Obispo de Santo Domingo, República Dominicana, Monseñor Pablo Cedano estaba supuesto a oficiar la misa pero debido a la salud del Cardenal Nicolás de Jesús López Rodríguez, tuvo que cancelar su viaje. En su lugar, el Obispo Emilio S. Allué, Obispo de la Región del Valle de Merrimack, ofició la misa. "Hoy yo soy dominicano", dijo, hablando a los fieles en español. Los dominicanos ven la imagen como exemplificación de nuestra señora que mira sobre la isla y el crecimiento del cristianismo allí. El día del banquete es marcado por servicios, vigilias que duran toda la noche, cantos, bailes, y festivales en muchas de las ciudades.

La leyenda dice que la hija piadosa de un comerciante rico pidió que él le trajera un retrato de Nuestra Señora de Altgracia de Santo Domingo, pero nadie había oído hablar de ese título. El comerciante, permaneció durante la noche en la casa de un amigo en Higüey, describió su problema mientras que se sentaron al aire libre después de cena. Un hombre viejo con una barba larga, que pasaba frente a la casa en ese momento, al oír el relato, sacó de una bolsa una pintura enrollada y le dijo al comerciante, "esto es lo que estás buscando." Era la Virgen de Altgracia.

Dieron al viejo un lugar para pasar la noche, pero al amanecer se había marchado, para no ser visto otra vez. El comerciante puso la imagen sobre una mesa, pero desapareció en varias ocasiones para ser encontrada solamente afuera.

Finalmente la volvieron a la iglesia.

DOMINICANS HONOR THEIR GUARDIAN

On Sunday, January 21, more than 2,000 faithful, largely Dominicans, filled St. Mary of the Assumption Church in Lawrence. They were coming to pay tribute to Virgen de la Altgracia (Our Lady of High Grace; Protector and Queen of the hearts of the Dominicans). When the pews were full, Ramón Brito and Temístocles Devers couldn't keep up bringing out folding chairs to accommodate those who continue arriving.

Santo Domingo's Bishop Monsignor Pablo Cedano in the Dominican Republic was scheduled to officiate the Mass but his trip was cancelled due to Santo Domingo's Cardinal Nicolas de Jesus Lopez Rodriguez's health. Instead, Bishop Emilio S. Allue, Regional Bishop of the Merrimack Region officiated the Mass. "Today, I'm Dominican", said speaking in Spanish.

Dominicans see the image as exemplifying Our Lady watching over the island and the growth of Christianity there. The feast day is marked by services, all-night vigils, singing, dancing, and festivals in many of the towns. Legend says that the pious daughter of a rich merchant asked him to bring her a portrait of Our Lady of Altgracia from Santo Domingo, but no one had heard of that title. The merchant, staying overnight at a friend's house in Higuey, described his problem as they sat outdoors after dinner. An old man with a long beard, who just happened to be passing by, pulled a rolled up painting from his bundle, gave it to the merchant, and said, "This is what you are looking for." It was the Virgin of Altgracia.

They gave the old man a place to stay for the night, but by dawn he was gone, not to be seen again. The merchant placed the image on their mantle, but it repeatedly disappearing only to be found outside. They finally returned it to the church.

El Censo también proporciona pruebas de que Ud. está viviendo en la ciudad y le protege contra ser removido de la Lista de Votantes Activos. Es muy importante que todo el mundo participe en este proceso. Cuando conteste el Censo, debe llevar en mente lo siguiente:

En esta ocasión el sobre de retorno está previamente pago y no necesita sello postal.

1. Al recibir, el Censo Anual se debe completar y devolver dentro de **DIEZ** (10) días, o inmediatamente, a la Oficina del City Clerk, 200 Common Street, Room 107, Lawrence, MA 01840.
2. Verifica y/o completa toda la información listada en el formulario.
3. Enumera toda la familia o miembros de la casa cuya dirección legal es la misma. Incluye cualquier miembro de la familia en el Ejército, fuera en la universidad o confinado a un hogar de descanso cuya dirección legal es la misma.
4. Tache cualquier persona que ya no vive en esta dirección y escriba su nueva dirección.
5. Indique si cualquier individuo listado se ha mudado o se ha muerto.

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
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Notas de su Bibliotecaria

¡Saludos, Amigos Lectores! Espero que todos estén manteniéndose bastante calentitos. Supongo que las cosas podrían estar peor—ya que virtualmente no tenemos ninguna nieve—aunque está bien frío. Creo que lo peor del invierno es la cantidad de personas que se enferman. En este edificio es como si todos estuviésemos compartiendo los mismos gérmenes, ya que siempre hay alguien enfermo. No será hasta el final de la primavera cuando ya todos aquí dejen de toser.

Les he estado hablando sobre Terry Farish, nuestra Coordinadora de Servicios Especiales del Departamento de Niños, y de su viaje a Kenia. Bueno, ya ella regresó y le gustaría compartir con ustedes sus experiencias durante el viaje y sobre su trabajo como voluntaria para ayudar a establecer una pequeña biblioteca en la Villa de Esabalu. Terry descubrió que el estilo de vida de allá es muy diferente al de aquí. Es una villa muy pobre y sus residentes trabajan arduamente. La mayoría de los negocios trabajan a través de un sistema de trueque ya que por lo general las personas no tienen acceso a dinero. El gobierno de Kenia ofrece educación gratuita para los niños hasta el 7mo grado solamente. Los padres tienen que pagar si desean que sus hijos continúen siendo educados. Como resultado, la mayoría de los niños solo cuentan con un séptimo grado de educación.

La lectura en Esabalu es considerada una actividad apropiada para el salón de clases, fuera del salón el niño que lee es considerado ocioso y se espera que ayude y participe en el mantenimiento de la familia trabajando. La mayoría de las familias son autosuficientes ya que ellos tienen pequeños cultivos y ganado en sus hogares. El agua hay que buscarla y transportarlas en cubetas que son cargadas encima de sus cabezas. La transportación es limitada, así que la mayoría de las personas tienen que caminar, dándoles suficiente trabajo para todos en la casa.

Teniendo todo esto en cuenta, uno se imagina que las vidas de estas personas son lamentables y demasiado

dificultosas. Terry por otro lado notó una comunidad, que aunque no cuentan con mucho, trabajan juntos para asegurarse de tener lo básico. Los niños nunca pasan hambre y aunque las casas no son lujosas siempre están inmaculadamente limpias. Los niños se crían con un sentir profundo de respeto hacia sus padres y otros adultos. Toda la comunidad también respeta la importancia de la educación. A pesar de que las oportunidades para una educación completa son muy limitadas, maestros, doctores, etc. son muy admirados en Esabalu.

Otra cosa que Terry encontró muy interesante fue que Esabalu se encuentra en la línea del ecuador y la puesta del sol es todas las noches exactamente a las 7:00, no importa la estación del año. Después de esta hora todo trabajo termina y todos se sientan a compartir y hablar. Dado el ritmo que lleva nuestra sociedad y las distracciones que parecen nunca acabar, me parece idílico el poder sentarse al final del día de trabajo y hablar y compartir con la familia y amistades.

Cualquier historia escrita para niños debe de estar impregnada de la ternura y la calidez que caracteriza esta hermosa edad del ser humano.



LET'S RETURN THE CENSUS!

On January 19, 2007, the City of Lawrence mailed its Annual Census Form to all homes in the City. The Census is now in Spanish and English for the convenience of everyone answering the Census. This information on the form is used by the City of Lawrence voters to establish local statistics within the City, and to notify this division of any changes in the household. The Census also, provides proof of residence to the Election Division and protects an individual from being dropped from the Active Voter List. It is very important that everyone participates in this process. You should keep the following in mind when answering the Census. This year the Census has a prepaid return envelope.

1. Upon receipt, the Annual Census Form should be completed and returned within **TEN (10) DAYS**, or immediately thereafter, to the City Clerk's Office, 200 Common Street, Room 107, Lawrence, MA 01840.
2. Verify and/or complete all information listed on the form.
3. List all family or household members whose legal address is the same. Include any member of the family in the Military, away at school or confined to a rest home whose legal residence is the same.
4. Cross off any resident no longer residing at this address and list his/her new address.
5. Indicate if any individual listed has moved or is deceased.

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Meehan Statement on the Passage of the College Student Relief Act

Congressman Marty Meehan (D-MA) released the following statement on H.R. 5, The College Student Relief Act. The bill is the fifth of six pieces of legislation that House Democrats have pledged to pass in the first 100 legislative hours of the 110th Congress.

Over the next 10 years, 6.4 million high school graduates will not be able to attend the college of their choice because of the high cost of college tuition, including 2 million graduates that will be forced to forego college altogether. H.R. 5, the College Student Relief Act will make college more affordable by cutting interest rates in half over the next five years on subsidized student loans. It will help ease the financial burden for 5.5 million students and their families. The average student will save \$4,400 over the life of the loan.

In April 2006, Meehan released a report on the increasing costs of college tuition in Massachusetts. The report found that tuition and fees at public colleges in Massachusetts increased by more than 70% in the last ten years, and nearly 60% at private colleges in the same time period. Meehan then held a series of town meetings throughout the 5th Congressional district, where he heard from parents and students about the burdens that these costs were putting on their families and the difficult choices they were being forced to make when it came to their children's education.

Meehan's statement on the College Student Relief Act appears below:

"The success of the national economy, and especially that of my home state of Massachusetts, is inextricably linked to our ability to innovate and create. America must remain on the cutting edge of science, medicine and every other field if we hope to compete in the global marketplace in the century to come. We will never be able to adhere to this high standard tomorrow if we fail to educate the future leaders, innovators and creators today. Failing to invest in the education of our young people discounts their future and our own. To this end, we must make affordable education our priority.

"Today, this House is putting a down payment on that priority by lightening the heavy burden of student loans. There's still more to do, especially in increasing Pell Grants, but decreasing the cost of student

loans can not be overstated.

"In Massachusetts, the average debt of a student with loans is \$13,994. Higher student debt is directly impacted by the increasing cost of higher education. In Massachusetts, tuition and fees at public colleges have increased by more than 70% in the last ten years. Total costs have risen more than twice as fast as inflation at both public and private institutions. At private schools, total cost rose by 53% and at public schools total cost rose by 65%, while inflation only accounted for a growth of 25%. These increases, coupled with rising interest rates on student loans, make college

too expensive for many students.

"We are short-changing our children by keeping college out of reach, denying them the opportunity to get an education, and increasing their chances of success in the global economy. We must renew our commitment to primary and secondary education and increase accessibility to higher education by making college more affordable. We will take a meaningful step in that direction today."

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Notes from your Librarian

Hello Rumbo readers. I hope you are all staying warm. I suppose things could be worse—at least we have had no snow to speak of—but it sure is cold out. I guess the worst aspect of the winter is that everyone is sick so often. In our building we seem to keep giving each other the same cold. It will probably be late spring before *no one* is coughing and sniffling.

I have been telling you about Terry Farish, our children's room outreach coordinator and her trip to Kenya. Well, she is back and I would really like to share some her reflections on her visit and her work helping to establish a small library in the village of Esabalu. Terry found the lifestyle in Esabalu very different from life here. The village is poor and people work very hard. Most business is on a barter system and the folks have limited access to hard cash. The Kenyan government offers free education for children only to the 7th grade level. It is necessary for parents to pay if they wish their child to continue his/her education. As a result, most children only do seven years.

Reading in Esabalu is considered an activity appropriate to the classroom but, outside of school, it is considered idle and children are expected to fully participate in the maintenance of the family by working. Most families are self-sufficient, growing their own small crops and keeping some livestock. Water must be fetched from wells in buckets toted on people's heads. Transportation is basically walking so, obviously, there is always plenty of work for the whole family.

Given all of this, life might seem pitiful for these folks and extraordinarily limited. Terry could see the other side of the story at the same time however. She saw a community of people who, while not having much, pulled together to assure the basics. Children were well-fed

and the homes were spotless if not elegant. The children grow up with a deep sense of respect for their parents and elders and the whole community respected education. Despite the fact that educational opportunities are limited, teachers, doctors etc. are very much admired in Esabalu.

Terry enjoyed her time in Kenya and learned a lot about the culture. I have found her stories and descriptions fascinating. I think the most interesting element of the story is that two societies can differ as much as ours and theirs in terms of wealth, progress and opportunity but it can still be questionable which is really the better off.

I promise next time I'll have my mind on matters local again but this was all enormously interesting to me and I wanted to share it with my readers. Meanwhile, see you at the library.

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
