Tiempo de compartir

El Día de Acción de Gracias saca lo mejor de la gente; esperemos que miren las fotos en las páginas 2 y 7 le ayude a entender la extrema necesidad existente en el área conocida como El Cibao en la República Dominicana. Las inundaciones que han estado sufriendo durante muchas semanas no tienen precedentes y no parecen detenerse.

Cuatro personas han muerto incluyendo dos niños. Ahora tienen que prepararse para las enfermedades y el hambre y la recuperación tomará años. El ganado y los animales de granja han muerto, así como toda la producción agrícola. El Cibao es la zona más fértil del país y ha sido destruida.

También se destruyeron 17 puentes y hay más de 40,000 personas que buscan cualquier tipo de refugio.

Hay una colección de alimentos no perecederos y todo tipo de artículos para el hogar, pañales desechables, etc. que tiene lugar en 530 Broadway en Lawrence.

En esta semana de buena voluntad, hágalo por su propia satisfacción sabiendo que hay alguien que le necesita.

Inexistencia policial

Estoy feliz de informar la conclusión de algo que escribí la semana pasada. Después de un mes y medio, el Departamento de Policía de Lawrence llamó al hombre cuyo coche fue robado y guardado en almacén desde el 4 de octubre. El propietario terminó pagando \$300 por remolque y almacenamiento aunque no está claro si eso cubre todo el tiempo que lo mantuvieron. Me dijeron que estaba satisfecho con poner fin a ese calvario.

Además, llamaron a la señora que fue tres veces a tomarse sus huellas dactilares y le dijeron que no había nadie que hablara español en la estación para traducirle y ella tenía que traer su propio intérprete. De repente, una noche de la semana pasada, se le pidió que viniera y quedó hecho.

Parqueo de invierno

La semana pasada publicamos las reglas de Estacionamiento de Invierno en

la Ciudad de Lawrence y aparecerán de nuevo el próximo mes. Usted puede ir a nuestro sitio web www.rumbonews.com y comprobarlo en cualquier momento.

Ahórrese un gran dolor de cabeza (y gastos) evitando el costo de remolque en la mitad de la noche y los gastos de almacenamiento mirando en esa lista, dónde permiten el estacionamiento desde el 15 de diciembre al 15 de abril. Algunas calles tienen un sistema de pares o nones dependiendo del día del mes. Otros prohíben estacionarse durante el día o la noche en esos meses de invierno.

Si usted tiene amigos o parientes que vienen a visitar durante la noche, asegúrese de que conocen las reglas o se arrepentirán de haber venido a verlo.

Ciudades Santuario

Parece haber cierta confusión en los medios de comunicación e incluso el Alcalde Rivera se refiere a Lawrence como una ciudad santuario con la aprobación del Trust Act. Esta ley que fue aprobada por el Concejo Municipal el año pasado da la seguridad al público que los oficiales de policía no pedirán estatus migratorio por violaciones de tránsito u otros crímenes. Si son arrestados, los tribunales y el sistema legal manejarán ese aspecto.

Le escribí al jefe de policía James Fitzpatrick y ésta fue su respuesta: "Yo apoyo cualquier cosa que fomente un sentido de confianza en la seguridad pública. El Departamento de Policía de Lawrence no está aquí para hacer cumplir las leyes de inmigración, estamos aquí para servir y proteger a la gente en Lawrence. Todos ellos. Si alguien es una víctima de un crimen, no queremos que piensen dos veces antes de interactuar con nosotros. Creo que el uso de la frase "ciudad santuario" es un nombre equivocado que confunde el asunto."

Las ciudades santuarios se niegan a ayudar a ICE durante investigaciones, arrestos o incursiones, y ese no es el caso aquí.

El Massachusetts Health Connector lanza campaña de inscripciones abiertas para alcanzar a los residentes latinos del estado

El Massachusetts Health Connector lanzó su nueva campaña en Springfield para promover el período de inscripciones abiertas diseñada para alcanzar a las poblaciones del estado que todavía no tienen seguro médico.

"La data muestra que la población latina en Massachusetts – particularmente en el oeste de del estado – es menos propensa de tener un seguro de salud que el resto del estado", dijo Louis Gutiérrez, director ejecutivo del Massachusetts Health Connector.

"Mucha gente desconoce que pueden recibir un seguro de salud gratis o a bajo costo. Conseguir un plan de seguro médico es asequible mediante el Health Connector y disponible para todos durante el período de inscripciones abiertas desde el 1 de noviembre hasta el 31 de enero. Estamos utilizando medios étnicos y una campaña de alcance para comunicarnos con los residentes de estas comunidades en varios idiomas", dijo Gutiérrez.

"Hay personas que se enteran que tienen cáncer o tienen un accidente grave y no tienen un seguro médico, por lo que cuando vienen a nosotros están muy nerviosos y desesperados porque realmente

lo necesitan", dijo María Semprit, una asistente del Caring Health Center que ayuda a los pacientes en español a obtener un seguro de salud. "Es por eso que le exhortamos a las personas sin seguro médico a no dejarlo para última hora".

A partir de esta semana, los mensajes promocionales del Massachusetts Health Connector se transmitirán en ocho idiomas a través de 55 medios televisivos, radiales e impresos. Los mensajes serán transmitidos hasta el final de las inscripciones abiertas el 31 de enero de 2017.

La campaña también cuenta con un amplio esfuerzo directo de alcance comunitario. Los organizadores cuentan con diversa capacidad lingüística y estarán trabajando en cientos de lugares y eventos a lo largo de Massachusetts, proporcionando información a los residentes que necesiten asistencia.

La campaña se desarrolló basada en lo aprendido en unos grupos focales llevados a cabo anteriormente en el este y oeste de Massachusetts, y hace énfasis en alcanzar a los residentes latinos más jóvenes, que representan una gran parte de la población no asegurada.

El Taller abre nuevo restaurante en Lawrence Campus

¿Dónde se puede disfrutar de comida mexicana y dominicana influenciada por un chef entrenado por Le Cordon Bleu? En la nueva barra de comida "El Taller @ NECC" en el atrio del Edificio Dimitry en el campus de Lawrence.

La barra de comida, que tuvo una "apertura silenciosa" esta semana, es operada por Eric Guerrero que es realeza de la industria de restaurantes siendo la segunda generación en Lawrence. Hace más de 20 años sus padres Antonio y María Guerrero abrieron Café Azteca en la calle Common en Lawrence, que sirve comida casera mexicana tradicional. Guerrero, de 27 años, creció bajo la tutela de sus padres y hace cuatro años abrió el ahora popular "El Taller", que combina buena comida, comunidad y libros. La librería y cafetería también acoge regularmente poesía y lecturas de libros y exposiciones mensuales de arte.

"El Taller @ NECC" es una extensión de la cafetería de mentalidad comunitaria en Essex Street. El menú modificado es ideal para un presupuesto estudiantil. Porciones más pequeñas y asequibles de los artículos favoritos del menú como pan con queso y mollete, los cuales están hechos con pan de la propia panadería de Trípoli de Lawrence, y sopa de fideo.

Abierto de 7:30 a.m. a través del almuerzo, El Taller @ NECC está abierto al público.

Junto a Guerrero, Tayisha Diaz, de 20 años de edad, nacida en Lawrence, viviendo

ahora en Bradford, estudiante del Colegio de Artes Culinarias Le Cordon Bleu de Boston realizando su práctica de tres meses con El Taller @ NECC y Nate Báez, escritora e innovadora de la comunidad.

Guerrero, creó un menú con alternativas saludables en mente como los dos batidos que ellos diseñaron llamados "The Greenery" y "The Berry Blast".

"El ambiente y la cultura que hemos creado en El Taller es lo que quiero traer a este espacio", dijo Guerrero a medida que música en español tocaba en segundo plano. "Estos estudiantes se merecen lo mejor. Estamos hablando con ellos para saber lo que quieren. Queremos que sea un espacio comunitario. Queremos ofrecer comida saludable para que estén comprometidos y enfocados en clase y no débiles".

Además de ofrecer alimentos populares, espera tener una pequeña galería que contará con obras de artistas locales, posiblemente estudiantes de NECC; una pantalla grande para proyectar las conversaciones de TED; y talleres comunitarios.

"Esta es una gran colaboración entre NECC y El Taller y la familia Guerrero", dijo Martha Leavitt, directora de operaciones y adquisiciones del campus de NECC.

El Taller Opens New Eatery on Lawrence Campus

Where can you enjoy contemporary Mexican and Dominican influenced food prepared by a Cordon Bleu trained chef? At the new "El Taller @ NECC" food bar in the atrium of the Dimitry Building on the Lawrence campus.

The food bar, which had a "soft opening" this week, is operated by Eric Guerrero who is second generation restaurant royalty in Lawrence. More than 20 years ago his parents Antonio and Mary Guerrero opened Café Azteca on Common Street in Lawrence, which serves traditional, homemade Mexican food. The 27-year-old Guerrero, is a "restaurant kid" who under the tutelage of his parents, four years ago opened the now wildly popular "El Taller", which combines good food, community, and books. The café bookstore also regularly hosts poetry and book readings and monthly art exhibits.

"El Taller @ NECC" is an extension of the community-minded Essex Street café. The modified menu is ideal for a student budget. Smaller, affordable portions of favorite menu items like pan con queso and mollete, both of which are made with bread from Lawrence's own Tripoli's bakery, and sopa de fideo.

Open from 7:30 a.m. through lunch, El Taller@NECC is open to the public.

Alongside Guerrero is 20 year-old Lawrence native Tayisha Diaz now of Bradford, a student at Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts in Boston, who is fulfilling her three-month externship with El Taller@NECC and Nate Baez, a self-employed local writer and community innovator.

Guerrero, created a menu with healthy alternatives in mind like the two smoothies they designed called "The Greenery" and "The Berry Blast".

"The vibe and culture we've created



at El Taller is what I want to bring to this space," Guerrero said, as Spanish music played in the background. "These students deserve the best. We are talking to them to learn what they want. We want it to be a community space. We want to offer healthy food so they are engaged and focused in class and not sluggish."

In addition to offering popular food items, he hopes to have a small gallery that will feature works of local artists – possibly NECC students; a full size screen to project TED talks; and community workshops.

"This is a great collaboration between NECC and El Taller and the Guerrero family," said Martha Leavitt, director of NECC's campus operations and procurement.



November: Lung Cancer Awareness Month

To the Editor:

I am writing to ask a favor of your readers that could help save millions of lives.

November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month. Despite being the #1 cancer killer of men and women in the United States, awareness about lung cancer remains critically low, meaning people don't bring it up with their doctors, understand screening procedures or recognize potential symptoms. The suspect was arrested, and police found the cash stolen from the bank on his person. He now faces numerous charges including Armed Robbery and Motor Vehicle Theft.

Alexis Fishbone, director de ayuda financiera, se apresuró a señalar lo fácil que puede ser el proceso de solicitud de asistencia estudiantil. Si bien muchas personas podrían pensar que es un asunto de pesadilla, dijo, algunos estudiantes pueden terminar la solicitud en tan sólo 9 minutos - y para aquellos que pueden luchar o tomar un poco más, la oficina de ayuda financiera está más que feliz de personalmente ayudarlos a llenarlo.

"Normalmente cuando la gente escucha acerca de ayuda financiera, su corazón se salta un poco o su presión arterial sube", dijo Fishbone, provocando muchas risas de la audiencia, "pero nuestro trabajo en la oficina de la FA es hacerlo lo más fácil posible. Local Employers Interested in Professional Development Opportunities for Their Employees

Employers and human resource professionals from around the Merrimack Valley attended Northern Essex Community College's Human Resources and Employer Information Session, which took place at the Haverhill Campus's Hartleb Technology Center on Nov. 15.

Burns said that Northern Essex serves exactly the kind of potential students working for the employers in attendance: action-oriented, busy adults juggling both a work and home life.

Since these adult learners often don't

have room for a full-time education in their schedules, she said, the school has many offerings to expedite their process through secondary education. For example, some students qualify for "credit for prior learning", while others might benefit from accelerated coursework or competency-based education programs.

And for those employees who might have military service on their resume, Northern Essex has a number of credit and support options — something she proudly associated with the school getting a prestigious "Best for Vets: Colleges" designation for the second year in a row.

Alexis Fishbone, director of financial aid, was quick to point out just how easy the application process for student assistance really can be. While many people might think of it as a nightmarish affair, she said, some students can finish the application in as little as 9 minutes — and for those who might struggle or take a little longer, the financial aid office is more than happy to personally assist them in filling it out.

"Typically when people hear about financial aid, their heart skips a beat or their blood pressure goes up," said Fishbone, eliciting many chuckles from the audience, "but our job in the FA office is to make it as easy as possible, whether you're an 18-year-old student or an adult learner returning to the classroom after a long time away. Financial aid should not be the reason somebody doesn't go back to school."

Lawrence Partnership convenes hundreds of regional stakeholders for third annual event

The Lawrence Partnership held its third annual event in the historic Wood Mill on Thursday, convening a packed house of nearly 400 local and regional business and community leaders to continue the conversation about the economic renewal in the City of Lawrence.

The speaking program, featuring community and business leaders and keynoted by Lieutenant Governor Karyn Polito, offered an update on the collaborative programming that the Lawrence Partnership has spearheaded over the last year and insight into work that will be a priority for the group in the coming year. “The recognition that we can accomplish so much more for our community by working together is what drives this group of CEO’s, elected officials, and community leaders to engage in this truly collaborative work,” shared Derek Mitchell, the Executive Director of the Lawrence Partnership. “And the commitment to prioritize an economic development strategy that lifts all boats is what makes this a process that so many can benefit from and throw their support behind.”

Sal Lupoli, the President and CEO of Lupoli Companies and Vice-Chair of the Lawrence Partnership Board took advantage of the full room to announce the launch of the Revolving Test Kitchen, a new project that he had a large hand in bringing to life. Located on the first floor of 420 Common Street, Lawrence, the Revolving Test Kitchen will be an incubator for local entrepreneurs who want to open a restaurant but aren’t quite ready to do that on their own. Through the program, a food-based entrepreneur will receive free rent in a fully built-out cafe, access to flexible financing and a host of technical support.

Lupoli, who started his successful career as the founder of Sal’s Pizza has offered both personal mentorship to the first entrepreneur of the Revolving Test Kitchen, Ray Gonzales of Coco Ray’s, as well as donating over \$300,000 worth of equipment to get the program, which has a grand opening on December 1, off the ground. “The Revolving Test Kitchen will be a unique opportunity to provide food-based entrepreneurs in the city the opportunity to take their ideas, work ethic and innovative spirit to the next level,” said Lupoli.

Support for small businesses received additional attention with the announcement of the creation of the ‘Small Business Connectors’ a coalition of service providers convened by the Lawrence Partnership committed to serving small businesses in Lawrence and the expansion of the Lawrence Venture Loan Fund to \$2.5 million from its \$1 Million pilot project last year.

Mayor Daniel Rivera endorsed the program, indicating that, “the businesses that are growing through support from this loan fund are the cornerstone of our economy, as they are creating jobs and

opportunities right here in Lawrence. It is an incredible resource for the city.”

The ability to support regional businesses while also creating upward mobility for local residents was a resonant theme of the day, marking perhaps the most ambitious of the projects that the Lawrence Partnership promoted at the event. “The Training Consortium aims to align the robust and committed training and educational resources in the city with the dynamic hiring needs of our community’s largest employers”, indicated Lane Glenn, the President of Northern Essex Community College and Chair of the Lawrence Partnership Board. “The unique pipelines in healthcare and manufacturing we are piloting here in Lawrence represent the future of how our workforce system should work. We are proud to be initiating this work here and are eager for the impacts it generates for our residents and businesses alike.”

Lieutenant Governor Polito expressed similar commitment to the work that is happening through the Lawrence Partnership and pledged statewide support to seeing the initiatives that come from the group’s activity get to scale. “We are so proud of the work that is happening here through this incredible Partnership,” claimed Lt. Governor Polito. “In just a short amount of time so much by bringing leaders together with public/private partnerships that are vital tools in reinvigorating economic opportunities in gateway cities and beyond.”

The Lawrence Partnership continues to promote itself as a work in progress, a group that is committed to creating a culture of collaboration while also being a catalyst for transformative projects and programming. Capacitación de gerentes intermedios en NECC para empleadores locales

Cuando los líderes de negocios locales hablaron con frustración de la falta de empleados calificados y entrenados, Northern Essex Community College no sólo escuchó, sino que encontró una respuesta: una Beca de Capacitación de Acceso Directo de Massachusetts de \$120,750 para crear un programa de capacitación de supervisor.

El programa se lanzará en febrero de 2017 bajo la dirección del Centro de Educación Corporativa y Comunitaria de NECC. El centro solicitó del Fondo de Formación de la Fuerza Laboral después de una encuesta de las necesidades del empleador que fue llevada a cabo por el Consorcio de Entrenamiento de Lawrence Partnership el verano pasado. Los resultados revelaron una enorme necesidad de un programa de capacitación de supervisores/administradores para el personal existente.

"Esta subvención abordará la 'brecha de habilidades' que existe aquí y en todo el estado y el país", dijo George Moriarty, director ejecutivo de NECC para el desarrollo de la fuerza laboral. "Los empresarios locales y pequeños quieren ascender desde adentro de su empresa, y ahora con esta subvención, los

empleadores podrán enviar a empleados seleccionados para recibir capacitación en estas importantes habilidades".

La encuesta fue enviada a 1000 empleadores de Merrimack Valley con 50 ó más empleados. Un total de 94 empleadores respondieron a la encuesta con muchos líderes de la compañía expresando su preocupación por la pérdida de productividad y competitividad debido a la falta de habilidades de supervisión y gestión entre sus trabajadores actuales.

El liderazgo identificado como el desafío número uno fue las habilidades blandas (comunicación, trabajando en equipo, resolviendo problemas, resolución de conflictos, etc.) mientras que la gerencia intermedia también mostró ser un área de necesidad, según la encuesta. Como un líder de una compañía escribió: "No podemos hacer crecer nuestro negocio sin un gran personal".

El programa de capacitación de 10 cursos en 30 horas sin acreditación se ofrecerá gratis a los empleados de las empresas locales que califiquen. Las empresas pagarán a sus empleados para asistir a la clase. Las clases comenzarán en febrero y se llevarán a cabo en la ubicación Riverwalk de NECC en Lawrence, 360

Merrimack St. Habrá 15 estudiantes por ciclo. Cada ciclo durará aproximadamente 10 semanas. El programa estará disponible durante seis ciclos por los próximos dos años.

Cada uno de los cursos del programa de capacitación se centrará en los 10 elementos comunes al trabajo de un gerente, incluyendo habilidades efectivas de supervisión, comprensión de estilos de comportamiento, gestión de cuestiones de personal, capacitación y evaluaciones, liderando un equipo, creando un clima para la motivación, utilizando la tecnología. El fomento de las relaciones públicas, el desarrollo de habilidades administrativas y el manejo de un presupuesto.

"Nuestra administración está trabajando duro para encontrar maneras innovadoras de ayudar a los trabajadores a recibir la capacitación que necesitan para avanzar sus habilidades", dijo el gobernador

Charlie Baker. "Estas subvenciones son una fantástica manera de dar a los trabajadores nuevas habilidades, mientras que satisfacen las necesidades de formación a menor escala de las empresas de Massachusetts".

"La capacitación continua y el desarrollo de habilidades es vital para el continuo éxito económico de nuestro estado", dijo la Vice Gobernadora Karyn Polito. "Estas subvenciones ayudarán a las empresas y los trabajadores a ser más prósperos y competitivos, mejorando la economía global del estado.

Grant Funds Middle Management Training at NECC for Local Employers

When local business leaders spoke with frustration of the lack of qualified, managerial-trained employees, Northern Essex Community College not only listened, but found an answer - a \$120,750 Massachusetts Direct Access Training Grant to create a supervisor/management training program.

The program will launch in February 2017 under the direction of NECC's Center for Corporate & Community Education. The center applied for the Workforce Training Fund after an employer-needs survey was conducted by The Training Consortium of The Lawrence Partnership this past summer. The results revealed a desperate need for a supervisor/management training program for existing staff.

"This grant will address the 'skills gap' that exists here and throughout the Commonwealth and the country," said George Moriarty, NECC's executive director of workforce development. "Local, small employers want to promote from within their company, and now with this grant, employers will be able to send selected employees to be trained in these important skills."

The survey was sent to 1000 Merrimack Valley employers with 50 or more employees. A total of 94 employers responded to the survey with many company leaders expressing concerns over lost productivity and competitiveness because of the lack of supervisory and management skills among their current workers.

Leadership was identified as the number one soft skills challenge (communication, teamwork, problem solving, conflict resolution, etc.) while middle management was also shown to be an area of need, according to the survey.

As one company leader wrote, "We cannot grow our business without great staffing."

The 10-course, 30-hour noncredit training program will be offered free to the employees of local companies who qualify. The companies will pay their employees to attend class. Classes will begin in February and be held at NECC's Riverwalk location in Lawrence, 360 Merrimack St. There will be 15 students per cycle. Each cycle will last approximately 10 weeks. The program will be available for six cycles over the next two years.

Each of the courses in the training program will focus on the 10 elements common to the job of a manager including effective supervisory skills, understanding behavior styles, managing personnel issues, training and evaluations, leading a team, creating a climate for motivation, using technology, fostering public relations, developing administrative skills, and budgeting.

"Our administration is working hard to find innovative ways to help workers receive the training they need to advance their skills," Governor Charlie Baker said. "These grants are a fantastic way to give workers new skills, while meeting the smaller-scale training needs of Massachusetts businesses."

"Continued training and skill development is vital to our state's continued economic success," said Lieutenant Governor Karyn Polito. "These grants will help businesses and workers become more prosperous and competitive, improving the Commonwealth's overall economy."

Reembolsos del IRS retrasados hasta el 15 de febrero para personas en Massachusetts que reclaman ciertos créditos

El Servicio de Impuestos Internos (IRS) recordó hoy a los contribuyentes de Massachusetts que reclaman el Crédito Tributario por Ingreso del Trabajo (EITC) o el Crédito Tributario por Hijo Adicional (ACTC) que planifiquen para un retraso en su reembolso hasta el 15 de febrero.

Un cambio reciente a la ley federal dirigida a facilitarle al IRS la detección y prevención del fraude de reembolso, requiere que el IRS retenga el reembolso de cualquier declaración de impuestos que reclame el EITC o ACTC hasta el 15 de febrero. Bajo la ley, el IRS debe retener la totalidad del reembolso, no sólo la porción relacionada a estos créditos.

"Quiero recordarle a las personas que a medida que nos acercamos a la temporada navideña algunos reembolsos se retrasarán el próximo año, por lo tanto deben tomar las medidas necesarias," dijo Matt Leas, portavoz del IRS. "Para evitar más retrasos, es importante que los contribuyentes presenten como normalmente lo harían y no esperen hasta más tarde en la temporada de impuestos."

Hasta junio de 2016, 398 mil individuos y familias que trabajan en Massachusetts recibieron \$838 millones solo en EITC, poniendo un promedio de \$2,107 en los bolsillos de individuos y familias trabajadoras con bajos ingresos. Del mismo modo, 231 mil los individuos y familias trabajadoras del estado recibieron un total de \$ 274.62 millones en ACTC, para un promedio de \$1,189 por individuos y familias.

Para evitar más retrasos en sus reembolsos, el IRS pide a los contribuyentes de Massachusetts que

presenten sus declaraciones como lo hacen normalmente, y no esperen a presentar más tarde en la temporada. Ya sea que reclamen o no el EITC o el ACTC, el IRS advierte a los contribuyentes que no esperen recibir un reembolso en una fecha específica, especialmente para hacer compras importantes o pagar otras obligaciones financieras. El IRS emite más de nueve de 10 reembolsos en menos de 21 días, sin embargo, algunos reembolso se retienen para revisiones más extensas.

Debido a que se retendrá la totalidad del reembolso y no sólo la porción del crédito hasta el 15 de febrero, el IRS exhorta a los contribuyentes a presentar una declaración completa y precisa la primera vez, lo que podría resultar en un reembolso más rápido. Las declaraciones enmendadas toman hasta 16 semanas en procesarse.

El IRS también exhorta a los contribuyentes a considerar una verificación de su retención de impuestos. Al ajustar el Formulario W-4, Certificado de retención del empleado (en inglés), los contribuyentes aseguran que la cantidad que se les saca de sus cheques es la correcta para que no tengan que pagar impuestos demás o esperar hasta presentar su declaración para recibir un reembolso. Los contribuyentes deben presentarle el formulario revisado a los empleadores, y los empleadores utilizarán el formulario para calcular el monto del impuesto federal que se retendrá del pago. Para ayuda, use la Calculadora de Retención en IRS.gov

El IRS tiene una página especial en IRS.gov con los pasos a tomar ahora para la temporada de impuestos de 2017.

Una ceremonia de dedicación formal, para invitados y medios de comunicación, será programada para principios del 2017.

Ahora ubicado en 201 Maple Street, Chelsea, MA 02150, el número de teléfono principal ha sido cambiado a: (857) 386-2000. La División continuará sirviendo a Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire y Rhode Island, además de supervisar diez oficinas satelitales en esos estados.

La nueva instalación de 268,000 pies cuadrados está situada en 5.1 acres de terreno y tiene ocho pisos de altura. El moderno sistema técnico de las instalaciones de aplicación de la ley fue diseñado para lograr una Certificación de Liderazgo en Energía y Diseño Ambiental (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design - LEED), y está siendo arrendado por el FBI por la Administración de Servicios Generales (GSA por sus siglas en

inglés) por un período de 20 años.

"Esta nueva instalación dará a nuestros empleados y socios de aplicación de la ley una mejor seguridad, tecnologías mejoradas y proporcionará más espacio para nuestras fuerzas de trabajo cada vez mayores", dijo Harold H. Shaw, Agente Especial a cargo de la División de Boston del FBI. "Esperamos seguir adelante con las relaciones que hemos establecido aquí en Chelsea, manteniendo las asociaciones críticas que hemos desarrollado a lo largo de los años en Boston. Esperamos que nuestra presencia en el vecindario tenga un impacto positivo".

The FBI Boston Division has officially transitioned its operations, moving its headquarters to a brand-new facility in Chelsea, Massachusetts, effective November 7, 2016.

Now located at 201 Maple Street, Chelsea, MA 02150, the main telephone number has been changed to: (857) 386-2000. The Division will continue to serve Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Rhode Island, as well as oversee ten satellite offices across those states.

The new 268,000 square foot facility is situated on 5.1 acres of land and is eight stories high. The state-of-the-art law enforcement facility was designed to achieve a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver Certification, and it is being leased for the FBI by the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) for a period of 20 years.

"This new facility will give our employees and law enforcement partners better security, upgraded technologies, and provide more room for our growing task forces," said Harold H. Shaw, Special Agent in Charge of the FBI's Boston Division. "We look forward to continuing to build upon the relationships we've established here in Chelsea while maintaining the critical partnerships we've developed over the years in Boston. We hope our presence in the neighborhood will have a positive impact."

This marks the first time the FBI Boston Division will be located in a stand-alone building. The Division spent 23 years at its previous location, One Center Plaza, Boston, MA 02108.

The new facility was developed and is owned by Emerald Corporate Center, LLC. GSA leases the property on behalf of the federal government. Construction began in October 2014.

The flooding they have been suffering for many weeks are unprecedented and it doesn't seem to stop.

Four people have died including two children. Now they must brace for diseases and hunger and it will take years for the recovery. Cattle and farm animals have died as well as all the agricultural production. El Cibao is the most fertile area in the country and it has all been destroyed.

Also destroyed were 17 bridges and there are over 40,000 people looking for any type of refuge.

There is a collection of non-perishable foods and all kinds of household goods, disposable diapers, etc. taking place at 530 Broadway in Lawrence.

In this week of goodwill, do it for your own satisfaction knowing that there is someone who needs you.

Police unresponsiveness

I am happy to report the conclusion of something I wrote last week. After a month and one half, the Lawrence Police Department called the man whose car was stolen and kept in storage since October 4th. The owner ended up paying \$300 for towing and storage which is not clear if that covered all of the time they kept it. He was satisfied with putting an end to that ordeal.

Also, they called the lady who went three times to get her fingerprints taken and was told that there was no one who spoke Spanish at the station to translate for her and she had to bring her own interpreter. Out of the blue, one evening last week, she was asked to go down and it was done.

Winter parking

Last week we published the Winter Parking rules in the City of Lawrence and they will appear again next month. You may go to our website www.rumbonews.com and check it out at any time.

Save yourself a big headache (and expense) by avoiding the cost of towing in the middle of the night and storage fees by looking up on that list where parking is allowed from December 15 to April 15. Some streets have an odd/even system while others forbid parking during the day or night in those winter months.

If you have friends or relative coming to visit overnight, make sure they know the rules or they'll be sorry to have come to see you.

Sanctuary cities

There seems to be some confusion in the media and even Mayor Rivera refers to Lawrence as being a sanctuary city with the passing of the Trust Act. The Trust Act approved by the City Council last year gives the assurance to the public that police officers will not ask for immigration status for traffic violations or other crimes. If arrested, the courts and the legal system will handle that aspect.

I wrote to Police Chief James Fitzpatrick and this was his response:

"I support anything that will foster a sense of trust in public safety. The Lawrence Police Department is not here to enforce immigration laws, we are here to serve and protect the people in Lawrence. All of them. If someone is a victim of crime we do not want them to think twice before interacting with us. I think that the use of the phrase 'Sanctuary City' is a misnomer that confuses the issue."

Sanctuary cities refuse to assist ICE during investigations, arrests or raids and that is not the case here.

Durante un evento comunitario, Sovanna conoció a Lianna, su futura esposa. Lianna había vivido en Lowell durante 7 años, mudándose acá originalmente para obtener su maestría en UMass Lowell.

Sovanna se reubicó un número de veces, viviendo en todas partes de Lowell. Eso es algo que no quería que su familia pasara. Cuando Lianna y Sovanna se comprometieron, decidieron iniciar el proceso de compra de vivienda inscribiéndose en el programa de capacitación ofrecido por Merrimack Valley Housing Partnership. "Para tener una familia fuerte, uno debe tener una base sólida con un hogar", dijo Sovanna.

Después de tomar las clases, la pareja se sentía como si tuvieran una mejor comprensión de cómo presupuestar correctamente a fin de eliminar la deuda y construir un historial de crédito fuerte. No esperaban estar listos para comprar una casa por lo menos en un par de años. Se reunieron con Ed Alcantara, consejero de MVHP para compradores de vivienda. Ed les aconsejó que prestaran atención a sus sugerencias para que estuvieran listos para la hipoteca dentro de seis meses.

Lianna comentó que, "Sin el asesoramiento, usted podría tomar el conocimiento de la clase, pero

probablemente no sería capaz de comprar una casa tan rápido. Tener a alguien allí para nosotros fue crítico".

Para cumplir con su objetivo de casarse y comprar su primera casa, los dos sabían los muchos desafíos que tendrían que superar. Se centraron en su presupuesto familiar, mantuvieron el gasto al mínimo y trabajaron para mejorar sus calificaciones crediticias. Comentaron que las clases eran esclarecedoras en la comprensión del proceso. Al oír a varios expertos en las clases, se dieron cuenta de que "No sabes lo que no sabes".

"Este programa es muy valioso. A mucha gente le gusta saltar en algo grande y drástico sin saber los pasos necesarios para hacer todo correctamente. El programa te prepara para dar ese gran paso en la compra de una casa", dijo Sovanna.

Después de seis meses de presupuesto, ahorro y caza de casas, la pareja encontró su hogar ideal en su ubicación ideal. Poco después de su boda, compraron su primera casa juntos.

"Tener una casa todavía se siente extraño, pero al mismo tiempo, cuando salgo de casa para ir a trabajar, miro hacia atrás y me digo a mí mismo 'Wow, esta es mi casa'", dijo Lianna.

Sovanna y Lianna son dos factores clave para la calidad de vida positiva en Lowell. Estamos encantados con ellos.

Sovanna was born in a refugee camp in Thailand. At an early age, he came to the United States to be reunited with his family. He has been an actively engaged Lowellian ever since.

During a community event, Sovanna met Lianna, his future wife. Lianna had lived in Lowell for 7 years, originally moving here to obtain her master's degree at UMass Lowell.

Sovanna relocated a number of times, living in all parts of Lowell. That is something he did not want his family to go through. When Lianna and Sovanna became engaged, they decided to start the home buying process by enrolling in the training program offered by the Merrimack Valley Housing Partnership. "To have a strong family, one must have a strong foundation with a home" said Sovanna.

After taking the classes, the couple felt like they had a better understanding of how to properly budget in order to eliminate debt and build a strong credit history. They did not expect to be ready to buy a house for at least a couple of years. They met with Ed Alcantara, MVHP's home buyer counselor. Ed advised them to heed his suggestions so that they would be mortgage ready within six months.

Lianna commented that, "Without the counseling, you could take the knowledge from the class, but you probably wouldn't be able to purchase a home as fast. Having

someone be there for us was critical."

To meet their goal of getting married and buying their first home, the two knew the many challenges they would have to overcome. They focused on their household budget, kept spending to a minimum, and worked to improve their credit scores. They commented that the classes were enlightening in understanding the process. Hearing several experts in the classes made them realize that "You don't know what you don't know."

"This program is very valuable. A lot of people like to jump into something big and drastic without knowing the steps needed to do everything properly. The program prepares you for taking that big step in buying a home" said Sovanna.

After six months of budgeting, saving, and house hunting, the couple found their ideal home in their ideal location. Shortly after their wedding, they purchased their first home together.

"Owning a home still feels weird, but amazing at the same time. When I leave home to go to work, I look back and say to myself 'Wow, this is my home'" said Lianna.

Sovanna and Lianna are both key contributors to the positive quality of life in Lowell. We are thrilled for them.



Puede ser un reto intentar mantener la objetividad cuando la decisión impactara a alguien que te importa. Es algo por lo que arriesgarías tu propia vida pero como aceptar la responsabilidad por la vida de alguien más?

Te ayudaría mucho mantenerte organizada y enfocada durante la fase de recopilación de información antes de tomar una decisión. Puede haber una gran posibilidad que no hayas hecho suficientes preguntas durante la cita con el especialista cardiaco después de haber recibido la desafortunada noticia. Realiza algunas búsquedas médicas por tu cuenta en la biblioteca o a través del internet acerca de la condición de tu esposo.

¿Comprendes completamente todos los factores de riesgos que existen? ¿Cuáles son las chances de sobrevivir sin la cirugía o lo opuesto al hacer la cirugía? Busca acerca de resultados predecibles. ¿Cuál es el tiempo esperado para la recuperación y si hay restricciones que deben ser seguidas luego? Se espera una recuperación completa o habrá limitaciones en el futuro? Anote todas las preguntas que usted aun pueda tener y pregúntelas al cirujano antes de tomar una decisión.

Obten una segunda opinión en cualquier momento que no estés claras del mejor tratamiento o te sientas intranquila. Requerir la asesoría de otro doctor independiente no es una indicación de que el doctor al que fueron referidos no está calificado o que sus recomendaciones no son garantizadas. Buscar una segunda opinión es una costumbre justa y puede liberar su ansiedad.

Algunas personas encuentran que orientación espiritual o hablar con miembros confiables de la familia ayuda a reducir el estrés en el que se encuentran. Ten fe de que tomarás la mejor decisión para ambos tú y su esposo.

Question:

My 88 year old husband's health has been slowly deteriorating over the last few years. After a recent check-up with his primary physician we were referred to a cardiac specialist. After numerous tests we were informed he needs surgery that has considerable risk due to his age and overall health. Neither of us were prepared for this news and we are overwhelmed with trying to decide what to do. My husband thinks because I have a health care background I should be the one to say yes or no. How do I proceed with this situation?

Answer:

Making the decision about whether to proceed with a risky surgery can take a lot of soul searching. The situation is further compounded when you are helping another person come to a determination. It can be a challenge to attempt to maintain objectivity when the decision is going to impact someone you care about. It is one thing to take a "gamble" with your own life but how do you accept the responsibility for someone else's?

It will be helpful to stay organized and focused during a fact gathering phase before making a decision. There is a strong possibility you might not have asked enough questions during your appointment with the cardiac specialist after receiving

the unfortunate news. Conduct some medical research on your own in the library or through the internet regarding your husband's condition.

Do you completely understand all the risk factors which exist? What are the chances of survival without the surgery as opposed to moving forward with the operation? Find out about predictable outcomes. What is the expected recuperation time and what if any restrictions will need to be followed? Is a complete recovery expected or will there be functional limitations in the future? Jot down all questions which you may still have and follow up with the surgeon before making a final decision.

Get a second opinion whenever you are unclear about the best course of treatment or have uneasy feelings. Requesting the advice of another independent physician is not an indication the surgeon you were referred to is not qualified or his recommendations were not warranted. Seeking out a second opinion is a fairly standard practice and could go a long way to relieve your anxiety.

Some people find seeking spiritual guidance and talking with trusted family members helps to reduce the stress they are under. Have faith that you will make the best decision for both yourself and your husband.

Rodriguez was sworn in on November 19, 2016 at the Governor's Office in Boston. Edward Palleschi, director of boards and commissions, administered the oath of office. He was accompanied at the swearing-in by his wife, City Councilor Nilka Alvarez-Rodriguez, their two children, State Rep. Diana DiZoglio, D-Methuen, and David D'Arcangelo, director of the state Office on Disability.

"As we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Americans Disabilities Act I am honored and grateful to be appointed by Governor Baker as an advisory board member. As a disabled person I am excited to be part of Governor Baker's administration and be part of the Commission's efforts to investigate, prosecute, adjudicate and resolve cases of discrimination." Rodriguez brings to this position his knowledge of disability law and his belief that everyone deserves a chance to succeed in life according to his/her knowledge without fear of discrimination. He is presently a member of the Lawrence Commission on Disability; his peers elected him as Chairman of the Commission.

Against all odds from his disabilities and adversity, Rodriguez today is a practicing attorney and principal of The Law Office of Richard Rodriguez in Lawrence, Massachusetts. He earned his B. S. Degree from John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York, a Paralegal Certificate with Honors from Long Island University, a Postgraduate Certificate in Public Policy from the CORO Foundation in Public Policy, and his J.D. Degree from Massachusetts School of Law. As a role model to people suffering from disabilities Rodriguez serves as a motivational speaker inspiring similarly disadvantaged individuals.

Rodriguez has over twenty years of public and community service experience. His extensive background includes working in the areas of legal, public policy, government, community organizing, and public/private administrative management. In his recent employment, Rodriguez worked for the Lawrence Police Department in charge of managing a \$1.5 million grant from the U.S Department of Justice. His past employment includes working for the Massachusetts Division of Unemployment Assistant Program, Covenant House, Legal Aid Society, and Massachusetts House of Representative. He also worked as an Adjunct Professor at Cambridge College and served nine years in the Army National Guard.

The board is charged with the responsibilities to "advise the commission and the governor on matters of policy affecting the commission, and shall review the implementation of the commission's programs and policies and from time to time report their conclusions to the commission and the governor."
