¡De vuelta a la escuela! Las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence inician el año académico 2024-25

LAWRENCE (26 de agosto de 2024) - Las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence comenzaron oficialmente el nuevo año escolar el lunes, dando la bienvenida a todos los estudiantes de K-12, el personal y las familias para 2024-25.

El primer día de clases sigue a la ceremonia anual del Día de Apertura del viernes pasado, en la que los aproximadamente 2,500 empleados del distrito llenaron el gimnasio de la Escuela Secundaria de Lawrence para celebrar su regreso con el Alcalde Brian A. DePeña, el Superintendente Ralph Carrero y las actuaciones del galardonado programa de teatro de LHS.

"He pasado las últimas siete semanas leyendo, aprendiendo, escuchando y visitando," dijo el Superintendente Carrero, quien comenzó en su cargo el 9 de julio. "He descubierto que las Escuelas Públicas de Lawrence es un lugar excepcional para enseñar, trabajar y aprender."

El Superintendente subió al podio después de la presidenta de la Alianza de Lawrence para la Educación, Patricia Mariano – quien le regaló los pompones que trajo para animar al personal para que tengan un año escolar exitoso – y un popurrí de la obra musical "In the Heights" resentado por el teatro de LHS que repetidamente puso a la audiencia de pie.

Señaló las extensas obras de

construcción y mantenimiento en los edificios escolares este verano y que ahora reciben a los estudiantes y al personal de todo el distrito - incluidos nuevos patios de recreo, pavimentación, techos, paneles de alarma contra incendios y sistemas de calefacción, ventilación y aire acondicionado - y destacó varias prioridades para el próximo año.

Entre ellas, seguir fortaleciendo el currículo estudiantil y el desarrollo profesional de alta calidad; la ampliación de las oportunidades de enriquecimiento, con programas extracurriculares en todo el distrito; y un compromiso continuo con la participación de las familias, incluido el programa de la Universidad de Padres para las familias de la escuela secundaria que se introducirá este otoño.

En el discurso de apertura del viernes, el alcalde DePeña enfatizó la importancia de cada individuo, en cada rol, para un 2024-25 exitoso.

"No siempre es fácil, pero cuando todos trabajan juntos – profesores, padres, alumnos – todo es posible," dijo DePeña. "¡Es hora de empezar!"

Alcalde DePeña Anuncia el Formulario como Voluntario para el Comité de Búsqueda del Jefe de Policía

Lawrence, MA – El Alcalde Brian A. DePeña se enorgullece de anunciar que ya está disponible un formulario de interés voluntario para los miembros de la comunidad que deseen ser considerados para su nombramiento como representantes comunitarios en el Comité de Búsqueda de Jefes de Policía.

El Comité de Búsqueda del Jefe de Policía estará compuesto por siete miembros, incluidos tres miembros designados por el Alcalde DePeña como representantes de la comunidad. Otros miembros del comité incluyen un nombramiento del Alcalde DePeña, un nombramiento en la selección del Concejo Municipal y dos miembros designados como representantes del Departamento de Policía.

El comité estará presidido por el Director de Personal, Michael Owens, como miembro sin derecho a voto, excepto en caso de empate. Los representantes de la comunidad serán elegidos en función de sus diversos orígenes, profundos vínculos comunitarios y compromiso demostrado con el servicio público. El comité de búsqueda trabajará en estrecha colaboración con una empresa de búsqueda profesional para realizar un proceso exhaustivo de candidatos a nivel nacional.

La decisión de involucrar a miembros de la comunidad en el proceso de búsqueda subraya el compromiso de la administración con la transparencia, la inclusión y la participación pública. "Seleccionar al próximo Jefe de Policía es una de las decisiones más importantes que tomaremos para nuestra ciudad", afirmó el Alcalde

DePeña. "Es esencial que abordemos este proceso con la máxima diligencia y cuidado, asegurándonos de que nuestra elección refleje los valores y necesidades de nuestros residentes. Estoy seguro de que los miembros de la comunidad designados aportarán perspectivas y conocimientos valiosos a este esfuerzo".

Este comité tiene la tarea de una misión crítica: ayudar a identificar y recomendar a un líder que encarne los principios de integridad, responsabilidad y compromiso con la seguridad y el bienestar de nuestra diversa comunidad.

Una vez que la búsqueda se reduzca a finalistas, se invitará a la comunidad a participar a través de foros públicos e iniciativas de retroalimentación. Los residentes tendrán la oportunidad de escuchar a los candidatos y compartir sus opiniones y expectativas sobre el próximo Jefe de Policía.

La Ciudad de Lawrence sigue dedicada a fomentar un ambiente de confianza y respeto mutuo entre las autoridades y la comunidad a la que sirve. El inicio de este comité de búsqueda es un paso fundamental para garantizar que el liderazgo del Departamento de Policía de Lawrence se alinee con estos valores fundamentales.

Remembering NECC President John R. Dimitry


It is with great sadness that we share news of the passing of former Northern Essex Community College President Dr. John Dimitry. In his 20 years as president, Dr. Dimitry led with compassion, tenacity, and a dedication to equity, which remain embedded in the fibers of NECC to this day.

"Dr. Dimitry's leadership at Northern Essex Community College forged pathways of opportunity and equity, ensuring that education could serve as a beacon of hope and change for countless individuals," says current NECC President Lane Glenn. "We are deeply grateful for Dr. Dimitry's numerous contributions to Northern Essex and we share our sincerest condolences with his loved ones"

Dr. Dimitry's life shows that learning comes in many forms. At the age of seventeen, he withdrew from high school and enlisted in the United States Army. While in the service he earned his GED certificate, and upon his discharge in 1948 he earned a bachelor's degree. He subsequently served in the Korean War from 1952 to 1954 when he was called to active duty. After the war, he earned his master's and doctoral degrees and began his lifetime career in education.

As the college's second president, serving from 1975 to 1996, Dr. Dimitry's legacy is especially felt on our Lawrence campus. Early in his tenure, he identified the need for permanent classroom space in Lawrence and made many trips to the Massachusetts State House to advocate for the creation of a campus there. Following the 1984 Lawrence riots, the state launched the Lawrence Education Employment Project (LEEP), which grew into the Lawrence Campus.

In 1991, due to Dimitry's leadership, The Prudential Company made the extraordinary donation of 45 Franklin St. to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for

use as the college's first permanent building in Lawrence. Five years later, in 1996, it was dedicated to Dr. Dimitry.

Today the campus has grown to half a dozen buildings, including the Dr. Ibrahim El-Hefni Allied Health & Technology Center, 420 Common St., and the Louise Haffner Fournier Education Center.


Carol Flaz-Burgos encontrada muerta; sospechoso arrestado en relación con su muerte

(Parte de prensa del Fiscal Paul Tucker)

Lawrence, Mass. – 4 de septiembre de 2024 – Carol Flaz-Burgos, de 37 años, de Lawrence, fue encontrada muerta ayer por la noche en una zona boscosa cerca del lago Kenoza en Haverhill, y las autoridades arrestaron a Cristian Montero, de 35 años, de Lawrence en relación con su muerte. El cuerpo de Flaz-Burgos, madre de dos hijos, fue localizado por un policía estatal de Massachusetts acompañado por una unidad K-9 y Airwing.

Después de notificar a la familia de Carol Flaz-Burgos, el fiscal de distrito del condado de Essex, Paul F. Tucker, el jefe de policía de Lawrence, Melix Bonilla, y el jefe de policía de Haverhill, Robert Pistone, hicieron el anuncio en una conferencia de prensa anoche en el Departamento de Policía de Lawrence. Flaz-Burgos fue reportada como desaparecida el 31 de agosto, cuando la Policía de Lawrence comenzó la búsqueda, seguida pronto por los detectives de la Policía Estatal de Massachusetts asignados a la oficina de Tucker, la Policía de Haverhill y la Policía de Methuen. Montero, que vivía en el mismo edificio que Flaz-Burgos, fue arrestada ayer por la tarde por la Policía de Lawrence.

“En este momento, tenemos un sospechoso bajo custodia por un cargo de intimidación de testigos y engaño en una investigación”, dijo Tucker sobre el arresto de Montero. “Cuando la oficina del médico forense complete su autopsia, lo que puede ocurrir en las próximas 24 a 48



horas, esperamos que el cargo se actualice a asesinato”.

“Ofrecemos nuestras condolencias a la familia”, dijo Bonilla. “Este no es el resultado que estábamos buscando y estamos tristes por esta pérdida”.

“Es un día difícil para la ciudad de Lawrence”, dijo el alcalde de Lawrence, Brian A. DePeña. “No es fácil para la familia ni para la comunidad, pero agradecemos a todos por trabajar juntos”.

Montero fue procesado hoy en el Tribunal de Distrito de Lawrence y se le detuvo sin derecho a fianza. Está previsto que regrese a la corte el miércoles 11 de septiembre a las 2:00 p. m. para una audiencia de detención.

Todos los sospechosos y acusados son considerados inocentes hasta que se demuestre su culpabilidad.

Carol Flaz-Burgos Found Deceased; Suspect Arrested in Connection to Her Death

(Press release from District Attorney Paul Tucker)

LAWRENCE, Mass. – September 4, 2024 – Carol Flaz-Burgos, 37, of Lawrence, was found deceased yesterday evening at a wooded area near Kenoza Lake in Haverhill, and authorities have arrested Cristian Montero, 35, of Lawrence in connection to her death. The body of Flaz-Burgos, a mother of two, was located by a Massachusetts State Police trooper accompanied by a K-9 and Airwing unit.

After notifying the family of Carol Flaz-Burgos, Essex County District Attorney Paul F. Tucker, Lawrence Police Chief Melix Bonilla, and Haverhill Police Chief Robert Pistone made the announcement at a press conference last night at the Lawrence Police Department. Flaz-Burgos was reported missing on August 31, when Lawrence Police began the search, soon followed by Massachusetts State Police detectives assigned to Tucker’s office, Haverhill Police, and Methuen Police. Montero, who lived in the same building as Flaz-Burgos, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Lawrence Police.

“At this time, we have a suspect in custody on a charge of witness intimidation and misleading an investigation,” Tucker said of Montero’s arrest. “When the medical examiner’s office completes their autopsy, which may occur in the next 24 to 48 hours, we expect that charge will be upgraded to murder.”

“We offer our condolences to the family,” said Bonilla. “This is not the outcome that we were looking for and we are sad for this loss.”

“It is a tough day for the City of Lawrence,” said Lawrence Mayor Brian A. DePeña. “It is not easy for the family or the community, but we thank everyone for working together.”

Montero was arraigned in Lawrence District Court today and was held without bail. He is scheduled to return to court on Wednesday, September 11 at 2:00 p.m. for a detention hearing.

All suspects and defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

Back to School! Lawrence Public Schools Launches 2024-25 Academic Year

LAWRENCE (August 26, 2024) – Lawrence Public Schools officially began the new school year Monday, welcoming back all K-12 students, staff and families for 2024-25.

The first day of school follows last Friday’s annual Opening Day ceremony, at which the district’s roughly 2,500 employees filled the Lawrence High School field house to celebrate their return with Mayor Brian A. DePeña, Superintendent Ralph Carrero, and performances from LHS’ award-winning theater program.

“I’ve spent the last seven weeks reading, learning, listening and visiting,” said Superintendent Carrero, who began in his role July 9. “I’ve discovered that Lawrence Public Schools is an outstanding place to teach, to work and to learn.”

The Superintendent stepped to the podium following Lawrence Alliance for Education Chair Patricia Mariano — who gifted him the pom-poms she brought to cheer on staff for a successful school year — and an LHS theater “In the Heights” medley that repeatedly brought the audience to its feet.

He noted this summer’s extensive facilities improvements now greeting students and staff around the district — including new playgrounds, paving, roofs,

fire alarm panels and HVAC systems — and highlighted several priorities for the coming year. Among them were continued strengthening of student curriculum and high quality professional development; expanded enrichment opportunities, with district-wide afterschool programming; and an ongoing commitment to family engagement, including the Parent University program for high school families being introduced this fall.

In Friday’s opening remarks, Mayor DePeña emphasized the importance of every individual, in every role, for a successful 2024-25.

“It’s not always easy, but when everybody works together — teachers, parents, students — everything is possible,” DePeña said. “It’s time to begin!”

Lawrence Public Schools pre-kindergarten programming will begin on Wednesday, September 4.

LHS Theater will present “In the Heights” this November 15, 16, 22 and 23, all at 6pm in the LHS Performing Arts Center. They have received national or state recognition each of the past two years, including Best Overall Musical at the Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild Awards for last year’s “Tarzan” performance.

Desde Mi Esquina

Propiedades de la ciudad y la LRA

Es posible que haya notado que mi conocimiento de la Autoridad de Reurbanización de Lawrence (LRA) es limitado. Hay más preguntas en todas partes donde miro, y estoy segura de que muchos en la ciudad sienten lo mismo; no es un tema fácil de entender a menos que esté en el "meollo del asunto".

Tengo la lista de propiedades que la Ciudad planea entregar a la LRA, e incluso con mi educación limitada sobre el tema, comencé a cuestionar el propósito porque no tenía sentido.

Déjenme explicar. En una carta del abogado de la LRA, Brian Corrigan, al Concejo, escribió:

"La LRA presentó una solicitud de propuestas para los muchos lotes disponibles en la ciudad, y la fecha límite es el 13 de septiembre de 2024. En ese momento, planean revisar las propuestas recibidas, albergar presentaciones de desarrolladores y hacer recomendaciones ante el Comité Asesor de Ciudadanos (CAC). Este comité está formado por 25 miembros de la comunidad de Lawrence, de los cuales 12 representan a los 6 distritos de la ciudad, 2 designados por cada concejal de su distrito y 6 ciudadanos designados por los 3 concejales generales de la ciudad; 2 designados por el alcalde; 1 miembro del comité de seguridad pública designado por el jefe de policía; 1 miembro designado por la Comisión de Planificación del Valle de Merrimack; y 3 miembros de la comunidad designados por la LRA y que representan a los sectores de arquitectura/ingeniería, negocios y banca. El objetivo es convocar al CAC antes de la fecha límite de presentación de propuestas para discutir la logística y establecer un cronograma para las presentaciones de los desarrolladores a medida que nos acercamos al otoño".

Actualmente, la LRA está vendiendo propiedades que pertenecen a la ciudad porque el alcalde Brian DePeña no ha aprobado ninguna de ellas. ¿Se están adelantando a los acontecimientos o es una forma de presionar al alcalde y a los concejales? ¿Cómo pueden abrir las propuestas el 13 de septiembre "para revisar las propuestas recibidas, organizar presentaciones de desarrolladores y hacer recomendaciones" sobre propiedades que aún no poseen?

Durante esa reunión, los desarrolladores conocerán a las personas que representan el área donde se encuentran sus propiedades, lo que les permitirá establecer una relación y destacar los beneficios para la zona si la adquieren. No quiero pensar en otros negocios nefastos de los que nos enteramos en diferentes lugares.

La cuestión principal es explicar a los contribuyentes los criterios para liberar una propiedad de la ciudad a la Autoridad de Reurbanización de Lawrence.

- Según las Leyes Generales, capítulo 121 B, sección 5, así como la sección 7. Una autoridad de vivienda o reurbanización elegirá de entre sus miembros un presidente y un vicepresidente, y podrá contratar un

abogado, un director ejecutivo que será el secretario ex oficio de la autoridad;

- Establecer estándares de rehabilitación y diseño;
- Reunir y disponer de terrenos, incluida la expropiación de bienes inmuebles mediante dominio eminent;
- Reubicar empresas y residentes que ocupen propiedades en áreas de renovación urbana;
- Demoler y/o rehabilitar estructuras deficientes;
- Participar en el desarrollo inmobiliario y la revitalización comercial;
- Emitir bonos, pedir dinero prestado, invertir fondos y recibir subvenciones; y
- Aceptar obsequios o solicitudes.

Esa información está disponible en el sitio web de la ciudad de Lawrence.

El 4 de abril de 2024, The Eagle-Tribune publicó un artículo titulado Council readies for legal action over transfer of Lawrence owned properties (El concejo se prepara para una acción legal por la transferencia de propiedades de Lawrence) por Jill Harnacinski, que afirma:

"En el centro del problema se encuentra un plan de renovación urbana de 2016 desarrollado por la LRA. Según ese plan, DePeña y los miembros de la LRA creen que pueden transferir las 11 propiedades a la LRA sin la aprobación actual del concejo municipal.

"Sin embargo, el abogado de la ciudad, Timothy Houten, en una decisión emitida el 28 de marzo, dijo que todas las transferencias de tierras deben ser firmadas por el alcalde después de recibir la aprobación del Concejo".

El público cree que hay una guerra entre el alcalde y el presidente del concejo (Jevanny Rodríguez), pero todo está ahí en las reuniones del concejo municipal. Una vez que aprendemos a escuchar a ambas partes, concluimos que algo no se está haciendo bien. Por ejemplo, el presidente del concejo quiere saber por qué las propiedades deben ser entregadas a la LRA cuando podríamos venderlas y quedarnos con las ganancias que podrían traer a la ciudad. Una vez que la LRA las vende, se quedan con esas ganancias para futuras inversiones, no para la ciudad.

El alcalde DePeña explicó que los estacionamientos (otro ejemplo) se venderán para construir garajes con espacios comerciales en el primer piso, dejando a la ciudad con esos ingresos. Eso no está claro, por eso los concejales se oponen a la aprobación.

Además, Buckley Garage estaba incluido en la lista original, pero algo sucedió y lo eliminaron. Entraron en razón porque ese garaje le genera a Lawrence \$600,000 anuales.

Hay demasiadas inconsistencias para aceptar renunciar a nuestras propiedades.

Como se predijo, muy pocas personas

fueron a votar el martes pasado. Sí, eso me enoja porque si la gente supiera el valor de su voto, nunca perderían esa oportunidad.

La mayoría de las personas van a las urnas motivadas por el candidato, no los temas. A veces, la razón es votar en contra del otro candidato ignorando por completo qué beneficia o perjudica a la sociedad.

Lo vemos en todos los niveles de nuestras comunidades, ya sean personas con un nivel educativo alto o no. Team Haverhill Announces Riverside Park Art Walk and Edible Avenue

Team Haverhill announces that the Art Walk and Edible Avenue originally planned for the Bradford Rail Trail Extension will now be placed at Riverside Park. The project, a joint effort of four organizations, will connect a sidewalk near the ballfields at the eastern side of Riverside Park with a state-funded trail constructed along the Merrimack River behind the park and the Rivers Edge Plaza. The avenue will feature sculptures as well as trees, plants and shrubs with edible parts.

The project is sponsored by Team Haverhill, Creative Haverhill, the Haverhill Garden Club and Haverhill's Brightside. Creative Haverhill, a nonprofit community arts organization, and Sarah LoVasco, of SJ Art Consulting will solicit sculptures from artists, and the Garden Club will oversee the mostly native plantings. Work on the Edible Avenue will begin in September, with completion expected by next year. The artwork is scheduled for installation by next summer.

"This project has been a long time coming," said Mayor Melinda Barrett. "I am excited that the Art Walk and Edible Avenue will have a home at the Riverside Trail at Riverside Park, which is undergoing significant improvements. Trails are a great benefit to offer a community. To be able to provide the public with an opportunity to view art and learn about nature, not just see it, while out on a trail is even better! Thank you to all involved with this project. It's a product of their determination and collaboration with others that has made the idea a reality."

The Art Walk and Edible Avenue project is being funded by a \$30,000 donation from

the Pentucket Bank Charitable Foundation, as well as grants from the Haverhill Cultural Council, the Massachusetts Federation of Garden Clubs, the Haverhill Garden Club, and Haverhill's Brightside. Whittier Technical High School students built two handicapped accessible raised planting beds that will be installed along the path. Nunan Florist & Greenhouses is contributing shrubs, bushes and plants. Signs and brochures will explain how the plants can be used as food for people, birds, bees, and other pollinators.

"We are so thankful for Pentucket Bank's continued support and are excited to move this project forward after experiencing a bump in the road when the original location proved infeasible," said Ann Jacobson, chair of the Team Haverhill Art Walk and Edible Avenue Committee. "We are grateful to Mayor Melinda Barrett and the City of Haverhill for helping us pivot to this new location, which we think will become an exciting new community resource."

The walkway along the Merrimack River is being paid for with a Mass Trails grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts' Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs.

Team Haverhill is an independent, volunteer action group dedicated to making Haverhill a better place to live, learn, work and play. We pursue this purpose by fostering civic dialogue, organizing hands-on projects, creating a more informed public, and advocating for positive change. Team Haverhill is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization serving Haverhill, Massachusetts.

Emmaus to Hold 36th Annual Cycle for Shelter in September

Riders can participate in Person or Virtually to help defeat homelessness

HAVERHILL | Thirty-five years after Emmaus' founding Executive Director, Tom Bentley, completed the first ride, a 1,200-mile journey from Georgia to Massachusetts visiting more than 100 programs serving homeless and impoverished families and individuals, Emmaus is celebrating its 36th Cycle for Shelter on Sunday, September 15.

Cycle for Shelter, the longest-running charity ride in Northeastern Massachusetts and an event the whole community looks forward to each year, has raised more than \$2.2 million for Emmaus.

Carlie Hornbrook, the Emmaus Development Director, commented that, "Cycle for Shelter has a very loyal group of supporters. Our cyclists and volunteers return year after year because they care deeply about helping the families and individuals who are our guests and clients. Each cyclist or volunteer has their own reason for supporting Emmaus and you'd be surprised to learn how many people have a story of their own about overcoming homelessness."

This year, riders can choose from four different routes to cycle: The Century Ride (100 miles), 62 miles, 35 miles, or 15 miles (the Family ride). These routes tour the picturesque New England coastline, woodlands and farms with well-stocked rest stops along the way. Cyclists are accompanied by route support vehicles to ensure their safety on every route. Riders can participate virtually, if they cannot attend the in-person event. Cyclists with pedal assist bicycles are also welcome.

The ride starts and finishes at Northern Essex Community College in Haverhill, and all riders will return to the college for a cookout with a wide variety of foods donated by local restaurants and a craft beer tent for cyclists 21 and over. The event offers a low registration fee and fundraising commitment. Each individual rider pledges to raise a minimum of \$250, and family teams of up to five members will have a combined fundraising minimum of \$300.

The conversations Tom had along his journey, led Emmaus to create pioneering programs for homeless families and individuals in our region. Since that first ride, more than 5,000 cyclists and volunteers have helped Emmaus raise critically needed funds through Cycle for Shelter. This year, Emmaus hopes to have close to 150 cyclists

participate in-person and raise \$200,000 for the organization.



Scholarship Program Helps Nontraditional Students Get Back on Track

Lowell, Mass. – Determined to help young people facing significant personal challenges continue their education and achieve greater independence, longtime friends Dave Aldrich and Ronnie Hoey turned to the Lowell Community Foundation (GLCF) to establish the Jump Start Scholarship Program.

Explicitly designed for nontraditional students, Jump Start awards \$2,500 scholarships twice a year to individuals striving to get their lives in order by studying at accredited vocational training programs, certificate programs, community colleges, or four-year colleges and universities.

Launched in 2023, Jump Start awarded a total of \$44,000 to 17 individuals, ages 18 and above, in its first two award cycles, in fall 2023 and spring 2024.

"The Jump Start Scholarship program is just one more way the Greater Lowell Community Foundation works with donors to achieve their philanthropic goals," said Jennifer Aradhya, GLCF's Vice President of Marketing, Programs & Strategy. "The Foundation facilitates almost 300 scholarship programs, and in this case, we worked with Dave and the Aldrich Family Charitable Foundation to create a more nontraditional scholarship fund to give students a second chance at higher education or an accredited career training program."

Jump Start awards more significant scholarships twice a year and allows recipients to re-apply each time the application process opens. As with many GLCF scholarship programs, Jump Start's founders manage their awards process, Aradhya explained. Hoey and Aldrich are responsible for community outreach to promote applications, and a committee reviews applicant submissions and facilitates the selection process.

"GLCF advises them on best practices and provides advice on how to run a successful scholarship program," said Aradhya. "But Dave and Ronnie do the heavy lift on Jump Start."

The most unique aspect of the Jump Start Scholarship Program is that it focuses on students who have had a tough time launching into adulthood, said Aldrich. "Many young adults need assistance until they can become more self-sufficient and get on their feet," he said.

"Often, these students experienced various forms of trauma when they ventured

off the traditional path of finishing high school and going right on to college. With Jump Start, we look for folks who have had the experience of lifting themselves, overcoming challenges, and who want to find a good job or finish their educations," he said.

"It's part of the Jump Start application process for students to identify the experiences and trauma that have led them to apply," added Hoey.

Jump Start is an outgrowth of Project Kompass, the North Chelmsford women's transitional housing nonprofit Aldrich and Hoey, founded in January 2020. Hoey serves as executive director of Project Kompass and is responsible for the residential program's day-to-day operation.

"Project Kompass welcomes young women who want to work or continue their education, and pay it forward," said Aldrich, founder and prior CEO and chairman of the board of Skyworks Solutions Inc. He also serves as board chairman of Project Kompass.

However, as Hoey and Aldrich got Project Kompass up and running, they realized their targeted cohort was experiencing another gap in support services. "We learned that some of our residents were having trouble accessing the direct financial assistance they needed to continue their educations," Hoey said.

So, Aldrich and Hoey – who have known each other and worked together in the high-tech industry for 35 years – set up the Jump Start Scholarship Program through GLCF.

For 18-year-old Raya Simpson, of Wilmington – one of the 21 communities GLCF serves – receiving a Jump Start Scholarship has relieved financial pressures. "I've been concerned about money and how to pursue further education," said Simpson, who plans to study animation at Georgia's Savannah College of Art & Design in the fall.

"I live with my single dad, who works tirelessly to help me achieve my dreams, but money is a real concern. Figuring out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), loans, and what we can pay has been hectic. This scholarship alleviates the pressure of facing tuition bills."

"Jump Start applicants don't have to have a high school diploma," stressed Aldrich. "And it's a straightforward application process, not some long,

multi-page application. "Thus far, we have helped almost 20 hard-working students – men and women -- attend vocational schools, trade schools, art schools, beauty academies," he said. "It's quite varied, and that's the point."



Ralph Carrero, Superintendent of Lawrence Public Schools, Joins Lawrence Partnership Board



The Lawrence Partnership is thrilled to welcome Ralph Carrero to its board of directors as an ex-oficio. With his extensive experience and lifelong dedication to the betterment of Lawrence—especially in education and community development—Mr. Carrero is uniquely positioned to support the Partnership's mission of fostering economic growth and opportunity in Lawrence.

Prior to being appointed Superintendent of Lawrence Public Schools in July 2024,

Ralph Carrero was the founding president and director/superintendent of the Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund and the Lawrence Family Development Charter School in Lawrence. Featuring a dual language education development program for 860 students in grades K to 8, the organization was built on a deep commitment to the development of youth leadership, new immigrants, and adult educational and training programs. Prior to that role, Mr. Carrero served as an education administrator for 18 years at the Greater Lawrence Technical High School, where he was coordinator of student services. His professional career spans close to 40 years, providing services in counseling, social work, criminal justice, and education to residents in the city of Lawrence. In 1992, Mr. Carrero became the first Latino ever elected to serve in public office in the City of Lawrence. He went on to serve three consecutive terms (eleven years) on the Lawrence School Committee.

He is the past president of both the Lawrence Youth Commission and the Family and Education Fund, has served on state boards, and worked with every level of governmental body advocating and recommending policy to serve residents in the Commonwealth.

The Alley at 427 Essex Street is a remarkable project initiated by the Lawrence TDI Partnership, transforming an underutilized space into a vibrant public area that connects the community through art, culture, and creativity. This revitalized alleyway now serves as a lively destination in downtown Lawrence, featuring an array of public art installations. Highlights include a captivating mural by a local artist as part of the Elevated Spaces program from Elevated Thought, alongside another mural entirely designed and completed by local youth during the Essex Art Center's summer classes. This transformed space not only enhances the visual appeal of the area but also acts as a hub for community gatherings, fostering connections and showcasing local talent.

Beyond its artistic contributions, the Alley offers various amenities that engage the public and create a welcoming environment for all. Newly installed lighting, seating, and the soon-to-be-installed public Wi-Fi reflect the power of placemaking in revitalizing urban spaces. This once-overlooked corner of Lawrence has become a popular spot for cultural events, relaxation, and appreciation of the area's newfound creative energy. The Alley has quickly become a success, with



local businesses utilizing the space daily and four significant events already hosted, including three by Elevated Thought and a community-led health fair. Looking ahead, a beauty market is planned for September, followed by a fashion show in early October. The ribbon-cutting ceremony for the space's renewal will take place at the end of September, where all donors who made this project possible will be celebrated.

Oxitocina natural o endógena. ¿Qué es?

La oxitocina es un neuropéptido formado por una cadena de nueve aminoácidos. La palabra oxitocina vio la luz en 1906, acuñada por el fisiólogo británico Henry Dale. Procede del griego y significa “parto rápido” y es la responsable de regular el ritmo del parto/nacimiento y de facilitar la lactancia.

¿Dónde se produce?

Es producida de forma mayoritaria en los núcleos paraventricular y supraóptico del hipotálamo, aunque también se sabe que es sintetizada en algunos órganos fuera del cerebro.

¿Qué funciones tiene?

La oxitocina interviene en determinados procesos fisiológicos, activando comportamientos a nivel mecánico en órganos específicos como el útero y las mamas, pero también influye en el comportamiento por su acción en determinadas áreas del cerebro.

Liberada al torrente sanguíneo desde la hipófisis posterior, la oxitocina recorre grandes distancias hasta encontrarse con su receptor específico en la membrana de las células mamarias o del útero. Al final del embarazo aumentan los receptores de oxitocina en estos órganos. Esta hormona activa estos órganos provocando en ellos una reacción, una actividad física o fisiológica determinada. En el caso del útero la oxitocina estimula y mantiene la contracción del músculo liso del útero durante el parto y el alumbramiento, es decir, es la responsable de la existencia de las contracciones. El alumbramiento de la placenta exige unos niveles aún más altos de oxitocina que la expulsión del bebé, por eso el pico máximo de oxitocina en la vida de una mujer es justo después del nacimiento del mismo. En el caso de las mamas provoca el reflejo de eyeción de la leche favoreciendo la lactancia.

La oxitocina y los procesos sexuales

La oxitocina no solo interviene en el cuerpo de la mujer durante el parto y la lactancia, sino que es una de las hormonas centrales de la excitación sexual y de los orgasmos tanto de hombres como de las mujeres. Los niveles de esta hormona en sangre aumentan durante el acto sexual y aún más durante el orgasmo.

Durante el orgasmo femenino, la oxitocina produce contracciones uterinas que ayudan a transportar el esperma hacia el óvulo para facilitar la concepción, y durante el orgasmo masculino, la oxitocina provoca

contracciones en la próstata y en las vesículas seminales.

Neurotransmisor en el cerebro

La oxitocina disminuye la actividad del sistema nervioso simpático y del eje hipotalámico-hipofisario-suprarrenal, lo que aumenta los niveles endógenos de opiáceos e induce efectos anti-estrés, como: baja tensión arterial, ritmo cardíaco y hormonas del estrés, bienestar y relajación, además de una óptima termorregulación.

Es considerada también un gran mediador y controlador de las emociones y comportamientos sociales como el amor, la memoria, la rabia, la agresión y el establecimiento de correlaciones entre experiencias pasadas y presentes, promueve un aumento del umbral del dolor y un descenso de los niveles de ansiedad, disminuye el miedo e incrementa la confianza, la empatía y la generosidad.

La oxitocina y el comportamiento social

Por tanto bajo los efectos de la oxitocina sentimos bienestar, estamos más tranquilos y con una mayor y mejor predisposición ante los demás. Por eso la oxitocina juega un papel fundamental en el vínculo y el cuidado del bebé. Puede decirse que su misión es facilitar la propagación de la especie. La oxitocina está implicada en comportamientos sociales como la memoria social que es la habilidad para reconocer un individuo del mismo grupo, la formación de vínculos, el apego, la empatía y el comportamiento maternal y paternal. Los niveles de oxitocina son más altos en las hembras que en los machos de cada especie y en ellos provoca conductas agresivas y de competición.

¿Qué condiciones son necesarias para que se libere la oxitocina?

La oxitocina es la hormona del amor, de la calma y el contacto, sólo se libera cuando se dan estas condiciones. Por el contrario es inhibida por la adrenalina, una hormona que liberamos los mamíferos en situaciones de emergencia: cuando tenemos frío, miedo o nos sentimos en peligro. De esta manera la naturaleza regula la producción de oxitocina, frenándola en los momentos en que sería peligroso para la hembra dar a luz, por encontrarse un depredador cerca.

Los niveles de la oxitocina dependen a su vez de otras hormonas e influyen así mismo en la producción de otras como los estrógenos, la dopamina, serotonina, prolactina y endorfinas. La prolactina por ejemplo está directamente implicada en los cuidados maternales/paternales hacia las crías y tiene un efecto relajante. La dopamina es la encargada del sistema de recompensa, que hace que tendamos a repetir los comportamientos que maximizan recompensas. Las endorfinas por su parte son analgésicos naturales que nos proporcionan bienestar. De manera que una persona con altos niveles de oxitocina se sentirá más feliz.

La oxitocina endógena y el parto.

Es habitual que para provocar artificialmente el inicio del parto y/o acelerarlo, se utilice oxitocina sintética o syntocinón, un medicamento catalogado como de alto riesgo, tanto por la Asociación Americana del Medicamento (FDA), como por el Instituto para el Uso Seguro

de los Medicamentos (ISMP) en España. Sin embargo la utilización del syntocinón es algo muy difícil de evidenciar como necesario o justificable cuando supera el 10% de los casos.

Toda mujer de parto produce su propia oxitocina natural y dicha producción dependerá en gran medida del ambiente que rodee a esa mujer durante el parto.

Una atención individual y respetuosa, que aporte a la mujer tranquilidad y sensación de libertad y confianza, redundará en que la producción de oxitocina sea adecuada para que el parto se desarrolle con normalidad. Cuando se crean las condiciones adecuadas para que la mujer genere su propia oxitocina, los partos se acortan y son vividos con menos estrés tanto por la madre como por el bebé. En un parto movido exclusivamente

por oxitocina endógena, las contracciones son menos dolorosas y más llevaderas, que las originadas por el syntocinón. Entre las mismas el cerebro produce endorfinas que nos ayudan a descansar y nos proporcionan sensación de bienestar, lo que reduce la necesidad de otros tipos de analgesia con efectos secundarios indeseados. Tras el parto, esas mismas hormonas facilitan el vínculo con la criatura y la instauración de la lactancia.

Es obligación de los profesionales de la salud que trabajan en el ámbito del parto, conocer como funciona el sistema oxitocínico y como influye en el parto, para favorecer el desarrollo del mismo y disminuir la probabilidad de intervenciones médicas y la morbilidad materno-fetal.

Knights, Colem Race Past Moose

Haverhill, MA (September 6, 2024) - On Thursday evening the Northern Essex Community College men's soccer team scored early and often to break into the win column for the first time in the 2024 season as they defeated University of Maine-Augusta by an 8-0 final and improved to 1-2 on the season. Christian Colem (Nashua, NH) made his debut for the Knights and recorded seven points behind three goals and an assist.

NECC controlled the play throughout the match as they outshot UMA by a 38-3 total for the game and goalie Will Paganini (Derry, NH) needed to make just one save to pick up the shutout and his first win of the season.

Nikos Kakavitsas (Athens, GR) got the scoring started in the games second minutes and he fired a shot from 25 yards out that snuck past the goalie and found left corner of the goal just beyond the outstretched keeper. Conor Fitzgerald (Danvers) picked up an assist on the goal.

Just nine minutes later Sam Lucena (Tyngsborough) delivered the first of two goals he sent a rebound into the upper right corner. In the 22nd minute, Lucena staked

the Knights to a 4-0 lead when he headed in a corner off the far post and into the net off of a corner kick from Colem.

Between the two Lucerna goals, Colem recorded the first of his three goals when he took a pass from Lucerna and sent it across the box and into the upper right corner. First half scoring concluded in the 35th minute when Redi Qesmi (Methuen) took a ball from the defender at the top of the box and snuck it past the goalies right side.

La expansión piloto de ConnectorCare genera costos más bajos, mejor acceso a la atención médica para 51,000 residentes

La encuesta a miembros de Health Connector revela que el 88 por ciento ha utilizado una nueva cobertura, uno de cada cinco ha utilizado servicios preventivos que anteriormente habían sido diferidos

28 de agosto de 2024: un nuevo informe publicado hoy por Health Connector muestra que la expansión piloto de ConnectorCare permitió el acceso a un seguro médico de menor costo a más de 51,000 residentes de Massachusetts y muchos nuevos participantes se benefician de las protecciones financieras del programa.

La expansión piloto, parte del presupuesto estatal del año fiscal 2024, está disponible para los residentes durante los años calendario 2024 y 2025. La expansión elevó los límites de elegibilidad de ingresos para el programa del 300 por ciento al 500 por ciento del nivel federal de pobreza, de \$43,740 a \$72,900 para una persona y de \$90,000 a \$150,000 para una familia de cuatro.

El informe detalla los resultados de la expansión piloto, incluido un aumento en los ahorros de costos para los miembros (algunos nuevos miembros de ConnectorCare ahorraron \$150 o más por mes en sus primas) y el rápido uso de la cobertura por parte de los miembros en la población piloto, con un 88 por ciento de los encuestados diciendo que ellos o un miembro de la familia habían usado su nueva cobertura. Uno de cada cinco había usado servicios preventivos que habían sido diferidos antes de ingresar a ConnectorCare.

“Me enorgullecí firmar la expansión piloto de ConnectorCare y estoy emocionada de ver que ha ampliado el acceso a un seguro médico de menor costo para decenas de miles de residentes de Massachusetts”, dijo la gobernadora Maura Healey. “Estamos agradecidos con el equipo de Health Connector por su arduo trabajo para hacer que este piloto sea un éxito y con la Legislatura por su asociación para hacerlo posible”.

“Sabemos lo importante que es para todos en Massachusetts poder obtener los servicios de atención médica que necesitan y pueden pagar”, dijo la Secretaria de Salud y Servicios Humanos, Kate Walsh. “Me alegra que los primeros resultados de esta expansión demuestren que incluso más personas pueden acceder a la atención médica a un precio más asequible”.

“Este programa piloto está haciendo exactamente lo que fue diseñado para hacer, que es brindar un seguro médico que sea realmente asequible y utilizable para los residentes de Massachusetts que anteriormente podrían haber considerado que la cobertura y los servicios estaban fuera de su alcance financiero”, dijo Audrey Morse Gasteier, directora ejecutiva de Massachusetts Health Connector. “Gracias a la Administración Healey-Driscoll y a la Legislatura por crear este programa piloto de dos años. Esperamos seguir brindando acceso a una atención médica asequible a todos los habitantes de Massachusetts que la necesiten”.

ConnectorCare utiliza subsidios estatales y federales para que los planes de salud comerciales cuesten menos para los residentes que califican. Junto con el apoyo de la prima mensual, el programa incluye copagos bajos y elimina los deducibles. ConnectorCare también incluye acceso a recetas sin costo para los miembros para medicamentos para enfermedades crónicas como diabetes, asma e hipertensión, lo que promueve la equidad en la salud para los residentes atendidos por el programa.

El informe transmite detalles geográficos y demográficos de la población piloto de expansión, y la encuesta realizada en mayo y junio arrojó luz sobre el uso temprano de su nueva cobertura por parte

de los miembros.

“Antes de que se implementara el plan de este año, estaba luchando con la decisión de terminar mi tratamiento de salud mental debido al costo”, dijo un miembro que respondió a la encuesta. “Pude continuar el tratamiento este año, lo que me ayudó enormemente”.

La expansión ha impulsado la membresía de Health Connector este año. Hay 271,000 personas en ConnectorCare en agosto, parte de las 324,000 personas en cobertura de salud individual y familiar disponible a través de Health Connector este mes. Ambos números son máximos históricos para el programa y la agencia.

Massachusetts Health Connector es el Mercado de seguros de salud de la Commonwealth y actualmente brinda servicios a 365,000 personas y miembros de pequeños empleadores con seguro médico y dental. ConnectorCare pilot expansion creates lower costs, better access to health care for 51,000 residents

Health Connector member survey finds 88 percent have used new coverage, one in five have used preventative services previously deferred

August 28, 2024 – A new report published today by the Health Connector shows that the ConnectorCare pilot expansion enabled access to lower-cost health insurance to over 51,000 Massachusetts residents and many new participants benefit from the program's financial protections.

The pilot expansion, part of the Fiscal Year 2024 state budget, is available to residents for Calendar Years 2024 and 2025. The expansion lifted income eligibility limits to the program from 300 percent to 500 percent of the federal poverty level – from \$43,740 to \$72,900 for an individual, and from \$90,000 to \$150,000 for a family of four.

The report details the outcomes of the pilot expansion, including an increase in member cost savings – with some new ConnectorCare members saving \$150 or more per month on their premiums – and the quick usage of the coverage by members in the pilot population, with 88 percent of survey respondents saying they or a family member had used their new coverage. One in five had used preventative services that had been deferred before entering ConnectorCare.

“I was proud to sign the ConnectorCare pilot expansion into law, and I’m thrilled to see that it has expanded access to lower-cost health insurance for tens of thousands of Massachusetts residents,” said Governor Maura Healey. “We’re grateful to the Health Connector team for their hard work to make this pilot a success and to the Legislature for their partnership to make this possible.”

“We know how important it is for everyone in Massachusetts to be able to get health care services they both need and can afford,” said Secretary of Health and Human Services Kate Walsh. “I am glad the early results of this expansion shows that even more people can access health care at a more affordable price.”

“This pilot program is doing exactly what it was designed to do, which is deliver health insurance that is truly affordable and useable to Massachusetts residents who previously may have found coverage and services financially out of reach,” said Audrey Morse Gasteier, the Executive Director of the Massachusetts Health

Connector. “Thank you to the Healey-Driscoll Administration and the Legislature for creating this two-year pilot program. We look forward to continuing to deliver access to affordable care to everyone in Massachusetts who needs it.”

ConnectorCare uses state and federal subsidies to make commercial health plans cost less for qualifying residents. Along with monthly premium support, the program includes low co-pays and eliminates deductibles. ConnectorCare also includes access to prescriptions at no cost to members for medication for chronic illnesses such as diabetes, asthma, and hypertension, which advances health equity for residents served by the program.

The report conveys geographic and demographic details of the expansion pilot population, and the survey fielded in May and June shed light on members’ early use of their new coverage.

“Before this year’s plan rolled out, I was struggling with the decision to end my mental health treatment due to the cost,” said one member responding to the survey. “I was able to continue treatment this year, which has helped immensely.”

The expansion has boosted the Health Connector’s membership this year. There are 271,000 people in ConnectorCare in August, part of 324,000 people in individual and family health coverage available through Health Connector this month. Both numbers are all-time highs for the program and the agency.

About the Massachusetts Health Connector



Team Haverhill anuncia el Art Walk and Edible Avenue en Riverside Park

Team Haverhill anuncia que el Art Walk and Edible Avenue, originalmente planeados para la extensión del Bradford Rail Trail, ahora se ubicarán en Riverside Park. Team Haverhill Announces Riverside Park Art Walk and Edible Avenue

Team Haverhill announces that the Art Walk and Edible Avenue originally planned for the Bradford Rail Trail Extension will now be placed at Riverside Park. The project, a joint effort of four organizations, will connect a sidewalk near the ballfields at the eastern side of Riverside Park with a state-funded trail constructed along the Merrimack River behind the park and the Rivers Edge Plaza. The avenue will feature sculptures as well as trees, plants and shrubs with edible parts.

The project is sponsored by Team Haverhill, Creative Haverhill, the Haverhill Garden Club and Haverhill's Brightside. Creative Haverhill, a nonprofit community arts organization, and Sarah LoVasco, of SJ Art Consulting will solicit sculptures from artists, and the Garden Club will oversee the mostly native plantings. Work on the Edible Avenue will begin in September, with completion expected by next year. The artwork is scheduled for installation by next summer.

“This project has been a long time coming,” said Mayor Melinda Barrett. “I am excited that the Art Walk and Edible Avenue will have a home at the Riverside Trail at Riverside Park, which is undergoing significant improvements. Trails are a great benefit to offer a community. To be able to provide the public with an opportunity to view art and learn about nature, not just see it, while out on a trail is even better! Thank you to all involved with this project.

It's a product of their determination and collaboration with others that has made the idea a reality.”

The Art Walk and Edible Avenue project is being funded by a \$30,000 donation from the Pentucket Bank Charitable Foundation, as well as grants from the Haverhill Cultural Council, the Massachusetts Federation of Garden Clubs, the Haverhill Garden Club, and Haverhill's Brightside. Whittier Technical High School students built two handicapped accessible raised planting beds that will be installed along the path. Nunan Florist & Greenhouses is contributing shrubs, bushes and plants. Signs and brochures will explain how the plants can be used as food for people, birds, bees, and other pollinators.

“We are so thankful for Pentucket Bank’s continued support and are excited to move this project forward after experiencing a bump in the road when the original location proved infeasible,” said Ann Jacobson, chair of the Team Haverhill Art Walk and Edible Avenue Committee. “We are grateful to Mayor Melinda Barrett and the City of Haverhill for helping us pivot to this new location, which we think will become an exciting new community resource.”

The walkway along the Merrimack River is being paid for with a Mass Trails grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts’ Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs.

From My Corner

City properties and the LRA

You may have noticed that my knowledge of the Lawrence Redevelopment Authority (LRA) is limited. There are more questions everywhere I look, and I'm sure many in the city feel the same way; it's not an easy subject to understand unless you are in the "thick of things."

I have the list of properties that the City is planning to turn over to the LRA, and even with my limited education on the subject, I began to question the purpose because it didn't make sense.

Let me explain. In a letter from the LRA attorney Brian Corrigan to the Council, he wrote:

"The LRA submitted a request for proposals for the many lots available in the city, and the deadline is September 13, 2024. At that time, they plan to review the proposals received, host developer presentations, and make recommendations before the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC). This committee consists of 25 members of the Lawrence community made up by 12 members representing the City's 6 districts, 2 appointed by each City Councilor from his/her district and 6 citizens appointed by the 3 at-Large City Councilors; 2 appointed by the Mayor; 1 member of the public safety committee appointed by the Police Chief; 1 members appointed by the Merrimack Valley Planning Commission; and 3 community members appointed by the LRA and representing the architectural/engineering, business and members and banking fields. The goal is to convene the CAC before the proposal submission deadline to discuss logistics and establish a schedule for the developer presentations as we head into the fall."

Currently, the LRA is selling properties belonging to the City because Mayor Brian DePeña has not signed off on any of them. Are they getting ahead of themselves, or is that a way to pressure the mayor and the councilors? How can they open the proposals on September 13th "to review the proposals received, host developer presentations, and make recommendations" on properties they don't own yet?

During that meeting, the developers will get to know the people representing the area where their properties are located, allowing them to establish rapport and stress the benefits for the area if they acquire it. I don't want to think about other nefarious dealings that we hear of in different places.

The main question is to explain to the taxpayers the criteria for releasing a piece of city-owned property to the Lawrence Redevelopment Authority.

- Under General Laws chapter 121 B Section 5, as well as Section 7. A housing or redevelopment authority shall elect from among its members a chairman and a vice-chairman, and may employ counsel, an executive director who shall be ex officio secretary of the authority;

- Establish rehabilitation and design standards;
- Assemble and dispose of land, including the taking of real estate through eminent domain; Relocate businesses and residents occupying property in urban renewal areas;
- Demolish and / or rehabilitate substandard structures;
- Participate in real estate development and commercial revitalization;
- Issue bonds, borrow money, invest funds, and receive grants; and
- Accept gifts or requests.

That information is available on the City of Lawrence's website.

On April 4, 2024, The Eagle-Tribune published an article entitled Council readies for legal action over transfer of Lawrence owned properties by Jill Harnacinski stating:

"At the heart of the issue is a 2016 urban renewal plan developed by the LRA. Under that plan, DePena and LRA members believe they can transfer the 11 properties to the LRA without current approval by the City Council.

"City attorney Timothy Houten, however, in a decision issued March 28, said all land transfers must be signed by the mayor after receiving approval from the City Council."

The public believes there's a war between the mayor and the council president (Jevanny Rodriguez), but it is all there in the city council meetings. Once we learn to listen to both sides, we conclude that something is not being done right.

For example, the council president wants to know why the properties must be surrendered to the LRA when we could sell them and keep the profits it could bring to the city. Once the LRA sells them, they keep that profit for future investments, not the city.

Mayor DePeña explained that the parking lots (another example) will be sold to build garages with business spaces on the first floor, leaving the city with that revenue. That's unclear, which is why the councilors object to approval.

Also, Buckley Garage was included on the original list, but something happened and was removed. They came to their senses because that garage earns Lawrence \$600,000 yearly.

There are too many inconsistencies to agree to give up on our properties.

Poor elections turnout

As it was predicted, very few people went to vote last Tuesday. Yes, that angers me because if people knew the value of their vote, they would never miss that opportunity.

Most people go to the polls motivated by a candidate, not the issues. Sometimes, the reason is to vote against the other candidate in complete ignorance of what benefits or damages society.

We see it at all levels of our communities, whether they are well-educated or not. People who refuse to talk to others with opposing views because their minds are made up or listen to radio or television stations that may expose them to other candidates. What a sad state of affairs we have!
