Massachusetts' namesake ship, USS Massachusetts, christened into U.S. Navy

WASHINGTON - The Navy christened one of its newest Virginia-class fast-attack submarines, the future USS Massachusetts (SSN 798), during an 11 a.m. EDT ceremony Saturday, May 6, 2023, at Huntington Ingalls Industries-Newport News Shipbuilding, in Newport News, Virginia.

In a time-honored Navy tradition, the submarine's sponsor, Ms. Sheryl Sandberg, christened the boat by breaking a bottle of sparkling wine across the bow. Sandberg is the founder and chair of the Sandberg Goldberg Bernthal Family Foundation, a nonprofit organization that works to build a more equal and resilient world through three key initiatives: LeanIn.org, OptionB.org, and the Dave Goldberg Scholarship Program.

"The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has been influential in our nation's culture and continues to play a prominent role in history, higher education, science, research and technology," said Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro. "Nearly eight decades later, I am proud to see Massachusetts' legacy continue, this time as a future attack submarine."

The future USS Massachusetts (SSN

798) is the ninth U.S. Navy vessel named in recognition of the state. The first USS Massachusetts was a steamer built in 1845 and acquired by the U.S. War Department in 1847 to use as a transport vessel during the Mexican-American War. Prior to SSN 798, the last USS Massachusetts (BB-59) was commissioned in 1942 as a South Dakota-class fast battleship. It spent most of its career in the Pacific, decommissioning in 1947.

Virginia-class submarines are built to operate in the world's littoral and deep waters while conducting anti-submarine warfare; anti-surface ship warfare; strike warfare; special operations forces support; intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance; irregular warfare; and mine warfare missions. Their inherent stealth, endurance, mobility, and firepower directly enable them to support five of the six maritime strategy core capabilities — sea control, power projection, forward presence, maritime security and deterrence. These capabilities allow the submarine force to contribute to regional stability and preservation of future peace while operating everywhere international law allows, so everyone else can too.

WASHINGTON - La Armada bautizó a uno de sus submarinos de ataque rápido de clase Virginia más nuevos, el futuro USS Massachusetts (SSN 798), durante una ceremonia a las 11 a. m. EDT el sábado 6 de mayo de 2023, en Huntington Ingalls Industries-Newport News Shipbuilding, en Newport, Virginia.

En una antigua tradición de la Marina, la patrocinadora del submarino, la Sra. Sheryl Sandberg, bautizó el barco rompiendo una botella de vino espumoso en la proa. Sandberg es el fundador y presidente de Sandberg Goldberg Bernthal Family Foundation, una organización sin fines de lucro que trabaja para construir un mundo más igualitario y resistente a través de tres iniciativas clave: LeanIn.org, OptionB.org y el programa de becas Dave Goldberg.

"El Estado Libre Asociado de Massachusetts ha influido en la cultura de nuestra nación y continúa desempeñando un papel destacado en la historia, la educación superior, la ciencia, la investigación y la tecnología", dijo el Secretario de Marina Carlos Del Toro. "Casi ocho décadas después, me enorgullece ver que continúa el legado de Massachusetts, esta vez como un futuro submarino de ataque".

El futuro USS Massachusetts (SSN 798) es el noveno buque de la Marina de los EE.UU. nombrado en reconocimiento

al estado. El primer USS Massachusetts fue un barco de vapor construido en 1845 y adquirido por el Departamento de Guerra de los EE.UU. en 1847 para usarlo como buque de transporte durante la Guerra México-Estadounidense. Antes del SSN 798, el último USS Massachusetts (BB-59) se puso en servicio en 1942 como un acorazado rápido de la clase de Dakota del Sur. Pasó la mayor parte de su carrera en el Pacífico, siendo dado de baja en 1947.

Los submarinos de clase Virginia están construidos para operar en las aguas litorales y profundas del mundo mientras realizan una guerra antisubmarina; guerra antibuque de superficie; guerra de huelgas; apoyo a las fuerzas de operaciones especiales; inteligencia, vigilancia y reconocimiento; guerra irregular; y misiones de guerra de minas. Su sigilo, resistencia, movilidad y potencia de fuego inherentes les permiten respaldar directamente cinco de las seis capacidades básicas de la estrategia marítima: control marítimo, proyección de poder, presencia avanzada, seguridad marítima y disuasión. Estas capacidades permiten que la fuerza de submarinos contribuya a la estabilidad regional y la preservación de la paz futura mientras opera en todos los lugares donde lo permite el derecho internacional, para que todos los demás también puedan hacerlo.

iUn impuesto es un impuesto, es un impuesto!

La Coalición Latina de Haverhill está creciendo en Haverhill y cada vez que los latinos se reúnen para ejercer su voz, los animo. Les ha llevado mucho tiempo movilizarse, pero parecen estar en el camino correcto, al contrario de Lawrence, donde varios grupos comenzaron algo y luego desaparecieron, no obtuvieron el apoyo necesario, o se politizaron y se disolvieron.

El propósito de esa reunión del 7 de mayo fue informar a la comunidad sobre la próxima elección del 6 de junio para la nueva Escuela Consentino. Me dicen que la información era vaga y que el público no se enteró de lo que significaría un voto Sí.

Una forma simple de decirlo es que no es un aumento en el impuesto a la propiedad regular, sino que es una cuenta separada por la cual todos tendrán que pagar impuestos anuales. Esto es importante para que todos lo entiendan.

Observe en las dos imágenes que no se ha hecho ningún esfuerzo por educar a la comunidad de habla hispana sobre lo que eso significa. Este es obviamente un esfuerzo ejecutado por un grupo que quiere que todos voten a favor de lo que apoyan.

Al principio, el Alcalde James Fiorentini dijo que no hay necesidad de ese impuesto adicional, aunque será ajustado para el presupuesto de la ciudad. Ahora dijo que votará Sí. Al fin y al cabo es una iniciativa ciudadana y no se le puede culpar por ello.

También discutieron los cambios que se están produciendo como resultado de que todos los funcionarios electos de Haverhill ahora tienen mandatos de dos años según la petición de autonomía de Haverhill aprobada el año pasado por la legislatura.

Los presentadores no hicieron su tarea antes de preparar su presentación de PowerPoint o no sabían lo que estaban haciendo. La pantalla decía que los concejales de la ciudad servirán durante cuatro años y los miembros del comité escolar durante dos años. Según los cambios aprobados, tanto los concejales de la ciudad como el comité escolar tendrán mandatos de dos años.

Lo más sorprendente fue que el secretario municipal y algunos concejales presentes no los corrigieron.

Supongo que educar a la gente no es una prioridad en sus mentes.

Estudios de género

Parece haber un enorme esfuerzo en este país para aceptar que las personas pueden cambiar su género a voluntad y como no se escribe ni se habla demasiado sobre esto, escribí un artículo en la página 11 que espero que se tomen el tiempo de leer.

Para mí fue un gran descubrimiento encontrar cómo el gobierno está detrás de las historias de terror que involucran a estas personas. El Instituto Nacional de Salud (NIH) otorga subvenciones para experimentos con jóvenes, algunos a partir de los 8 años de edad.

Los resultados han sido desastrosos. Reconocieron que dos sujetos se suicidaron y el resto (hombres y mujeres) corren el

riesgo de volverse infériles a consecuencia de las hormonas que les están dando.

La peor parte del escándalo es que a los niños se les dice que lo mantengan en secreto de sus padres que son parte de esto. Algunas escuelas han creado programas extracurriculares llamados "Clases de Arte" para que nadie sospeche.

El Centro para el Control de Enfermedades (CDC) tiene mucha información en su sitio web bajo "Inclusividad LGBTQ en las escuelas: una herramienta de autoevaluación", y aparece en el sitio web para jóvenes de los CDC en una sección etiquetada como "Para las escuelas" y debajo de la lista desplegable abajo la etiqueta "Herramientas para apoyar a la juventud LGBTQ" ("Tools for Supporting LGBTQ Youth.")

Se insta a los maestros, administradores, personal de salud escolar y otros a defender las causas LGBT en la escuela.

Algunos estados han tomado medidas contra los sistemas escolares para prevenir o prohibir que sucedan estas cosas; otros han promulgado leyes que prohíben la disponibilidad de ciertos libros para niños pequeños. Hay una campaña contra ellos llamándolo "prohibición de libros" cuando en realidad los libros no han sido prohibidos para las personas mayores.

Otro aspecto es que debemos tolerar a los miembros LGBTQ por la fuerza. He tenido buenos amigos que resultaron ser homosexuales y los traté como lo que eran: buenos amigos. Hoy, un comentario negativo sobre este impulso puede causar problemas a cualquiera, y está en todas partes.

El Gobernador de Oklahoma, Kevin Stitt, vetó recientemente un proyecto de ley que habría renovado la licencia y proporcionado fondos millonarios para

In speaking to those in attendance, Rep. It's going to take some time and there will be some bumps in the road as the city embarks on a new municipal election system, but this new system will be a tremendous asset to current and future Haverhill generations and those who wish to serve. I thank the Coalition for their steadfast work."

Luego, en 2020, cuando los niños más lo necesitaban, él y su amigo James Reynolds crearon la Liga Merrimack Valley Spartans.

Hoy, los Spartans tienen más de 170

ninos en 5 equipos de fútbol de 5 a 14 años y 3 equipos de porristas. Vienen de Methuen, Lawrence, Haverhill y Andover y pertenecen a varias nacionalidades y grupos lingüísticos.

José está muy orgulloso de que lo más importante de sus reuniones es lo que aprenden de los adultos: modales, comportamiento, convivencia, respeto y responsabilidad. Se les hace sentir importantes colocándolos primero en todo. Si tienen un banquete, los miembros comen primero, luego los adultos.

En tan poco tiempo, recibieron apoyo de la Fundación del condado de Essex, la Fundación Andona en Andover y Commonwealth Motors con Charles Daher, Jr. como entrenador voluntario para sus propios hijos y sus juegos tienen lugar en los terrenos de la Greater Lawrence Technical School por cuatro días a la semana durante el verano.

José es muy conocido en Methuen porque fue nombrado Enlace Comunitario de la Policía y ahora está viviendo un sueño al guiar a esta generación a amar el deporte que él adora.



Leaders are born, not made. Look at any schoolyard

Sometimes, living conditions don't reflect the dreams and aspirations of children. They tend to dream in silence, especially when they are old enough to realize that their families cannot afford to make them possible.

Most often, they just want to join the football team in their school and even that is unattainable due to its cost. That was the story of José Santiago, who grew up in the Stadium Projects in Lawrence and his family could not afford the \$75 joining fee. His father wanted him to play baseball

because it was within their means. But football was his passion for him and he couldn't stop thinking about it.

José grew up, became a police officer in the City of Methuen, and had children of his own. When they were old enough, he started teaching them his love for the game and soon became their trainer. Then, in 2020, when children needed it most, he and his friend James Reynolds created the League Merrimack Valley Spartans.

Today, the Spartans have more than 170 children in 5 football teams from 5 to

14 years of age and 3 cheerleading teams. They come from Methuen, Lawrence, Haverhill, and Andover and belong to several nationalities and language groups.

José is very proud that the most important part of their meetings is what they learn from the adults: manners, behavior, getting along with others, respect, and responsibility. They are made to feel important by placing them first in everything. If they have a banquet, the members eat first, then the adults.

In such a short time, they have

received support from the Essex County Foundation, The Andona Foundation in Andover, and Commonwealth Motors with Charles Daher, Jr. volunteering as a trainer for his own children and their games take place at Greater Lawrence Technical School's field four days each week during the summer months.

José is well-known in Methuen because he was named Community Liaison By the Police Department and he's now living a dream by guiding this generation to love the sport that he adores.

Running the Campus: Happy Mother's Day

This Mother's Day arrives after a week of reflections about mothers in my life.

I was adopted.

My biological parents were young when I was born, and made the generous but difficult decision to bring me into the world and share me with someone else to raise me.

I lived for a while with a foster family. A short journal and a first birthday card (without names) are the only objects I have that connect me with a foster mother, father, and five siblings, who I never met again.

My genes were a mystery until I was in my thirties and met my biological parents and siblings. Suddenly, my family tree grew a lot bigger, filled with colorful characters and fascinating lessons about nature and nurture.

Just over eleven years ago, on April 30, 2012, I was inaugurated as president of Northern Essex Community College--which was one of the happiest moments of my life.

But the night before, April 29, was a quieter, even more joyful one.

This picture was taken when, for the first time, over dinner in my home, my (adoptive) mother and father, Judy and Ray Glenn, met my (biological) mother and father, Lisa Carlson and Doug Riley.

To this day, that picture holds a special place in my heart.

Two years later, on May 5, we lost Mom (Judy). This past week marks the ninth anniversary of her passing.

So, this Mother's Day, I am revisiting a story I shared about her in October 2014. I hope you enjoy it, and that it reminds you of all of the wonderful things about the moms in your life.

Family Dinner

My mother used to say that I learned how to cook in self-defense.

Don't get me wrong. The meals I grew up on weren't actually deadly. But Mom knew her strengths and competencies, and when it came to household chores, she

recognized that she was better at gardening, decorating, cleaning—anything other than cooking.

My sister and I never went hungry, and Mom meant well, but things just didn't always go as planned.

When I was six years old, Mom tried to teach me to make a grilled cheese sandwich (my favorite lunch). I buttered a couple slices of Wonder bread, unwrapped the Kraft American cheese slice, piled it all in the skillet on the stove, and watched it sizzle.

Mom, meanwhile, had turned away for a moment without telling me that skillets get hot on a stove. I smelled my lunch burning, reached in to flip it over, and scalded my fingertips.

I insisted on cold lunches for a while after that (which I ate left-handed).

For most of my childhood, I remember a lot of Fruit Loops, bologna sandwiches, frozen Banquet fried chicken, and Swanson turkey pot pies.

And then there was Sunday dinner.

Whatever injuries or indignities we may have suffered at mealtime during the rest of the week, we knew we had something to look forward to Sunday evening: Mom's famous "Meat, Potatoes, and Corn."

It was all we could ask for in a dinner. It was nutritionally balanced, offering a serving of protein, carbohydrates, and vegetables.

It was flavorful. The rest of the week, salt and pepper were the spiciest things to sprinkle on food. I didn't discover garlic, oregano, paprika, or curry until years later in college. But in the meantime, Sundays included exotic seasonings like A-1 and Worcestershire sauce!

And there was even some variety. The corn might be microwaved from a bag, simmered out of a can, or boiled on the cob. Potatoes could be baked, mashed, scalloped, or French-fried.

And at the center of it all was a brisket, pork loin, or beef roast that simmered all afternoon in a huge antique, two-handled, hand-me-down, cast iron pot.

The pot once belonged to my



grandmother (on my father's side) who was an accomplished chef. Somehow, through years of concocting savory soups and stews, pastas, casseroles, and all manner of roasted meats, some of her kitchen mojo baked itself into that glorious vessel, and continued to bless our dinner table every Sunday evening.

Earlier this year, after a brave battle against cancer, heart disease, and the ailments of old age that will catch up with all of us eventually, Mom passed away. Although I hadn't thought about those special Sunday dinners in a while, I realized that I would never sit down to a plate of Mom's "Meat, Potatoes, and Corn" again.

Then, recently, I celebrated my birthday, and a big box from Texas appeared on my doorstep.

I hauled it into the house, opened it up, and found that old, battered and tarnished iron pot inside, carefully layered in bubble wrap, Styrofoam, and tissue as if it were the Holy Grail (which, to my sister and I, it was).

Taped to the lid was a note from my father that read:

"The last time you visited, your mom

said she wanted to give you the family cook pot on your next birthday. I am passing it on to you now. From Grandma and your mom, the cook pot is now yours, and you can make Meat, Potatoes, and Corn for Big Sis and Little Sis."

Well, Big Sis is a vegetarian, Little Sis (like me) enjoys some flavor in her food, and there was a cool autumn breeze blowing last weekend; so, we celebrated the third and fourth generations of cooking in Mom's pot with a Texas favorite: chili.



But if you're in the neighborhood next Sunday, stop by for some meat, potatoes, and corn.

And thanks, Mom.

¿Es su hijo o hija una víctima de Transgendersmo?

Después de leer un artículo sobre lo que está haciendo el Instituto Nacional de Salud (NIH) en este país, lo único que me vino a la mente fue el Dr. Josef Mengele, el "ángel de la muerte", que realizó experimentos médicos inhumanos y, a menudo, mortales en prisioneros en Auschwitz.

Se ha sabido que el Children's Hospital de Boston estaba realizando estas cirugías y cuando lo mencioné hubo algunos que cuestionaron de dónde saco mi información. Simplemente los remitió a su página web donde describen todos sus servicios a esa población.

Ahora, para aquellos que dudaron de mi palabra, los referiré a una publicación en The Daily Signal, Republicans Demand Answers From NIH on Transgender Youth 'Experiments' Study That Left 2 Dead, Other Sterilized, por Tyler O'Neil, con fecha de mayo 9, 2023.

El artículo dice en parte que los Institutos Nacionales de Salud otorgaron \$477,444 en una subvención de cinco años al Hospital Infantil de Boston, la Universidad de California en San Francisco y el Hospital Infantil Lurie de Chicago para el estudio, Funcionamiento Psicosocial en Jóvenes Transgénero después 2 años tomando hormonas. Esto fue publicado por el New England Journal of Medicine publicado en enero.

"El estudio analizó a 315 participantes, identificados como transgénero y no binarios, entre las edades de 12 y 20 años, en el transcurso de dos años. Estos participantes recibieron "hormonas de afirmación de género", es decir, hormonas para hacer que sus cuerpos masculinos o femeninos se parezcan a los cuerpos del sexo opuesto.

Johanna Olson, del Children's Hospital de Boston, "llegó a afirmar que los niños pueden conocer su identidad de género desde el útero", según el artículo. Más

tarde, recibió una subvención federal para permitir que niños de hasta 8 años recibieran hormonas del sexo opuesto.

Nunca esperábamos algo así en este país, permitir que los jóvenes sean utilizados en un experimento de este tipo que provocó que dos de ellos se suicidaran y el resto probablemente quedara estéril como resultado. En entrevistas televisivas hemos visto casos de arrepentimiento cuando les han mutilado los senos y los genitales, solo para darse cuenta de que han cometido un gran error. Si son mayores de edad, son responsables de sus acciones, pero exponer a los niños a eso, usarlos para obtener una subvención del gobierno es imperdonable.

Los 15 republicanos de la Cámara y el Senado señalan los dos suicidios y 11 episodios de ideación suicida.

Dijeron en su carta: "A pesar de la abrumadora evidencia de que los niños en transición química no son seguras, los NIH planean dar más de \$10.6 millones para experimentar con niños y adolescentes hasta el 2026", y continuaron: "Estamos profundamente preocupados por el uso de dólares de los contribuyentes para avanzar en experimentos con niños que serán dañados irreversiblemente por la ideología de género radical".

"El dinero de los contribuyentes no debe usarse para financiar estudios que alienten las intervenciones de transición de género en los jóvenes", dijo el Senador Ted Budd de Carolina del Norte a The Daily Signal en un comunicado el lunes. "El NIH debe rendir cuentas por usar el dinero de los contribuyentes para estudiar estos experimentos altamente cuestionables".

Mientras tanto, mi pregunta es si los padres están al tanto de lo que se les enseña a sus hijos en la escuela, qué conversaciones tienen con los maestros y consejeros que pueden ser objetables, y si alguna vez les han dicho que guarden secretos de sus padres.

Los padres no pueden enviar a sus hijos a la escuela con la confianza de que se les enseñará de acuerdo con nuestras creencias; en cambio, sus mentes y cuerpos están siendo envenenados. Puede que no sea una práctica en su ciudad o en la escuela de su hijo, pero debe asegurarse de que no esté sucediendo haciendo preguntas.

Is your son or daughter a victim of Transgenderism?

After reading an article on what the National Institute for Health (NIH) is doing in this country, the only thing that came to mind was Dr. Josef Mengele the "angel of death" who conducted inhumane, and often deadly, medical experiments on prisoners at Auschwitz.

The issue of transgender affairs is in the news often and I don't talk about it because I don't have an opinion when it involves adults. On December 8, 2022, my column mentioned the system used in the public schools system all over the country instructing children from an early age on sexual issues.

It has been known that Children's Hospital in Boston was performing these surgeries and when I mentioned it, there were some who questioned from where I get my information. I simply referred them to their webpage describing all of their services to that population.

Now, for those who doubted my word, I'll refer them to a publication in The Daily Signal, Republicans Demand Answers From NIH on Transgender Youth 'Experiments' Study That Left 2 Dead, Others Sterilized, by Tyler O'Neil, dated May 9, 2023.

The article says in part, The National Institutes of Health granted \$477,444 in a five-year grant to the Boston Children's Hospital, the University of California at San Francisco, and the Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago for the study, Psychosocial Functioning in Transgender Youth after 2 Years of Hormones. This was published by the New England Journal of Medicine published in January.

"The study analyzed 315 participants, identified as transgender and nonbinary, between the ages of 12 and 20, over the course of two years. These participants received "gender-affirming hormones," i.e. hormones to make their male or female bodies resemble bodies of the opposite sex.

Johanna Olson of the Children's Hospital in Boston "went as far as to claim that children can know their gender identity from the womb," according to the article.

She was later given a federal grant to allow children as young as 8 years old to receive cross-sex hormones.

We never expected something like this in this country, allowing young people to be used in such an experiment causing two of them to commit suicide and the rest probably sterile as a result. In television interviews we have seen cases of regret when they had breasts and genitals have been mutilated, only to realize that they have made a big mistake. If they are of adult age, they are responsible for their actions but exposing children to that, using them to get a government grant is unforgivable.

The 15 Republicans from the House and Senate note the two suicides and 11 episodes of suicidal ideation.

They said in their letter, "Despite overwhelming evidence that chemically transitioning children is not safe, the NIH plans to give more than \$10.6 million to experiment on children and adolescents through 2026," and continued, "We are deeply concerned about your agency's use of taxpayer dollars to advance experiments on children who will be irreversibly harmed by radical gender ideology."

"Taxpayer dollars should not be used to fund studies that encourage gender transition interventions on young people," Senator Ted Budd of North Carolina told The Daily Signal in a statement Monday. "The NIH must be held accountable for using taxpayer dollars to study these highly questionable experiments."

Meanwhile, my question is if parents are aware of what their children are being taught in school, what conversations they are having with teachers and counselors that may be objectionable, and whether they have ever been told to keep secrets from their parents?

Parents cannot send their children to school in confidence that they will be taught according to our beliefs; instead, their minds and bodies are being poisoned. It may not be a practice in your city or your child's school but you have to make sure that it's not happening by asking questions.

And, where are the churches on this?

Percy is the first NECC student since 2011 to receive the scholarship. She worked closely with the Pathways for Academic and Career Excellence (PACE) program Director Kristen Arnold and PACE Transfer Advisor Jessica Rocker to submit the application.

"As a mom, it was immediately clear to me that this educational journey she was on was not a solo mission," remarked Arnold. "She works so hard, not only for herself but for the desire to secure a better future for her entire family. We're so proud of her and all that she has achieved in her time at Northern Essex."

The PACE program serves first-generation college students and students with financial need. PACE is a Student Support Services program funded by a



TRIO grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

Percy is currently exploring her options and will likely transfer to UMass Lowell or Merrimack College. "It's amazing the turn my life took because I gave myself a chance to try, and I took the opportunity that presented itself to me. Thanks to the support of the PACE team, who encouraged me not to limit my dreams and my efforts."

Along with financial support, new Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholars will receive comprehensive educational advising to guide them through the process of transitioning to a four-year college and preparing for their careers. Scholars will additionally receive opportunities for internships, study abroad, and graduate school funding, as well as connection to a thriving network of more than 3,000 Cooke Scholars and Alumni.

This year, more than 1,700 students from 448 community colleges applied to receive the Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. The Foundation evaluated each submission based on students' academic ability and achievement, financial need, persistence, and leadership.

From My Corner

A tax is a tax, is a tax!

The Haverhill Latino Coalition is growing in Haverhill and anytime Latinos get together to exercise their voice I cheer for them. It has taken a long time for them to mobilize but they seem to be on the right track, contrary to Lawrence where several groups have started something and then disappeared. Either, they didn't get the support needed or became politicized and disbanded.

The purpose of that meeting on May 7th was to make the community aware of the upcoming vote for the June 6th election for the new Consentino School. They tell me that the information was vague and the public didn't learn about what a YES vote will mean.

A simple way of putting it is that it's not an increase on the regular property tax but it is a separate account for which they all will have to pay annual taxes. This is important for everyone to understand.

Notice in the two pictures that there has been no effort to educate the Spanish-speaking community on what that means. This is obviously an effort executed by a group that wants everyone to vote in favor of what they support.

At first, Mayor James Fiorentini said there is no need for that additional tax although it will be tight for the city budget. He now said that he will vote YES. After all, it's a citizen's initiative and he cannot be blamed for it.

They also discussed the changes taking place as a result of all of Haverhill's elected officials now having two-year terms under Haverhill's home-rule petition approved last year by the legislature.

The presenters didn't do their homework before preparing their PowerPoint presentation or didn't know what they were doing. The board said that city councilors will be serving for four years and the school committee members for two years. Under the changes approved, both city councilors and school committee will have two-year terms.

The most surprising part was that the city clerk and some councilors in attendance didn't correct them.

I guess that educating the people is not a priority in their minds.

Gender studies

There seems to be an enormous effort in this country to accept that people can change their gender at will and since not too much is written or talked about, I wrote an article on page 11 that I hope you take the time to read.

For me, it was a big discovery finding

how the government is behind the horror stories involving these people. The National Institute of Health (NIH) is providing grants for experiments with young people, some starting at 8 years of age.

The results have been disastrous. They recognized that two subjects committed suicide and the rest (males and females) are at risk of becoming infertile as a result of the hormones they are being fed.

The biggest part of the scandal is that children are told to keep it secret from their parents that they are part of this. Some schools have created after-school programs called "Art Class" so no one would suspect.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) has plenty of information on its website under "LGBTQ Inclusivity in Schools: A Self-Assessment Tool," and it appears on the CDC's youth website in a section labeled "For Schools" and under the drop-down label "Tools for Supporting LGBTQ Youth."

Teachers, administrators, school health staff, and others are urged to advocate LGBT causes in school.

Some states have taken measures against school systems to prevent or prohibit these things from happening; others have enacted laws prohibiting certain books available to young children. There's a campaign against them calling it "book banning" when in reality, the books have not been banned for older people.

Another aspect is that we must tolerate LGBTQ members by force. I've had good friends who happen to be gay and treated them as what they were: good friends. Today, a negative comment about this thrust can get anyone in trouble – and it's everywhere.

The Governor of Oklahoma, Kevin Stitt, recently vetoed a bill that would have renewed the license and provided millions in funding for the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority, the statewide PBS network that reaches more than 650,000 viewers a week.


Gov. Stitt took issue with what he alleged was LGBTQ-inclusive programming on the station, claiming that it amounted to the "indoctrination and over-sexualizing of our children."

And check out Nickelodeon; parents now claim that their programming is geared in the same way.

Why is this happening? Can we allow our children to grow up with healthy minds and let them decide when they become aware and understand what they want to do? After all, the gay population in the United States is 7.2% and the transsexual is 1.8%.




No. But keep in mind that it's difficult for us to accommodate any work beyond 48" in height or width.

Las mujeres hispanas se enfrentan a desigualdades que afectan los resultados en salud materna



La American Heart Association lanzó una campaña para mujeres hispanas/latinas que se centra en la importancia de controlar la presión arterial durante el embarazo.

La enfermedad cardiovascular es la principal causa de muerte entre las madres primerizas. La American Heart Association, mediante la nueva campaña llamada "My health is our health"/"Mi salud es nuestra salud", busca generar conciencia entre las madres hispanas/latinas, especialmente durante el embarazo, sobre la importancia de controlar su presión arterial. En promedio, alrededor de 1 de cada 16 mujeres hispanas a partir de los 20 años padece una enfermedad coronaria, la enfermedad cardíaca más común.

Las madres hispanas/latinas tienen un lugar especial en sus hogares cuando se trata de decisiones familiares. Se les considera como la cabeza de la familia debido a su función fundamental en la crianza de sus hijos y en la enseñanza a las generaciones más jóvenes. Más del 61% de las madres hispanas/latinas también son parte de la fuerza laboral de EE.UU. Tienen que lidiar con varias funciones, desde las responsabilidades familiares, que en muchas ocasiones involucran el cuidado de sus padres de edad avanzada, hasta trabajos exigentes, muchos de ellos con una remuneración baja. A menudo, estas responsabilidades las dejan con menos tiempo para priorizar su salud. De hecho, los resultados clínicos adversos relacionados con enfermedades cardiovasculares afectan de forma desproporcionada a las madres hispanas/latinas. Estos resultados adversos del parto relacionados con enfermedades cardiovasculares han ido en aumento en

EE.UU., lo que ha aumentado la disparidad racial y étnica. Las madres hispanas/latinas priorizan el cuidado de su propia salud no solo por beneficios personales, sino por la salud de sus hijos.

El objetivo de la campaña de concientización de la Asociación es alcanzar y lograr la participación de mujeres latinas mediante redes sociales, herramientas y recursos que se comparten a través de alianzas estratégicas para apoyar a las mujeres durante todas las etapas del cuidado materno, el cual empieza con la importancia de controlar su presión arterial. La presión arterial es el signo vital fundamental para detectar trastornos hipertensivos en el embarazo, como la preeclampsia. De hecho, las mujeres hispanas pueden desarrollar presión arterial alta a temprana edad y tener un promedio más alto de presión arterial en relación con otros grupos étnicos que no son de raza Negra, de acuerdo con los Centros para el Control y la Prevención de Enfermedades.

Las mujeres pueden medir su presión arterial en el hogar con frecuencia e informar a su profesional médico, farmacéutico o médico de confianza si sus niveles se encuentran a menudo por sobre 120/80 mmHg, lo que para la Asociación corresponde al umbral basado en evidencia de presión arterial elevada. Mantener un estilo de vida que favorezca la presión arterial saludable, como dormir lo suficiente, realizar una cantidad adecuada de ejercicio, comer alimentos saludables para el corazón, mantener un peso saludable y no fumar, pueden ser de gran utilidad a fin de reducir el riesgo de que las mujeres desarrollen enfermedades cardiovasculares.

La American Heart Association, una fuerza global que tiene el objetivo de lograr vidas más largas y saludables para todos, recomienda a las madres latinas que den el primer paso para tener un corazón sano. Para ello, deben acudir a la clínica, el consultorio del médico o su farmacia local a fin de comprobar sus niveles de presión arterial y aprender cómo controlar y mantener su presión arterial bajo control en casa. - If you see a downed power line, keep away from it and anything it may be in contact with. Downed lines should be immediately reported by calling National Grid at **1-800-465-1212** or **911**
- Generators used to supply power during an outage must be operated outdoors to prevent the buildup of deadly carbon monoxide. Before operating a generator, be sure to disconnect from National Grid's system by shutting off the main breaker, located in the electric service panel. De cosas regias y humanas

Como muchos de nosotros, me sentí atraído por las ceremonias que rodearon la reciente coronación de Carlos Felipe Arturo Jorge, Príncipe de Gales, como Carlos III, Rey de Inglaterra. Es un evento único en la vida. Bueno, dos veces quizás, ¿quién está contando?

No tuve la paciencia para permanecer pegado a una pantalla de televisión mientras ocurrían los eventos, pero afortunadamente tengo las conexiones de cable que me permitieron grabarlos y verlos más tarde a nuestra conveniencia.

Este artículo no es un refrito de lo que vi o creo que vi. En realidad, es un comentario sobre el contexto de la sociedad británica que permitió que tuviera lugar la coronación.

Como muchos otros en Estados Unidos, podría convertirme en multimillonario si trabajara lo suficiente, me casara con riqueza, o tuviera la suerte de comprar un boleto de lotería ganador, pero no hay manera en el cielo de que alguna vez nos convirtamos en reyes o reinas.

Había cerca de un millón de personas rodeando el área de los palacios y la iglesia involucrados en este espectáculo. La iglesia era la Abadía de Westminster, el palacio el Palacio de Buckingham, y el transporte de ida y vuelta un coche llamado Gold State Coach, una reliquia de 261 años de antigüedad que usted y yo nos negaríamos a conducir para viajar al trabajo porque es demasiado incómodo. Puede ser divertido que los caballos tiren del carro, pero no porque dé tantos saltos. Había miles en la multitud, jóvenes y viejos, con coronas

de cartón dorado o cascós plateados con símbolos británicos pintados. Y un montón de banderas ondeando en el aire. Definitivamente fue un momento británico de orgullo.

En Estados Unidos votamos por nuestros líderes. También es un lugar donde siempre nos quejamos de aquellos por los que elegimos votar, incluido el ataque a nuestra cámara del Congreso para invalidar ese voto cuando cambiamos de opinión. Los británicos no votan por su rey. Es una persona que resulta ser descendiente de un monarca anterior y ha heredado la distinción. Cuando nacen, alguien ya lleva el título. Y el Rey (Reina) reina pero no gobierna. Hay ciudadanos en Inglaterra que podrían vivir sin la monarquía y lo que cuesta, muchos de ellos expresándolo violentamente a veces, pero hay muchos más que se van a la cama todas las noches agradecidos de que la cabeza de la corona todavía esté cerca para usarla. Y en el momento en que la persona coronada muere, la gente se pone ansiosa por gritar: ¡Viva el Rey o la Reina! de nuevo, según sea el caso.

Me hace preguntarme si debemos tener ídolos reales en el cielo antes de que podamos apreciar a los humanos simples que tenemos de vecinos. La persona que lleva la corona inglesa también lleva la cabeza de su Iglesia Anglicana. Son como los Papas. Y ver los rituales de las ceremonias religiosas anglicanas nos recordó las misas tradicionales de la Iglesia Católica Romana, vino y comunión incluidos.

Tal similitud es la ruptura histórica de la monarquía inglesa con la gente de

Roma. Fue el deseo del rey Enrique VIII (1509-1547) de tener un heredero varón el conocido ímpetu detrás de sus muchas esposas y algunas de sus muertes prematuras la razón por la que él y su corte pidieron al Papa Clemente VII en 1530 la anulación de su primer matrimonio con Catalina de Aragón. El rey deseaba pasar a una novia nueva y más joven que pudiera darle un hijo.

Esta batalla real entre Enrique y Clemente resultó en que la iglesia inglesa rompiera con la iglesia católica y siguiera su propio camino. Otro Enrique, llamado Enrique IV de Francia (1553-1610), fue por el otro lado, cuando cambió del protestantismo al catolicismo tratando de salvar a la Francia católica. La historia está


llena de contradicciones, pero también lo están sus actores, usted y yo incluidos.

Parece que los británicos han evitado esa elección y la han simplificado con las cosas regias.

Y ese es mi punto de vista humano hoy. ¡Abur!

Of Regal and Humanly things

Like many of us, I felt attracted to the ceremonies surrounding the recent coronation of Charles Philip Arthur George, Prince of Wales, as Charles III, King of England. It is a once-in-a-lifetime event. Well, twice perhaps, who is counting?

I didn't have the patience to remain glued to a television screen while the events took place, but fortunately, I have the cable connections that allowed me to record them and watch them later at our convenience.

This article is not a rehash of what I saw or think I saw. It is actually a commentary on the context of the British society that allowed the coronation to take place.

Like many others in America, I could become a multimillionaire if I worked hard enough, married right enough, or were lucky enough to buy a winning lottery ticket, but there is no way in heaven that most of us will ever become kings..., or queens.

There were close to one million people surrounding the area of the Palaces and church involved in this pageantry. The church was Westminster Abbey, the palace Buckingham Palace, and the transport back and forth was a coach dubbed Gold State Coach, a 261-year-old relic you and I would refuse to drive to commute because it is too uncomfortable. It may be fun that horses pull the carriage, but not because it is bumpy. There were thousands in the crowd, young and old, wearing golden cardboard crowns or silver helmets with painted Union jacks. And plenty of waving flags in the air. It was definitely a proud British moment.

In America, we vote for our leaders. It is also a place where we are always complaining about those we choose to vote for, including attacking our House of Congress to invalidate that vote when we change our minds. The British don't vote for their king. It is a person who happens to be a descendant of a previous monarch and has inherited the distinction. When they are born, someone is already wearing the top title. And the King (Queen) reigns but does not rule. There are citizens in England who could live without the monarchy and what it costs, many of them expressing it violently sometimes, but there are much more who

go to bed every night thankful that the head of the crown is still around to wear it. And the moment that crowned person dies, the people become anxious to scream: Long Live the King, or Queen! again, as the case may be.

It makes me wonder if we must have regal idols in heaven before we can appreciate simple humans next door. The person who wears the English crown also wears the head of their Anglican Church. They are like Popes. And watching the rituals of the Anglican religious ceremonies reminded us of the traditional masses of the Roman Catholic Church, wine and host communion included.

Such similarity is the historical breakup of the English monarchy and people from Rome. It was King Henry (1509-1547) VIII's desire to have a male heir the well-known impetus behind his many wives and some of their untimely demises the reason he and his court asked Pope Clement VII in 1530 for the annulment of his first marriage to Catherine of Aragon. The king wished to move on to a new, younger bride who might be able to deliver him a son.

This Regal battle between Henry and Clement resulted in the English church breaking from the Catholic church and going its own way. Another Henry, called Henry IV of France (1553-1610), went the other way when he changed from Protestantism to Catholicism trying to save Catholic France. History is full of contradictions, but so are its actors, you, and me included.

This duality in the nature of the British monarch means that we can address the crown when we want to pray, and we can also address that crown when we want to retire and start collecting a pension. Wouldn't you feel safe if you had that choice? In Mark 12:17, Jesus is quoted as having said, "Well, then, give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and give to God what belongs to God". It seems that the British have avoided that choice and made it simpler with Regal things.

And that is my human Point of View today. So Long!

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
