





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Massachusetts Health Connector continúa el período de Inscripción abierta hasta el 23 de marzo

Massachusetts Health Connector anunció hoy que continuará con la Inscripción Abierta hasta el 23 de marzo, lo que brinda tiempo adicional para que los residentes del estado accedan a un seguro médico asequible y de calidad, particularmente aquellos afectados por el impacto económico del COVID-19.

Con la inscripción abierta en curso, los residentes de Massachusetts que no tienen seguro médico tienen una nueva oportunidad de obtener cobertura a través del Health Connector. Esto incluye planes comerciales a través del programa ConnectorCare, que brinda ayuda para pagar las primas mensuales y también ofrece copagos bajos y sin deducibles.

"Tener seguro médico significa tener la tranquilidad de que si está enfermo o lesionado, el acceso a la atención médica y los servicios está disponible", dijo Louis Gutiérrez, director ejecutivo de Massachusetts Health Connector. "Ojalá quienes no tienen cobertura puedan aprovechar esta oportunidad para inscribirse y disfrutar de la tranquilidad que conlleva estar asegurado". Concluyó Gutiérrez.

Al igual que las personas que no tienen seguro médico, las personas que actualmente tienen cobertura COBRA después de haber perdido sus trabajos, pueden cambiarse a un plan Health Connector durante este período. Para las personas que actualmente pagan las primas completas de los planes COBRA, calificar para ConnectorCare representaría ahorros significativos. Es probable que los participantes de COBRA puedan encontrar

planes de menor costo disponibles sin subsidio.

Muchas personas necesitan ayuda para solicitar cobertura o para elegir un plan, y Health Connector tiene 18 organizaciones navegadoras disponibles en todo el estado, muchas de ellas con capacidad recientemente agregada, incluidas las horas de la tarde y los fines de semana, para ayudar a quienes tengan preguntas. Las personas que necesitan ayuda pueden encontrar un Navegador local en www.MAhealthconnector.org/navigators. Decenas de miles de solicitantes miembros de Health Connector permanecen cubiertos o reciben cobertura durante la Inscripción Abierta, y se alienta a las personas a comunicarse con un Navegador lo antes posible para conseguir el apoyo necesario para y obtener cobertura.

Massachusetts Health Connector es el intercambio de seguros de salud del estado de Massachusetts y actualmente brinda servicios a más de 300,000 personas individualmente o a través de pequeños empleadores con seguro médico y dental. Los residentes de Massachusetts que no tienen seguro médico de un empleador u otra entidad pueden usar el intercambio para obtener cobertura. A través del programa ConnectorCare, los residentes que califiquen por ingresos pueden acceder a una cobertura que incluye primas y copagos a bajo costo, y sin deducibles. Massachusetts Health Connector continues Open Enrollment through March 23

The Massachusetts Health Connector announced today it is continuing Open Enrollment until March 23, providing additional time for state residents to access affordable, quality health insurance, particularly those hurt by the economic impacts of COVID-19.

With Open Enrollment ongoing, Massachusetts residents who do not have health insurance have a new opportunity to get coverage through the Health Connector. This includes commercial plans through the ConnectorCare program, which provides help paying monthly premiums, and also offers low co-pays and no deductibles.

"Having health insurance means having the peace of mind that if sick or injured, access to health care and services is readily available," said Louis Gutierrez, the Executive Director of the Massachusetts Health Connector. "Hopefully those who don't have coverage can take advantage of this opportunity to enroll and enjoy that peace of mind that comes with being insured."

Along with people who do not have health insurance, people who are currently in COBRA coverage after losing their jobs can switch to a Health Connector plan during this period. For people who are current paying full premiums for COBRA plans, qualifying for ConnectorCare would represent significant savings. It is likely that for COBRA participants could also

find lower-cost plans available without subsidy.

Many people need help applying for coverage or picking plan, and the Health Connector has 18 Navigator organizations available around the state, many with newly added capacity – including evening and weekend hours – to help those with questions. People who need help can find a local Navigator at www.MAhealthconnector.org/navigators. Tens of thousands of Health Connector members applicants are staying covered or getting covered during Open Enrollment, and people are encouraged to reach out to a Navigator as soon as possible to get the support needed to get coverage.

The Massachusetts Health Connector is the Commonwealth's health insurance exchange, and currently serves more than 300,000 individuals and small-employer members with health and dental insurance. Massachusetts residents who do not have health insurance from an employer or other entity can use the exchange to gain coverage. Through the ConnectorCare program, income-qualifying residents can access coverage that includes low-cost premiums and co-pays, and no deductibles. Access to health coverage for individuals and small businesses can be found at the Health Connector's website, MAhealthconnector.org.

Durante varios años he estado escribiendo sobre juntas y comisiones municipales que no pueden reunirse por falta de quórum.

Mis críticas a Dan Rivera han sido abundantes durante ese tiempo por no llenar esos puestos. Es en esas reuniones donde verdaderamente se resuelven los asuntos del pueblo.

de propietarios, problemas con compañías de seguros, servicios de inspección, etc.

Veamos si en su tiempo limitado en el cargo el Alcalde Interino Kendrys Vásquez regresará a un gobierno real del pueblo y seguirá llenando esos puestos.

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Prevención y tratamiento de tuberías congeladas

STOW □ El Jefe de Bomberos del Estado Peter J. Ostroskey dijo: "Estamos a punto de tener un clima muy frío que trae el riesgo de tuberías congeladas. Es importante evitar que una mala situación empeore; mucha gente provoca incendios al intentar descongelar tuberías congeladas".

Consejos para prevenir tuberías congeladas

- Cuando el clima es muy frío afuera, deje que el agua gotee de los grifos con tuberías en las paredes exteriores. Hacer correr agua a través de la tubería, incluso con un chorrito, ayuda a evitar que las tuberías se congelen. La temperatura del agua corriente está por encima del punto de congelación.
- Abra las puertas de los gabinetes de la cocina y el baño para permitir que el aire más cálido circule alrededor de las tuberías. Asegúrese de mover los limpiadores y productos químicos domésticos dañinos fuera del alcance de los niños.
- Mantenga el termostato ajustado a la misma temperatura de día y de noche. No baje la temperatura por la noche durante la ola de frío. Puede aumentar un poco la factura de la calefacción, pero puede evitar un trabajo de reparación mucho más costoso si las tuberías se congelan y explotan.
- Si se va a ir durante el clima frío, deje la calefacción encendida en su hogar o negocio a una temperatura no inferior a 55°F.
- Cierre el agua exterior.

Para descongelar tuberías congeladas

- Si abre un grifo y solo sale un hilo, sospeche que se trata de una tubería congelada. Localice el área de la tubería de agua que podría estar congelada. Los lugares más probables son las tuberías que corren contra las paredes exteriores o donde el servicio de agua ingresa a su hogar.
- Mantenga el grifo abierto. A medida que trate la tubería congelada y el área congelada comience a derretirse, el

agua comenzará a fluir a través del área congelada. Hacer correr agua por la tubería ayudará a derretir más hielo en la tubería.

- Aplique calor a la sección de la tubería usando una almohadilla térmica eléctrica envuelta alrededor de la tubería, un secador de pelo eléctrico o envolviendo las tuberías con toallas empapadas en agua caliente. No use un soplete, calentador de queroseno o propano, estufa de carbón u otros dispositivos de llama abierta. Un soplete puede hacer hervir el agua de una tubería congelada y hacer que la tubería explote. Todas las llamas abiertas en los hogares presentan un grave peligro de incendio, así como un grave riesgo de exposición al monóxido de carbono letal.
- Aplique calor hasta que se restablezca la presión total del agua. Si no puede ubicar el área congelada, si el área congelada no es accesible o si no puede descongelar la tubería, llame a un plomero autorizado.
- Revise todos los demás grifos de su casa para averiguar si tiene tuberías congeladas adicionales. Si una tubería se congela, es posible que otras también se congelen.
- Tenga cuidado al usar calefactores portátiles para calentar áreas cercanas a las tuberías. No sobrecargue los circuitos. Enchufe calentadores portátiles directamente en los tomacorrientes de pared. Trate de no usar cables de extensión, pero si debe hacerlo, asegúrese de que esté calificado para el aparato y use solo uno. Los electrodomésticos que producen calor necesitan cables de extensión más fuertes que las lámparas.
- Recuerde no dejar abierta la puerta de un horno a gas; producirá grandes cantidades de monóxido de carbono.
- Asegúrese de que haya alarmas de humo y monóxido de carbono que funcionen en todos los niveles de la casa.

"Afortunadamente, el clima se calentará en los próximos días, lo que ayudará a que las tuberías congeladas se descongelen y evitará que se congelen otras tuberías", dijo Ostroskey.

Proteja los sistemas de rociadores

Para proteger los sistemas de rociadores, controle su edificio durante la ola de frío, especialmente si no tiene una alarma de baja temperatura. Asegúrese de que todas las partes del edificio

permanezcan calentadas por lo menos a 40 ° F y no estén expuestas a condiciones de congelación. Ajustar el termostato más alto por lo menos 50-60 ° F durante esta ola de frío ayudará a asegurar que las tuberías en áreas ocultas se mantengan calientes.

Preventing and Dealing with Frozen Pipes

STOW - State Fire Marshal Peter J. Ostroskey said, "We're about to get some bitter cold weather which brings the risk of frozen pipes. It is important keep a bad situation from getting any worse; many people cause fires trying to thaw frozen pipes."

Tips for Preventing Frozen Pipes

When the weather is very cold outside, let the water drip from faucets with pipes in outside walls. Running water through the pipe – even at a trickle – helps prevent pipes from freezing. The temperature of the running water is above freezing.

- Open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing. Be sure to move any harmful cleaners and household chemicals up out of the reach of children.
- Keep the thermostat set to the same temperature day and at night. Don't lower the temperature at night during the cold spell. It might raise the heating bill a little bit, but can prevent a much more costly repair job if pipes freeze and burst.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home or business set to a temperature no lower than 55°F.
- Shut off outside water.

To Thaw Frozen Pipes

If you turn on a faucet and only a trickle comes out, suspect a frozen pipe. Locate the area of the water pipe that might be frozen. The most likely places are pipes running against exterior walls or where

your water service enters your home.

- Apply heat to the section of pipe using an electric heating pad wrapped around the pipe, an electric hair dryer, or wrapping pipes with towels soaked in hot water. Do not use a blowtorch, kerosene or propane heater, charcoal stove, or other open flame devices. A blowtorch can make water in a frozen pipe boil and cause the pipe to explode. All open flames in homes present a serious fire danger, as well as a severe risk of exposure to lethal carbon monoxide.
- Apply heat until full water pressure is restored. If you are unable to locate the frozen area, if the frozen area is not accessible, or if you cannot thaw the pipe, call a licensed plumber.
- Check all other faucets in your home to find out if you have additional frozen pipes. If one pipe freezes, others may freeze, too.
- Be careful using space heaters to warm up areas near pipes. Don't overload circuits. Plug space heaters directly into wall outlets. Try not to use extension cords but if you must, make sure it is rated for the appliance, and only use one. Heat producing appliances need stronger extension cords than lamps.
- Remember not to leave the door of a gas oven open; it will produce large amounts of carbon monoxide.
- Be sure there are working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every level of the home.

"Fortunately the weather will warm up in the next few days which will help frozen pipes thaw and prevent additional pipes from freezing," said Ostroskey.

Protect Sprinklers Systems

In order to protect sprinkler systems, check on your building during the cold snap, especially if you don't have a low temperature alarm. Make sure that all portions of the building remain heated to at least 40°F and not exposed to freezing conditions. Setting the thermostat higher at least 50-60 ° F during this cold snap will help make sure pipes in concealed areas stay warm.

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Living the Dream Partners Honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Legacy

On Monday, January 18, 2021, the Living the Dream Partners co-sponsored “Where Do We Go From Here?” – a virtual Rev. Bermudez – who serves as pastor at Iglesia Trono Celestial and is the founder of Hope Dove Inc., both in Lowell – is dedicated to helping individuals with disabilities and those living in extreme poverty have a better quality of life. Calling the award an honor, Bermudez asks the community to commit to answering “life’s most persistent and urgent question” posed by Dr. King’s – “what are you doing for others?”

“I am deeply humbled to be recognized as a recipient of the Living the Dream Partners Award,” Bermudez said. “Dr. King tirelessly worked for a more equitable future for all – and this is the reason many of us are able to stand here today. Though we may have different backgrounds and experiences, we are united by our commitment to serve the community around us.”

The MVFB is a nonprofit that seeks to provide nutritious food and essential personal care items to emergency feeding programs for the low-income, homeless and hungry within the community. Their mission is to not only meet but satisfy people’s basic human needs in order to help individuals gain “freedom from hunger” – especially during the pandemic.

“Those food pantries, meal programs, senior centers and schools are on the frontlines and are providing not only food, but a sympathetic ear as well as other

services including rental assistance and advice, healthcare, fuel assistance and referrals to help our neighbors navigate this uncharted territory,” a spokesperson for the MVFB said. “Thanks to our local, state and federal representatives, corporate, faith-based and academic partners, families currently seeking food can maintain their health through nutrition.”

Reginald Nichols, MCC’s Assistant Director of Human Resources, acted as emcee and emphasized the relevancy of the annual event started by Lura Smith and family 23 years ago.

The online presentation and discussion will look back on significant leaders of the past in African American history, their path to the present day, and the implications of identity politics and social structures in the African American community.

MCC will welcome guest lecturer Dr. Thomas L. Doughton, Senior Lecturer from the College of the Holy Cross Center for Interdisciplinary Studies, from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, February 3. Dr. Doughton will present and lead a discussion that recognizes the history, diversity and multiplicity of "Strength in Diversity: New England People of Color."

Dr. Doughton specializes in the Holocaust, comparative genocide, Native American studies, local history and African American history. In celebration of MCC's 50 years as an institution, there will be an opportunity for Middlesex Black alumni, faculty and staff to discuss their experiences in shaping the college over the past 50 years. Throughout the month, the podcast The Liturgists will offer a daily episode of "Black History is American History," highlighting Black public figures.



Acting Mayor Vasquez is starting with the right foot

For several years I've been writing about city boards and commissions that are not able to meet lacking a quorum.

My criticisms of Dan Rivera have been plentiful through that time for not filling those posts. It is at those meetings where the real city business gets done.

People would often complain that these are voluntary positions without a stipend but the truth is that there are many individuals eager to be motivators of change.

Anyone interested in contributing to the city by being a member of a particular board or commission, would normally check on the city website and apply from there. The problem with the lack of transparency in Lawrence is that right now there are only 3 posted openings since March 2014.

Hopefully, we invite only honorable people to participate because you may hear about future city plans that, if you play your cards right (in a devious way, of course) you may pick up city properties that will be going out for bids before the general public finds out. We have found many people lacking integrity that started out on city boards and ended up millionaires. It's time for hard-working people in Lawrence to stand up and work for the common good.

But, I am very pleased to announce that Acting Mayor Kendrys Vasquez has done what was lacking for so long. He will be presenting to the City Council on Tuesday night, 12 names of candidates for three boards. He still has many more appointments to do but this is a good start.

When referencing that it is at these boards and commissions where the citizens' business is done, I suggest you take a look at the list and you'll see which decisions they handle. By not having effective boards and commissions the administration may make decisions affecting the city and residents, often in violation of the law.

Let's see if in his limited time in office Acting Mayor Kendrys Vasquez will bring back real government by the people and completes filling those posts.


