De más está decir que aunque creíamos y creemos que era nuestra obligación llamarles la atención a los políticos sobre las distintas ordenanzas, tenemos que confesar que ninguno las cumplía y aún no las cumplen.

Con el tema nos viene a la memoria el Sr. Patrick Blanchette, a la sazón Concejal del Distrito A de Lawrence y Candidato a Representante por el Distrito 16 en el año 2002. El Sr. Blanchette envió una carta abierta a los otros candidatos con copia a la prensa, acompañada de las ordenanzas que regulaban estos carteles. Para hacer el cuento corto, el Sr. Blanchette no resultó electo.

Esto nos trae a otro tema: Los carteles no votan, dicen muchos. ¿Será cierto? ¿Sería que la razón de no ser electo el Sr. Blanchette era porque tenía menos carteles que otros candidatos? ¿Capacidad para desempeñar el cargo le sobraba!

Election Time

Time flies, there are less than thirty days left until the elections and this has reminded us of the past. How many times at election time, the topic being discussed was always the same: the political signs and according to the different ordinances of the city, their sizes as well as abundance and from when they were allowed to be placed, how many by establishment or home and when it was mandatory the withdrawal of all of them.

Needless to say, although we believed and still believe that it was our duty to call the attention of politicians to the different ordinances, we have to confess that none of them complied with them and still do not comply with any.

One subject comes to mind; Mr. Patrick Blanchette, at that time Councilor of District A in Lawrence and Candidate for Representative for District 16 in 2002. Mr. Blanchette sent an open letter to the other candidates with a copy to the press, accompanied by the ordinances that regulated these posters. To make the story short, Mr. Blanchette was not elected.

This brings us to another issue: Posters do not vote, many say. Is it true? Would it be that the reason Mr. Blanchette was not elected was because he had fewer posters than other candidates? Ability to fill the position was not the issue!

Discussing with a political analyst about the proliferation of political signs in the city, he told us that he does not mind these posters. On the contrary, in his opinion, they favor the candidate because he makes his name known and shows popularity, particularly those candidates needing the votes of citizens of other towns or cities that make up their district.

As we said at the beginning, time flies. In the coming weeks we will have the opportunity to make other analyzes about the elections of September 4, 2018. On that day, go out and vote. It's your duty.






CIUDAD DE LAWRENCE SISTEMA DE DISTRIBUCIÓN

The Middlesex Experience Nurtured His Passion for Plant Science

Evan Rees has grown from being a two-time high-school dropout to pursuing a doctorate in plant science at Cornell University. And it all started at Middlesex Community College.

At age 18, Rees dropped out of high school for the second time and earned his GED. Today, the Lexington native is enrolled in a Ph.D. program at Cornell, studying plant breeding and genetics in the School of Integrative Plant Science.

As a teen, Rees worked in restaurants and at a local garden center. A dual citizen of the U.S. and the U.K., he headed to London for a few years, and then spent time in San Francisco working in a farm-to-table restaurant. When his father died in 2013, 22-year-old Rees returned to Massachusetts to be closer to his family. His mother, who works at another local community college, guided him toward MCC.

"I didn't know what I wanted to study, but my plan was to explore my interests in food, agriculture and sustainability, and see where that led," he said.

After his first semester, Rees entered MCC's Commonwealth Honors Program (CHP).

"Evan exhibited creativity, diligence and excellence in his academic work," recalled David Kalivas, CHP Director. "And he was quite energetic as he worked

on the college's Community Garden."

Kalivas became Rees' academic advisor, helping him apply for transfer to four-year schools and encouraging him to shoot high. "He helped me polish my personal statements and urged me to apply to Cornell, which I may not have done otherwise," said Rees.

Rees' first exposure to life-science research was in an independent-study STEM research course. His focus was soil microbes in the Bedford campus organic garden.

In fact, it was in MCC's Community Garden where Rees really began to bloom. A work-study position steered him toward the garden, where he planted, weeded and watered for hours. "Working on the garden taught me quite a bit about plants, people and nature, and how they all fit together," Rees said.

Following his 2015 graduation from MCC with a degree in Liberal Studies, Rees was accepted to Cornell. However, for financial reasons he chose to attend UMass Amherst, completing a bachelor's degree in Plant and Soil Science in spring 2017.

"Middlesex was something of a proving ground for me," said Rees. "By navigating MCC, I figured out that I could be successful in academics – and that college was a feasible path to continue on."

At UMass, he had the opportunity to work in a genomics lab. Feeling comfortable with the laboratory side of science, Rees yearned for more applied-fieldwork. So, he applied to Cornell for graduate school. "Plant breeding is, at least seasonally, a

good balance of bench and field, so it seemed like the natural choice," said Rees.

He is currently working to identify the genetic basis of cold tolerance in wild relatives of maize (corn). The goal is to develop varieties that can thrive in colder climates and for extended seasons, possibly even over winter. Rees expects to complete his doctorate in 2022 or 2023, then find work that has a global impact and also allows him to do some teaching.

As he has nurtured and grown his skills and experiences, Rees has not forgotten his roots. "The community at MCC was incredible. The faculty and staff were warm and accessible, willing to lend an ear and make connections where it made sense," he said. "Those connections led to opportunities and experiences that defined my time there."

"The other part of the Middlesex equation was the students," continued Rees. "The variety of backgrounds and perspectives they represented led to some engaging discussions and lasting friendships."

\$760,000 para ex delincuentes

Reingreso, Entrenamiento y Apoyo

El Alcalde Daniel Rivera, con la Junta de Inversión en la Fuerza Laboral del Valle de Merrimack (MVWIB) anuncia la adjudicación de una subvención federal del Departamento de Trabajo de los Estados Unidos por un monto de \$760,000. La Ciudad de Lawrence y la MVWIB se asociaron con el Centro Juvenil SISU de Lawrence Prospera (antes Lawrence Family

Development) para presentar su propuesta al Departamento de Trabajo. El dinero de la subvención permitirá a MVWIB y SISU proporcionar a al menos 95 ex delincuentes servicios de tutoría y desarrollo de la fuerza de trabajo.

El proyecto incluirá el desarrollo de habilidades sociales y emocionales enfocadas en la fuerza de trabajo, así como el entrenamiento previo al aprendizaje y el aprendizaje y nuevas oportunidades de empleo para varios trabajos. Los participantes del programa serán colocados en una de las tres fases de desarrollo de trabajo según su nivel de necesidad, madurez y capacidad: aprendizaje, empleo o educación postsecundaria.

"El Lawrence Youth Reentry Project recibió estos fondos federales necesarios a través de un proceso de subvención competitivo, que habla tanto de la calidad de la propuesta de la Ciudad como del trabajo de la Junta de Inversión Laboral de Merrimack Valley y Lawrence Prospera en nombre de la Ciudad de Lawrence. \$760K for Prior Offenders Re-entry, Training and Support

Mayor Daniel Rivera, with the Merrimack Valley Workforce Investment Board (MVWIB) announces the award of a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Labor in the amount of \$760,000. The grant will provide services to prior offenders ages 18-24, living in the city of Lawrence, returning to Lawrence from incarceration or other court statuses.

"This grant will give the participating prior offenders a second chance," said Mayor Dan Rivera. "It allows them access to education based training and jobs that they otherwise would not have. It gives them an opportunity to build careers and a stable home environment to help them succeed. I want to thank the Department of Labor and our federal delegation for working to secure this funding for Lawrence."

The City of Lawrence and the MVWIB partnered with Lawrence Prospera's (formerly Lawrence Family Development) SISU Youth Center to submit their proposal to the Department of Labor. The grant money will allow MVWIB and SISU to provide at least 95 prior offenders with mentoring and workforce development services.

The project will include workforce focused social-emotional skills development, as well as pre-apprenticeship and apprenticeship training and new employment opportunities for various jobs. Participants of the program will be placed into one of three job development phases based on their level of need, maturity and

ability: apprenticeships, employment or post-secondary education.

"The Lawrence Youth Reentry Project received these needed federal funds through a competitive grant process, which speaks to both the quality of the City's proposal and the work the Merrimack Valley Workforce Investment Board and Lawrence Prospera has done on behalf of the City of Lawrence. This collaboration has the potential to transform the lives of young adults transitioning back into the community by giving them the resources they need to obtain a quality education, find a job, and move their lives forward in the Greater Lawrence community. I commend Mayor Rivera for his commitment to creatively working to reduce juvenile recidivism and improve the vibrant community he represents," said Congresswoman Niki Tsongas.

"I am grateful to Mayor Rivera for pushing for our U.S. Department of Labor Youth Re-entry application and for his leadership in the development of the grant partnership," said Rafael Abislaiman, Executive Director of the MVWIB. "This project will break the cycle of youth involved crime by allowing them to learn real world workforce skills."

Participants of the program will be referred to the program through a variety of community partners including: Lawrence Police Department, Essex County Sheriff's Department, Department of Youth Services, Lawrence Adult Probation and Committee for Public Counsel Services.

POLL WORKERS NEEDED

The State Elections are rapidly approaching and the City of Lawrence needs the assistance of poll workers, poll clerks, and poll wardens to work on Tuesday, September 4, 2018 and Tuesday, November 6, 2018.

A minimum time commitment is from 6:30 a.m. until polls are officially closed [which is usually about 8:30 p.m. or 9:00 p.m.]. However, the hours to work may extend beyond that time period as needed. A full day commitment is preferred but half-day shifts of 6 hours may be arranged.

If you are registered to vote in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are eligible to work as a poll worker in the City of Lawrence. Lawrence residents and those fluent in Spanish/English language are preferred.

Poll workers receive \$140.00 for a full day – Clerks receive \$180 [full day] – Wardens receive \$220 [full day]. Half days compensation rates are calculated pro-rata on the full day rate. Each worker attending mandatory training sessions receive an additional \$20.00 for training attendance. (Workers receive payment of \$20.00 for one training session only and is paid only to those workers placed into service.)

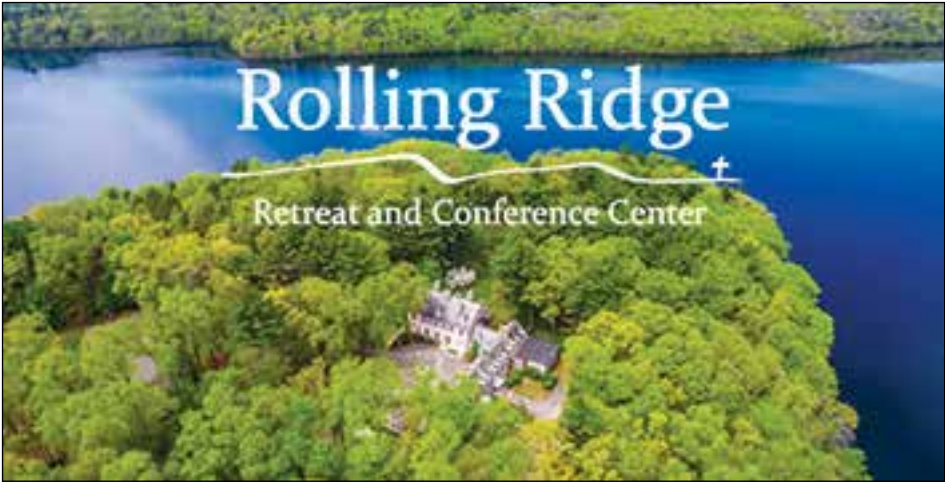

An Ocean Away, North Reading Native Serves in U.S. Navy, Lives in Europe, Supports NATO Mission

ROTA, Spain – A 2010 North Reading High School graduate and North Reading, Massachusetts, native is serving our country in the Navy, living on the coast of Spain, and participating in a critical NATO ballistic missile defense (BMD) mission while assigned to the guided-missile destroyer USS Ross.

Lt. j.g. Nicholas McGrath is an electrical officer aboard one of the four advanced warships forward-deployed to Rota, Spain, a small village on the country’s southwest coast 65 miles south of the city of Seville.

A Navy electrical officer is responsible for managing the electrical safety program as well as overseeing the 'E' division, which consists of all the electricians onboard.

McGrath credits success in the Navy with lessons learned growing up in North Reading.

“I learned perseverance from high school sports in my hometown,” said McGrath. “All you have to do is keep moving forward and everything will fall into place.”

These four destroyers are forward-deployed in Rota to fulfill the United States’ phased commitment to NATO BMD while also carrying out a wide range of missions to support the security of Europe.

According to the NATO website, many countries have, or are trying to develop ballistic missiles. The ability to acquire these capabilities does not necessarily mean there is an immediate intent to attack NATO, but that the alliance has a responsibility to take any possible threat into account as part of its core task of collective defense.

U.S. Navy Aegis ballistic missile

defense provides scalability, flexibility and mobility. These systems are equally beneficial to U.S. assets, allies and regional partners in all areas of the world. Positioning four ballistic missile defense ships in Spain provides an umbrella of protection to forward-deployed forces, friends and allies while contributing to a broader defense of the United States.

Guided-missile destroyers are 510 feet long warships that provide multi-mission offensive and defensive capabilities. The ships are armed with tomahawk cruise missiles, advanced gun systems, close-in gun systems and long-range missiles to counter the threat to friendly forces posed by manned aircraft, anti-ship, cruise and tactical ballistic missiles.

Destroyers are deployed globally and can operate independently or as part of carrier strike groups, surface action groups or amphibious readiness groups. Their presence helps the Navy control the sea. Sea control is the necessity for everything the Navy does. The Navy cannot project power, secure the commons, deter aggression, or assure allies without the ability to control the seas when and where desired.

The ship is named after Capt. Donald Kirby Ross, who was presented a Medal of Honor by Adm. Chester Nimitz for his actions during the attack on Pearl Harbor.

“I’m proud to lead such a dedicated, experienced, resilient and mission-oriented crew,” said Cmdr. Bryan S. Gallo, commanding officer of USS Ross. “Team Ross always meets the mission while taking care of each other and having a fun time doing it.”

Serving in the Navy is a continuing tradition of military service for McGrath, who has military ties with family members who have previously served. McGrath is honored to carry on that family tradition.

“My grandpa was in the Army Air Corps during WWII,” said McGrath. “I knew I wanted to join since I was five, but I didn’t know what branch until after college and the Navy had the best opportunities. I do not regret my decision at all.”

While serving in the Navy may present many challenges, McGrath has found many great rewards.

McGrath is proud of earning his officer-of-the-deck qualification and earning the surface warfare officer device while onboard Ross.

Unique experiences build strong fellowship among the crew of more than 300 women and men aboard Ross. Their hard work and professionalism are a testament

to the namesake’s dedication and the ship’s motto, “Fortune Favors Valor.” The crew is motivated, and can quickly adapt to changing conditions, according to Navy officials. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches and drills. Serving aboard a guided-missile destroyer instills accountability and toughness and fosters initiative and integrity.

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy’s most relied upon assets, McGrath and other Ross sailors know they are a part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes providing the Navy the nation needs.

“Not a lot of people my age get the chance to have a leadership role. It’s going to set me up for success in and out of the Navy,” said McGrath. “Living in Spain is a fantastic cultural experience. The mission has been very fulfilling, the port visits and getting to travel all over Europe is great. I think I’ve been to 13 different countries now.”

He no longer has his weekly radio program so I will continue to check for the rest of the year. \$6,500 in six months is an exorbitant amount to pay for a one-hour weekly program

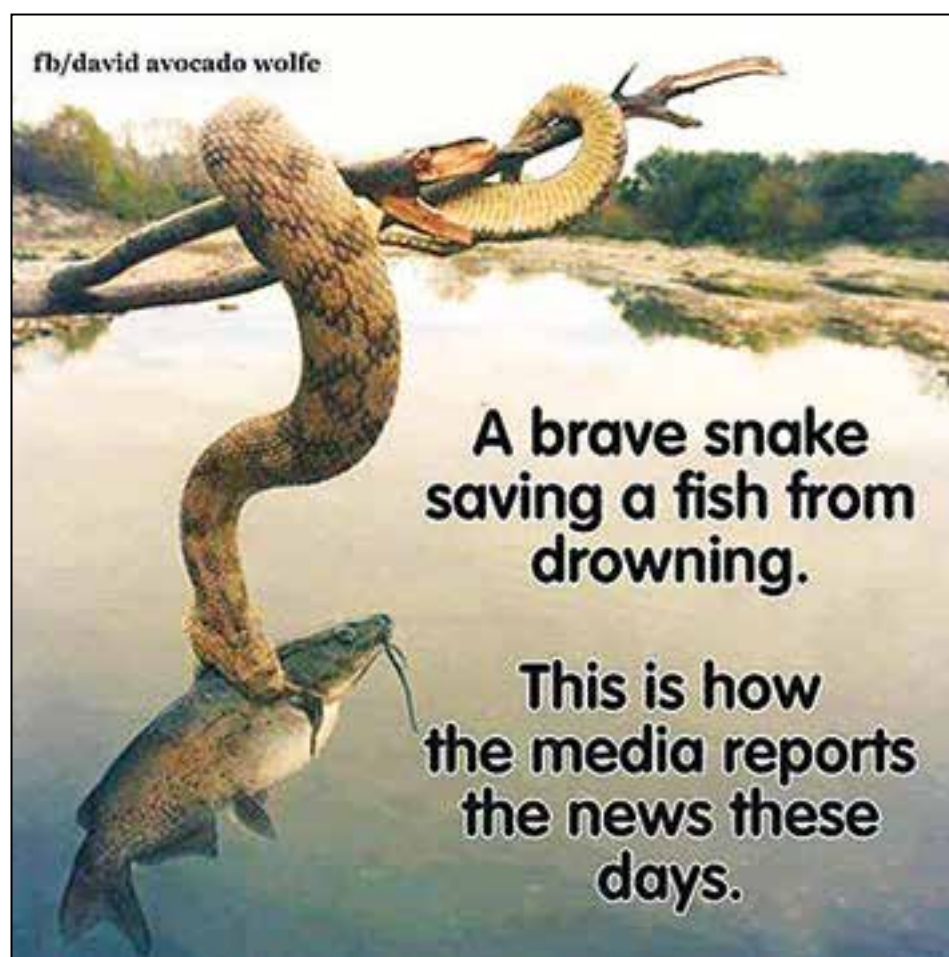

A returning-adult student with her own architectural-restoration business, Byrne is planning a career change and enrolled in MCC's Biotechnology Certificate Program.

A single mother with a 13-year-old daughter, Byrne, 40, earned a bachelor's degree in anthropology from Smith College. She has run Byrne Restoration for almost 20 years. "I restore furniture, and also work on historic homes and church organs. My specialty is finishes and painted surfaces."

While Byrne loves the hands-on aspect of restoration work, she's no longer happy about the toxic chemicals that are part of the job. Even with good ventilation and other protections, these strong solvents are harmful to the environment and the conservators using them. So, Byrne has begun developing her own, less toxic compounds.

"In restoration, we do lots of testing and sampling, which involves mixing together different products to come up with the best solutions for a particular job. You're basically doing chemistry lab work. I decided I wanted to go back to school to learn how to do that lab work the right way."

Byrne enrolled at Middlesex to pursue a degree in Chemical Engineering. However, after taking a "Mathematics for Technology"

course and exploring other STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) fields, she realized she prefers the hands-on aspects of biotechnology. She is now pursuing a certificate in Biotechnology and expects to graduate in May 2019.

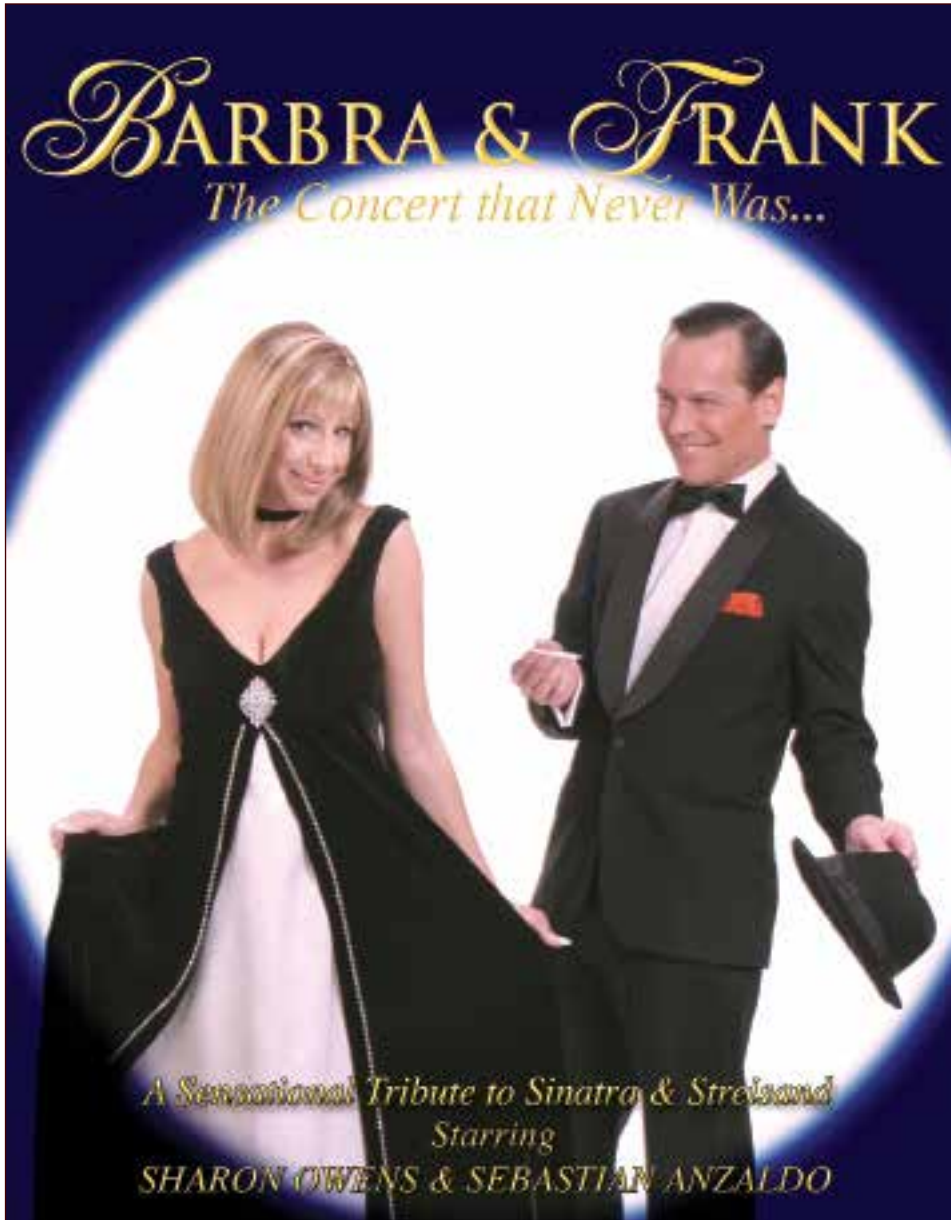
