Greater Lawrence Family Health Center (GLFHC) / MCPS University graduó a dos farmacéuticos de su programa de capacitación farmacéutica avanzada de un año en junio.

Vivian Nguyen se ha unido al equipo de GLFHC. Trabajará en una posición híbrida, como farmacéutica clínica y de planta, para ayudar a los pacientes ambulatorios en todo lo que pueda.

Mai Yakota regresará a su estado natal de California. Mientras busca un empleo de tiempo completo, seguirá actuando como puente entre la educación farmacéutica en los Estados Unidos y Japón. Yakota fue seleccionada recientemente como presentadora en una conferencia de educación farmacéutica en Japón.

"Mientras atravesaban un año de residencia inusual en medio de la pandemia, Mai y Vivian se mantuvieron ansiosas y flexibles y dispuestas a aprovechar cualquier oportunidad que pudieran", dijo Alexia Sroka, Coordinadora del Programa de Residencia de Farmacia. Cuerpo docente y personal de NECC completan capacitación nacional sobre primeros auxilios® en salud mental

Al reconocer que muchos estudiantes universitarios sufren de ansiedad y depresión, Northern Essex Community College está trabajando de manera proactiva para ayudar a identificar a los estudiantes que tienen dificultades y conectarlos con ayuda.

En los dos años que se ha ofrecido en la universidad, 130 miembros de la facultad y el personal han completado la capacitación de certificación nacional Mental Health First Aid® (MHFA) a través del Centro de Desarrollo Profesional de la universidad.

El curso de capacitación de ocho horas enseña cómo identificar, comprender y responder a los signos de enfermedades mentales y trastornos por abuso de sustancias. Después de completar el curso y dos horas de trabajo a su propio ritmo, los participantes toman una prueba y se certifican como Primeros Auxiliares de Salud Mental.

"Así como la RCP ayuda a quienes no tienen formación médica a ayudar a una persona que sufre un ataque cardíaco, la MHFA prepara a los participantes para ayudar a alguien que desarrolle un problema de salud mental o experimente una crisis de salud mental", dice Kim Burns, decano de innovaciones académicas y desarrollo profesional".

En Northern Essex, el curso es impartido por la profesora de ciencias del comportamiento y servicios humanos Kathleen Bartolini, quien pasó a la docencia después de una carrera de 20 años como psicoterapeuta de niños y adolescentes. El Centro de Desarrollo Profesional ofrece el curso durante todo el año.

"Como parte de este curso, vamos a tener las conversaciones difíciles; vas a saber qué hacer a continuación", explica Bartolini. "No estoy dando capas, pero con esta certificación, puedes identificar el problema y saber cuándo es importante intervenir".

Las personas inscritas en el programa aumentarán su conocimiento de los signos, síntomas y factores de riesgo de enfermedades mentales y adicciones; ser capaz de identificar múltiples tipos de recursos profesionales y de autoayuda para personas con una enfermedad mental o adicción; y aumentar su confianza para



ayudar a una persona en peligro.

"Si alguien está luchando con un hueso roto o una enfermedad física, tendemos a saber qué decir", dice Bartolini. "Pero no con problemas de salud mental. La gente tiene miedo de decir algo incorrecto, por lo que no dice nada".

Si bien el curso se ofreció antes de que ocurriera la pandemia en marzo de 2020, COVID se ha convertido en parte de la conversación, dice Bartolini. "Mucha gente ha preguntado cómo ayudar a los estudiantes, así como a familiares y amigos a manejar la ansiedad de COVID".

La salud mental no es solo un problema en los campus universitarios. Según las estadísticas proporcionadas por el Consejo Nacional para el Bienestar Mental, 123 personas mueren por suicidio cada día y casi 1 de cada 5 adultos estadounidenses vive con una enfermedad mental.

"Estoy encantado de poder trabajar para una institución que ve la importancia de recibir educación sobre los problemas de salud mental", dice Bartolini.

This group graduated from the Mental Health First Aid Program pre-COVID. Since the pandemic, the program has been offered online.

NECC Faculty and Staff Complete National Mental Health First Aid® Training

Recognizing that many college students suffer from anxiety and depression, Northern Essex Community College is working proactively to help identify students who are struggling and connect them with help.

In the two years it's been offered at the college, 130 members of the faculty and staff have completed the national Mental Health First Aid® (MHFA) certification training through the college's Center for Professional Development.

The eight-hour training course teaches how to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illness and substance abuse disorders. After completing the course and two-hours of self-paced work, participants take a test and become certified as Mental Health First Aiders.

"Just as CPR helps those without medical training to assist an individual having a heart attack, MHFA prepares participants to help someone developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis," says Kim Burns, dean of academic innovations and professional development."

At Northern Essex, the course is taught by Behavioral Science and Human Services Professor Kathleen Bartolini, who transitioned to teaching after a 20-year career as a child and adolescent psychotherapist. The Center for Professional Development offers the course throughout the year.

"As part of this course, we are going to have the hard conversations; you're going to know what to do next," Bartolini explains.

"I'm not giving out capes, but having this certification, you can identify the problem, and know when it's important to step in."

Individuals enrolled in the program will grow their knowledge of signs, symptoms, and risk factors of mental illnesses and addictions; be able to identify multiple types of professional and self-help resources for individuals with a mental illness or addiction; and increase their confidence in helping an individual in distress.

"If someone is struggling with a broken bone or physical illness, we tend to know what to say," says Bartolini. "But not with mental health issues. People are afraid of saying the wrong thing so they don't say anything."

While the course was offered before the pandemic struck in March of 2020, COVID has become part of the conversation, says Bartolini. "A lot of people have asked how to help students as well as family and friends to manage the anxiety from COVID."

Mental health isn't only an issue on college campuses. According to statistics provided by the National Council for Mental Wellbeing, 123 people die by suicide each day and nearly 1 in 5 U.S. adults lives with a mental illness.

"I am thrilled that I get to work for an institution that sees the importance of being educated about mental health issues," says Bartolini.

Los estudiantes de electricidad trabajaron con energía temporal para suministrar electricidad a las herramientas de los trabajadores y aprendieron sobre la lectura de planos, los requisitos del (Código Eléctrico Nacional), el uso y la seguridad de herramientas manuales e inalámbricas, escaleras, trabajos de servicio, cableado en bruto, PPE, instalación de dispositivos y diseño.

Los estudiantes de HVAC trabajaron en la lectura de planos, códigos, PPE, uso y seguridad de herramientas manuales e inalámbricas, ventilación de electrodomésticos, extractores de aire, distribución de conductos e instalación y terminación, y escaleras.

GLTS Students Help Build Duplex in Partnership with Andover Community Trust

ANDOVER -- Superintendent John Lavoie is pleased to share that students from Greater Lawrence Tech worked during the past few years to build a duplex in partnership with Andover Community Trust.

Andover Community Trust is a nonprofit that works to advocate for and develop affordable homes for families in the Andover area. GLTS has partnered with the organization on various projects since 1999.

"Partnering with Andover Community Trust allows our students from multiple disciplines to gain valuable, hands-on experience building a home, and it also allows students to utilize their trade knowledge and skills in a way that will make a big difference in someone else's life," Superintendent Lavoie said. "It's a great way for students to learn and become invested in a project that will make a positive impact in the community."

Andover Community Trust hosted a Build the Dream Celebration on June 17 and presented students with plaques.

More than 100 juniors and seniors worked on the project from Greater Lawrence Tech's carpentry, electrical, plumbing, and HVAC programs. Instructors involved in the project include electrical instructor Charlie Kennedy, plumbing instructor Kenny Henricks, plumbing instructor Mike Capeless, carpentry instructor Peter Magee, carpentry instructor Bret Marciano, and HVAC instructor Joe Savino.

"The off-campus house project provides a real-world work experience for our students and has a positive impact on the local communities," Instructor Magee said.

"The experience on the house project has taught us to work as a team and to challenge ourselves individually," said Scarlett Holbrook, of Andover, a junior in the carpentry program.

"It has also taught us valuable lessons in communication, problem-solving, and

life lessons," said Emilio Cardona, of North Andover, a junior in the carpentry program.

Students and instructors completed the first-floor framing of the duplex, located on Lupine Road in Andover, at the end of the 2018-2019 school year. During the 2019-2020 school year, they framed the house and prepared it for roofing.

Students and instructors were able to return to the project in November 2020, after work paused temporarily due to the pandemic.

This school year, they finished installing plumbing, electrical work, ductwork, and fire caulking and the draft stop was conducted by a subcontractor this June. Routine inspections on the home are being completed this month as well.

Carpentry students working on the project learned about plan reading, building codes, portable power tool use and safety, pneumatic tool use and safety, personal protective equipment (PPE), fall protection use and set up, ladders, framing floors, walls, ceilings, roofs, and stairs.

Electrical students worked on temporary power to supply electricity for the workers' tools and learned about plan reading, (National Electrical Code) requirements, hand and cordless tool use and safety, ladders, service work, rough wiring, PPE, installation of devices, and layout.

Plumbing students learned about plan reading, codes, PPE, hand, and cordless tool use and safety, ladders, Radon systems, sewage, hot and cold water piping, venting, drainage systems, COMBI boilers, and layout.

HVAC students worked on plan reading, codes, PPE, hand and cordless tool use and safety, venting of appliances, exhaust fans, ductwork layout, and installation and termination, and ladders.





El periódico estudiantil de NECC recibe la medalla de oro por su cobertura pandémica

A pesar de los desafíos de la pandemia, el periódico estudiantil de Northern Essex Community College, el NECC Observer, recibió una medalla de oro de la Columbia Scholastic Press Association para el año escolar 2019-2020. El periódico tuvo la distinción adicional de All Columbia Honors por recibir una puntuación de evaluación excepcionalmente alta.

El NECC Observer es un periódico estudiantil galardonado constantemente, pero el premio se siente particularmente impactante este año.

Incluso después de que sus vidas cambiaron en marzo de 2020, los estudiantes de periodismo de NECC siguieron dedicados al Observer mientras cubrían el efecto de la pandemia en los estudiantes y profesores de NECC. También pasaron sin problemas de producir un periódico impreso a uno solo en línea, lo que llevó a casa la importancia del periodismo estudiantil, especialmente en tiempos de crisis.

“Me impresionó mucho cómo los estudiantes pudieron seguir haciéndolo”, dice Mary Jo Shafer, asesora del NECC Observer e instructora adjunta de periodismo e inglés.

A pesar de que no estaban en el campus y tuvieron que lidiar con la presión de tener que navegar repentinamente por un nuevo mundo en el que se equilibra el aprendizaje en línea con los rigores de los cursos universitarios, los estudiantes periodistas continuaron buscando temas, fuentes de entrevistas y escribiendo historias.

Pudieron “perseverar incluso con todas las tensiones de ese semestre”, dice Shafer.

También giraron en el tipo de historias que estaban cubriendo. Al comienzo del año escolar, Shafer dice que el personal y

los colaboradores de NECC Observer ya estaban haciendo un gran trabajo cubriendo eventos y otros acontecimientos del campus. Luego, al inicio de la pandemia, cambiaron de marcha y cubrieron lo que estaba sucediendo de una manera diferente.

“Me impresionaron muchas de las historias que hicieron sobre cómo lidiar con el aprendizaje en línea y sobrellevar la pandemia, y ese tipo de cosas”, dice Shafer.

NECC's Student Newspaper Receives Gold Medal for Pandemic Coverage

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, Northern Essex Community College's student newspaper, the NECC Observer, received a gold medal from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association for the 2019-2020 school year. The newspaper had the additional distinction of All Columbia Honors for receiving an exceptionally high judging score.

The NECC Observer is a consistently award-winning student newspaper, but the award feels particularly impactful this year.

Even after their lives were upended in March 2020, NECC's student journalists remained dedicated to the Observer as they covered the pandemic's effect on NECC students and faculty. They also seamlessly shifted from producing a print newspaper to one that's online-only, driving home the importance of student journalism, especially during times of crisis.

“I was really impressed with how the students were able to just keep doing it,” says Mary Jo Shafer, advisor for the NECC Observer and adjunct journalism and English instructor.

Even though they weren't on campus—and had to deal with the pressure of suddenly having to navigate a new world of balancing online learning with the rigors of college courses—the student journalists continued to find topics, interview sources, and write stories.

They were able to “persevere even with all the stresses of that semester,” says Shafer.

They also pivoted in the kinds of stories they were covering. At the beginning of the school year, Shafer says the NECC Observer staff and contributors were already doing a great job covering events and other campus happenings. Then, at the onset of the pandemic, they switched gears, covering what was happening in a different way.

“I was really impressed with a lot of the stories they did about coping with online learning and coping with the pandemic, and that sort of thing,” Shafer says.

That experience is a testament to Shafer's belief that working on a student newspaper is one of the best ways for students who are passionate about journalism to get real, hands-on experience in the field. Working on the Observer is a labor of love that doesn't earn students course credit, but often provides something else that's just as valuable.

“I really believe in journalism being a craft that you learn best by doing it,” she says. And awards like the gold medal from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association are the icing on the cake.

“It's a nice acknowledgment of their hard work and their persistence,” Shafer says.

Founded in 1925, the CSPA unites

student editors and faculty advisers working with them to produce student newspapers, magazines, yearbooks, and online media. CSPA is owned by Columbia University and operated as a program affiliated with its Graduate School of Journalism.

The NECC Observer is an award-winning newspaper published by NECC journalism students. The Observer is published twice monthly during the academic year.

The NECC Observer staff works to inform the college community, including students, faculty, and staff. The Observer also serves as a public forum for the Haverhill and Lawrence campuses and accepts letters and guest columns from the

college community.

The NECC Observer is funded by the college's Academic Affairs division, and the newspaper staff receives its training in the college's Journalism/Communication Program. Professor Mary Jo Shafer, an instructor in the Communication Arts Department, serves as faculty adviser to the newspaper.

The Observer is a member of the Associated Collegiate Press and the New England Press Association.

La demanda de sangre en los hospitales sigue siendo alta a medida que la nación se acerca a la semana festiva

La Cruz Roja Estadounidense continúa experimentando una grave escasez de sangre que está afectando negativamente la disponibilidad de productos sanguíneos en todo el país. Se insta a los donantes de todos los tipos de sangre, especialmente el tipo O y los que dan plaquetas, a hacer una cita para donar ahora y ayudar a garantizar que las estanterías del hospital estén abastecidas con productos sanguíneos durante el feriado del 4 de julio y más allá.

Además, si bien el verano es tradicionalmente una época en la que disminuyen las donaciones de sangre, este año es particularmente desafianta ya que muchos estadounidenses reciben sus vacunas y reanudan las actividades de verano después de más de un año de interacciones y viajes limitados, lo que lleva a una menor participación de donantes. La necesidad de sangre no toma un descanso en las vacaciones: los pacientes aún dependen de transfusiones que les salvan la vida.

Para donar sangre, las personas deben traer una tarjeta de donante de sangre o una licencia de conducir u otras dos formas de identificación que se requieren en el check-in. Las personas que tienen 17 años de edad en la mayoría de los estados (16 con el consentimiento de los padres cuando lo permite la ley estatal), pesan al menos 110 libras y gozan de buena salud en general pueden ser elegibles para donar sangre. Los estudiantes de secundaria y otros donantes de 18 años o menos también deben cumplir

con ciertos requisitos de altura y peso.

Los donantes también pueden ahorrar hasta 15 minutos en la campaña de donación de sangre completando un RapidPass®. Con RapidPass®, los donantes completan el cuestionario de historial médico y de lectura previa a la donación en línea, el día de la donación, desde un dispositivo móvil o computadora. Perspectivas de salud para donantes

Hospital blood demand remains high as the nation heads into holiday week

The American Red Cross continues to experience a severe blood shortage that is negatively affecting blood product availability across the country. Donors of all blood types – especially type O and those giving platelets – are urged to make an appointment to give now and help ensure hospital shelves are stocked with blood products over the Fourth of July holiday and beyond.

Right now, the Red Cross is working around the clock to provide blood products to hospitals responding to an unusually high number of traumas and emergency room visits, as well as overdoses and resulting transplants. As a result of the blood shortage, some hospitals are being forced to slow the pace of elective surgeries until the blood supply stabilizes, delaying crucial patient care.

In addition, while summer is traditionally a time when blood donations decline, this year is particularly challenging as many Americans receive their vaccinations and resume summer activities after more than a year of limited interactions and travel, leading to lower donor turnout. The need for blood doesn't take a holiday break – patients still depend on lifesaving transfusions.

Donors are needed now to prevent further delays inpatient care. Schedule an appointment to give blood now by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767), or enabling

the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

In most cases, those who have received a COVID-19 vaccine can donate. However, knowing the name of the manufacturer of the vaccine they received is important in determining donation eligibility.

About blood donation

To donate blood, individuals need to bring a blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds, and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass®. With RapidPass®, donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer. To complete a RapidPass®, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org.

org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor App.

Health insights for donors

At a time when health information has never been more important, the Red Cross is also screening all blood, platelet and plasma donations from self-identified African American donors for the sickle cell trait. This additional screening will provide Black donors with an additional health insight and help the Red Cross identify compatible blood types more quickly to help patients with sickle cell disease. Blood transfusion is an essential treatment for those with sickle cell disease, and blood donations from individuals of the same race, ethnicity, and blood type have a unique ability to help patients fighting sickle cell disease.

Donors can expect to receive sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org.

Blood drive safety

The Red Cross has updated its pandemic safety protocols in alignment with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Fully vaccinated individuals, including staff and donors, no longer need to wear masks or social distance. Unvaccinated individuals continue to be required to wear masks and social distance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive.

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
Nuevo libro sobre cubanos en Massachusetts

Mayor Fiorentini picks Pistone to lead Haverhill Police

Mayor James J. Fiorentini has appointed longtime Haverhill police officer Captain Robert Pistone to be the city's next police chief.

Pistone, a 22-year veteran of the Haverhill force, will succeed Alan DeNaro who retired in May for health reasons. Pistone is expected to take over as chief July 17, replacing Interim Chief Anthony Haugh, a former Haverhill deputy who came out of retirement to head the department for a few weeks until the new permanent chief was chosen.

Pistone was chosen by the mayor following a nation-wide search that included nearly 30 applicants from across the county as well as internal and local candidates. Pistone was one of three finalists who were unveiled at a public "meet the finalists" session Friday at City Hall. Haverhill Deputy Chief Stephen Doherty and Lawrence Capt. Maurice Aguiler were the other finalists.

A 10-person committee of local people interviewed five candidates and assisted in whittling the candidate pool to three finalists. The finalists were then interviewed a final time Friday by Mayor Fiorentini, New Hampshire-based Municipal Resources Inc. President Alan Gould and former Hampton, New Hampshire police Chief William Wrenn, a Haverhill native. Gould's company was hired by the city to help recruit candidates and guide the city's search. Gould and Wrenn favored Pistone for the position although it was a close and tough decision. Either of the three finalists are qualified and capable of performing the duties of police chief, Mayor Fiorentini said.

"This was an extraordinarily difficult decision because we had two outstanding local candidates in Captain Pistone and Deputy Chief Doherty," Mayor Fiorentini said. "All of us on the interview panel were very impressed with both and I believe Chief Pistone and Deputy Chief Doherty will make an incredible team to bring our police department to even higher levels." Mayor Fiorentini said the Haverhill Police Department fared very well during the chief search process.

"One thing that really impressed me during the interviews is that a number of people said how impressed they are with our existing police," the mayor said. "They stressed to me that our department has already adopted new police practices that are being demanded of police departments in the post George Floyd era."

Mayor Fiorentini noted the final interview panel was especially impressed with Pistone's commitment to working with the city's BIPOC (black, indigenous, and people of color) communities. The mayor



said he and Chief Pistone will be hosting a series of outreach meetings with the Latino community and visiting neighborhood markets this summer.

"We are committed to being a partner in the Latino community," the mayor said.

Pistone holds a Master's degree in Criminal Justice Administration and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and Chief Executive Leadership Course. In his more than two decades with the Haverhill department, Pistone has served as Patrol Commander, Detective Commander and Administrative Commander while also successfully handling the department's grant writing and media relations.

While speaking with members of the press and public Friday, Pistone stressed his leadership philosophy of transparency and building strong community relationships. In his letter of interest in the chief's position, Pistone said he is extensively familiar with the responsibilities of leading an urban police department as well as being a leader and role model in both the community and department.

"I have effectively managed high-profile cases and have contributed to the design and implementation of programs which have measurably improved the safety of both civilians and officers," Pistone said. "I have a track record of having made swift, fair, and impartial decisions in chaotic, stressful, and time-sensitive situations."

"I have continued to form and build amicable working relationships with department heads, business officials, and outside agencies so that we may more efficiently address community improvements ... and achieve a greater positive impacts on both crime control and quality of life for our citizens," he said.

Perhaps the Congressional leaders who will be in charge of making those changes should carefully judge the intelligence of those voters.



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

New book about Cubans in Massachusetts

Women's, Men's Hockey Impresses on Hockey East All-Academic Teams



The Merrimack College women's and men's hockey teams had an impressive showing on the Hockey East All-Academic teams, as the Warrior programs combined for 46 selections and eight student-athletes were named to the Academic All-Star team, as announced by the league office Friday.

The Warrior teams combined for the second-most number of All-Academic team members in their respective leagues and no school in Hockey East combined for more All-Star team nods than Merrimack College.
