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Haverhill native continues a 123-year tradition of service under the sea

PEARL HARBOR – Submariners make up only 10 percent of the U.S. Navy's personnel, but they play a critical role in carrying out one of the Defense Department's most important missions: strategic deterrence. Petty Officer 2nd Class Michael McAuliffe, a native of Haverhill, Massachusetts, is one of the sailors continuing a 123-year tradition of service under the sea to help ensure Americans' safety.

McAuliffe joined the Navy five years ago and today serves as a torpedoman's mate aboard USS Minnesota.

"I joined the Navy as third generation Navy, and second generation submarines as part of a family tradition," said McAuliffe.

Growing up in Haverhill, McAuliffe attended Whittier Regional Vocational Technical High School and graduated in 2018.

Skills and values similar to those found in Haverhill are similar to those required to succeed in the military.

"My parents taught me working hard pays off, they inspired me to get a job when I was young," said McAuliffe. "I got early experience working at a construction company during high school."

These lessons have helped McAuliffe while serving in the Navy.

Known as America's "Apex Predators!", the Navy's submarine force operates a large fleet of technically-advanced vessels. These submarines are capable of conducting rapid defensive and offensive operations around the world, in furtherance of U.S. national security.

There are three basic types of submarines: fast-attack submarines (SSN), ballistic-missile submarines (SSBN) and guided-missile submarines (SSGN).

Fast-attack submarines are designed to hunt down and destroy enemy submarines and surface ships; strike targets ashore with cruise missiles; carry and deliver Navy SEALs; conduct intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance missions; and engage in mine warfare. The Virginia-class SSN is the most advanced submarine in the world today. It combines stealth and payload capability to meet Combatant Commanders' demands in this era of strategic competition.

The Navy's ballistic-missile submarines, often referred to as "boomers," serve as a strategic deterrent by providing an undetectable platform for submarine-launched ballistic missiles. SSBNs are designed specifically for stealth, extended patrols and the precise delivery of missiles. The Columbia-class SSBN will be the largest, most capable and most advanced submarine produced by the U.S. - replacing the current Ohio-class ballistic-missile submarines to ensure continuous sea-based strategic deterrence into the 2080s.

Guided-missile submarines provide the Navy with unprecedented strike and special operation mission capabilities from a stealthy, clandestine platform. Each SSGN is capable of carrying 154 Tomahawk cruise missiles, plus a complement of heavyweight torpedoes to be fired through four torpedo tubes.

"Our mission remains timeless - to

provide our fellow citizens with nothing less than the very best Navy: fully combat ready at all times, focused on warfighting excellence, and committed to superior leadership at every single level," said Adm. Mike Gilday, Chief of Naval Operations. "This is our calling. And I cannot imagine a calling more worthy."

Strategic deterrence is the nation's ultimate insurance program, according to Navy officials. As a member of the submarine force, McAuliffe is part of a rich history of the U.S. Navy's most versatile weapons platform, capable of taking the fight to the enemy in defense of America and its allies.

"The Navy is important to national

security because we control the ocean and keep it safe," said McAuliffe. "The submarines are the silent service of the Navy, our whole job is to be quiet."

With 90 percent of global commerce traveling by sea and access to the internet relying on the security of undersea fiber optic cables, Navy officials continue to emphasize that the prosperity of the United States is directly linked to trained sailors and a strong Navy.

McAuliffe and the sailors they serve with have many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during their military service.

"My proudest accomplishment in the Navy getting my submarine warfare pin

also known as 'Dolphins,'" said McAuliffe.

As McAuliffe and other sailors continue to train and perform missions, they take pride in serving their country in the United States Navy.

"Serving in the Navy is about being involved in something bigger than myself and being a leader of a great group of sailors," said McAuliffe.

McAuliffe is grateful to others for helping make a Navy career possible.

"I would like to thank my Dad for inspiring me to join the Navy," added McAuliffe. "My brother and I actually joined together and went to boot camp together through the buddy program."

El nativo de Haverhill continúa una tradición de 123 años de servicio bajo el mar

PEARL HARBOR: Los submarinistas representan solo el 10 por ciento del personal de la Marina de los EE.UU., pero realizan un papel fundamental en el desempeño de una de las misiones más importantes del Departamento de Defensa: la disuasión estratégica. El suboficial de segunda clase Michael McAuliffe, nativo de Haverhill, Massachusetts, es uno de los marineros que continúa una tradición de 123 años de servicio bajo el mar para ayudar a garantizar la seguridad de los estadounidenses.

McAuliffe se unió a la Armada hace cinco años y hoy se desempeña como oficial de torpedo a bordo del USS Minnesota.

"Me uní a la Armada como la Armada de tercera generación y los submarinos de segunda generación como parte de una tradición familiar", dijo McAuliffe.

Al crecer en Haverhill, McAuliffe asistió a la Escuela Secundaria Técnica Vocacional Regional de Whittier y se graduó en 2018.

Las habilidades y los valores similares a los que se encuentran en Haverhill son similares a los que se requieren para tener éxito en el ejército.

"Mis padres me enseñaron que trabajar duro da sus frutos, me inspiraron a conseguir un trabajo cuando era joven", dijo McAuliffe. "Obtuve experiencia temprana trabajando en una empresa de construcción durante la escuela secundaria".

Estas lecciones han ayudado a McAuliffe mientras servía en la Marina.

Conocidos como los "Apex Predators" de Estados Unidos, la fuerza de submarinos de la Armada opera una gran flota de embarcaciones técnicamente avanzadas. Estos submarinos son capaces de realizar operaciones defensivas y ofensivas rápidas en todo el mundo, en apoyo de la seguridad nacional de los EE. UU.

Hay tres tipos básicos de submarinos: submarinos de ataque rápido (SSN), submarinos de misiles balísticos (SSBN) y submarinos de misiles guiados (SSGN).

Los submarinos de ataque rápido están diseñados para cazar y destruir submarinos y barcos de superficie enemigos; atacar objetivos en tierra con misiles de crucero; transportar y entregar Navy SEAL; realizar misiones de inteligencia, vigilancia y reconocimiento; y participar en la guerra de minas. El SSN de clase Virginia es el submarino más avanzado del mundo en la actualidad. Combina capacidad de sigilo y carga útil para satisfacer las demandas de los comandantes combatientes en esta era de competencia estratégica.

Los submarinos de misiles balísticos de la Armada, a menudo denominados "boomers", sirven como disuasión estratégica al proporcionar una plataforma indetectable para los misiles balísticos lanzados desde submarinos. Los SSBN están diseñados específicamente para sigilo, patrullas extendidas y la entrega precisa de misiles. El SSBN de la clase Columbia será el submarino más grande, más capaz y más avanzado producido por los EE.UU., reemplazando a los actuales submarinos de misiles balísticos de la clase Ohio para garantizar una disuasión estratégica continua en el mar hasta la década de 2080.

Los submarinos de misiles guiados brindan a la Marina capacidades de misión de operación especial y ataque sin precedentes desde una plataforma clandestina y sigilosa. Cada SSGN es capaz de transportar 154 misiles de crucero Tomahawk, además de un complemento de torpedos de peso pesado para ser disparados a través de cuatro tubos lanzatorpedos.

"Nuestra misión sigue siendo atemporal: brindar a nuestros conciudadanos nada menos que la mejor Armada: totalmente lista para el combate en todo momento, enfocada en la excelencia en la guerra y comprometida con un liderazgo superior en todos los niveles", dijo el Almirante Mike Gilday, jefe de Operaciones Navales. "Este es nuestro llamado. Y no puedo imaginar un

llamado más digno".

La disuasión estratégica es el último programa de seguros de la nación, según funcionarios de la Marina. Como miembro de la fuerza de submarinos, McAuliffe es parte de una rica historia de la plataforma de armas más versátil de la Marina de los EE.UU., capaz de llevar la lucha al enemigo en defensa de Estados Unidos y sus aliados.

"La Marina es importante para la seguridad nacional porque controlamos el océano y lo mantenemos seguro", dijo McAuliffe. "Los submarinos son el servicio silencioso de la Marina, todo nuestro trabajo es estar callados".

Dado que el 90% del comercio mundial viaja por mar y el acceso a Internet depende de la seguridad de los cables de fibra óptica submarinos, los oficiales de la Marina continúan enfatizando que la prosperidad de los Estados Unidos está directamente relacionada con marineros capacitados y una Marina fuerte.

McAuliffe y los marineros con los que sirven tienen muchas oportunidades de lograr frutos durante su servicio militar.

"Mi mayor logro en la Armada es obtener mi pin de guerra submarina, también conocido como 'Dolphins'", dijo McAuliffe.

Mientras McAuliffe y otros marineros continúan entrenando y realizando misiones, se enorgullecen de servir a su país en la Armada de los Estados Unidos.

"Servir en la Marina se trata de estar involucrado en algo más grande que yo y ser líder de un gran grupo de marineros", dijo McAuliffe.

McAuliffe agradece a los demás por ayudar a hacer posible una carrera en la Marina.

"Me gustaría agradecer a mi papá por inspirarme a unirme a la Marina", agregó McAuliffe. "De hecho, mi hermano y yo nos unimos y fuimos juntos al campo de entrenamiento a través del programa de amigos".

No vivimos en una burbuja; nos afecta todo lo que nos rodea para bien o para mal y deberíamos ser obstinados de una forma u otra, pero la gente guarda silencio.

Muchas cosas que me molestan y las traigo a colación en esta columna. Uno de ellos es la situación con el servicio de cable local. Todos pagamos más de \$5 cada mes por los canales PEG (Público, Educación y Gobierno) y no estamos obteniendo el valor de nuestro dinero.

No, no voy a hablar del canal Público o Comunitario. Si la administración no quiere hacer nada al respecto, mis quejas no pueden ser de ninguna ayuda. Pero el canal del Gobierno es el epítome de los insultos a esta comunidad.

Hace dos semanas dejó de funcionar el equipo del Ayuntamiento (llevaba mucho tiempo fallando y finalmente se rindió) y no han podido transmitir las reuniones del Concejo Municipal y sus comités. En mi opinión, esas han sido reuniones ilegales.

Mantenernos en la oscuridad es incorrecto. Muchas personas que realmente se preocupan por lo que sucede en esta ciudad y, como yo, miran religiosamente las reuniones por televisión o Facebook.

Entonces, llamé al alcalde durante su programa de radio el sábado pasado para quejarme y me respondió que eso es responsabilidad del presidente del concejo. No me molesté en llamar a Marc Laplante porque mi respuesta al alcalde fue que él es la máxima autoridad y que debe arreglarlo.

Algunas personas me han estado llamando para decirme que ha construido

un estudio de televisión en el tercer piso y transmite todas las tardes directamente a la República Dominicana y mientras la instalación continúa, el servicio en las salas del concilio se ha interrumpido.

Eso fue tan escandaloso que me presenté en la oficina el lunes (ayer) para comprobarlo yo misma. El alcalde estaba ocupado en su oficina con alguien, así que Claudia y Néstor me mostraron los alrededores, incluso los armarios y no había ni rastro de lo que me dijeron. Les mencioné que con la tecnología actual, podrían muy bien transmitir a cualquier lugar desde la sala de conferencias con solo usar un teléfono.

Cuando estábamos en la sala de conferencias, Néstor encendió el interruptor del aire acondicionado que estaba sobre la puerta, pero no se puso en marcha hasta que golpeó dos veces el suelo con el pie. Fue un poco de humor en medio de una conversación seria, pero me preguntaba por qué no lo han cambiado.

Ese era solo otro rumor de muchos, como el de que el Ayuntamiento cerraba todos los viernes por la tarde por las creencias religiosas del alcalde. En primer lugar, el Ayuntamiento está abierto todos los días hasta las 4:30 p.m., y eso no es parte de la religión del alcalde porque los viernes es cuando trabaja más tarde.

Créanme, si eso llegara a suceder, seré la primera en quejarme.

The invisible laws that led to America's housing crisis

In the 1910s, US cities began enacting policies that would shape neighborhoods and, unintentionally, lay the roots for the severe housing shortage today: single-family zoning laws.

Zoning laws, at their most basic, follow a simple concept. In one part of town, only factories can be built. In another section of town, only apartment buildings can be built. And in a different part of town, only single-family houses can be built.

Single-family zoning laws are unknown to most Americans, but they were instrumental to the expansion of urban areas and the suburban ideal of



owning a home with a front porch and backyard on a half-acre plot of land post-World War II... Zoning laws protected millions of Americans' home values, stopped development of projects that could turn small villages into larger towns and larger towns into cities, and delegated control to local homeowners and government over how land in their neighborhoods was used.

However, strict single-family zoning regulations limited housing supply, artificially raised prices, squandered the dream of homeownership for future generations, and blocked families from

moving into neighborhoods with better schools and job opportunities, researchers and advocates say.

More than a century after the first single-family zoning laws were passed, roughly 75% of land that is zoned for housing in American cities is for private, single-family homes, only.

"Zoning is key to understanding why housing is so expensive and why we're not providing housing to folks who need it," ...Yonah Freemark, the research director of the Urban Institute's Land Use Lab said.

Over the past three weeks our students explored the theme of "Leaving a Legacy" and experienced the importance of preserving our great city's history in the Lawrence History Center archives. The writing in the 2023 Rising Loaves Anthology, a treasure of thoughts and ideas, represents only a small sample of all the writing and art our students created together this summer. Students filled their personal notebooks with poetry, short stories, drawings, and ideas that they will take with them forever.

"Leaving Our Legacy" was a thought-provoking theme as we encouraged our students to think about their own legacy. We challenged them to think about how they could make a difference for future generations through their actions and words. Guest artists and writers such as Harlym 125, T-Melon, Nathan Baez, Nurylis Cintron, jayvie song, and Edwin Santana inspired our students to value and express their thoughts; during activity time, volunteer and teacher Sheila Barry taught some students to crochet while others put their passion towards playing volleyball. All students toured the Lawrence History Center and learned about the early planning of Lawrence by the Essex Company and viewed hidden vaults and archival documents with Kathy Flynn and Amita Kiley. Al Brandano of The Voice Library spoke to us about the importance of storytelling and recording the voices of our loved ones.

We visited the new exhibit, Somos Latinos: Our Journey to Lawrence and Beyond, at the Lawrence Heritage State Park with its community content team

director Sara Morin. In week two, UMass Lowell History Professor Robert Forrant taught us about the tragedy of the fall of Pemberton Mill in 1860 through the eyes of "The Ghost of Pemberton." Students then walked over to the site of the collapse and discussed who gets remembered and why?

We took a field trip to the Addison Gallery of American Art at Phillips Academy to view the current exhibition of the work of Alison Elizabeth Taylor, The Sum of It. Inspired by the art they had seen, students created art using the technique of marquetry with Christine Jee, the Addison's Manager of School & Community Collaborations, the following day.

In week three, we held an Amazing Race! Students divided into teams and solved crosswords, followed maps, located historic buildings in downtown Lawrence, ate tostones at El Taller, and returned to home base to solve another puzzle that earned them a special treat -- ice cream!

Special thanks to our brilliant youth writing leaders -- Gabrielle Anderson, Katerina Guerrero, Christian Pimentel, and Francine Tshimbanganga -- who led writing prompts and small group activities with our students with great talent and enthusiasm.

The final reading and the exhibition of student work on the last day was a day of celebration. There were fond farewells and promises to keep in touch. Our students were sad that the three weeks had flown by so quickly.

“I am thankful for Representative Morán’s continued efforts to provide state funding to the young people of Lawrence,”

Representative Morán secured a total of \$325,000 in funding through An Act relating to economic growth and relief for the Commonwealth, which was signed into law in November 2022 and included \$3.76 billion in critical funding to aid small businesses, promote workforce development, and provide financial support to the municipalities of Massachusetts.



Northern Essex Prepares for MassReconnect Program

With the signing of the state budget this week, Massachusetts Governor Maura Healey fulfilled one of her major campaign promises: free community college for the Commonwealth’s adults ages 25 and over. Dubbed MassReconnect, the program provides last-dollar support to those adult learners who have not already obtained a college degree. It covers tuition and fees and includes a stipend for books and materials.

“Workforce shortages have impacted nearly all sectors of our economy, but we have an incredible opportunity before us to train the next generation of workers and increase opportunities for all,” said Governor Healey during the budget process.

At Northern Essex Community College, preparations are underway to welcome these students. The program is available for the fall semester, which starts on September 6.

“The MassReconnect program is just what hundreds of thousands of adults in Massachusetts who started college and have not yet been able to complete their degrees need to help them cross that finish line, and it’s just what the state’s employers

need to help them fill in-demand jobs in our workforce,” said Northern Essex President Lane Glenn. “NECC looks forward to welcoming these students back to campus.”

Students who are new to the college are encouraged to apply and complete the 2023-2024 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form. The financial aid team will contact eligible students who are already enrolled, and students who previously enrolled at NECC but took some time off should contact enrollment services.

“Our college is a leader in innovative practices that honor the prior experiences of our learners and the care and concern of our faculty,” said Northern Essex Provost, Paul Beaudin. “MassReconnect at Northern Essex is being built upon a foundation that listens to the voices of our ‘more adult’ learners and reconnects them with their dreams for the future.”

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Guía de un psiquiatra para salir de la locura

La locura total se está aprovechando de nuestros hijos...

En todo nuestro país, se están cometiendo atrocidades en los consultorios médicos y en los quirófanos de los hospitales. Los niños y adolescentes físicamente sanos están siendo desfigurados permanentemente y, en ocasiones, esterilizados. Esos jóvenes dicen que son transgénero, y se supone que nosotros, sus padres, maestros, terapeutas y médicos, estamos de acuerdo con su autodiagnóstico y nos quedamos en un segundo plano mientras toman la decisión más importante de sus vidas: alterar sus cuerpos y nos dicen que es para "alinearlos" con sus mentes.


Las autoridades médicas, educativas y gubernamentales nos aconsejan que apoyemos el "viaje de género" de los niños que aún están en desarrollo, incluidas las intervenciones médicas con poca evidencia de mejora a largo plazo.

Esto no sería aceptable en ningún otro campo de la medicina. De hecho, los tratamientos que nuestras autoridades médicas y Washington llaman "cruciales" y "salvavidas" han sido prohibidos en lugares progresistas como Suecia, Finlandia y Gran Bretaña.

La Dra. Miriam Grossman es una psiquiatra de niños y adolescentes cuya práctica consiste en jóvenes identificados como trans y sus familias. En Lost in Trans Nation, implora a los padres que rechacen los consejos de los expertos en género y los políticos y que confíen en sus instintos, sus instintos paternales, frente a una avalancha de información errónea impulsada ideológicamente que los lleva a ellos y a sus hijos a tomar decisiones arriesgadas en las que pueden terminar en duelo por el resto de sus vidas.

Las creencias de que lo masculino y lo femenino son invenciones humanas; que se "asigna" arbitrariamente el sexo de un recién nacido; y que, como resultado, el niño requiere "afirmación" a través de intervenciones médicas: estas ideas están divorciadas de la realidad y, por lo tanto, son peligrosas, especialmente para los niños. La creencia central, que la biología puede y debe ser negada, es un repudio de la realidad y una burla de lo que enseña la ciencia dura sobre ser hombre y mujer.

La Dra. Grossman cree que los padres conocen mejor a su hijo; saben especialmente si tienen un hijo o una hija. Pero actualmente en nuestro país cuando se trata de identidad de género, todos saben mejor que mamá y papá. Las escuelas permiten a los estudiantes vivir una doble vida: Patrick en casa, Patti en la escuela. Los activistas les dicen a los niños que sus



amorosos hogares son "inseguros" cuando los padres expresan sus dudas sobre la nueva identidad del niño. Por negarse a ver a su hijo como su hija, los padres pueden ser denunciados a los servicios de protección, un hecho que puede conducir a la destrucción de una familia.

Lost in Trans Nation arma a los padres con las municiones para evitar o, si es necesario, luchar contra lo que muchas familias describen como el desafío más difícil de sus vidas. Los padres aprenderán qué decir y cómo, en casa, en la escuela y, si es necesario, a la policía cuando aparezcan en la puerta.

"No se deje sorprender como tantos padres que conozco", advierte Grossman, "sea proactivo y edúquese. Siéntase preparado y confiado para hablar sobre personas trans, no binarias o lo que sea que su hijo traiga a la mesa". Ya sea el reclamo "trans es tan común como el pelirrojo", o la proclamación "No soy tu hijo, soy tu hija", o la amenaza "¿Prefieres un hijo vivo o una hija muerta?", dice Grossman, ninguna familia es inmune y todos los padres deben estar preparados.

Ningún niño nace en el cuerpo equivocado, nos asegura la Dra. Grossman, sus cuerpos están bien; son sus vidas emocionales las que necesitan sanación. Ya sea que esté enfrentando una batalla de identidad de género en su hogar en este momento, o quiera prevenir una, necesita este libro para guiarlo a usted y a sus seres queridos fuera de la locura.

Lost in Trans Nation: A Child Psychiatrist's Guide Out of the Madness

Total Insanity is Preying on Our Children...

Throughout our country, atrocities are taking place in doctor's offices and hospital operating rooms. Physically healthy children and adolescents are being permanently disfigured and sometimes sterilized. Those youth say they're transgender, and we—their parents, teachers, therapists, and doctors—are supposed to agree with their self-diagnosis and take a back seat as they make the most consequential decision of their lives: to alter their bodies in order to, we are told, "align" them with their minds.

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Medical, educational, and government authorities advise us to support the "gender journeys" of still developing kids, including medical interventions with poor evidence of long-term improvement.

This would not be acceptable in any other field of medicine. Indeed, the treatments our medical authorities and Washington call "crucial" and "life-saving" have been banned in progressive Sweden, Finland, and Britain.

Dr. Miriam Grossman is a child and adolescent psychiatrist whose practice consists of trans-identified youth and their families. In Lost in Trans Nation, she implores parents to reject the advice of gender experts and politicians and trust their guts—their parental instincts—in the face of an onslaught of ideologically driven misinformation that steers them and their children toward risky decisions they may end up mourning for the rest of their lives.

The beliefs that male and female are human inventions; that the sex of a newborn is arbitrarily "assigned"; and that as a result the child requires "affirmation" through medical interventions—these ideas are divorced from reality and therefore hazardous, especially to children. The core belief—that biology can and should be denied—is a repudiation of reality and a mockery of what hard science teaches about being male and female.

Dr. Grossman believes that parents know their child best; they especially know if they have a son or daughter. But currently in our country when it comes to gender identity, everyone knows better than mom and dad. Schools enable students

to live double lives—Patrick at home, Patti at school. Activists tell kids their loving homes are "unsafe" when parents voice doubts about the child's new identity. For refusing to see their son as their daughter, parents might be reported to protective services, a development that can lead to a family's destruction.

Lost in Trans Nation arms parents with the ammunition to avoid, or, if necessary, fight what many families describe as the most difficult challenge of their lives. Parents will learn what to say and how—at home, at school, and if necessary, to police when they appear at the door.

"Don't be blindsided like so many parents I know," warns Grossman, "be proactive and get educated. Feel prepared and confident to discuss trans, nonbinary, or whatever your child brings to the dinner table." Whether it's the "trans is as common as red hair" claim, or the "I'm not your son, I'm your daughter" proclamation, or the "do you prefer a live son or a dead daughter" threat, says Grossman, no family is immune, and every parent must be prepared.

No child is born in the wrong body. Dr. Grossman reassures us, their bodies are just fine; it's their emotional lives that need healing. Whether you're facing a gender identity battle in your home right now, or want to prevent one, you need this book to guide you and your loved ones out of the madness.
