

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

On November 2, 2015, Jennifer Lopez, on behalf of Citizens for Justice in Lawrence, received from City Clerk William Maloney the necessary documentation to begin collecting signatures for Recall #2.

About half an hour later the same day, Lawrence Police Officer William Green, representing the Foundation for Transparency in Government received the necessary documentation to start collecting signatures for Recall #1. This one was finally approved on Saturday, October 31 by members of the Board of Registrars of Voters after a long battle with Mayor Daniel Rivera's lawyers that began on September 2, 2015.

So far, City Attorney Boddy have been twice in court with lawyers representing Mayor Rivera presenting the same objections to Recall #2, as they did to Recall #1 which took 62 days to be resolved.



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Elecciones en Haverhill Elections in Haverhill



Haverhill is making history politically speaking. Not only they have elected the first Latino as City Councilor but a Mayor for seven consecutive terms and this time, he ran unopposed.

Andres Vargas, the first Latino being elected as city councilor, came in third with 3,830 votes, after John Michitson who came in first with 4,441 votes and Melinda

Barret who made it second with 3,877.

There were 15 candidates running for 9 positions. Joseph Bevilacqua, a familiar name for the Lawrence Community as President/CEO of the Merrimack Valley Chamber of Commerce came in 5th, in the City Councilor race after serving for several years as a member of the School Committee.



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NECC Branch of Eastern Bank Celebrates One Year

Northern Essex Community College students studying in Lawrence frequently hang out in the Common Street branch of Eastern Bank and Bank Manager Rachel Concepcion could not be happier.

On Wednesday, Oct. 21, the bank and the college celebrated the one-year anniversary of the opening of the NECC branch of the bank with a luncheon for college faculty and staff.

In addition to being small and loaded with technology, this branch has more of an educational focus than other bank branches. "We're here to inform students," said Concepcion. "We want to share the financial practices that will help them be successful."

Eastern Bank also hires college students as interns and employees, taking the educational mission even further.

Lindsey Sander of Haverhill, an Eastern Bank service associate and student

in the Northern Essex accounting program, has been working in the bank 20 hours a week since last January, balancing work in her field with three courses a semester. She's planning to graduate in December and transfer to Southern New Hampshire University for a Bachelor's Degree in Accounting.

"I'm in love with accounting. There are so many learning and training opportunities here," says the 2012 graduate of Whittier and former nursing assistant.

Concepcion says the bank hopes to use this partnership as a model for partnerships with other colleges.

"This was the first, and we've found we really like getting students involved," she said.



The Lawrence Family Development Charter School Placement Office is at the core of a successful high school transition program called "Opening Doors." Throughout the year, the Placement Counselor, Carlos Cedeño, establishes the overall schedule of workshops to be delivered in the classrooms of grades 7 and 8 and is responsible for the outreach to area secondary schools as well as those throughout New England. The Placement Office plans and manages the High School Admissions Fair which includes in-school presentations by admissions directors and coordinated visits to many of the schools. In addition, the Placement Counselor meets with every eighth grade student and their parent(s) to discuss best options, sets deadlines for applications and completes hundreds of required forms. Each year, Mr. Carlos Cedeño, LFDCS Placement Counselor, and Ms. Amelia Hernandez-Marinez, LFDCS Alumni Coordinator, work with Principal Dr. Susan Earabino and Head of School, Ms. Stephanie Cole, to increase the number of schools in LFDCS' outreach portfolio and provide new opportunities for students' consideration. These counselors and the LFDCS Upper School team assist eighth graders to submit applications to one or more admissions-based secondary schools and assist parents in filling out their financial aid forms. In addition, teachers are supported with writing recommendation letters and mailing over 200 applications. To assist with the success of LFDCS graduates once they matriculate into high school, full-time Alumni Coordinator, Ms. Hernandez-Marinez, also supports LFDCS Upper School students by providing workshops which helps students, once accepted, make the transition to high school. In addition to helping prepare upcoming graduating classes, she is responsible for meeting with all LFDCS alumni—LFDCS Classes of 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015—and to follow-up on high school grades, monitor community service requirements and help alumni solve personal issues in order for them to focus their efforts on academic excellence.

Founded in 1995, the Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund, Inc.'s Lawrence Family Development Charter School (LFDCS) is one of the first K-8 Commonwealth public charter schools. As a "Level 1" public school for MCAS performance in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015, the work of the Lawrence Family Development Charter School is known for its best practices as a Massachusetts urban school. The school uses research-based practices for academic instruction and intervention, and supplements this instruction with after school and summer school programs.

The Residency Law: The Numbers Speak

On the ballot, during this recent election, a question was posed as to residency requirement for city employment positions. After much controversy, from some of the elected officials and a few from the press, it has been found that the people of Lawrence really do want such rule in place. The numbers speak for themselves. Sixty-three percent (63%), a margin of almost 2-1, expressed favorable for a residency rule.

Only a few elected officials, and some candidates that lost, believe that the residency rule is not an effective rule. However, this rule should not be about whether the elected officials agree or disagree with the residency requirements for city employment. This request, and now a demand on the election ballot and by vote, is because the people of Lawrence want this rule in place. Elected officials should start listening to the people because when you don't listen to the people, the people will send a clear message and find a way for you to listen. I know you hear them, but are you really listening?

Some may argue that the residency rule limits the City's options. That may have been an argument 10 years ago, or even 15 years ago when this debate was also part of the political landscape, but the City is in a much better position. The City has many college graduates seeking employment and there are many really experienced individuals wanting to make this city a

better place for their children. We insist on our children to get an education and return to give back our community only to find there are no jobs available and preference for city jobs is given to outsiders and friends.

I recently read somewhere that an individual stated that demanding that a Police Officer reside in their community is an insult to their work. I, on the other hand, believe that not demanding that a police officer reside in his or her community is an insult to the community in which they sworn to protect. However, as many of us know, this residency is not about police, fire or teachers. The City of Lawrence already has a residency preference rule for police and fire and there is a state law that states that they must live within 10 miles of their city's border. The question becomes whether this ten mile radius law is being enforced. I know many officer and fire protection personnel who live in the state of New Hampshire or so far south that they almost can be categorized as a resident of the state of Connecticut (sarcasm).

This story is about the other 90% of employment positions that are available at any given time. Currently there are 31,515 unemployed individuals in the City of Lawrence. There are over 3,200 city and school employment positions in Lawrence, a little over 2,000 if we eliminate teachers from the totals. Now, I

am not saying that this rule would eliminate the unemployment in Lawrence. It may just be a drop in the bucket. In a city in which the unemployment rate is double to the statewide average, every little bit of opportunity to work and reduce this high rate should be applied.

Right from the start many of our Lawrencians are discriminated. What many elected officials fail to notice is that a Lawrence contact address, on your resume, most of the time gets one eliminated from even being considered for jobs across Massachusetts outside of Lawrence. We are the ones being discriminated. These very same Lawrence elected officials just want their options open to allow their friends, from other communities and higher elected officials, to garner these sought-after positions in our communities.

Let's look at the recent numbers, in detail, to see how the people of Lawrence voted. District D (North Lawrence) had the three highest percentage numbers of the north side of the city for a yes vote on residency requirements (79.46%, 77.05% and 69.90%). District D city councilor vacant position was won by Mr. Jeovanny Rodriguez and is included in Representative Frank Moran state district as well. I hope both these individuals see that this district numbers was well over the 2-1 ratio and the people feel very strongly about it.

District F3 and E4, which are in South Lawrence right along the river closest to the north, had the highest percentages of any South Lawrence district that voted yes for residency with 75.89% and 70.11%, respectively.

All districts, except for one district, voted in favor of residency. District E2 voted against the rule by a slim margin of 4.26%. Actually, all districts farthest south in Lawrence had the lowest votes for residency requirements with F1 = 51.55%, E1 = 50.75% and E2 = 45.75%. These districts tend to be populated by fewer minorities and have a higher median income concentration than many other districts in Lawrence.

Most people in Lawrence just want people to stop keeping them down in poor paying jobs and heavily struggling

positions that don't allow for upward mobility. Of the over 2000 plus positions (teachers not included) only 953 employees are from Lawrence. Not bad; that equals out to 47%. But when you look at the number further, you find that of those 953 most are cafeteria workers, custodians, mechanics, clerical, emergency hires and building based educators (another fancy word for substitute teacher that pays only 22K a year). What elected officials fail to see is that many of the good paying positions (are still low when compared to other communities across the Commonwealth) such as administrators, coordinators, directors, supervisors, managerial positions, nurses, accountants/financial, foremen, firefighters and police go mostly to people who resides outside of Lawrence.

Out of 129 fire personnel, only 49 reside in Lawrence; that's 37%! Residency is almost the same for police officials (124/47) in that only 38% reside in Lawrence, with ten individuals residing in another state! Of the 46 building based educators in the city's public schools only 19 reside in Lawrence (41%).

Of the 140 administrators, managers, supervisor and directors who run this city (whether a department, school, division, etc.) only 31 reside in Lawrence (22%). These numbers indicate that city decisions are being made mostly by people who reside outside of the City. These numbers speak! These leaders are mostly saying you are too dumb to get these jobs. Yes, that's exactly what is being stated, except they use words such as "this will reduce the number of applicants in the pool," "this reduces our chances of finding the right candidate," and "this will hurt our recruitment efforts". They fill in words with "will" instead of "may". These individuals, who are against the residency rule, use these psychological measures to continue making you believe that you are not smart enough to work in the City government positions.

So when you hear Council President Modesto Maldonado or any of the very few councilors advocating for residency, these are the numbers they see and the voices of Lawrence people that he listens to. These numbers speak!

La Ley de Residencia: Los números hablan

En las elecciones, durante esta reciente elección, hubo una pregunta sobre el requisito de residencia para los puestos de trabajo de la ciudad. Después de mucha controversia, de algunos de los funcionarios electos y algunos de la prensa, se ha encontrado que el pueblo de Lawrence realmente quiere tal regla en su lugar. Los números hablan por sí mismos. Sesenta y tres por ciento (63%), un margen de casi 2-1, se expresó favorable hacia una regla de residencia.

Sólo unos pocos funcionarios electos y algunos candidatos que perdieron, creen que la residencia no es una regla eficaz. Sin embargo, esta regla no debe ser acerca de si los funcionarios electos están de acuerdo o no con los requisitos de residencia para el empleo de la ciudad. Esta solicitud, y ahora una demanda en la boleta electoral y por el voto, es porque el pueblo de Lawrence quieren esta regla en su lugar. Los funcionarios electos deben empezar a escuchar a la gente, porque cuando usted no escucha a la gente, la gente va a enviar un mensaje claro y encontrar una manera para que usted escuche. Sé que usted oye, pero ¿está realmente escuchando?

Algunos pueden argumentar que la residencia limita las opciones de la Ciudad. Eso puede haber sido un argumento hace 10 años, o incluso hace 15 años, cuando este debate fue también parte del paisaje político, pero la ciudad está en una posición mucho mejor. La ciudad tiene muchos graduados universitarios que buscan empleo y hay muchas personas con mucha experiencia que quieren hacer de esta ciudad un lugar mejor para sus hijos. Nosotros insistimos a nuestros hijos que se hagan de una educación y regresen a servir en esta comunidad encontrando que no hay empleos disponibles y le dan preferencia para trabajos con la ciudad a gente de afuera y amistades.

Hace poco leí en alguna parte que un individuo declaró que exigir que un oficial de policía resida en su comunidad es un insulto a su trabajo. Yo, por el contrario, creo que no exigir que un oficial de policía resida en su comunidad es un insulto a la comunidad que juraron proteger. Sin embargo, como muchos de nosotros sabemos, esta residencia no se trata de la policía, bomberos o maestros. La Ciudad de Lawrence ya tiene un principio de preferencia de residencia para la policía y los bomberos y hay una ley estatal que establece que deben vivir a 10 millas de la frontera de su ciudad. La pregunta es si esta ley de un radio de diez millas se está aplicando. Sé de gran parte del personal de oficiales y de protección contra incendios

que viven en el estado de New Hampshire o tan al sur que casi se pueden clasificar como un residente del estado de Connecticut (sarcasmo).

Esta historia es sobre el otro 90% de los puestos de trabajo que están disponibles en un momento dado. Actualmente hay 31,515 personas desempleadas en la Ciudad de Lawrence. Hay más de 3,200 puestos de empleo de la ciudad y las escuelas en Lawrence, un poco más de 2,000 si eliminamos a los profesores de los totales. Ahora, no estoy diciendo que esta regla eliminaría el desempleo en Lawrence. Puede que sólo sea una gota en el balde. En una ciudad en la que la tasa de desempleo es el doble que el promedio estatal, cada poquito de oportunidades de trabajo con tal de reducir esta alta tasa debe utilizarse.

Desde el principio muchos de nuestros lawrencianos son discriminados. Lo que muchos funcionarios electos no se dan cuenta es que poner una dirección de Lawrence en su hoja de vida, la mayoría de las veces elimina la oportunidad de siquiera ser considerado para puestos de trabajo en Massachusetts fuera de Lawrence. Somos los que estamos siendo discriminados. Estos mismos funcionarios electos de Lawrence simplemente quieren que sus opciones queden abiertas para permitir que sus amigos, de otras comunidades y funcionarios superiores elegidos, reserven estos codiciados puestos en nuestras comunidades.

Echemos un vistazo a los números recientes con cuidado para ver cómo la gente de Lawrence votó. Distrito D (North Lawrence) tuvo los tres números porcentuales más altos del norte de la ciudad por un voto afirmativo por el requisito de residencia (79.46%, 77.05% y 69.90%). La posición del concejal en el Distrito D estaba vacante y fue ganada por el Sr. Jeovanny Rodríguez y está incluido en el distrito del Representante Estatal Frank Moran también. Espero que estas dos personas vean que estos números de ese distrito fueron muy por encima del promedio de 2-1 y la gente se siente muy firme al respecto.

Los Distritos F3 y E4, que son en el sur de Lawrence a lo largo del río más cercano al norte, tuvieron los porcentajes más altos de cualquier distrito Sur Lawrence que votaron sí por la residencia con 75.89% y 70.11%, respectivamente.

Todos los distritos, a excepción de un distrito, votaron a favor de la residencia. El Distrito E2 votó en contra de la regla por un estrecho margen de 4.26%. En realidad, todos los distritos más al sur en Lawrence tuvieron los votos más bajos para el requisito de residencia con F1 =

51.55%, E1 = 50.75% = y E2 = 45.75%. Estos distritos tienden a ser poblados por un menor número de minorías y tienen una concentración de ingreso medio más alto que muchos otros distritos en Lawrence.

La mayoría de los residentes en Lawrence sólo quieren que la gente deje de mantenerlos en empleos pobres luchando fuertemente en posiciones que no permiten la movilidad hacia la mejora. De los más de 2,000 puestos (profesores no incluidos) sólo 953 empleados son de Lawrence. No está mal; eso equivale a 47%. Pero cuando nos fijamos en el número con más cuidado, usted encuentra que los 953 son trabajadores de la cafetería, conserjes, mecánicos, oficinistas, contrataciones de emergencia y lo que llaman "building based educators" (otra palabra elegante para decir maestros sustitutos que paga sólo \$22,000 al año). Lo que los funcionarios electos no ven es que muchas de las buenas posiciones que pagan (siguen siendo salarios bajos en comparación con otras comunidades de todo el estado) como administradores, coordinadores, directores, supervisores, gerentes, enfermeras, contables/financieros, capataces, bomberos y la policía van sobre todo a las personas que residen fuera de Lawrence.

De los 129 bomberos, ¡sólo 49 residen en Lawrence; eso es 37%! La residencia es casi igual para los oficiales de policía (124/47) en el que sólo el 38% reside en Lawrence, con diez personas que residen en

otro estado! De los 46 educadores llamados "building based educators" en las escuelas públicas de la ciudad sólo 19 residen en Lawrence (41%).

De los 140 administradores, gerentes, supervisores y directores que dirigen esta ciudad (ya sea un departamento, escuela, división, etc.) sólo 31 viven en Lawrence (22%). Estos números indican que las decisiones de la ciudad se están haciendo en su mayoría por personas que residen fuera de la ciudad. ¡Estos números hablan! Estos líderes en su mayoría dicen que usted es demasiado tonto para conseguir estos puestos de trabajo. Sí, eso es exactamente lo que están diciendo, excepto que utilizan palabras como "esto reducirá el número de solicitantes", "esto reduce nuestras posibilidades de encontrar al candidato adecuado," y "esto va a afectar nuestros esfuerzos de reclutamiento". Utilizan palabras que no dejan probabilidad de equivocación. Estos individuos, que están en contra de la Ley de Residencia, utilizan estas medidas psicológicas para seguir haciéndole creer que usted no es lo suficientemente inteligente para trabajar en las posiciones del gobierno de la Ciudad.

Así que cuando escuche al Presidente del Concejo Modesto Maldonado o cualquiera de los muy pocos concejales que abogan por la residencia, estos son los números que ellos ven y las voces de la gente Lawrence que escuchan. ¡Estos números hablan!

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La lucha contra la Nicotina: La adicción 'persistente'

Especialista en Adicciones Intenta diferentes enfoques para ayudar a los pacientes a poner fin al hábito del tabaco

El experto en salud mental y especialista en adicciones Dr. Gregory L. Jantz ve pacientes que luchan contra todo tipo de adicciones en el Centro de Consejería y Salud, cerca de Seattle.

Pero incluso después de que la gente conquistar algunos de sus problemas más debilitantes - alcohol, el juego, las drogas - un hábito persistente tiende a perdurar.

"Cuando las personas tienen múltiples adicciones, tabaquismo suele ser el último en irse", dice Jantz. "Es como si estuvieran diciendo: 'No me lo quite todo.' En general, dada la oportunidad, las personas quieren dejar de fumar. Pero no creen que pueden o no saben cómo".

Cerca de 46 millones de estadounidenses fuman, pero la mayoría desean que no lo hicieran, según los Centros para el Control de Enfermedades. Una encuesta del 2010 mostró que el 70 por ciento de los fumadores en los EE.UU. le gustaría dejar de fumar, y en el 2012 más del 40 por ciento intentó activamente dejar de fumar.

Los Institutos Nacionales de Salud apuntan a numerosas razones para acabar con el hábito. Los fumadores que dejan de fumar reducen su riesgo de contraer varios tipos de cáncer, incluyendo el cáncer de pulmón, y también reducir sus posibilidades de padecer enfermedades del corazón, derrame cerebral, enfisema y otras enfermedades graves.

Averiguar una estrategia para dejar de fumar implica el reconocimiento de las

profundidades de la adicción al tabaco, dice Jantz. Algunos puntos para entender incluyen:

- Fumar satisface las necesidades emocionales, así como las necesidades físicas.** "Llena una enorme necesidad de bienestar", dice. "Así que los fumadores tienen que preguntarse, '¿Cómo puedo llevar consuelo a mi vida sin fumar?'"

- Fumar es relacional.** Los fumadores se reúnen con otras personas a fumar, lo cual alimenta el hábito. "Una vez que te conviertes en un ex fumador, ya no formas parte de ese grupo", dice Jantz. "Y eso no es divertido. Pero si los fumadores pueden empezar a ver la posibilidad de sí mismos como más saludables, personas vibrantes, entonces son más inclinados a hacer el esfuerzo".

- Dejar de fumar de repente no funciona para la mayoría de la gente.** Incluso todas esas advertencias sanitarias en los paquetes de cigarrillos y las imágenes de los medios de comunicación que retratan los resultados devastadores del cigarrillo no tienen el impacto que usted pueda imaginar, dice Jantz. "Esto es tan adictivo y tan poderoso que la gente puede ver estas fotos y seguir haciéndolo", dice Jantz. "Esa es una adicción poderosa." La Sociedad Americana del Cáncer informa que sólo alrededor de 4 a 7 por ciento de los fumadores son capaces de detenerlo por su cuenta sin necesidad de utilizar productos

para dejar de fumar, sin embargo, casi todos estos productos usan terapia de reducción de la nicotina (NRT), que requiere que los fumadores dejen de fumar de golpe. La mayoría de los fumadores que han intentado con productos NRT no logran dejar de fumar aún después de varias veces. Hay un nuevo producto que Jantz comenzó recientemente a utilizar con algunos de sus pacientes llamados NicoBloc (www.nicoblocusa.com), un enfoque más innovador para ayudar a los fumadores a dejar el hábito gradualmente, así que ir de golpe no es necesario. NicoBloc ha demostrado ser un éxito notable (más del 60 por ciento de las tasas de abandono) en programas para dejar de fumar en Europa.

"Obviamente, las personas pueden y deben parar", dice Jantz. "A veces sólo necesitan el método correcto y el enfoque que puede liberarlos de los aspectos físicos y emocionales de su adicción. Estamos

enfocados en el tratamiento de la adicción a la nicotina, eliminando el uso de la nicotina en el tratamiento, sobre todo porque la nicotina sigue siendo la droga más adictiva conocida por el hombre".

Tackling Nicotine: The 'Lingering' Addiction

Addiction Specialist Tries Different Approaches To Help Patients End The Stubborn Tobacco Habit

Mental health expert and addiction specialist Dr. Gregory L. Jantz sees patients battling all types of addictions at his Center for Counseling and Health near Seattle.

But even after people conquer some of their most debilitating problems – alcohol, gambling, drugs – a persistent habit tends to linger.

"When people have multiple addictions, smoking is usually the last to go," says Jantz. "It's as if they are saying, 'Don't take everything from me.' Generally, given the opportunity, people do want to quit smoking. But they don't believe they can or don't know how."

About 46 million Americans smoke, but most wish they didn't, according to the Centers for Disease Control. A 2010 survey showed that 70 percent of smokers in the U.S. would like to quit, and in 2012 more than 40 percent actively tried to stop.

The National Institutes of Health points to numerous reasons to end the habit. Smokers who quit lower their risk of getting various cancers, including lung cancer, and also reduce their chances of suffering from heart disease, stroke, emphysema, and other serious diseases.

Figuring out a strategy for quitting involves recognizing the depths of the smoking addiction, Jantz says. A few points to understand include:

- Smoking meets emotional needs as well as physical needs.** "It meets a huge need for comfort," he says. "So smokers need to ask themselves, 'How do I bring comfort into my life without smoking?'"
- Smoking is relational.** Smokers get together with other people to smoke, which fuels the habit. "Once you become an ex-smoker, you are no longer part of that group," Jantz says. "And that's not fun. But if smokers can begin to see the possibility of themselves as healthier, vibrant persons, then they are more inclined to make the effort."
- Going cold turkey doesn't work for most people.** Even all those health

warnings on cigarette packages and images in the media portraying the devastating results of smoking don't have the impact you might imagine, Jantz says. "This is so addictive and so powerful that people can see these pictures and continue to do it," Jantz says. "That's a powerful addiction."

The American Cancer Society reports that only about 4 to 7 percent of smokers are able to stop on their own without using smoke-cessation products, yet almost all of these products use nicotine reduction therapy (NRT), which require smokers to quit cold turkey. Most smokers who have tried NRT products fail to quit multiple times. There is one new product Jantz recently began using with some of his patients called NicoBloc (www.nicoblocusa.com), a more innovative approach helping smokers to quit the habit gradually, so going cold turkey isn't necessary. NicoBloc has proven to be remarkably successful (over 60 percent quit rates) in stop smoking programs in Europe.

"Obviously, people can and do stop," Jantz says. "Sometimes they just need the right method and approach that can free them from both the physical and emotional aspects of their addiction. We are focused on treating nicotine addiction by eliminating the use of nicotine in treatment, primarily because nicotine remains the most addictive drug known to man."

We need more involvement in our schools

On Election Day, I was eager to exercise my right to vote. As a Hispanic woman, I’m thankful to those who have stood up for my right to vote and proud to be a part of the political decision making process. When I received my ballot, I was deeply disappointed to see that there was no one running for District D School Committee. I left the polls in disbelief and wondering why this was happening in our community. As it turns out, there were no candidates running for school committee in four out of six of Lawrence’s districts. So why is this happening? It’s because the state has relinquished control from the school committee and given it to the state receiver, Jeffery Riley.

This year is the 50th anniversary of The Voting Rights Act and although the rights enacted by this law are still in effect, minorities continue to face barriers to their votes. Rather than facing barriers to the ballot box, we now are faced with local elected officials being stripped of their power in school committees of Hispanic and African American schools and districts throughout the country. These state takeovers are taking our rights away as parents and community members to make decisions that will have an impact on the education and future of our children. Instead of taking away the power from our school committee, the parents from our community need to feel EMPOWERED to make a difference in their children’s lives.

A study conducted in the early 1990’s by Betty Hart and Todd Risley found that there is a 30 MILLION word gap between children from low income and high income households by the time a child is 3 years old. Many of our children come from low socioeconomic status households and are at an educational disadvantage before they even step foot in Lawrence Public Schools. This word gap is a major reason why our students are struggling with their literacy skills in school. We need the support of state elected officials to provide the resources that parents need in order to help our students be successful in school rather than appoint a state receiver to dictate changes in school policies and fire the teachers who are working so hard to bridge the word gap. There has been too much time committed to test prep and testing rather than training parents on how to reinforce teacher’s lessons at home.

We need more parents and teachers involved in our school committee so that we can reach out to other parents who need help to carry over educational objectives at home. Our students need their parents, teachers, community members, and the school committee to work together so that we can provide the best education for our children both at school and at home. Our students need the Massachusetts Board of Education to give our community back the power to make these changes.

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

Andover singer-songwriter Casey McQuillen opened her recent anti-bullying program at the Boys & Girls Club of Lawrence with her audition tape from "American Idol," during which she received unanimous praise last year from judges Jennifer Lopez, Keith Urban, and Harry Connick Jr. for her rendition of Demi Lovato's "Skyscraper."

Although that moment remains a career highlight, she told the audience of nearly 300 students that she gained something far more meaningful than celebrity through the experience.

"At the time, I thought the opinions of those three people were more important than what I believed about myself, more important than my 10 years of hard work," McQuillen told the fifth and sixth graders from Guilmette Elementary School in Lawrence. Guilmette is one of six Lawrence Public Schools that participate in a school-day enrichment program at the Boys & Girls Club of Lawrence.

"I was afraid of failing, and I was afraid of disappointing people, but I was hardest on myself," she added. "You cannot worry about what others think."

McQuillen shared other messages of self-respect, confidence, and the importance of compassion for others by describing the stories behind original songs which she performed while playing guitar. For example, she wrote "Enough" to express

her heartbreak over the bullying endured by a friend whose appearance became altered during a health crisis. In "Beautiful," she details her own suffering at the hands of bullies in middle school, which she said took years to overcome.

The performance was one of two which McQuillen is donating to the Boys & Girls Club of Lawrence. A recent graduate of Berklee College of Music, she has been performing her "You Matter" tour at area schools for two years.

"If there's one thing that the kids learn from my experiences," she said, "it's that no one's opinion of you should matter more than your own."


Despiden ex Militar Héroe de La Revolución de Abril

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Con la presencia de su viuda y algunos familiares de ella, así como de otros ex-militares que también forman parte de la legión de combatientes en la Guerra de Revolución de Abril del 1965 en República Dominicana, se le ofreció el último adiós, al Alférez de Fragata de la Marina de Guerra, Alfredo Rosario Acosta, durante un velatorio que se efectuó el jueves 29 de octubre en la Funeraria Farrah de la calle Lawrence, luego que falleciera el pasado domingo 25 de octubre a las 5 a.m.

Rosario Acosta, perteneciente al equipo élite de los "Hombres Rana", creados y dirigidos por el entonces Coronel Ramón Montes Arache, que intervino con su tropa en la Revolución defendiendo la constitucionalidad al lado de los combatientes del Pueblo, en contra

de las fuerzas invasoras del Ejército de los Estados Unidos, salvó su vida en plena guerra al lanzarse del Puente Juan Pablo Duarte hacia el Río Ozama para evitar morir en una emboscada de las fuerzas interventoras, azaña que ha sido destacada por varios historiadores dominicanos en sus relatos sobre la Revolución de abril.

El ex-militar residía en Estados Unidos desde el 1966 cuando salió exiliado por persecución política en su país y sus restos permanecerán sepultados en Cementerio Municipal de Lawrence, aunque le sobre vive un solo hijo con el mismo nombre, Alfredo Rosario, en la funeraria solo estaba como parte de la familia, la viuda, Sra. Gladys Polanco, que llevaba más 40 años unida al Ex Militar dominicano.

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


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Architecture in New England at SNHU's McIninch Art Gallery



The McIninch Art Gallery at Southern New Hampshire University presents Architecture in New England, curated by Colin Root, from Nov. 19 through Dec. 19, 2015. There will be an opening reception on Thursday, Nov. 19 from 5-7 p.m. The exhibition is free and open to the public.

Ranging from the colonial era to the present, this exhibit reflects the ever-changing styles of architecture in New England. Including prints, photographs, paintings and drawings, "Architecture in New England" seeks to immerse visitors in the types of buildings that surround them every day.

Perhaps more than any other region in the United States, the architecture of New England represents a true spectrum of building styles. Because it is home to some of the oldest structures in colonial America as well as modern, urban skyscrapers, New England offers a unique microcosm of architecture typologies that can be found throughout the United States. The exhibit "Architecture in New England" provides a look at that breadth. Using different media such as prints, photographs, oil paintings, blueprint drawings and physical objects, "Architecture in New England" walks the line between informational and experimental. When thinking about how

to assemble and categorize these works, it was decided that chronology does not correspond with one's experience of architecture in this region. Rather, different eras and styles intermingle and complement one another. Nearly all of the artists depicting the architectural landscape focus on a sense of merger and seamlessness between the buildings. Even though we are often dealing with a series of dissimilar (yet adjacent) structures, artists are responding to the way in which those structures blend into one another.

Artists include: Ben Aronson (Alpha Gallery), Reed Kay (Alpha Gallery), Richard Raiselis (Gallery Naga), Peter Vanderwarker (Gallery Naga); as well as a selection of historic prints, drawing sand photographs from the Boston Public Library and Historic New England.

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


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
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Help for Elders

- With companionship, someone they can just talk with.




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
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
