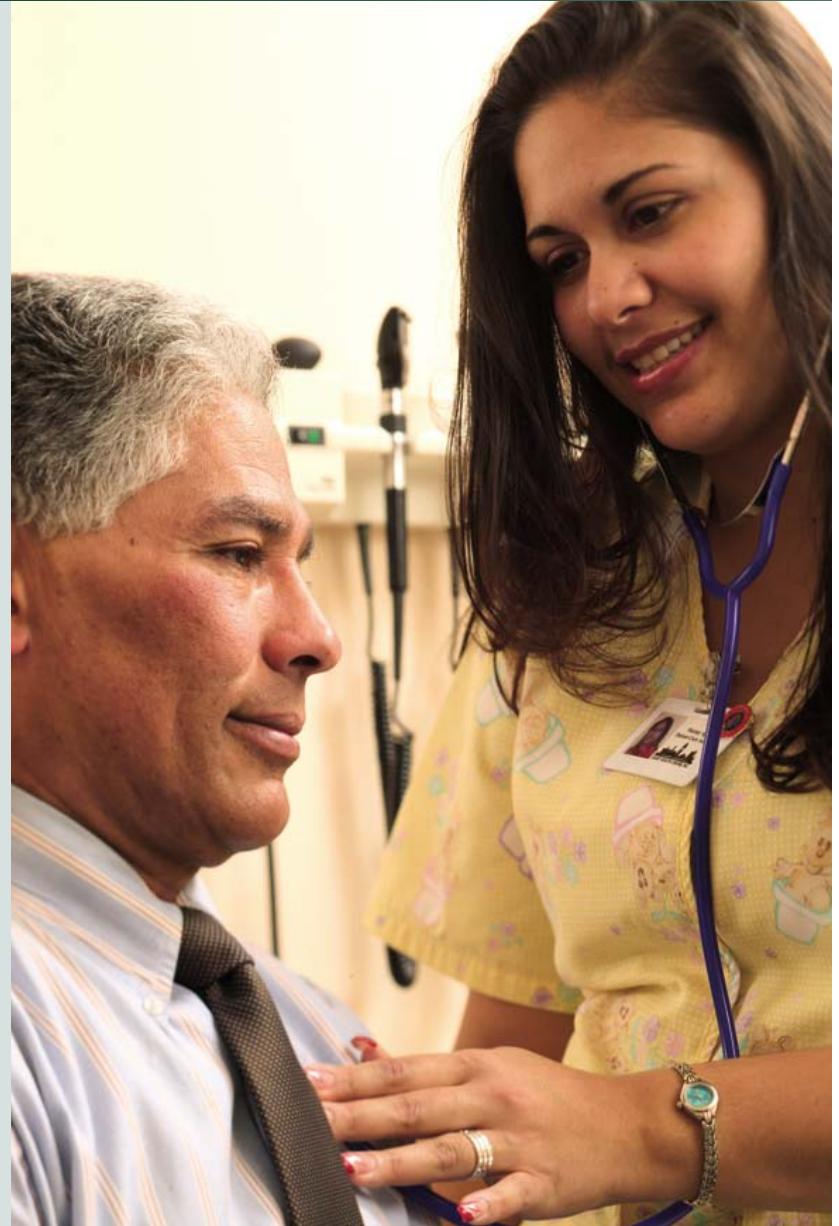

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
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Jacques Pond clean-up

Local neighborhood associations have continued to stress the importance of city departments' need to enforce all existing ordinances regarding trash, debris removal and littering.


Immediate removal of graffiti

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

MONTESINO: LA EDAD DE LA INFORMACIÓN QUE NO LO ES

“Está bromeando?” El otro teléfono solo hace un sonido de clic, la comunicación se muere y la conversación termina.

Me pesa decir que jamás he visto ningún anuncio telefónico de candidato presidencial que suene como el que he acabado de completar, pero me pregunto por qué no. Como todos los ciudadanos de este país me preocupan las guerras y el terrorismo y quiero sentirme seguro de que las operadoras de teléfonos de la Casa Blanca trabajen 24/7 para protegernos, pero mi interés va más allá de ese riesgo. Y no estoy hablando solamente de que me maten a mí o a mi familia sino a las mentes de nuestros hijos también. El riesgo es muy real y también lo es la posibilidad de que usted puede recibir esa llamada que le programé y que le va a noquear el cerebro si ocurre.

Un reporte reciente de America's Promise Alliance, una institución de investigación educacional muy reconocida –el pasado Secretario de Estado Colin Powell y su esposa Alma son directores– encontró que solamente el cincuenta por ciento de los estudiantes servidos por los sistemas escolares principales de las cincuenta ciudades más grandes de la nación se gradúan de escuela secundaria; o sea, más de un millón al año a través del país no lo hacen. La Alianza para la Excelencia en la Educación estima que los estudiantes que dejaron las escuelas en la clase del 2006-2007 le costarán a los Estados Unidos más de 329 mil millones de dólares en salarios perdidos, impuestos y productividad por el resto de sus vidas. Los jóvenes de color son los más afectados, porque casi la mitad de los afro-americanos y los americanos nativos no se graduarán con su clase, mientras menos de seis de cada diez hispanos lo harán.

En la ciudad de Detroit solamente el 20% se gradúa. Eso quiere decir que tienen un ochenta por ciento de colgados. El mismo estudio indica que la incidencia de esos suspendidos se concentra en el centro de las ciudades mientras que los suburbios tienen mejores porcentajes de graduados. En otras palabras, las normas de graduación de escuela superior se han convertido en una línea divisoria social. Yo le pregunté a mis estudiantes de universidad que consideraran la posibilidad de que ellos jamás hubieran terminado la escuela superior, una categoría en la que obviamente no pertenecen. Les hice esta simple pregunta: “Presuman que ustedes dejaron la escuela e imagínense cómo ustedes pasarían sus días. ¿Dormirían? ¿Mirarían televisión? ¿Se unirían a otros estudiantes suspensos? ¿Qué harían ustedes con su tiempo? Y por encima de todo, ¿Cómo luciría su futuro?”

Me miraron incrédulos y sorprendidos; pero mi intención no era forzarles a compararse con otros menos dichosos que habían renunciado muy temprano. Mi objetivo era hacerles realizar y notar que teníamos una parte de nuestra sociedad que obviamente no iba a ser compuesta

de clientes de nuestros negocios muy lucrativos o compañeros de trabajo en una sociedad que depende más cada día de nuestra habilidad de manejar una serie de problemas y reglas muy complejas. En otras palabras, en el mundo en el que yo opero y enseño vivimos envueltos en una información continua que demanda, pero esos estudiantes se estaban convirtiendo en personas menos informadas cada día y quedándose atrás.

Ellos son las oportunidades de éxito perdidas que lenta pero seguramente se caerán a un lado del camino en lo que se trata de seguridad económica e intelectual. Cuando la educación no es el foco y parte central de nuestra visión, otras partes irrelevantes de nuestra periferia que hasta ahora eran de pequeño valor o no atracción para nosotros, se convierten en nuestros objetivos principales y nadie sabe qué son esas partes: el sexo, las drogas, la pereza, la pobreza.

Esos estudiantes crecerán para convertirse en costosos dependientes de una estructura de impuestos donde sus contribuciones serán limitadas e insuficientes y estarán fuera del alcance de los sistemas de salud que podrían ayudarles a vivir vidas más prolongadas y saludables. Y se revolverán en un ambiente político donde las decisiones sobre la calidad de aquellos que votamos para que dirijan nuestros asuntos en un mundo que se hace cada día más pequeño se hace más exigente de nuestros conciudadanos. Para ser más productivos tenemos que saber más y necesitamos escoger mucho mejor todos los aspectos de nuestras vidas, sean nuestras parejas, nuestras amistades, nuestras carreras o los líderes gubernamentales.

Me agradaría oír a los tres candidatos presidenciales responder a esa llamada de teléfono del director de la escuela cuando se produzca. Y también sé que esos candidatos solos no serán capaces de hacer todo lo necesario para resolver el problema. Desafortunadamente no he investigado este asunto en suficiente detalle formalmente y sospecho que los padres de muchos de esos estudiantes que fracasan fracasaron también y sus hijos son víctimas de un proceso trágico de selección natural repetitivo que no pronostica nada bueno para ellos. Ellos socializan y se unen con su misma clase y sus descendientes son producto de la misma categoría. La evolución es el juego; la mutación de tipo intelectual su nombre. Sugiero que comencemos a prestar atención a nuestros teléfonos y miremos a nuestros hijos con más cuidado y demandemos más de aquellos cuyos trabajos son ayudarnos a hacerlo.

de vida aquí y cosas sucediendo. Vuestra generación ha hecho esto posible y hoy las personas miran a los "nursing homes" de distinta manera", dijo.

El jueves, 10 de abril, 2008, patrocinado por Trinity Ambulance, 20 alumnos de la clase de la Hermana Nancy viajaron en dos limosinas desde la Escuela de San Patricio hasta el Colonial Heights Nursing Home. Finalmente, iban a conocer a sus amigos por correspondencia. Para su sorpresa y la de los residentes, allí los estaba esperando Anthony Evans, de Curious Creatures, con una colección de animales salvajes para ellos verlos de cerca y tocarlos.

Entre los animales que trajo Evans

había una joven mofeta (skunk), muy común en el norte de los Estados Unidos de Norteamérica; una chinchilla, nativa de los Andes en América del Sur; dos tortugas africanas; una rana saltarina de América del Sur; un bebé cocodrilo de la Florida; una serpiente pitón dorada del sureste de Asia de 7 años de edad; un lagarto Tegu u Obero también conocida como iguana de la Argentina y una pequeña ardilla voladora de Norteamérica.

On Thursday, April 10, 2008, sponsored by Trinity Ambulance, 20 pupils from Sister Nancy's class rode in two limos from Saint Patrick School to Colonial Heights Nursing Home. Finally, they were going to meet the seniors they have been corresponding with. To their surprise and the residents', Anthony Evans from Curious Creatures was there to entertain them all with an array of wild animals for them to see and touch.

Among the animals brought by Evans was a baby skunk, widely found in the United States; a chinchilla, native of the Andes Mountains of South America; two African turtles; a jumpy frog from South America; a baby Florida alligator; a golden, seven-year-old python from Southeast Asia; a Tegu Lizard or Lagarto Obero also known as iguana, from Argentina and a tiny Northern flying squirrel.

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
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Sen. James P. Jajuga to be honored as Methuen's 2008 Democrat of the Year



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Lawrence Awarded Fourth EPA Brownfields Grant

The City of Lawrence's Community Development Department was been awarded its fourth Brownfields grant by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). On Monday, April 7th, the city received \$150,000 in EPA Brownfields funding for clean-up at the former Covanta site in the Arlington District. The city is currently working on plans to convert the five acre site into a neighborhood park.

"Brownfields funds help Lawrence continue in its commitment to the green movement, by returning idle or abandoned sites to a useable status", remarks Mayor Michael J. Sullivan.

Brownfields are properties for which expansion, redevelopment or reuse may be complicated by the presence of hazardous substances, pollutants or contaminants. Cleaning up and reinvesting in these properties takes development pressures off undeveloped, open land while improving and protecting the environment. It also returns properties to the tax rolls.

Amidst a highly competitive national process, Lawrence has received the largest amount of EPA Brownfields grant awards consecutively, for a total of \$750,000 between 2007-2008. Communities across New England will receive more than a record \$18 million from EPA to help revitalize former industrial and commercial sites, transforming them from abandoned and blighted properties into community assets.

The information age that ain't

I was planning to write my Enron V Part VI with potential solutions to the home mortgage crisis this week when I saw an interesting article covering the sound advice of the President and Executive Director of the Boston Fed in the April 1 issue of Rumbo. He was not talking about how we got here but about how to get from under the weight of the current situation. And I know that it will be more rewarding to you if you follow his advice and go to a bank and tell them that the President and Executive Director of the Fed sent you and not a former banker like me who mostly banks online these days.

I know my advise will be repetitive of what he said or more unnecessarily detailed, so I have decided to forego Part VI and tell you to listen to him while I get into other issues that are as relevant as losing your own home, perhaps even more so. In future articles I will try to dig deeper on other more complicated mortgage crisis points that are taking shape as we speak. But for now, how does losing your children's entire life sound like as a subject?

For the past few weeks we have witnessed a very creative competition

about wakeup calls between all three of the current presidential candidates. It appears that all American crisis loom in the horizon at three o'clock in the morning; insomnia perhaps? In the three versions of the same we have seen it seems that we are all sound asleep and then suddenly the phone sounds to awaken the President to tell him or her that there is a serious crisis that only "that candidate" claims to be able to solve. I hate to use this example, but the twin towers attack took place in the early morning hours of September 11 when the president was reading children's books in a southern school. The ad is really absorbing and powerful and makes us wonder whether our presidents have a full night sleep when they live in the White House. I have, however, come up with another wakeup call ad that might impress and affect you much more. Let's give it a shot.

"It is dark at home. It is three o'clock in the morning and your phone rings. Yes, your phone, not the president's. You are tired and deeply asleep and so is your spouse and your kids. You awaken and shake your head in disbelief: "Who the heck?... at three o'clock in the morning!" You approach the phone with trepidation and pick it up. It is your kid's school principal's voice. "Principal?... What is going on?" The voice on the other side makes a few sounds to clear the throat. "Yes, it is me," the voice says. "I am calling to tell you that your child has dropped out from high school and is officially a failure." "My child?... Are you kidding?" The other phone clicks, goes dead and the conversation ends."

I have to confess that I have never seen any presidential candidate phone ad sounding like the one I just completed but in honesty to you I wonder why not. Like any citizen of this country I am worried about wars and terrorism and want to make sure that the operators in the White House work 24/7 to protect us, but my interest

goes beyond that risk. I am not talking only about killing me or my family but killing our children's minds as well. The risk is very real and so is the possibility that you may get the call I just staged for you and will knock your brains out.

When we were kids there was a scourge called Infantile Paralysis and we also called it Polio. Every public school would at least once a year run a drive to raise funds. Each class had a slotted canister in which coins could be deposited.

Do you remember the little tin red feathers that you could attach to your clothing? They also distributed a small blank book that had slots to cradle whatever dimes you could donate. The little red feathers would signify that you were a donor. This type of fund raiser was so successful that it was used in the theaters and in between the double feature movies the house lights would come on and the canisters would be passed out row by row by the ushers. Yes I'm sure you remember when each theater had an usher.

I can remember a diminutive Larry Halloran in his military-like usher's uniform at the Palace Theater to this day. He would make you think of the small guy that in uniform would shout "Call for Phillip Morris" as he would be hawking that brand of cigarettes. Larry left us at a much too young age.

Once in a while a collection would be taken up for war bonds or war stamps. Frank Sinatra in his prime made a short subject film in which he crooned the song "the house I live in". Boy, remember when he was so young and thin women would swoon to his songs? There were many

Not a lot of youngsters know that the Lawrence High School and Central Catholic rivalry in all sports was initiated by a local political gadfly who used the first game as a fundraiser for Infantile Paralysis. These teams met in a basketball game that was played at the Lawrence Armory with all the proceeds going to this charity. The Armory was situated at the corner of Amesbury and Methuen streets and it was a huge sellout.

Spearheading that drive was a gentleman who easily could've been called "Mr. Lawrence." Later in life he was one of the "doers" that brought Little League baseball to our City. He was the annual Master of Ceremonies at the 4th of July celebration at the Lawrence Veterans Stadium. The City honored him by naming the tennis courts just up the street from his home in his name. He was a State Liquor commissioner in his fulltime job and still found time to aid many fundraising groups.

I am of course talking about James "Nick" Carter. I can't recall anyone else who gave as much to the City. Oh, by the way he could take you to school in a game

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of billiards or pool at either the Golden Cue owned by George Rippe, (formerly the English Social Club) or the Reek Center on Hampshire St. Both places, by the way, are being remodeled as we speak.

Bowling was another sport he excelled in. The apple didn't fall far from the tree as his son Joe was a great LHS athlete and he and fellow teammate the late Johnny Hale were recipients of scholarships to Alabama to play for the immortal Paul "Bear" Bryant. Bryant made a house visit to the houses of both these grid stars.

Joe recently retired from the Lawrence Housing Authority. Nicks grandson Jimi worked at WCCM radio when it was a local entity and now works for a Boston station. He is still a Lawrence resident.

Grondine added that the families of active duty personnel are encouraged to attend. "We want to help veterans start the transition early," she says. "Spouses or parents can come and check out what is available for their family member who is serving."

The college is working in partnership with local veterans' agents, the Veterans Northeast Outreach Center, the state's Division of Veterans Services, the Greater Haverhill Chamber of Commerce, and other organizations.

At the event, college support staff, veteran's agents, and active duty personnel will be available to answer questions. Participants will also learn about federal, state, and military funding sources, how military experience may translate directly into college credits, and about flexible learning options such as online courses.

The college will be highlighting certificate and associate degree programs in areas such as health care, criminal justice, and human services, which can lead to a new career after one to two years of full-time study. Part-time study options for veterans who are working full-time will also be identified.

This event is part of a larger Northern Essex plan designed to attract veterans to the college. The college is collaborating with veterans' services directors from Amesbury, Haverhill, Lawrence, and Haverhill to determine educational needs and make sure that services are available.



lifetimes. Young people of color are most affected, because nearly half of all African-American and Native-American students will not graduate with their class, while less than six in 10 Hispanic students will.

In the city of Detroit alone only 20% graduate. That is a whopping eighty percent dropout rate. The same study indicates that the incidence of those dropouts concentrates in the inner cities while the suburbs perform better. In other words, high school graduation rates have become a new social divide. I posed the possibility of not having finished high school to my current college students, obviously not in that category. I asked them a simple question: "Presume you had dropped out of high school and imagine how you would spend your days. Would you sleep, watch TV, hang around with other dropouts? What would you do with your time? And most of all, how would you be looking at your future?"

They looked at me amazed in disbelief but my intention was not to force them to compare themselves with others who had given up very early. I wanted them to realize that here we had a section or our society who obviously were not going to be their useful business customers or our work associates in a society that depends more and more on our ability to handle an ever increasing complex set of rules. In other words, in the world I operate and teach we live in a demanding information society but these students were becoming uninformed instead and staying behind. They are the lost opportunities to success who slowly but surely will fall by the wayside when it comes to economic and intellectual security. When education is not the focus and central part of our vision, other irrelevant parts in the periphery that up to now were of little value or no attraction to us become our

main goals and no one knows what those parts are: sex, drugs, laziness, poverty.

Those students will grow to become expensive dependents of a tax structure where their contributions will be limited and insufficient; will be beyond the reach of health systems that could help them live longer and healthier lives and will scatter around a political environment where the decisions about the quality of those we vote to direct our affairs in a shrinking world is becoming more demanding from the citizenship. In order to produce more we need to know more and we need to choose better every things whether it is a spouse, a friend, a career or a leader in government.

I would like to hear how the three presidential candidates will respond to that principal's phone call when it is made. And I also know that the candidates alone will never be able to do everything that has to be done to solve this problem. Unfortunately I have not researched this issue formally but I also suspect that the parents of many of those students are high school dropouts themselves and their kids are victims of a tragic repetitive cultural natural selection process that bodes nothing well for them. They socialize with and marry their same kind and beget the same kind of children. Evolution is the game and mutation of the intellectual kind is the name. I suggest we all start listening to our phones and looking at our children with more care and demand the same from those whose jobs it is to help us do so.

"If you are planning for a year, sow rice; if you are planning for a decade, plant trees; if you are planning for a lifetime, educate people." Chinese Proverb.

And that is my point of view today.

out, they seem to be forgotten and go on collecting indefinitely.

That was the case of Officer Keith Stramaglia, the dog officer. Perhaps it was the driving or the barking that caused him to stay home for over a year collecting his pay but he refused to return to those chores. Chief Romero sent him to a Certification Class and put him to work taking 911 calls and that also proved to be too stressful for him after a couple of calls.

But faithful that the Chief is to his friends, he had to find his brother-in-law a job somewhere and I believe that he is about to start, if he's not already working, for the Lawrence Public Schools. Had he stuck it out in the Police Department, he would have made lieutenant by the end of the year!

The Treasurer/Tax Collector's mess

We really need a complete overhaul and a new mayor or a Latino mayor is not the answer. The only one who can fix this mess is an administrator by any title who enforces employment rules and is willing to impose annual reviews in all departments (something unheard of at City Hall) in order to know who is doing what they are getting paid for.

I had no idea that the Assistant Treasurer Ronald Martin spends all day doodling on a piece of paper with nothing to do. If someone comes near, he quickly turns the

paper over. A computer was placed on his desk but he never turns it on because he has no idea of what to do with it. It is there just to make him look good.

His only task was to pick up the mail every morning and he delegates on Robert Runge, someone who was moved from the Tax Department to the Election Department. If he is no longer employed by that department, he should not be the one picking up their mail each morning.

People have told me that Treasurer Patricia Cook treats her employees in a militaristic way ordering them around and that is the reason for moving her to the third floor. For example, when she wants them to do something different, instead of asking them to close the window, she tells them, "Get out of the window!" And when they ask her how to proceed on something, she tells them, "Do what you want," because she has no idea what to do.

Meanwhile, the Tax Department is very busy these days refunding money to taxpayers. Remember that it was one of the recommendations made by DOR? The City of Lawrence had been keeping \$7.5 million in overpayment of real estate taxes dating back to 1994 and excise tax dating back to 1988 and they were ordered to pay it back. They started processing them before many times only to be pulled away from that task because the city never had money for refunds. Now they have to find it! They are so busy that even Ron Martin is going to have to work one of these days.



The work on each approach will consist of reconstruction of the existing pavement, minor vertical alignment improvements, sidewalk reconstruction, drainage improvements, and safety improvements such as proper guardrail transitions to the bridge, pavement markings and safety signing.

A secure right-of-way is necessary for this project. Acquisitions in fee and permanent or temporary easements may be required. The City of Lawrence is responsible for acquiring all needed rights in private or public lands. MassHighway's policy concerning land acquisitions will be discussed at this hearing.

Written views received by MassHighway subsequent to the date of this notice and up to five (5) days prior to the date of the hearing shall be displayed for public inspection and copying at the time and date listed above. Plans will be on display one-half hour before the hearing begins, with an engineer in attendance to answer questions regarding this project. 


