# Medidas severas son necesarias

# Severe measures are necessary

During his inaugural speech, our newly elected Mayor of Lawrence, William Lantigua said that he received a mandate from the citizens of Lawrence to address and fix our economic problems and that he has accepted that responsibility.

He conceded that to fix our problems will require strong fiscal discipline, tough decisions, consolidating departments, and renegotiating contracts and that he was ready to lead in that effort.

The next morning, his first day at work, Lantigua and his team made good on what he meant in his speech by terminating some department heads while consolidating their departments. And more are coming!

Nobody wants to see people losing their jobs, especially in this economy but reality is that the city, has to be run as a business and when business is slow, the CEO (in this case the mayor) has to make extremely hard decisions.

For a long time we have been calling on the former administration that in order to balance the budget, the solution was not in raising taxes but controlling expenditures.

The truth now is that mismanagement went on for so long, that controlling expenses won't solve the problem by itself and we may end up paying higher taxes anyway.

That is what we inherited from our old administration!

# El Gobernador Patrick presenta legislación para ayudar a la Ciudad de Lawrence a recuperar su seguridad fiscal

Para ayudar a la Ciudad de Lawrence a controlar extremos desafíos fiscales, el Gobernador Deval Patrick presentó hoy una legislación que dará a la ciudad nuevas herramientas para ayudar a equilibrar sus libros y fijarse el camino hacia un futuro económico sólido.

La Ciudad de Lawrence se enfrenta a un déficit en el año fiscal actual en el presupuesto operativo de aproximadamente \$9.5 millones y un déficit de proyectos de capital de \$8 millones. Lawrence también se enfrenta a un déficit presupuestario previsto en el año fiscal 2011. La ciudad no será capaz de resolver estos déficits presupuestarios sin la autoridad para pedir préstamos, que los funcionarios no pueden hacer bajo la ley actual. Sin la acción del Estado, la Ciudad de Lawrence será incapaz de seguir financiando las operaciones críticas de la ciudad para esta primavera.

"Esta es una manera responsable de ayudar a la comunidad de Lawrence a volver a ponerse en pie", dijo el Gobernador Patrick. "A través del apoyo y la supervisión estricta, este proyecto de ley puede poner a Lawrence en un curso de estabilidad fiscal a largo plazo y duradera."

"Esta ley provee que al nuevo alcalde y al Concilio de la Ciudad tiempo y herramientas para reparar el presupuesto de Lawrence. Hay mucho trabajo duro por hacer. Este proyecto de ley crea el marco para una asociación fuerte entre la ciudad y el Estado para garantizar la estabilidad financiera de Lawrence en el futuro", dijo la Senadora Susan Tucker.

"Este es un paso hacia adelante para la ciudad en la dirección correcta", dijo el Representante Barry Finegold.

"Le estoy agradecido al Gobernador Patrick por su liderazgo y los esfuerzos para poner a Lawrence en una base financiera segura", dijo el Alcalde-Electo William Lantigua. "Espero seguir trabajando con él y con todos nuestros socios para equilibrar el presupuesto de la Ciudad y fortalecer a nuestra comunidad para hoy y mañana".

La amplia legislación presentada hoy requiere que la Ciudad cumpla con determinadas condiciones para conseguir volver a una senda responsable en el presupuesto y para evitar la necesidad que el Estado implemente una junta de control en Lawrence.

Concretamente, la legislación permite a la Ciudad a pedir prestado dentro de un déficit de hasta \$35 millones para equilibrar su presupuesto FY10 y FY11, lo que permite




I thank the city council and the school committee for their service to the city and I look forward to serving with you to solve Haverhill's problems.

## GREAT PROGRESS IN PAST SIX YEARS

As I stand here today, I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to for 2 more years – and I understand – that this awesome opportunity comes with special responsibilities. I am reminded of the words of President Kennedy: “from those to whom much is given, much is required.” My obligation, and obligation that comes with the responsibility of being Mayor, is to listen to all and to lead. I will try my best.

When I was first handed that responsibility six years ago, the city of Haverhill stood on the brink of financial disaster because of the collapse of the last municipally owned hospital in the State that served an entire region.

Six years ago, I offered you a vision and a plan where factory buildings could be remade into upscale housing and restore areas of the city that had been forgotten for decades and turn them back onto the tax rolls. I called it the Haverhill renaissance.

Today, we have \$100 million in new investment in our downtown, a new

boardwalk, with new jobs and new business, with a parking garage ready to break ground in the spring. We can say with confidence the Haverhill Renaissance is alive and well and we will not allow the recession to kill the Haverhill renaissance.

## OUR GREATEST DAYS LIE AHEAD

But, for all of our progress, our best days lie ahead.

## WHAT I SEE AHEAD—MY VISION FOR A GREATER HAVERHILL

Ahead, I see a great city, with more and better jobs, improved schools and better parks and playgrounds: a great place to live, and a great place to work.

But none of this will happen by itself. Building the future for great city will require hard work and short term sacrifices. Building the future will require us to be bold and innovative and to take chances as we strive to bring new business to our city. The safest way is surely to do nothing, but we do not want to be like the person described by the Ancient Roman Poet Horace: “He who feared he would not succeed sat still.” This term, we will not sit still. We will work hard and we will make jobs for Haverhill a key focus in this term.

## New Tools for Economic Growth

Every day, I am reminded of the need to bring new jobs to our city.

I am reminded when I meet the woman who used to work at Lucent, who now works for minimum wage with no benefits.

I am reminded when I meet the couple who both lost their jobs and lost their house

as a result.

I am reminded every day, when I meet the young person who has to put their future dreams on hold, or the old person who has to decide between rent and medicine: jobs have to be our top priority.

Bringing in jobs is never easy. It is particularly difficult in a recession—it is hard to go up when the escalator is going down. But even in a recession, we need to put the tools in place so that when the recession ends and business is ready to expand again, Haverhill is ready and is first in line to recruit these new businesses.

To be ready, we will need some new tools and new ideas and we will need some new uses of our old tools.

Tomorrow, I will issue an executive order today consolidating several downtown and zoning committees into a new downtown planning committee. I ask them to examine the zoning laws for downtown, to eliminate red tape and regulatory barriers, and establish design standards for downtown so that when business is ready to reinvest in our downtown, Haverhill is ready to make it easy for them.

Later this spring I will ask the city council to join me in establishing an economic development corporation, similar to the ones used successfully in New Bedford and Providence with the powers to raise and lend money as well as other powers to help bring jobs to the city.

I'll establish a new business ambassador program, and ask the CEO's of businesses we brought to the city to join me in telling new businesses that Haverhill is the place to expand.

Downtown, we'll use our Federal grant to improve downtown, and starting this

summer, you'll see a fresh new look and new appearance to your downtown.

We'll work with the MVRTA so that the promise of a new parking garage downtown becomes a reality.

But we recognize that the main ingredient in any downtown isn't government, it is private business. To help them we'll create a new façade improvement program, and use some of our Federal block grant money to lend money to downtown businesses willing to improve the facades of their business.

## LOOKING AT ZONING

Downtown is important symbolically to our city, but the heart of job creation is in our industrial parks. This year, I will propose that we rename our industrial parks as business parks, and examine the zoning laws in these industrial parks to remove red tape and regulatory barriers that might discourage businesses from locating there.

## A FRESH NEW LOOK AT OUR ZONING LAWS

To help keep our city competitive I will establish a zoning task force to take a fresh new look at the zoning laws of this city. We will ask them to take advantage of the new technologies for low impact development, and to develop rules that encourage development that has a minimal impact on our environment and discourage development that takes



away what we love best, the beauty of Haverhill.

### The rail trail

Our plans for a new and better Haverhill start with zoning, but that is only the beginning.

Two years ago, I announced plans to reorient Haverhill towards the Merrimack River.

Today, our new boardwalk behind Washington Street is open, and the boardwalk on Merrimack Street has been rebuilt.

We used a State grant, and purchased portions of an abandoned rail line in Bradford—the first steps towards creating a walkway and series of parks along the river in Bradford.

This spring, we'll take the next step. We'll ask for volunteers, led by the Friends of the Bradford Rail Trail committee, to start clearing the trail so that people can start to walk along it. We'll begin working on a grant application to build a new set of trails and parks along the river. Someday, our children and our grandchildren will be able to walk along our own string of parks and walkways along the river. When they do, they will know we kept our promise to them, to keep the river – our greatest asset-- for everyone, not just for those fortunate enough to own land next to it.

### THE SCHOOLS OF TOMORROW

Building the Haverhill of tomorrow means building first class schools today.

In the past six years, we've made great progress in our schools but there is more to be done. We've improved MCAS scores; our children attend some of the top colleges and universities in the world. Our Classical Academy is the envy of communities throughout the State.

At the high school, our \$32 million renovation project is nearing completion. We should be proud indeed that while other communities spend up to \$200 million on new high schools, our high school will get a complete makeover for far less. We will complete that project this term.

### THE CHALLENGES OF TODAY

The Haverhill of tomorrow, the city I see ahead with jobs and economic opportunity, walkways along the river and top quality schools, will take time, and lots of hard work.

But as we consider the bright promise of our future, we cannot ignore the hard times that exist all around us today.

### GETTING BY THIS YEAR MAKE CUTS AND REINVENT GOVERNMENT

This year, we face enormous challenges. Our unfunded mandates will cause us to spend millions we do not have on projects we do not want to spend them on. Pension costs are rising. The Hale debt is still with us and we remain the one community required to pay for a hospital that served the entire region.

But the greatest immediate challenge is that the global recession has caused revenues to plummet downward at the same time that health care costs are spiking upward.

To meet the challenge of providing good services with less money, we will need to continue to reinvent government, and we will need the continued help of our State and Federal partners.

We'll need to make use of new tools and new technology to make government more efficient.

We'll also use some old tools, and go

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

into your neighborhoods, meet regularly with citizens. We will remember always that the heart of Haverhill isn't here at city hall, and it isn't downtown. The heart of Haverhill is its neighborhoods and its people, and we will be in your neighborhoods to serve you better.

To meet those challenges, we will have to start by reforming our health care system. The sad truth is, we can no longer afford the employee health care system we have. The stark truth is this: If we do not change our municipal health care system, then we will have to make cutbacks in every other area of government to pay for an outmoded health care system.

Cutbacks and health care reforms have to be our first step, but they cannot be our only step. Our challenges this year are so great that we will also have to look for other sources of revenue other than the property tax.

Our citizens demand and deserve good service from their city. If we are going to deliver to our citizens what they need and deserve, we need to use of the tools at our disposal.

## DAWN ON THE HORIZON

In this recession, it is easy to fear tomorrow. When I start to feel that way, I am reminded of the words of President Roosevelt at the start of the depression: "we have nothing to fear but fear itself." No one can say when the recession will end, but we can certainly say that following this long dark night of a recession there will be the new dawn of a recovery.

Today, we see signs of that dawn on the horizon. We see that our unemployment

rate has gone down two months in a row. State tax revenues have begun to go back up. We see a few jobs starting to come back, and we see hope starting to return. No one can say for certain when dawn will come, but we can say for certain that it will.

When dawn finally arrives, and it will, I see a city with jobs and hope for tomorrow. I see a city with cleaner streets, safer streets and better schools. I see a city that is oriented towards the river, a city we are proud to live in, proud to work in and proud to send our children to school in.

We can make that happen if we work together for the common good.

But this is not just about government, this is about you. To make this great new city work and work better, we need your help. We need citizens to work with us, to be on volunteer boards, to help our schools as tutors and mentors, to help our newly revitalized Brightside program. Working together, there is nothing we can't accomplish. Working together, our best days lie ahead.

# Mayor William Lantigua's inaugural speech

January 4, 2010

Hola Familia... Good Evening my friends.

Reverend Clergy, Congresswomen Tsongas, Governor Patrick, District Attorney Blodgett, Senator Tucker, Senator Pichardo, Rep. Torrisi, Rep. Finegold, Rep. L'Italien, Sheriff Cousins, Sheriff Glodis, City Councilors, School Committee members, my friends who have traveled from the Dominican Republic, fellow mayors and distinguished guest.

Today is a day for thanks. Today I thank the people of this great city of Lawrence for allowing me to stand here tonight and take this special oath of office. It's my honor and I will not let you down.

What a great country we live in.

What a great city we live in.

Today is a historical day.

Some people said it could not be done. Three years ago, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts elected the first African American Governor. Not because he is African American, but because he was the best person for the job.

Some people said it could not be done. One year ago, our country, America, elected the first African American president. Not because he is African American, but because he was the best person for the job.

Some people said it could not be done. Last summer, the first Latina was chosen to serve on the United States Supreme Court. Not because she is a Latina, but because she was the best person for the job.

Some people said it could not be done. Two months ago, my friends, the residents of this great City of Lawrence elected the first Latino Mayor in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Not because I am a Latino, but because I earned your trust and confidence and you believe that I am the best person for this job.

I'm honored by this historic moment, but let me be very clear to all of you. I am very happy to be the first, but being the first is only a coincidence. Being the first is only important to those who write about history. To me being the first is insignificant. What will be significant to me is that when my days are over at city hall and the history books are written, they will read that William Lantigua was the best Mayor the city ever had, and by the way... happens to be a Latino.

Tonight I took an oath here on this stage, but remember that this ceremony is far more important than one person. It's larger than an oath of one man. Tonight is an oath of commitment by all of us to the great City of Lawrence.

Today, I am asking all of us to come together as one great city for a common cause and common purpose. Today we must rise above our differences, may they be political or personal, to face the challenges ahead and set our goals for tomorrow. In order to do that, we must all realize where we came from and where we want to go.

There is not a day that goes by that I don't think about how I got to the place I am today.

For that I am forever grateful to America and to the great City of Lawrence and to all of you for allowing a 19-year-old boy to arrive here from the Dominican Republic and be offered the same opportunities as all Americans, have a job, raise a family, run



for office, and to be elected as Mayor of the greatest city in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Today I also want to honor and pay tribute to those who came before us. I want to thank those who worked with us, side by side, along the journey.

I want to thank my mother, Ana Soto and my entire family.

I also want to thank my Office Manager, volunteer and dear friend Annette Webster and Tom Vallante. Also, Teresa Polizotto and I also want to recognize my number one supporter, who also volunteers to help many other city activities ...Jude Charles... will you please stand up... I want a round of applause for Jude Charles.

I know like Jude Charles there are many other people that worked on our team to move the city forward, you worked day in and day out without asking for anything in return, you know who you are and more importantly the people know who you are, Thank you all!

I must also remember those who are no longer with us but helped me along the way. Let us remember Americo "Rick" DiZazzo and our dear friend Elsa Pichardo (La Muñeca). She did a lot to help me.

My friends, I wish I could keep this historic moment tonight and speak of all the great things ahead, but I have to be very clear with all of you. The challenges we face as a city are very real. The problems we face are many and they are very serious. They will not be fixed in a short time. But please know this, they will be fixed!

Our administration will work day in and day out to make sure that this city is put back on track.

Let's face it, our budget deficit is real. The number is \$17.5 million; it is not a laughing matter.

Let's face it; hundreds of homes have been lost in this city to foreclosure.

Let's face it; unemployment rate in Lawrence is the highest in the State of Massachusetts.

Let's face it; our School Department performance has been under question for a long time.

Let's face it; we have seen a spike in crime due to our economy.

Let's face it; our streets and sidewalks are literally a mess.

And let's face... Much more important

to me is the lack of trust, the lack of confidence that the people of this city have in our local government. There is a lack of morale in city hall these days by many of our hard working men and women who are desperate for leadership in these tough times.

Well, Leadership Has Just Arrived!

Ladies and gentlemen on November 3rd, you gave me a mandate to address our problems and tonight I stand before you to accept that responsibility.

Now, I know many of you are concerned about the future, but, please be assured that my duty in the upcoming days is to find out what part of our government is working. The areas that are working, we will continue and support, but the areas that are failing our city will end immediately. Our duty is to restore the public trust in our local government and bring in the sunshine through the doors and windows of city hall.

As of this moment, the expressions of doubt must end – Some say Lawrence is not governable. Some say City Government is not manageable or some say the hell with Lawrence... some say it's not worth it. All of this nonsense must end, let's come together and not talk that way anymore.

Now is the time to remove the doubt and show people that are our problems can and will be solved.

With that said, let me tell you a little bit about our Community working plan.

As you know, I have already taken the proactive step asking for assistance from our state government. It has been made very clear to me that the fiscal problems that I am inheriting and I repeat I'm inheriting after years of mismanagement, are too deep to fix on our own. I have taken the unusual step to ask Governor Patrick to put any and all resources and guidance behind our city.

Governor Patrick, thank you for being part of our recovery team. In the immediate days I will be asking our City Council to work hand in hand with me to allow our city to deficit borrow after my colleagues in state house pass special legislation.

# Governor Patrick Files Legislation to Help the City of Lawrence Regain Its Fiscal Footing

To help the City of Lawrence rebound from extreme fiscal challenges, Governor Deval Patrick today filed legislation that will give the city new tools to help balance its books and set itself on a path to a strong economic future.

The City of Lawrence is facing a current fiscal year operating budget deficit of approximately \$9.5 million and a capital project deficit of \$8 million. Lawrence is also facing a projected budget gap in Fiscal Year 2011. The City will be unable to resolve these budget deficits without the authority to borrow, which officials are unable to do under current law. Without state action, the City of Lawrence will be unable to continue to fund critical city operations as early as this spring.

"This is a responsible way to help the Lawrence community get back on its feet," said Governor Patrick. "Through support and strong oversight, this bill can put Lawrence on a course toward long-term and lasting fiscal stability."

"This bill provides the new Mayor and City Council time and tools to repair Lawrence's budget. There is a lot of hard work that needs to be done. This bill creates the framework for a strong partnership at the City and State level to ensure Lawrence's financial stability for the future," said Senator Susan Tucker.

"This is a step forward in the right direction for the City," said Representative Barry Finegold.

"I appreciate Governor Patrick for his leadership and efforts to put Lawrence on strong financial footing," said Mayor-Elect William Lantigua. "I look forward to continue to working with him and all of our partners to bring the City's budget into balance and to make our community strong for today and tomorrow."

The comprehensive legislation filed today requires the City to meet certain conditions to get back on a path to responsible budgeting and to avoid the need for the state to implement a control board in Lawrence.

Specifically, the legislation allows the City to borrow into deficit up to \$35 million to balance its FY10 and FY11 budgets, allowing it to generate a steady cash flow, and to meet payroll and other commitments. The City would be able to borrow for up to 20 years. The bill

"The YMCA is able to offer this sliding fee scale thanks to the generous donors whose contributions to our 'Reach Out for Youth & Families' annual campaign enable us to realize our mission of being open and accessible to all," he said.

The Merrimack Valley YMCA's facility branches in Andover, Lawrence and Methuen offer state-of-the art wellness centers with cardiovascular and strength training equipment, dozens of group exercise classes (including Zumba, cardio kickboxing, Spinning, Step, Yoga, and more) gymnasiums for organized ball play or individual practice, and monthly family nights and special seasonal and holiday celebrations.

This new pricing structure will not replace the Merrimack Valley YMCA's current financial assistance program, which takes into consideration the members' overall situation, including the number of dependents and monthly income. ## Environmentally Friendly Courses Offered to NECC Students

**N**orthern Essex Community College students have always been friendly, now they will have the opportunity to be eco-friendly.

Beginning with the spring semester, as part of the college's green initiative, students will be offered a series of green courses infused with an eco-friendly theme. At least 15 percent of each course will be “green” focused and students will have the opportunity to either perform environmentally friendly service learning, develop a green project, or present a green presentation.

“These courses are one of the ways in which Northern Essex is addressing the need for a more environmentally sustainable society,” according to NECC professor Paul Chanley. “Federal, state, and local governments, businesses, and non-profit organizations are realizing that such a green approach is not only good for the planet and people, but good for the economy and jobs. It is clear that many professions and careers—including business, engineering,

science, computers and technology—will require knowledge and understanding of environmental sustainability issues, policies, and practices. Such a background may provide a significant advantage for NECC graduates in the job market.”

The six spring courses are being offered by the Business, Math, Science and Technology Division, but it is hoped that faculty in other academic areas will join the effort in future semesters so students can explore issues of environmental sustainability from as many perspectives as possible, Chanley said.

Some of the work in the spring courses will be showcased in a Green Open House sponsored by the Business, Math, Science and Technology Division to be held in April 2010.

The six courses being offered include Introduction to Biology II, Introduction to Business, Integrated Computer Applications, Green Technology, Environmental Issues, and Statistics.

This offering is in keeping with

the current scientific, public, business and government interest in the issue of environmental sustainability. Faculty and staff from throughout the college community have been working for more than a year regarding this issue. As a result, the college is responding in several different ways. On the academic side it has become clear that students need to understand the environmental challenges facing society in general. In addition, NECC wants to help

them think about how these challenges will affect their academic disciplines and potential careers. Northern Essex's aim is to begin to infuse content about environmental sustainability into as many of our courses as is appropriate. This will begin with the six “green” course offerings.

# Mayor orders full inspection of Woolworth Building

**A**fter a piece of the front façade of the former Woolworth building fell to the sidewalk on Monday, Mayor James J. Fiorentini ordered city inspectors to conduct a full and thorough inspection of the building to make certain it is safe.

On Monday, a small piece of the front façade of the Woolworth building, located at 2 Merrimack Street, fell on the sidewalk in front of the building. Police and highway crews were called. The highway crew used a bucket truck to do a cursory inspection of the roof. That cursory inspection showed what appeared to be a portion of the roof deteriorating and potentially being open to intrusion.

Mayor Fiorentini said he received a report about the building early Tuesday morning and went down personally to look at it. Fiorentini said that he then ordered

city inspectors to take steps to gain access to the building and took to conduct a more thorough inspection and investigation.

"This building is in a prime location in our city," explained Mayor Fiorentini. "It is important that the building be safe, not open to intrusion and well-secured so it presents no safety hazard either to the public or to public safety personnel who may be called there in the event of a fire."

"For that reason, I have asked our inspectional services code inspection team to meet with the building owners and to conduct a full and thorough investigation of the structure to make certain it is safe," the Mayor declared.

The Woolworth building has been vacant for approximately 40 to 45 years. It is considered by many to be an eyesore in the Gateway area of the city.

effort. I know by working together to make tough budgetary decisions, consolidating departments, and renegotiating contracts, we can and will be successful.

In the upcoming weeks, I will work side by side with our School Committee members to refocus our effort on educating our children and directing resources to improve our classroom. We must instill integrity and leadership throughout, to ensure that our students are the focal point each and every day, as they deserve no less from us. I will ask our School Leaders to work with City Hall to find creative ways to consolidate and reduce spending in all areas without interrupting classroom learning. We must empower our school principals and teachers to focus on school based learning concepts to improve our children's future.

In the upcoming days, I will ask our Planning and Community Development Departments as well as non-profit organizations to work closely with homeowners in danger of losing their homes. We must keep our homeownership and stop the foreclosure crisis. For that I also thank Governor Patrick for supporting our nonprofits in Lawrence to address this

critical issue.

Soon, I will meet with my Economic Development Team, business leaders and our Workforce Development Agencies, to put a long term plan in place for job training and job creation. We must tap into our workforce to create additional jobs for ALL Lawrencians. I will also work with small business to build a strong and vibrant downtown along Broadway, Union, South Union and Essex Street.

Starting tomorrow I will be working with our DPW department to develop a city repair program to address the needs of our streets and sidewalks. We will work block by block in an effort to make our city safer. We will also be reviewing the new garbage collection procedure, which seems not to be working properly for the whole city. That process needs to be improved.

Tomorrow morning, I will be meeting with our Police Chief John J. Romero to make sure his department has the tools to keep our city safe. I will be presenting some ideas that we feel will improve public safety, and the relationship between the police and our community. I will also be asking for Sensitivity Training for our Public Safety

Officers to attend on a voluntary basis to better serve our community. At first, this training will be voluntary and I know most officers will take part. However, this training will soon be mandatory.

Starting tonight I am committed to working with the Lawrence City Council. I want to be part of your agenda and I want you to be part of mine. We must work together to move this city forward and I pledge tonight open communication with all of you. In return, I ask you to give me a chance to make change. Don't let those who fear change to stop the process before it begins. By working together we can accomplish great things for the people who placed their trust in us.

Despite the tough steps that we must take to remove our budget deficit, be sure that I will take them, we in Lawrence can still plan for great things.

Now, you all know me... I'm your friend... Willy Lantigua and I have to talk straight to all of you tonight. Things are not going to be easy. ## LEGISLATION: Governor Patrick Files Legislation to Help the City of Lawrence Regain Its Fiscal Footing

also increases state oversight of the City's finances by providing for a state-appointed fiscal overseer who will work cooperatively with the new mayor and city council. The overseer will report directly to the Secretary of Administration and Finance and will be paid for by City funds.


The bill requires the overseer to assess the ability of City government to manage the City's fiscal challenges and develop a three year financial plan. If the City is not able to balance its FY11 budget before January 31, 2011, the overseer will report this to the Secretary of Administration and Finance. If the state overseer concludes that the City is unable to achieve a balanced budget and fiscal stability after that time, the Secretary of Administration and Finance may appoint a finance control board with extensive powers.

In addition, the bill requires the City to act to move to GIC or a regional health purchasing group if it will save the City money and requires the consolidation of municipal and school business functions.

Once again I want to remind you that being the first is only a coincidence. Being the first is only important to those who write about history. To me being the first is insignificant. What will be significant to me is that when my days are over at city hall and the history books are written, they will read that William Lantigua was the best Mayor the city ever had, and by the way... he happens to be a Latino.

Thank you for this honor tonight, let's get this party started, but mañana – let's put our plan in place and move our city forward... together!

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

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

Amigos míos, me gustaría poder mantener este momento histórico esta noche y hablar de todas las grandes cosas por delante, pero tengo que ser muy claro con todos ustedes. Los desafíos que enfrentamos como ciudad son muy reales. Los problemas que enfrentamos son muchos y son muy graves. No van a arreglarse en un corto tiempo. Pero sepan esto, se van a arreglar.

Seamos realistas, la tasa de desempleo en Lawrence es la más alta en el Estado de Massachusetts.

Seamos realistas, el rendimiento de nuestro Departamento Escolar ha estado bajo investigación durante algún tiempo.

Seamos realistas, hemos visto un aumento en la delincuencia, debido a nuestra economía.

Seamos realistas, nuestras calles y aceras son, literalmente, un desastre.

Y seamos sinceros... Mucho más importante para mí es la falta de confianza, la falta de confianza que la gente de esta ciudad tiene en nuestro gobierno local. Hay una falta de moral en el Ayuntamiento en estos días por muchos de nuestros hombres y mujeres trabajadores que están desesperados por liderazgo en estos tiempos difíciles.

¡Bueno, el liderazgo acaba de llegar!

Señoras y señores: el 3 de noviembre, ustedes me dieron un mandato para abordar nuestros problemas y esta noche me presento ante ustedes para aceptar esa responsabilidad.

Pronto me reuniré con mi equipo de Desarrollo Económico, líderes de negocios y nuestra fuerza de trabajo de agencias de desarrollo, para poner un plan a largo plazo de capacitación laboral y creación de empleo. Debemos aprovechar nuestra fuerza laboral para crear puestos de trabajo adicionales para TODOS los lawrencianos. A partir de mañana voy a trabajar con nuestro departamento de DPW para desarrollar un programa de reparación de la ciudad para atender las necesidades de nuestras calles y aceras. Vamos a trabajar, bloque por bloque, en un esfuerzo para hacer a nuestra ciudad más segura. También vamos a analizar el nuevo procedimiento

de recogida de basura, que no parece estar funcionando correctamente para toda la ciudad. Ese proceso debe ser mejorado.

Mañana por la mañana me reuniré con nuestro Jefe de Policía John J. Romero para asegurarnos de que su departamento tiene las herramientas para mantener nuestra ciudad segura. Le voy a presentar algunas ideas que creemos que mejorará la seguridad pública, y la relación entre la policía y nuestra comunidad. También voy a pedirle por un entrenamiento de sensibilidad para nuestros oficiales de Seguridad Pública para asistir de forma voluntaria para servir mejor a nuestra comunidad. Al principio, esta capacitación será de carácter voluntario y sé que la mayoría de los oficiales tomarán parte. Sin embargo, este entrenamiento, pronto será obligatorio.

A partir de esta noche me he comprometido a trabajar con el Consejo de la Ciudad de Lawrence. Quiero ser parte de su programa y quiero que su programa sea parte del mío. Debemos trabajar juntos para mover hacia adelante esta ciudad y esta noche me comprometo con ustedes a mantener una comunicación abierta. A cambio, les pido que me den la oportunidad de hacer el cambio. No deje que los que temen el cambio, detengan el proceso antes de que comience. Trabajando juntos podemos lograr grandes cosas para las personas que depositaron su confianza en nosotros.

A pesar de las duras medidas que debemos tomar para eliminar el déficit presupuestario, y pueden estar seguros de que voy a tomarlas, en Lawrence todavía podemos planear para grandes cosas.

Ahora todos me conocen... Yo soy su amigo... Willy Lantigua, y yo tengo que hablarles claro a todos ustedes esta noche. Las cosas no van a ser fáciles. Los tiempos son difíciles en nuestro país, en nuestro estado y en nuestra ciudad. Pero veo mejores días y le pido que se unan a mí esta noche para hacer de nuestra ciudad un mejor lugar. Independientemente de por quién usted votó en noviembre... no importa que calcomanía había en su carro... únase a nosotros en esta búsqueda, ya que nuestro éxito depende de todos ustedes. Ya ven, no importa cuánto el gobierno puede hacer y debe hacer, el éxito final de esta ciudad depende de sus acciones y sus creencias.

Como dijo una vez John F. Kennedy, uno de nuestros más grandes presidentes: "No pregunes qué puede tu país hacer por ti, pero lo que puedes hacer por tu país." Así como tu amigo Willy Lantigua, quiero presentar un desafío para todos y cada uno de ustedes... no importa cuán pequeño o cuán grande es tu acción, favor de hacer algo que ayude a nuestra ciudad. Ese algo puede ser barriendo por delante de tu casa, palear la nieve de la acera, ser respetuosos con sus vecinos en todo momento, o como voluntario en una despensa de alimentos o en su centro comunitario local... Siéntase orgulloso de ser un lawrenciano. Le pido que tome posesión de nuestra ciudad. ¡Lawrence necesita de todos nosotros!

Recuerde, la Ciudad de Lawrence no es de los latinos o los anglos o los negros o los asiáticos o verde o azul, Lawrence es una ciudad formada por todos nosotros. ## LEGISLACIÓN: El Gobernador Patrick presenta legislación para ayudar a la Ciudad de Lawrence a recuperar su seguridad fiscal

generar un flujo de efectivo constante y para cumplir con la nómina y otros compromisos. La ciudad sería capaz de pedir prestado hasta por 20 años. El proyecto de ley también aumenta la supervisión estatal de las finanzas de la ciudad mediante el establecimiento de un supervisor fiscal designado por el Estado que trabajará en cooperación con el nuevo alcalde y el concilio de la ciudad. Dicho supervisor reportará directamente al Secretario de Administración y Finanzas y será pagado por fondos municipales.

El proyecto de ley requiere que el supervisor evalúe la capacidad del gobierno municipal de manejar los desafíos fiscales de la ciudad y desarrollar un plan financiero de tres años. Si la ciudad no es capaz de equilibrar su presupuesto para el año fiscal del 2011 antes del 31 de enero 2011, el supervisor estatal informará de ello a la Secretaría de Administración y Finanzas. Si el supervisor del Estado llega a la conclusión de que la ciudad no es capaz de lograr un presupuesto equilibrado y la estabilidad fiscal después de ese momento, el Secretario de Administración y Finanzas podrá designar un órgano de control de las finanzas con amplios poderes.

Además, el proyecto de ley requiere que la Ciudad adopte el GIC que es un sistema regional de salud o un grupo de compra si eso va a ahorrar dinero a la ciudad y requiere la consolidación de departamentos municipales y escolares.

Una vez más quiero recordarles que ser el primero es sólo una coincidencia. Ser el primero sólo es importante para los que escriben sobre la historia. Para mí, ser el primero es insignificante. ¿Qué va a ser importante para mí? Que cuando mis días hayan terminado en el ayuntamiento y los libros de historia se escriban, se lea que William Lantigua fue el mejor alcalde que la ciudad ha tenido siempre, y por cierto... resultó que era latino.

¡Gracias por este honor esta noche, vamos a esta fiesta que comenzó, pero mañana, vamos a poner en marcha nuestro plan y avanzar a nuestra ciudad adelante... juntos!

## Free Nicotine Patches for Veterans

Massachusetts veterans are now eligible for a FREE quit-smoking offer from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

Massachusetts veterans and their family members and survivors who call the Massachusetts Smokers Helpline at 1-800-Try-To-Stop will receive a free four-week supply of nicotine patches valued at \$100 retail, along with informational resources on the benefits of quitting smoking, and tips on how to stop. Program participants can also receive free telephone support to help them quit.

The nicotine patch giveaway program will run through June 30, 2009.

Massachusetts veterans smoke at a higher rate than the general adult population: 24% as opposed to 18%, when adjusted for age (based on figures from 2005-07). This new quit-smoking offer for veterans is a joint effort of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and the Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Services.


