Policía arresta a seis por asalto en Sullivan Park

Como se informó, la investigación del incidente en Sullivan Park en North Parish Road el lunes, 4 de diciembre permanece activa. Como resultado de la investigación realizada por el Departamento de Policía de Lawrence, nueve jóvenes fueron identificados y acusados de la siguiente manera:

- Seis personas han sido arrestadas y acusadas de asalto y agresión con arma peligrosa y asalto con intención de asesinar
- Dos individuos tienen órdenes de arresto activas, uno acusado de asalto y agresión con arma peligrosa y asalto con intención de asesinar, y un segundo acusado de robo sin armas
- Un individuo será citado ante el tribunal por asalto y agresión

Estos individuos fueron detenidos por miembros de la Unidad de Delitos Callejeros de la Policía de Lawrence y la Unidad de Oficiales de Recursos Escolares de la Policía de Lawrence sin incidentes. La policía de Lawrence continúa buscando a los dos individuos con órdenes de arresto.

Como se enfatizó, la seguridad de los estudiantes de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence sigue siendo de suma importancia para el alcalde Brian A. Police arrested six for assault in Sullivan Park

As was reported, the investigation of the incident at Sullivan Park on North Parish Road on Monday, December 4th remains active. As a result of the investigation conducted by the Lawrence Police Department nine juvenile males were identified and charged as follows.

- Six individuals have been arrested and charged with Assault and Battery with a Dangerous Weapon and Assault with Intent to Murder.
- Two individuals have active warrants for their arrest, one being charged with Assault and Battery with a Dangerous Weapon and Assault with Intent to Murder, and a second charged with Unarmed Robbery
- One individual will be summonsed into court for Assault and Battery

These individuals were taken into custody by members Lawrence Police Street Crimes Unit and Lawrence Police School Resource Officer Unit without incident. Lawrence Police continue searching for the two individuals with arrest warrants.

As was emphasized, the safety of the students of the Lawrence Public Schools continues to be of paramount importance to Mayor Brian A. DePeña, Chief William Castro, Superintendent Juan Rodriguez, the members of the Lawrence Police Department, and, staff and leadership of the Lawrence Public Schools, as such we are committed to continue to work together with the public at large to achieve this goal.

POLICE ACTIVITY AT A GLANCE BY DISTRICT

November 1st, 2023, to December 1st, 2023

Through a new initiative instituted by Acting Chief William Castro, residents are now being informed of police activities in their neighborhoods by voting district. This new approach is meant to familiarize residents with the department's ongoing work in their area in a simplified way, as all residents know where their address appears on the city's voting district map.

From November 1st, 2023, to December 1st, 2023, the Lawrence Police Department received 4,612 calls for service, arrested 80 individuals on various crimes, and conducted 524 motor vehicle stops.

Incidente en Escuela Secundaria de Lawrence;

El lunes por la tarde, miembros de la Unidad de Oficiales de Recursos de la Escuela de Policía de Lawrence y la División de Patrulla acudieron al Parque Sullivan, que está ubicado junto al campus de la Escuela Secundaria Lawrence, por un informe de un hombre que había sido agredido. Al llegar se encontraron con un joven tirado en la cancha de baloncesto ubicada en el parque. Ese individuo estaba acompañado de otro menor de edad que tenía un corte reciente en el rostro. Mientras los dos menores estaban siendo tratados en el lugar por técnicos médicos de emergencia del Hospital General Lawrence, sus padres llegaron al lugar. Posteriormente, ambos menores fueron trasladados en ambulancia a ese centro.

Como resultado de una investigación realizada por la Unidad de Oficiales de Recursos de la Escuela de Policía de Lawrence, se identificaron cinco jóvenes varones. Con la ayuda de la Unidad de Delitos Callejeros de la Policía de Lawrence, tres de los menores fueron detenidos sin incidentes. Un cuarto individuo fue detenido sin incidentes esta mañana por la Unidad

de Oficiales de Recursos de la Escuela de Policía de Lawrence. Esta sigue siendo una investigación en curso y se anticipan más cargos.

El jefe de policía William Castro elogió a la Unidad de Oficiales de Recursos de la Escuela de Policía de Lawrence y a la División de Patrulla por su rápida respuesta y la investigación posterior que llevó a que estos individuos fueran acusados. Los responsables del incidente de ayer no eran estudiantes de Lawrence High School. Según la investigación hasta el momento, no se cree que se trate de un acto de violencia casual que no represente ninguna amenaza para el público en este momento.

La seguridad de los estudiantes de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence sigue siendo de suma importancia para el alcalde Brian A. DePeña, el jefe William Castro, el superintendente Juan Rodríguez, los miembros del Departamento de Policía de Lawrence y el cuerpo docente, el personal y el liderazgo de las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence como tal, estamos comprometidos a continuar trabajando junto con el público en general para lograr este objetivo.

Lawrence High School; Incident

On Monday afternoon members of the Lawrence Police School Resource Officer Unit and the Patrol Division responded to Sullivan Park, which is located adjacent to the Lawrence High School Campus, for a report of a male being assaulted. Upon arrival they encountered a juvenile male laying on the basketball court located in the park. That individual was accompanied by another juvenile male who had a fresh cut on his face. As the two juveniles were being treated on scene by emergency medical technicians from Lawrence General Hospital both of their parents arrived on scene. Both of the juveniles were subsequently transported by ambulance to that facility.

As a result of an investigation conducted by the Lawrence Police School Resource Officer Unit five juvenile males were identified. With the assistance of the Lawrence Police Street Crimes Unit three of the juvenile males were taken into custody without incident. A fourth individual was taken into custody without incident this

morning by the Lawrence Police School Resource Officer Unit. This remains an ongoing investigation, and further charges are anticipated.

Police Chief William Castro commanded the Lawrence Police School Resource Officer Unit and Patrol Division for their quick response, and the subsequent investigation which led to these individuals being charged. The individuals responsible for yesterday's incident were not students from Lawrence High School. Based on the investigation thus far this is not believed to be a random act of violence with no further threat to public at this time.

The safety of the students of the Lawrence Public Schools continues to be of paramount importance to Mayor Brian A. DePeña, Chief William Castro, Superintendent Juan Rodriguez, the members of Lawrence Police Department and the faculty, staff and leadership of the Lawrence Public Schools, as such we are committed to continue to work together with public at large to achieve this goal.

Lawrence, un desierto informativo

La semana pasada expliqué qué es un “desierto noticioso” y por qué Lawrence califica como tal. Sin acceso a las noticias locales, los residentes no saben cuándo llega el momento de tomar decisiones acertadas para su futuro y su ciudad.

Por suerte, esta semana hubo un artículo en el Boston Globe escrito por Amanda Milkovits y Edward Fitzpatrick sobre el gobernador de Rhode Island, Daniel McKee, anunciando el nombramiento de Bryant C. Da Cruz para la Comisión de Ética.

Selección de un nuevo Superintendente Escolar

Tómese el tiempo para leer una carta del concejal del Distrito C, Gregory Delrosario, insistiendo en que el público debe participar en la selección de un nuevo superintendente. Nos han dicho que se ha contratado a un grupo de Chicago para llevar a cabo una búsqueda nacional en lugar de buscar a alguien conocedor de esta ciudad y su gente, preferiblemente bilingüe y elegido por nosotros.

El miércoles pasado, la Junta de la Alianza para la Educación de Lawrence (LAE) se reunió en una reunión que no fue publicada entre los residentes, lo que resultó en una carta que publicamos en la página 12.

Han programado dos reuniones con miembros de la comunidad durante enero. No sé cuánta participación habrá ya que el grupo de Chicago está a cargo de la

La administración Healey-Driscoll otorga \$4,8 millones para apoyar la dotación de personal de seguridad pública

Como parte de un compromiso continuo para garantizar la seguridad de las comunidades en todo Massachusetts, la Administración Healey-Driscoll anunció hoy casi \$4,8 millones en subvenciones para apoyar a la policía municipal y los servicios de bomberos en 10 comunidades.

Diez ciudades recibieron fondos estatales a través del Programa de Dotación de Personal de Seguridad Pública Municipal de Massachusetts. Este programa ayuda a las comunidades elegibles con el costo de mantener suficiente personal en sus departamentos de policía y bomberos. "Estas subvenciones apoyan el trabajo de los socorristas que salvan vidas y ayudan a las agencias de seguridad pública a satisfacer las necesidades de aquellos a quienes sirven. Agradezco a la Legislatura por poner estos fondos a

disposición para apoyar los servicios de emergencia".

Healey-Driscoll Administration Awards \$4.8 Million to Support Public Safety Staffing

As part of an ongoing commitment to ensure the safety of communities across Massachusetts, the Healey-Driscoll Administration today announced nearly \$4.8 million in grant funding to support municipal police and fire services in 10 communities.

Ten cities received state funds through the Massachusetts Municipal Public Safety Staffing Program. This program assists eligible communities with the cost of maintaining sufficient staffing in their police and fire departments. By statute, eligibility is limited to municipalities with a population of at least 60,000 on the 2010 Census and whose police departments had an operating budget of less than \$200 per capita in 2010. The program awarded a total of \$4,799,696.48 to eligible communities.

"Through this investment, cities are able to maintain vital public safety services and provide mutual aid to neighboring towns," said Governor Maura Healey. "These grants support the life-saving work of first responders and help public safety agencies to meet the needs of those they serve. I'm grateful to the

Legislature for making these funds available to support emergency services."

"This program empowers local leaders to identify and direct funds toward staffing for police and fire departments to ensure sufficient community services are available," said Lt. Governor Kim Driscoll. "These grants reflect our administration's dedication to promoting public safety and keeping our communities safe."

"Local police and fire personnel are the first line of protection for our communities. Ensuring that public safety agencies can maintain staffing is essential to protecting our communities and keeping our residents safe," said Secretary of Public Safety and Security Terrence Reidy.

"Supporting municipal public safety agencies is central to our agency's mission of promoting safety and security across Massachusetts. These grants invest in the police and fire personnel who risk their lives to protect their communities. We're grateful to provide this funding to support them," said OGR Executive Director Kevin Stanton.

#2 Knights stay unbeaten with Stratton named HoopDirt.com home victory over MassBay, 77-62 JUCO Coach of the Week

Haverhill, MA (December 2, 2023) – The #2 nationally ranked Northern Essex Community College men's basketball overcame a slow start on Saturday afternoon to defeat MassBay Community College a 77-62 final score. With the win the Knights stay perfect at 11-0 overall and 7-0 in Region 21 play.

The Knights took a seven point lead to the locker room at halftime leading 40-33.

Luis Reynoso (Lawrence) continued his strong play as he picked up his ninth double-double of the season with a game high 19 points and 15 rebounds while he

also three blocked shots and seven assists.

Camill Palacioglu (Tuebengin, GR) provided a huge spark off the bench in the game with 13 points and three steals.

Ben Nkwantah (Methuen), Edwin SamMbaka (Laris, FR) and Karl Wolfgang (Douala, CM) all recorded nine points each while SamMbaka and Wolfgang each had a pair of blocked shots.

NECC will hit the road on Tuesday when they travel to the Reggie Lewis Center in Boston for a 7:30pm tip-off with Roxbury Community College.

Haverhill, MA (December 4, 2023) – Northern Essex Community College head men's basketball coach Darren Stratton has been named the Week 4 HoopDirt.com JUCO National Coach of the Week as announced today by the website. The award is presented by Just Play Sports Solutions. Stratton is now eligible for consideration at the end of the season for JUCO National Coach of the Year honors.

This is the second time in his career he has earned the recognition from HoopDirt.com as the Coach of the Week, with the awards program dating back to the 2015-16 season. Stratton, who picked up his 300th career win last week as part of a 3-0 week has the Knights off to an 11-0 start and a #2 national ranking in the NJCAA Basketball weekly poll.

As a team, the Knights currently lead the nation in rebounding with 63.8 boards per game and rank fourth in both field goals made and three-point field goals made with 363 and 85 respectively.

NECC has three games remaining in the seasons first half including a pair of key road matches this week when they travel to Roxbury on Tuesday evening following by a trip to Massasoit on Thursday evening. Both games are slated for 7:30pm tip-offs.



With an average age of 26, transfer students bring life experiences to the classroom and contribute to the diversity and vitality of UMass Lowell.

Nearly one in 10 of those students enters the university from Bunker Hill Community College.

Building on a longstanding collaboration, UMass Lowell is proud to announce a joint admissions agreement with BHCC.

The largest community college in the Commonwealth, BHCC students who wish to pursue bachelor's or more advanced degrees will be encouraged to apply to UMass Lowell.

Leadership from both higher education institutions met Monday to celebrate the partnership and look to the future. "We are committed to student success. We're committed to attracting the right students for

whom a UMass Lowell education can do the most good," said UMass Lowell Chancellor Julie Chen. "With this agreement, we can create a seamless pathway for Bunker Hill students to continue their education."

Referencing her experience as a first-generation college student, BHCC President Pam Eddinger said the joint admissions agreement is, and has been from the start, built to support students from all backgrounds who are pursuing higher education.

"If the support doesn't come from the

Aquella viejecita, con sus cabellos blancos y su mirada triste, estaba todos los días, desde horas tempranas, junto a la acera de su casa, esperando al cartero. ¡Esperaba una carta!

Cuando desde lejos se veía la imagen uniformada y escuchaba el silbato del empleado de correos anunciando a los vecinos su presencia tan deseada por todos, el rostro de la anciana se llenaba de alegría, de esperanzas. Aquel hombre seguramente le traía hoy el mensaje que ella esperaba con ansias desde hacía tiempo.

Cuando el cartero se acercaba, la anciana vibraba de emoción; su corazón latía aceleradamente. Era como un soplo de nueva vida que llenaba todo su ser. Allí, en aquella bolsa que colgaba del hombro del cartero, vendría la misiva esperada, el mensaje de alivio, la alegría metida en un sobre. Y el cartero, al llegar junto a la viejecita, siempre repetía las palabras amargas de días anteriores: "Señora, hoy no traigo carta para usted."

La anciana, al ver defraudada sus esperanzas, fruncía el ceño, dibujándose en su rostro el dolor y la desesperación. De sus ojos, casi apagados por los años, brotaban las lágrimas. Y sus manos, huesudas y temblorosas, hacían las veces de pañuelos. La carta que esperaba no vino tampoco ese día. Los vecinos la atendieron con todo cariño. Uno de ellos fue hasta la acera, se situó en el mismo lugar que la anciana ocupaba todos los días y esperó allí pacientemente la llegada del empleado postal; este venía alegre como siempre; tocando su silbato y con un montón de cartas en las manos...

- ¿Hay carta para la viejecita que lo esperaba a usted todos los días?—le preguntó el vecino.

- No; tampoco traigo carta para ella en el día de hoy; ¿y la viejecita?; ¿Qué le pasa que no me espera?

- Está enferma; muy enferma; delirando. Hace falta algo que le anime y solo usted podría ayudarla.

- ¿Yo? ¿De qué manera?

- Escríbale, Cartero, por lo que más usted quiera: ¡Escríbale una carta! ¡Hágale una postal de Navidad!

Nota: Desde los años cuarenta hasta los setenta del siglo pasado, Pedro Pablo Montesino, que mis lectores han sospechado correctamente era mi padre, fue un escritor prolífico de varias organizaciones periodísticas escritas, radiales y televisoras de Cuba. Esta historia la publicó en Hialeah, Florida, en los años sesenta como homenaje a las madres que sufrieron entonces, sufren todavía, la tragedia política cubana que las separaban de sus hijos.

Yo escogí y edité este artículo para publicación con el objetivo de reconocerle su importancia no solamente en el campo periodístico en que Pedro Pablo Montesino se desenvolvió sino la fortaleza moral de su filosofía política y su efecto en mi carrera de escritor también. Un hombre que publicó en tantos medios de comunicaciones se sentiría orgulloso e impresionado de ver sus pensamientos resucitados navegando a través de la supercarretera milagrosa del Internet. Estoy seguro de que, la esperara o no, ahora él recibió su carta. Los escritores no mueren hasta que su última historia se olvida.

Tengan unas festividades y nuevo año feliz. ¡Y no dejen de enviar su carta! O mejor, llamen a su viejecita si vive o envíenle el mensaje de una oración si no.

The old fragile woman, with her cotton-white hair and eternally sad appearance, was prompt every single day standing next to the sidewalk in front of her unassuming house, waiting for the mailman. She was anxious for a letter or just a Christmas card!

As soon as she spotted the white and blue uniformed image of the mail carrier in the distance following his intricate daily route, the face of the old woman suddenly shone with happiness, expectations, and hope. That man would certainly bring today the message of love she earnestly awaited. As he approached her, the woman quivered with emotion, her heart beating at a higher rate. It was like a flow of new life that filled her up. There, in that shoulder bag carried by the man would lie the expected letter, the Christmas card, a message of relief and happiness sealed in an envelope. And the mailman, as he came close to the woman, would repeat the same words of disappointment of the day before: "Sorry madam, today I have no correspondence for you either."

The old woman, her hopes dashed one more time, would knit her thick eyebrows, pain and desperation reflected on her face, shedding tears from her tired old eyes, tears she would wipe away with trembling hands and an old, wrinkled handkerchief. The letter she waited for had not come that day either. She then returned to the room that served her as a refuge to wait until the following morning; a new day when she might receive a card or a letter from her beloved son that she anticipated with anguish and motherly love.

Time went by day by sullen day and always the poor old woman, under the morning sun, waited for the mailman and received the same disappointing answer: "Sorry madam, today I don't have a letter for you." As the branches of the Christmas trees withered down, so did the hopes of this anxious mother.

And it was that the letter could never arrive. The son she loved so dearly had been involved in a revolutionary uprising against the Castro dictatorship one day and

had become a nameless victim of the firing squad. The old mother had been lied to by protecting friends and in her unwavering and eternal faith believed that he was still alive, in another country perhaps, happy and full of life like the day he had given her a goodbye kiss and a promise to love her forever. That is why she always waited every day for the letter that never arrived; the letter that would never arrive, the simple Christmas card she longed for.

One day, it was still early in the morning, the old woman was not waiting for the mailman as was her practice and costume. The neighbors, concerned for her absence, went looking for her in the humble quarters where she lived. They found her sick, gravely ill, and crying. In the stupor produced by the fever, all she asked was to see a letter, the letter she wanted from her son.

The neighbors called a doctor and took care of her with love. One of them went to the sidewalk, stood in the same place where the woman did every day, and waited patiently for the customary arrival of the mailman. He showed up happy and energetic as usual, a heavy load of letters in his hands.

- "Is there any letter for the old woman who waits for you every day?" asked the neighbor.

- "No," he replied, "I have no letter today either. And the old woman, what happened that she did not wait for me today?" He added with concern.

- "She is ill, very ill; restless. She needs something to alleviate her pains and you are the only one who can help."

- "Me? How?"

- "Mr. Mailman, please give her this letter we wrote for her. Please give her this Christmas card."

Note: Between the nineteen forties and the nineteen seventies, Pedro Pablo Montesino, who my readers must have guessed by now was my father, wrote prolifically for various media organizations in Cuba and later in Florida. This fictional piece appeared in the Hialeah Sun, Hialeah, Florida, in October of 1969. He intended it as a homage to the mothers who suffered, and still suffer, the Cuban political tragedy that separated them from their sons and daughters.

I choose and edit this article for Christmas every year to recognize its importance not only as a journalistic piece in the field in which my father worked, but also as an example of the strength of the morality of his political philosophy and the impact it had in my career as a writer. A man, who published so skillfully in so many communication channels of the time, would be proud and impressed to see his thoughts come to life as they travel through the information superhighway of the Internet. He died in November of 1995. I am sure that, whether waiting for it or not, he now received this letter. Writers don't die until their last articles are forgotten.

Have a happy holiday season and don't neglect to send your letter! Better, call your loving mother if she still lives or send her the message of a prayer if she doesn't.

As luck will have it, there was an article in the Boston Globe this week by Amanda Milkovits and Edward Fitzpatrick about the Governor of Rhode Island Daniel McKee announcing the appointment of Bryant C. Da Cruz to the Ethics Commission.

These reporters did what the governor and his people should have done investigating the individual discovering that he had multiple accusations made against him by six women and their article detailed the sexual harassment complaints.

The next day, after the publication of the article, Mr. Da Cruz tendered his resignation and Gov. McKee’s office stated that the vetting process was not adequate and that it would be corrected going forward.

Can you think of all the appointments that have been made through the years in our city by pointing a finger? It’s our responsibility to make sure that our city employees (as well as Board Members and Commissioners) are deserving of our trust and salary; but, if we elect individuals who may have a shady past or questionable behavior, we can only expect that they will select people of their ilk to work here. Yet, we do it all the time!

Selection of a new School Superintendent

Please take the time to read a letter by District C Councilor Gregory Delrosario insisting that the public should participate in the selection of a new superintendent. We have been told that a group from Chicago has been contracted to perform a national search instead of looking for someone knowledgeable of this city and its people, preferably bilingual and chosen by us.

This past Wednesday, the Lawrence Alliance for Education Board (LAE) met in a meeting that was not publicized to the residents resulting in a letter that we published on page 12.

They have scheduled two meetings with members of the community during January. I don’t know how much participation there will be since the Chicago group is charged with the selection but I plan to be there to witness how many parents will attend.

My skepticism comes from many years of watching the lack of interest from parents regarding their children’s education. I believe that was the reason for losing the high school accreditation first and later the control of the school system: People didn’t care enough to get involved and demand better education. I’m afraid nothing has changed and we will continue to be managed

by outsiders whether it’s Jeffrey Riley or someone from out-of-state.

No one can deny the lack of interest because we just had an election and it is always difficult getting someone to run for school committee. Yes, even after the takeover of the schools, the school committee shall continue to exist by law. The purpose is that the LAE Board is supposed to train them in all matters having to do with their duties, particularly with the budget.

The reality has been that the school committee members have been treated like unwanted stepchildren kept ignorant of important decisions and taught nothing.

I don’t know how the LAE Board members have been selected but, if anyone is interested, here they are: Pat Mariano, Chair, Brian DePeña, Dolores Calaf, Arlene García, Juana Matías, Edgar De León, and María Muller.

Arrests of Juveniles

We published on the front page the arrest of the students involved in the beating of two other children at Sullivan Park. Notice that we didn’t say it was at the “high school” because it must be clarified that it did not happen at school and they were not students there.

According to Chief William Castro, the Police Department acted very efficiently arresting six of them within two days of the attack of the nine that have been identified. They are being held until they appear in court accused of multiple charges.

Chief Castro is very pleased with the response of the units as well as the courts and District Attorney Paul F. Tucker.

It was previously announced that once the new LAE board was established, the process for the determination of a permanent Superintendent would be established. What is the status at this time? I know you did have a meeting about it today. I did try to watch but it was impossible, also tried to be part of it by sending Maria Campusano an email and calling her numerous times with no luck or reply.

My position is that a new superintendent must simultaneously develop a strategy and drive execution. The need to do both at once has never been more urgent for LPS in this new transition. I feel strongly that given this history and the investment the city has, over 200,000,000 in new school construction, we need to do a better job vetting the qualities and just as important, making sure the City Council has a say in the candidate selection process.

Therefore, I would like to ask the LAE board, The Commissioner of Education, and the Mayor of the City of Lawrence, that two City Councilors be selected to serve on the new superintendent search interview committee to recommend the finalist to the LAE board.




